



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

Cape Kennedy isn't the only site that can launch rockets. Northwestern had their own launch pad and crew of engineers. On January 31, the physics class, taught by Mr. Roggenbuck, sent up a two-stage rocket. The rocket was equipped with a miniature camera.

Their goal—to snap a picture of the school building. The rocket soared to an altitude of 2,100 feet and took the picture. When the negative was developed, it showed they had missed their mark. The picture covered about one square block, northwest across the intersection from the school building. The cause of error was believed to have been the wind currents.

Although they didn't accomplish their goal, it was quite an amazing feat. The physics class and Mr. Roggenbuck gained some publicity for their efforts. A radio station in Aberdeen gave an account of their launching and the Redfield Press carried the picture that was taken; both dubbed Northwestern "Cape Roggenbuck."

Science is a part of everyday life. It makes no difference which way we look—science is all about us.

It appears in the smallest blade of grass to the mighty power of a multi-staged rocket. Science is especially vital in this era of space adventure. Scientific study and research results in a better standard of living for all mankind.

Because of its importance and magnificence we, the annual staff, would like to base the theme of the 1966-67 Wildcat around the world of science.



Mr. Landru Janes is the guidance director at Northwestern. He teaches guidance, psychology, and English III and IV.







Grade Band






Remedial Reading

This year six sophomores were selected as waitresses and waiters for the Junior-Senior Banquet and Prom.












