Each of these options focuses on different aspects of Selkirk programs so you will probably need to access more than one to get all of the information you want about our schools. For example, "Weekly Classroom

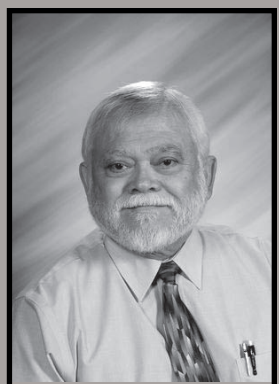


Field day at Selkirk Elementary (June 2006) - See page 12 for more pictures

THE PACE OF SUMMER

Someone asked me the other day if the pace of summer “slowed down” at school for those who work year-round. For students, summer elicits thoughts of lazy days, floating in inner-tubes, hanging out with friends, no homework... a leisurely pace. I thought about the staff still working during the summer months and started ticking off each group mentally.

The **custodial crew**, down to three this year, started the day after school was out on their annual thorough cleaning and repair routine. They did not look like they were moving slower than they had during the school year. As a matter of fact, I didn’t think bringing up the topic of “speed” was a good idea the other day when I saw the crew moving heavy boxes and furniture out of rooms as the temperature outside peaked at 100 degrees; we won’t discuss the temperature inside! Schools in the northeast corner of Washington generally get by without central air, but during those hot July and August months, I know of at least three people that would beg to differ!

I also thought of the **transportation foreman** (slash) mechanic who attended two different trainings himself and spent much of June readying our bus fleet for the annual State Patrol inspection in July. He also trained new drivers this summer which gave him an opportunity to experience the hours of preparation for classroom lessons that come with teaching! As he tried to slip in a week or two of vacation around trainings

and before the school year begins, I thought it best not to ask whether he felt things were a little slow lately!

The **office staff**, working long hours in June and July to prepare a balanced 2007-2008 budget, publish the Selkirk Success, and close out the previous years’ books, did not appear to be working in slow motion either. In fact, looming deadlines for State year-end reports and 07-08 grant applications seemed to kick everyone into high gear.

The **grounds crew** of one person maintains all fields and surrounding grounds areas for the three schools: watering, mowing, and dealing with weeds and gophers! Summer is the busiest time in the district for grounds maintenance and in order to keep all three sites looking good, she moves quickly!

Building **principals** are not paid to work year-round, they just do because the job requires them to attend conferences and trainings, coordinate and supervise maintenance projects, and file end-of-year reports. When all that is done (a seemingly impossible goal considering the overwhelming amount of work), it is time to prepare their buildings and staff for opening day in September! As they both carved out a few days here and there to be with their families (and not in the office), I wasn’t so sure that summer elicited the same leisurely feeling that they had has kids.

What I did notice, however, was that even if the pace of summer wasn’t “slower”, it was definitely different. The tasks that had been put aside or buried throughout the year to deal with more pressing issues concerning students, academic programs, staff needs and facilities

concerns now moved their way to the top of the to-do list. This summer, we found time to complete important projects like board policy review (see our website for updates), facilities planning, curriculum and assessment review, preparation for 2008 Levy, and collaboration with other agencies and businesses. Most of the projects tackled by staff in the summer are not possible during the school year when staff and students occupy the buildings and their issues come first.

In the time it took to ponder all of the variables and answer the question that was posed at the beginning of the article, I realized that even though summer is just as hectic with multiple projects and deadlines, it is missing something.

The buildings do not vibrate with the same excitement and enthusiasm in the summer as they do when students occupy the classrooms. The energy created by student learning and activities is the blood that courses through the veins of a school keeping it alive and growing. The summer activities are like “maintenance” on that body.

So, when I finally answered the query about the pace of summer, my response was that summer, for year-round school staff, is like the proverbial soccer mom who after dropping the kids at the field, whips into the gas station to fill the mini-van and then dashes off to finish five different errands all in diverse parts of the town, some of the errands being for those proverbial soccer kids, and finishing in time to bring snacks and other refreshments to the team before they head out to start the game...just a little maintenance to keep things running smoothly!

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EDUCATOR OF THE YEAR



The Selkirk School District Board of Directors has selected Carla Chantry as the 2006-2007 Educator of the Year.

During an awards assembly on June 14, 2007 in front of the entire elementary school, Superintendent Nancy Lotze presented Carla Chantry with the award on behalf of the school board. The Educator of the Year award is in its eighth year. According to Lotze, the school board calls for nominations in May and selects the recipient at their regular monthly meeting. Nominations can be made for any employee within the district. Over the past eight years, the board has selected four classroom teachers, one counselor, and two classified employees: a library/media specialist and P.E. assistant/paraeducator as Educator of the Year.

Chantry received multiple nominations from staff, students, and parents. During the presentation, Lotze equated Chantry's many qualities with the nine elementary school "Selkirk Way" words of the month to help students understand the enormity of Chantry's impact. Throughout the school year, two students from each class who demonstrate the word of the month trait receive an award and a certificate for a free hamburger at the Western Star, a local business sponsoring the character trait program.

Prior to the Educator of the Year presentation, elementary principal, Don Hawpe, awarded sixteen students a "Principal's Award" for demonstrating "Selkirk Way" traits throughout the year. Lotze made a comparison for the 170 students and parents in the assembly that, "The Educator of the Year award is somewhat like as Principal's Award for adults, but without the free hamburger!" She went on to describe how Chantry exhibited each of the following traits: initiative, commitment, cooperation, courtesy, success, appreciation, respect, honesty, self-discipline, and responsibility.

Lotze also described Chantry's impact on the education program at the elementary school. Ten years ago, few, if any of Selkirk's first grade students, attained the ending first grade level. However, with Chantry's assistance the district developed a strong guided reading program and today, the majority of first grade students do reach "level 18" in the series. Lotze stated that the district has focused resources toward developing a strong reading program in the early grades and that Chantry has been an integral part of the district's success. In 2006, 100% of Selkirk's third grade students passed the reading WASL and 95% of the fourth grade students met the standard.

Summer break is a time to re-group, reflect on the past year and make changes that will help the department run a little smoother in the 2007-2008 school year. However, I didn't find much time for reflection these past two months. Instead, it was full speed ahead (and sometimes super speed) through June and July as I attended driver trainer in-service in Spokane, prepared for our fleet for the annual State Patrol bus inspection on July 2 and on July 9 starting driver training class for new bus drivers. We received an excellent report on the condition of our fleet, by the way, from the State Patrol!

We are also in the beginning stages of updating our video systems in the buses. Our current systems are 10 years old, the cameras are the old Sony HandyCam 8mm cameras. The last time we tried to have one repaired it couldn't be fixed due to the age of the camera. We are now looking into a new system that uses a flash card to record the video so there will be no more tapes. We are able to try the system on a 60 day trial basis to decide if this is the right system for our program.

Also in August and September, I will be preparing to take possession of two new busses that the district was able to purchase from saved "depreciation funds". These funds are allotted to each district annually and are based on your current bus fleet's depreciation schedule. Selkirk School District has done a great job over the past 10-15 years managing the fleet and depreciation schedules so that we have not had to ask the community for extra levy funds for a bus purchase. We will be replacing the two small 20-passenger busses. In two years, we should have enough depreciation built up to purchase another large passenger bus.

No changes are anticipated on the bus routes this year, although drivers may change as each August they "bid" their route by seniority. Of course, we will also be adding new regular drivers with the retirements of Sharon Haney and Ken Percival last year.

PUBLIC NOTICES

No Child Left Behind Ensures Your Right to Know

No Child Left Behind (NCLB) places an emphasis on parents' right to know about the professional qualifications of their child's classroom teachers. Parents have the right to request the following information about the instructional staff working with their child:

1. Has the teacher met state certification for the grades and subjects that he or she is teaching?
2. Is the teacher working with an emergency or conditional certificate?
3. What was the baccalaureate degree major of the teacher and any other graduate certifications or degrees held?
4. What are the qualifications of the paraeducators working with the child?

In addition, all Title 1 schools must notify parents individually when their child had been assigned to or has been taught for four or more consecutive weeks by a teacher who does not meet NCLB requirements. Selkirk Elementary School operates a Title 1 school-wide program.

All Selkirk School District K-12 teachers and paraeducators currently meet the highly qualified definitions set by NO Child Left Behind (NCLB). HOME-BASED INSTRUCTION

Lotze wants to remind parents who intend to provide home-based instruction in lieu of attendance or enrollment in a public school, approved private school, or an extension program of an approved private school that they must file an annual declaration of intent to provide home-based instruction by September 15th. Forms are available at the Selkirk District Office located on the Selkirk Jr/Sr High School campus (509) 446-2951.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION INVITED

Annually, the Selkirk School District applies for Special Education, Title 1, Learning Assistance Program, and Vocational funding. 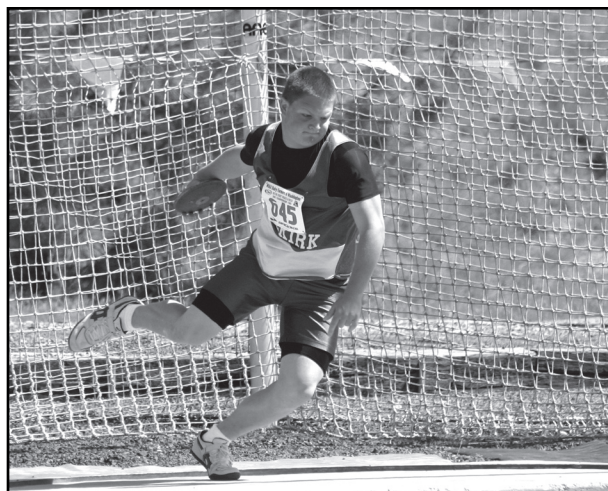

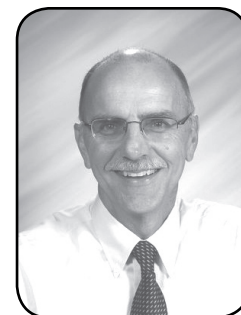

Dress Code 2007-2008

These are the most common dress code concerns. Please refer to the school district policy (3224) for complete details. The best advice for students and parents concerning school attire is, if you are in doubt, do not wear the item to school.

Prohibited clothing includes, but is not limited to:

1. Short skirts, including skorts. These must be at least to the length of the end of hand when arm is placed in rest position along the outer leg.
2. Short shorts. Inseam must be a minimum of five inches in length.
3. Dangling belts.
4. Spaghetti straps, strapless or backless tops or dresses.
5. Any clothing that reveals the abdomen or underwear.
6. Stocking hats or beanies – those styles or colors associated with or similar to gang attire. All hats or beanies will be worn above the eyebrows. Students may be required to remove any style of hat or beanie to comply with classroom rules.
7. Shirts of the tank top style that have narrow straps over the shoulders or plunge down in the back, front or under the arms. This includes the men's white t-shirt style garment.
8. Tags or bandannas – those styles and colors associated with or similar to gang attire.
9. Clothing, jewelry items with statement, messages or pictures referring to alcohol, tobacco, drugs, sexual activity, violent behavior or other offensive material.

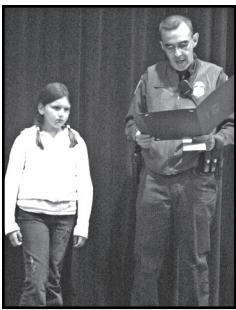

Letter to Parents/Guardians of Students with Health Concerns

If your child has a health concern or is taking any medications during the school hours, whether the medicines are scheduled or "as needed" (i.e.: in an emergency basis), I need to have a health plan and Doctor's order on file at the school. I sent home information to parents of children that have had a health plan or taking medications, during the 06-07 school year, so they were able to have these plans/forms ready at the start of this school year.

If your child has a health concern that we need to be aware of, for their health and safety during the school hours, please call the school to set up a time to meet with me so we can make an appropriate care plan for your child.

If your child has medication that they will need to take at school, please contact the school to find out the appropriate forms that may be needed and filled out by both your child's doctor and you, the parent/guardian.

As of July 1, 2005 schools are required to provide meningococcal information beginning with sixth grade entry to students and parents in our community. All students, grade 6-12, and their parents, need to be informed of this disease.

Meningococcal disease, commonly known as meningococcal meningitis, strikes up to 3,000 adolescents and adults in the U.S. each year. Adolescents and young adults have an increased rate of contracting meningococcal disease compared to the general population. According to one study, as many as one out of every four adolescents infected with the disease may die. Of those who survive, up to 20 percent suffer long-term disabilities, including brain damage, hearing loss, kidney disease and limb amputations.

The Department of Health wants you to be aware of meningococcal meningitis and the availability of a vaccine to protect against the disease. Vaccination can help protect against up to 83 percent of the meningococcal disease cases occurring among adolescents and young adults. Vaccination is not required for school attendance.

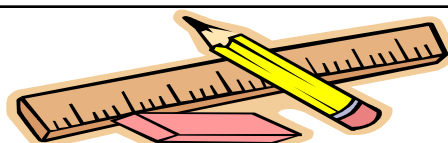

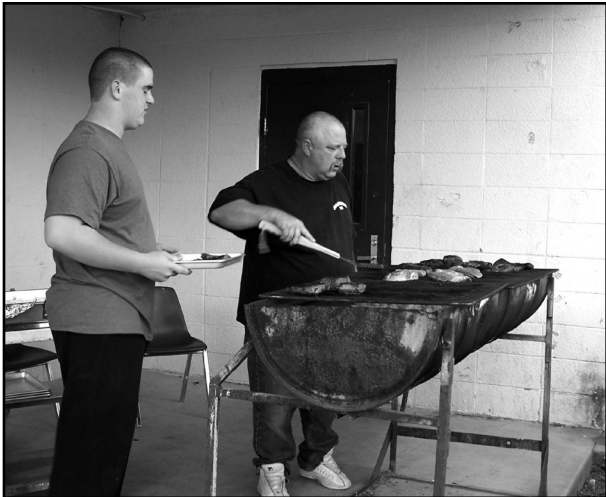

- WASL –Graduating classes of 2008-2012, students must pass the reading and writing WASL, a state approved alternative to the WASL or an assessment for students in special education. Students can meet the state’s math requirement by passing the math WASL, a state-approved alternative or an assessment for students in special education, OR, they can continue to earn math credits until they graduate. Students who pass the reading, writing and math assessments earn a Certificate of Academic Achievement or Certificate of Individual Achievement and a high school diploma. Students who fulfill the math requirement by earning math credits do not receive a certificate but do earn a diploma.
- Culminating Project – Each student shall complete a culminating project for graduation. (Completed through the senior careers class)
- High School & Beyond Plan – Students shall have an education plan for their high school experience, including what they expect to do the year following graduation. (Started in the 9th grade and completed in senior careers)

NOTIFICATION OF RIGHTS UNDER THE FAMILY EDUCATIONAL RIGHTS AND PRIVACY ACT (FERPA) for Elementary and Secondary Schools

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords parents and students over 18 years of age ("eligible students") certain rights with respect to the student's education records. These rights are:

- (1) The right to inspect and review the student's education records within 45 days of the day the School receives a request for access.
Parents or eligible students should submit to the School principal [or appropriate school official] a written request that identifies the record(s) they wish to inspect. The School official will make arrangements for access and notify the parent or eligible student of the time and place where the records may be inspected.
- (2) The right to request the amendment of the student's education records that the parent or eligible student believes are inaccurate or misleading.
Parents or eligible students may ask the School to amend a record that they believe is inaccurate or misleading. They should write the School principal [or appropriate official], clearly identify the part of the record they want changed, and specify why it is inaccurate or misleading.
If the School decides not to amend the record as requested by the parent or eligible student, the School will notify the parent or eligible student of the decision and advise them of their right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the parent or eligible student when notified of the right to a hearing.
- (3) The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent.
One exception, which permits disclosure without consent, is disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests. A school official is a person employed by the School as an administrator, supervisor, instructor, or support staff member (including health or medical staff and law enforcement unit personnel); a person serving on the School Board; a person or company with whom the School has contracted to perform a special task (such as an attorney, auditor, medical consultant, or therapist); or a parent or student serving on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or assisting another school official in performing his or her tasks.
A school official has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his or her professional responsibility.
[Optional] Upon request, the School discloses education records without consent to officials of another school district in which a student seeks or intends to enroll.
[NOTE: FERPA requires a school district to make a reasonable attempt to notify the parent or eligible student of the records request unless it states in its annual notification that it intends to forward records on request.]
- (4) The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by the School to comply with the requirements of FERPA. The name and address of the Office that administers FERPA are:

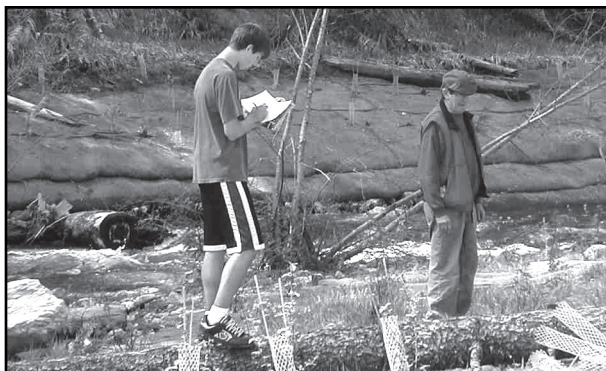

*State Law Qualification: Although FERPA allows 45 days to honor a request, the state policy records law requires an appropriate response to a "public records" request within five business days. RCW 42.17.320

NOTE: In addition, an institution may want to include its directory information public notice, as required by §99.37 of the regulations, with its annual notification of rights under FERPA.

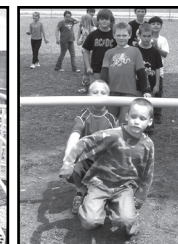
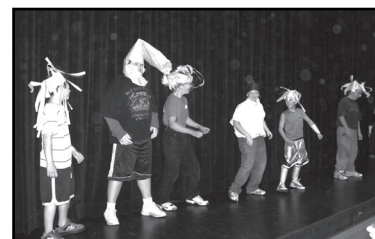

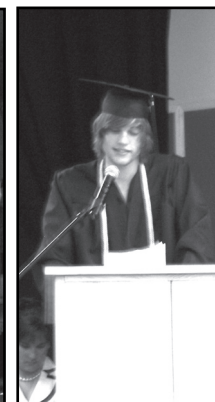

Selkirk Elementary Field Day

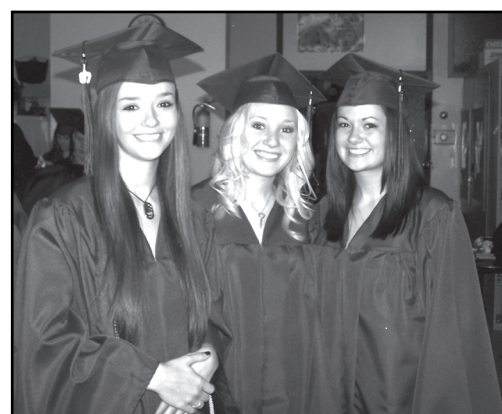

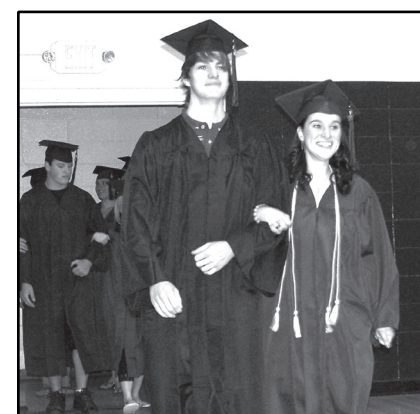
