### **Equal Educational Opportunity Policy**

## News from the Superintendent

I would like to take a minute to explain how important allowable growth is to all school districts. Allowable growth is a percentage increase of the cost per pupil that school districts are provided by the state. Allowable growth is supposed to be set, by law, 30 days after the governor sets the budget for the state. This would be prior to the start of the next school year. When legislators do not follow this law it forces schools to make tough decisions in regards to programs and staff. As a school, we have to assume that we will be getting no increase in the cost per pupil. Also, when the legislature does not set allowable growth at a reasonable rate, this causes many school districts to receive a 101% budget guarantee. The more schools that receive the guarantee, the higher property taxes will be in Iowa. The more allowable growth the state gives the less money that has to be raised through local property taxes. The following article gives a bit more insight to allowable growth and its importance:

School leaders say they're looking at a "horrible" situation if state lawmakers don't strike a deal on school funding soon. School officials say they're running out of time to prepare budgets for next year and it's still not clear when the Legislature will approve a funding increase. The Solon School Board passed a resolution this week calling for lawmakers to raise per-pupil state support by 4 percent for the next two years and to do so sooner than later.

Until a funding bill is approved, school administrators say they're left guessing. "We're building our budget with a couple different scenarios and plugging in different numbers on what it might be and trying to see how it's going to impact us," Solon Superintendent Sam Miller said.

The Statehouse is a year behind on determining school funding. K-12 funding in Iowa is based on what policymakers call allowable growth, which is how much per-pupil support from the state increases each year. Democrats in the Iowa Senate voted to set that allowable growth at 4 percent last year, but the Republican-controlled Iowa House didn't take up the bill.

"If last year is any indication, then no, I'm not very hopeful that this will be done prior to April 15," the deadline for schools to publish their budgets, Miller said. "School leaders are going to be in the horrible position of just guessing with funding."

In Iowa City, school officials say they're pushing for 4 percent allowable growth, but it appears 2 percent is more likely. Chief financial officer Craig Hansel said the Iowa City Community School District is writing its budget based on 2 percent allowable growth but also is preparing a 0 percent allowable growth budget. The law requires school districts to publish a no-increase budget if no allowable growth has been approved.

"We're still waiting," Hansel said at a School Board finance committee meeting last week.

The Democrat-controlled Senate already has passed two funding bills — one to set allowable growth at 4 percent next year and another passed Thursday to set the same rate for the following year. The Republican-controlled House has not voted on those bills, and Gov. Terry Branstad is urging lawmakers to first approve his proposed shake-up for teacher pay.

Republicans have said passing basic funding before approving bigger education reform is "putting the cart before the horse" while Democrats have said waiting any longer is "holding allowable growth hostage."

Iowa schools are funded through a combination of state support and local property tax dollars, with the state providing 87.5 percent of the money. School funding is distributed on a per-student basis to local districts. State supplemental aid for K-12 schools this fiscal year totals \$6,001 per pupil.

If you have not contacted your local legislature in regards to allowable growth for schools, please do so. Explain to them the importance to a school's budget by knowing what allowable growth will be a year in advance. Also express to them the importance of a reasonable allowable growth percentage. ## Library Happenings

What a great winter we're having at the library. The kids are really enjoying all the books that are constantly coming in and out. Daily we have students coming in to quiz on books. They also are doing this in their classrooms. The Scholastic Reading Counts quizzing program is purchased for all first through fourth grade students and for others with teacher recommendation. Reading a story and checking for comprehension is another way teachers are able to assess a child's progress.

The vacation brought a variety of ereader type devices into school. Students are having a blast accessing books online. Just a reminder that all students have access to FollettShelf via the Keystone AEA website. Students will need their own passwords that were given to them at the beginning of the school year. Many have the green Keystone sticker affixed to the inside of their planner. Any questions, feel free to call me at school, ext. 1670. The Fort Atkinson Library also has the NEIBORS online reading program that allows students and adults to check out books digitally. Talk to Chris Bodensteiner if you'd like to become a patron there. Students in grades K – 2 are using iPads daily to enhance reading, and in grades three through 12 many have used personal devices or laptops to access books. We really have a number of great tools that weren't available even five years ago.

The Turkey Valley Education Foundation supplied funding this year for mini grants that are allowing students to enrich their learning. Kindergarteners are using a program called ClickNRead Phonics to further fundamentals for beginning reading. Students in grades two through six are actively using a program called First in Math which allows them to gain and practice math skills at an individual pace, and all students and teachers have access to DEStreaming Plus, a data base of instructional videos that help do research and delve into multiple topics. This support goes a long way and each child benefits by having access, so thanks to all our parents, community members and staff who support the efforts of the Education Foundation's mission to enhance learning at Turkey Valley.

Private donations to the library were recently made to the library by teacher Lezley Johansen in the form of a magazine subscription and by Sharla Fencl in the form of a book donation in memory of Harlan Middlebrook, the late husband of former teacher Wilda Middlebrook. Sharon Bahr also donated a book on wind farms, and the information included will be a great asset to our students as more of these energy generators are appearing in our area. Your giving is much appreciated. Another special thank you goes to Shirley Riha and family for their very generous gift to the libraries in memory of husband and father Dan Riha. We will enjoy buying books with this donation, but better yet, each time one is opened a reminder of Dan will be shared.

## Turkey Valley Wellness Team Activities

The Turkey Valley Wellness Team has been busy since the start of the school year empowering our youth to be healthy and strong. Understanding the relationship between health education, good nutrition, and regular physical activity is important to improve the health of all students at Turkey Valley. It is our goal to ***create a community-wide learning environment that promotes wellness, which results in healthy lifestyle choices for the overall lifelong well-being of school district students and their families.***

One of our wellness goals for the 2012-2013 school year is to provide interesting and useful health information to all students on a monthly cycle. The January wellness theme focused on Substance Abuse Prevention. Along with bulletin board displays, the sixth grade students started the DARE unit. Our February theme is Heart Health Awareness. The upper elementary students participated in a Heart Health Fair on Valentine's Day coordinated by Lynnette Kruse, RN, an Upper Iowa University student nurse completing her Community Health clinical rotation at Turkey Valley as she works towards her BSN. She taught the students about the anatomy of the heart and how the heart functions in the body. The students then listened to their own hearts using stethoscopes. Joetta Redlin, a dietitian from Winneshiek Medical Center, taught the students about the importance of eating a heart healthy diet. The students were asked to list heart healthy foods from each of the food groups. Raeann Flick, from Drs. Boeding and Speltz Family Dentistry, talked to the students about the importance of limiting sugars in their diet, and how keeping their teeth healthy actually helps to keep their hearts healthy. She had a display demonstrating the actual amounts of sugar in common treats and sodas. Nicole Reicks, RN, from Winneshiek Medical Center Home Health, taught the students about the importance of physical activity in keeping their hearts strong and healthy. The students checked their pulses before and after exercise, and discussed the benefits of exercising their hearts by getting at least 60 minutes of physical activity every day.

By time you read this article, the secondary students will have already participated in a Wellness Day at 'The W' at Wartburg College in Waverly. Our goal is to expose the students to an environment of wellness and activities, allowing them to enhance their physical and mental well-being. It should be a great day of fun, camaraderie, and working-out!

Our March theme will focus on the Prevention of Head Injuries. Wearing seat belts, using bicycle and motorcycle helmets, and exercising good judgment are all strategies for preventing head injuries. We have a TIPS (Traumatic Injury Prevention Strategies) assembly planned for the students in grades 5 through 12 on March 15<sup>th</sup>.



## Spring Musical "Little Shop of Horrors"



Preschool Registration will be held in the Elementary Library/Media Center on Wednesday, March 20, between 3:30-6:00 p.m. Please bring your child's birth certificate as proof of birth date and his/her social security number.

**Registrations will not be accepted by phone. Students will be registered on a first come-first served basis, so be sure to stop in during registration. If you are unable to attend registration, you may send a friend or relative who can register your child on your behalf.**

## Scheduling for the 2013-2014 School Year

In upcoming weeks, students will receive registration materials for the 2013-2014 school year. The Course Guide, a listing of all high school courses offered at Turkey Valley, will be available electronically on the school website. Paper copies will be available for student use in the guidance office, media center, study halls, and in each junior-senior high school classroom. Each student will then complete and return a course registration sheet indicating the courses they plan to take for next year. The sheet requires a parent signature; please review this information with your son or daughter. Keep in mind that some lab courses are limited to the number of students allowed per section and also that some courses are limited to when they are offered. Students are required to take six classes and PE each semester; 50 credits are required to graduate

There are different types of classes offered at Turkey Valley including:

- Regular high school classes (elective and required) receive high school credit.
- Concurrent enrollment classes are taken for both high school and college credit (through NICC). These courses are offered at Turkey Valley by an instructor or via the ICN, or offered at other NICC sites. Students enroll for these classes at Turkey Valley. (These classes are listed in all CAPITAL letters in the Course Guide and on registration forms.)
- PSEO (Post Secondary Enrollment Options) courses are for both high school and college credit (through NICC). These courses are taken online or at an NICC site. To search for classes on the NICC website go to: [www.nicc.edu/courses/](http://www.nicc.edu/courses/) and then open “Search for credit courses”. PSEO registration forms are available in the guidance office. If a similar course is offered at Turkey Valley, the class cannot be taken PSEO. Administrative approval is required.
- AP (Advanced Placement) Courses through the Iowa Online Academy for students identified as gifted/talented. Qualifying students should contact the school G/T coordinator for a list of available courses and number of openings. AP courses are taken for high school credit with the possibility of receiving college credit based on the end-of-course exam score.

NOTE: Concurrent enrollment and PSEO courses are paid for by the district, but may require additional out-of-class time or fees/materials that are the responsibility of the student. These courses are taken as juniors and seniors; courses are also available to G/T freshmen and sophomores. Some age restrictions and qualifying placements may apply. For more information, please contact the guidance office.


