



"No pain, no gain" really comes alive for athletes with injuries, but most of them say they would rather do without!







Fall is an adjustment period for most students. We stay busy train-














in the ditch.



Where she got them is a mystery. Upon reaching the curb, she handed the barrel to a couple of teen-agers. One took a large swig.

That's not a common sight in Montrose.

After all, residents say their town is a great place to raise a

people are friendly and the police system is great. It's a quiet town — usually. But not on Friday and Saturday nights.

That's when thousands of teen-agers, out in downtown Montrose, hang out, everyone gets along well and there's no trouble.

There are no cops, half a dozen teen-agers explained. Saturday night.


