In February 2023, the percentage of each graduating class on track for graduation was as follows:

- * Class of 2023: 92% (76% in Feb 2022)
- * Class of 2024: 83% (88% in Feb 2022)
- * Class of 2025: 72% (83% in Feb 2022)
- * Class of 2026: 93% (82% in Feb 2022)

We aim for 90-100% of scholars, in all grades to be on track for graduation by February 2024.

In March 2024, the percentage of each graduating class on track for graduation was as follows:

- * Class of 2024: 77%
- * Class of 2025: 71%
- * Class of 2026: 76%
- * Class of 2027: 83%

We saw a marked decrease in on track status across the board, even with efforts inside

Action Plan Steps and Expenditures

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These are the Action Steps identified in the plan to reach the goal:

Step 1: Continue to employ our Achievement Specialist who will tutor scholars on a daily basis in order to make sure all assignments are completed. The Achievement Specialist will monitor grades on a daily basis for scholars who are already off track for earning a high school diploma and currently failing a class or classes. The Achievement Specialist will reach out to parents to connect them to school resources and promote the positive actions of scholars and teachers at Whitehorse High School. This position is a scholar advocate as the person works directly with scholars to support them academically, along with learning executive skills (taking notes, time management, organization, flashcard use/review system, self assessment, how to study for a test, etc) necessary to be successful in school.

Step 2: Continue to employ a person specifically responsible to tutor and support 8th and 9th graders in passing all classes the first time. This position is the Personal Success Tutor. This person will attend core classes for 8th and 9th grade (Math, LA, Science, Business Office Specialist, Social Studies) to gather assignments. The assignments will be organized into a filing cabinet in the Promising Youth Center so that assignments can easily be found. The Personal Success Tutor will also assist with behavior interventions for scholars in these two transition grade levels.

Step 3: Continue to employ a Learning Coordinator who runs our Immediate Credity Recovery program so that scholars can recover credits in the very next quarter as needed. This person will work with the Principal and Counselor to support scholars who are recovering credit as well.
