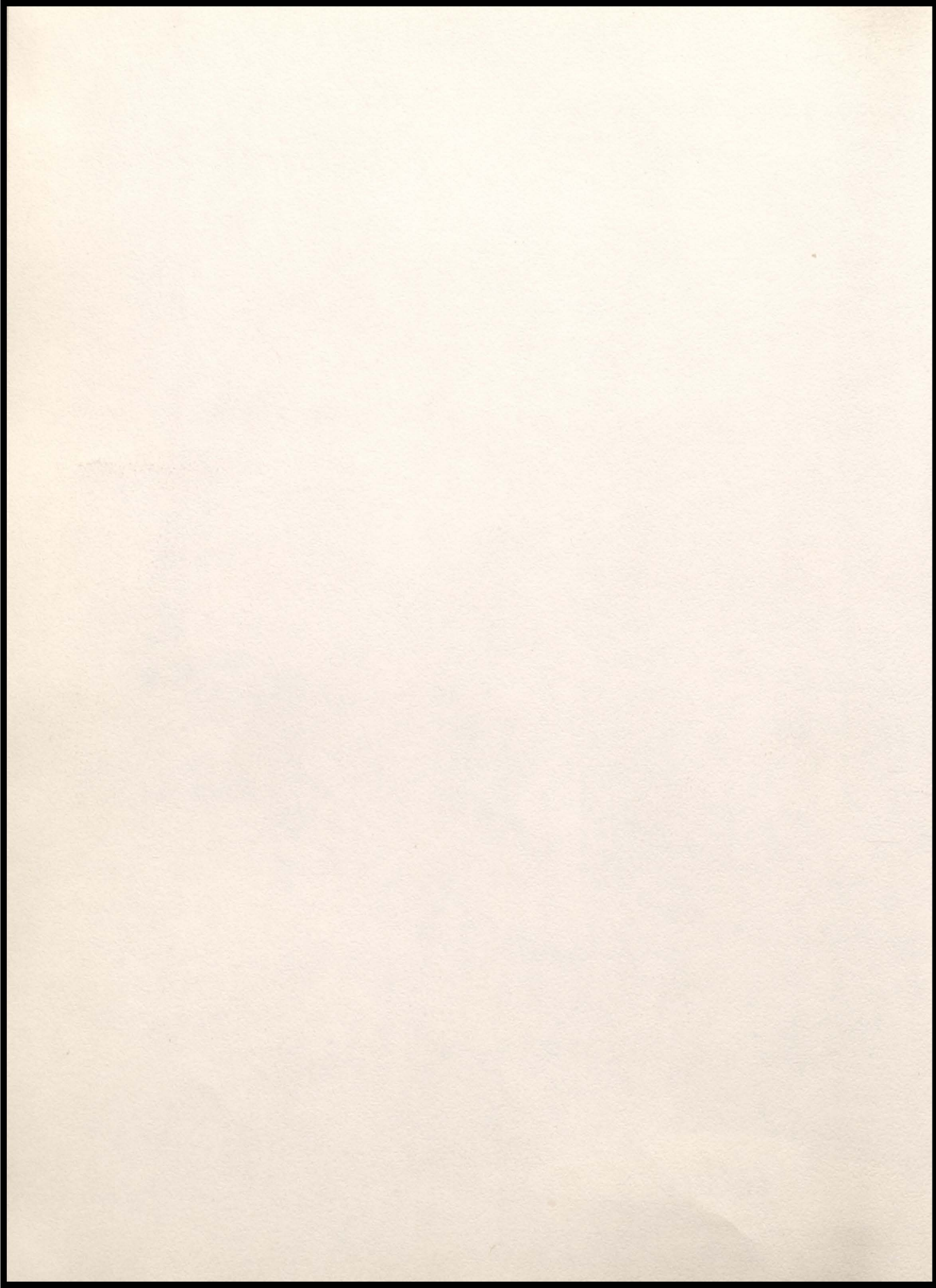


Mrs. Brumbach's town car

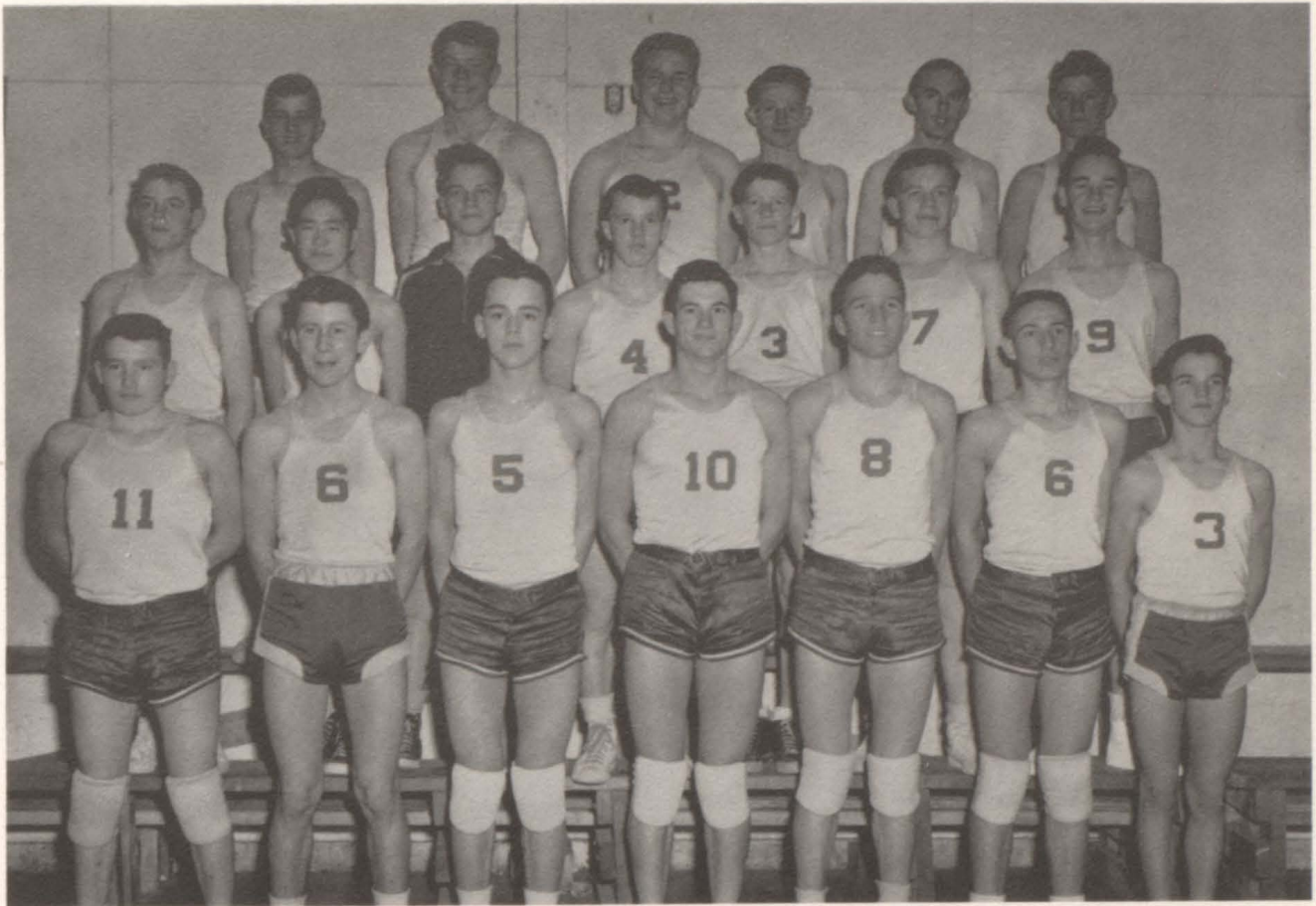
“A” SQUAD
