A Quick Word on Fall MAP Testing

This fall, students in grades 1–11 will take the MAP Growth tests in math and reading. These aren't your typical "pass or fail" tests—they're actually pretty helpful. The test adapts to each student as they go, so it gives us a real picture of where they're at and what they're ready to learn next.

After testing, we get a RIT score, which helps us track growth over time—kind of like marking height on a doorframe. Teachers use that info to adjust their instruction and give students the support they need, right when they need it.

JHEF Receives Gifts in Memory of Linda Rieschick

The Jackson Heights Education Foundation (JHEF) recently received memorials designated specifically for the Jackson Heights schools. The donations were made in memory of Linda Rieschick, a long time supporter of Jackson Heights, who passed away in July 2026.

"Linda's family and friends recognized how much Jackson Heights meant to her and wanted her passing to have a positive impact on the faculty and students," said Max Lierz, president of the JHEF.

Lierz said the money will be used to provide \$100 classroom grants for the teachers of the Jackson Heights schools. A classroom grant application has been distributed to the faculty and the Foundation's Board of Directors will oversee how the funds are distributed. They work with the district administration to purchase the requested classroom materials.

"This is a wonderful way to honor a loved one and a tribute to their involvement in the Jackson Heights schools," Lierz said about the memorial gifts. "It is a great example of the impact that our organization can have on our schools by helping families and friends leave legacy gifts," said Lierz.

Lierz said memorial gifts are a good reminder that the work of the foundation is making a real difference.

The Jackson Heights Educational Foundation is a charitable, non-profit organization created in 2008 to strengthen educational opportunities for students and patrons of USD #335. The Foundation is designated as a 501(c)3 organization so all contributions to the Foundation are tax deductible. It is eligible to receive private, state and federal grants. The Jackson Heights Educational Foundation has acquired more than \$100,000 in grant funds over the past 18 years to support and strengthen programs at the elementary and high school/middle school. Projects range from media production to archery, and from literacy to driver's education.

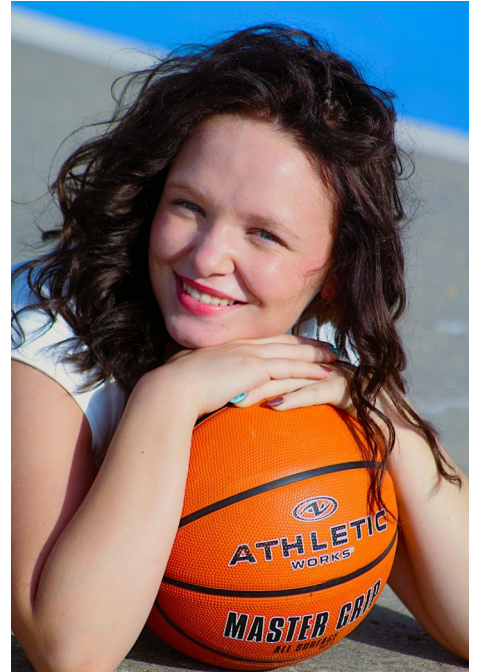
Alexis Deneault

- Mr. Howard, Mr. Vanderbilt, Reporter-Brian Sanders, Travis Henry, Duke Condo, Tony Rieschick, Kristi Altenburg, Vern Andrews, David Heit, and Jed Rose were present for the meeting.
- Call to Order** Mr. Keeler called the board meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.
- Flag Salute** The flag salute was recited.
- Agenda** Dr. Allen moved to approve the agenda as presented. Mr. Holliday seconded the motion. Motion carried 7-0.
- Public Forum** Duke Condo presented on the FCCLA National trip taken to Washington DC over the summer. He expressed gratitude to the school and board members for being able to attend.
- Vern Andrews presented his technology requests and answered questions for board members. In the past, student computers have been replaced on a 4-year schedule. That could be extended to get more life out of the computers. Currently when a computer has reached the end of its use, Mr. Andrews is able to save them for parts if repairs need to be made on other student computers. At present, Mr. Andrews recommended ordering Chrome Books for 2nd grade and replacing some staff computers in need.
- Consent Agenda** Dr. Allen moved to approve the consent agenda that consisted of the following:
- Approval of the regular board meeting minutes from July 13, 2026, payments of the current bills and activity accounting funds as presented, along with the energy lease payment for \$148,480.00. Michelle Cochran seconded the motion. Motion carried 7-0.
- Old Business** Mr. Jed Rose with BHS and Mr. David Heit with Civium gave an update on the Bond progress and next steps. Mr. Rose received the subcontractor bids earlier this week and is compiling that information. The board will meet again on August 20 to review these bid summaries and get the Guaranteed Maximum Price document. Ground breaking will be scheduled sometime in early September. Mr. Rose also presented options for sound reduction in the new music room.
- Mr. Howard shared that the KSBRC has reviewed the current board policies and presented their summary and suggestions on any changes or updates needed.
- Administrator Reports** Mr. Howard reported that he had recently attended a KSDE Conference in Wichita. The conference was to learn about changes to At-Risk reporting and tracking. He also attended a vendor food show with the kitchen staff this month. Bus inspections have been completed and all are ready to go. Track resurfacing was completed. The school entrance sign on the highway is approved and Schurle Signs will install that as soon as possible. Mr. Howard reported that back-to-school summer swim parties were held for all buildings and were well attended.
- Mrs. Rash reviewed the treasurer's report.
- New Business** Handbook updates were presented including a revised cell phone policy, Tardy policy updates, and the

new after school program in the middle and high school program for students with grades below eligibility guidelines. Dr. Allen moved to approve the handbooks for the 2026-27 school year. Mrs. Kirk seconded. Motion carried 7-0.

Mr. Howard and Mr. Vanderbilt presented information on district communication and social media use. Per new Kansas legislature, school staff can share information but are not allowed to engage back with students via social media or text. One way the coaches and sponsors will be able to send out information to students and parents is Sports You. Mr. Holliday moved to approve the Sports You app for district communications for the 2026-27 school year. Dr. Schierling seconded. Motion carried 7-0.

It was presented to move back to an 8-hour day at the middle and high school. Dr. Allen moved to approve for the 2026-27 school year. Mrs. Kirk seconded. Motion carried 7-0.

Consideration of approval of KSBRC board policies was tabled in order to provide more time to review the documents.

The Joint Teacher Agreement for the 2026-27 school year was reviewed. Changes include \$1,500 on the Base rate, 3 additional steps added to each column, an early retirement notice stipend, and maternity/paternity leave being written into the sick leave bank as the teacher negotiation team sees fit. Dr. Schierling moved to approve the agreed-upon changes for the 2026-27 school year. Mr. Bagby seconded. Motion passed 7-0.
