# Northern Adirondack CSD Capital Project: A Look at Our Future

Public Information Session Highlights: Planning for the Next Decade and Beyond (11/12/25)

The Northern Adirondack CSD held a Public Information Session on November 12th, 2025, to present a proposed capital improvement project. The driving factors behind this project stem from the fact that it has been 15 years between capital improvement projects. Critical infrastructure and building systems are now nearing the end of their useful life. Many original systems are no longer code compliant or efficient, and there are significant facility maintenance needs across the campus.

The proposed project is divided into **Two Propositions** to address both immediate, critical needs and future-focused enhancements.

## The Financial Foundation: Proposition 1 is Tax Levy Neutral

The most important takeaway for local residents is that **Proposition 1 (\$38,000,000) will not place any additional financial burden on local taxpayers.** 

This is achieved because the debt service (bond payment) for Proposition 1 is structured to be **Tax Levy Neutral**. The District is offsetting the entire local share of the new debt through a combination of:

- **1.** New York State Building Aid: The State pays the vast majority of the project cost (NAC's aid ratio is very favorable).
- 2. Expiring Debt: The District has previous capital project debt that is scheduled to expire in the coming years. By timing the new debt to coincide with the retirement of old debt, the annual local tax levy portion for capital projects remains stable.

In short, the community will receive \$38 million in essential infrastructure upgrades with NO increase to the current local tax levy amount.


## **Unveiling Our New Athletic Hall of Fame**


to preserve and honor Northern Adirondack's rich athletic history while inspiring future generations of student-athletes.


All nominations will be reviewed by the Athletic Hall of Fame Committee. Through a voting process, the 2026 Athletic Hall of Fame

## **The Decision-Making Process**

The project scope and cost were developed using a data-driven approach, prioritizing critical needs based on the **Building Condition Survey** and **Facilities Priorities identified by the Capital Project Committee**. The final step is the community-wide **Vote**, scheduled for **December 16th, 2025** 

## **Proposition 1: Addressing Critical**

Proposition 1 focuses on **Critical Infrastructure/Systems Replacement** and includes immediate, high-need items and **All Building Work**. The total projected cost for Proposition 1 is **\$38,000,000**. This proposition includes work that is **NYSED aid-eligible** and, as noted, is structured to be **Tax Levy Neutral**.

## **Elementary School Scope**

The proposed work at the Elementary School focuses on essential systems and maintenance:

- Roof Replacement (Eliminating leaks and degradation).
- · Bathroom Renovations.
- Envelope/ Foundation Upgrades.
- Building Management System Replacement (Improving energy efficiency and climate control).
- Piping Replacement (Storm, Sanitary, Supply) and Closure of Artesian Well.
- Fire Alarm System and PA System Upgrades.
- Electrical Panel Replacement.

### **Middle-High School Scope**

The Middle High School also requires significant system replacements and upgrades:

- Roof Replacement.
- Interior Upgrades Including Floor Repairs.
- Envelope / Foundation Upgrades.
- Building Management System Replacement.
- Control Valve Replacement and Boiler Improvements.
- HVAC Unit Upgrades.
- Fire Alarm/ PA System Upgrades.
- Electrical Service / Panel Replacement and Upgrades
- Install a Stand-By Generator (Ensuring continuity of operations during power outages).
- Roof repair and replacement work

#### **Bus Maintenance Garage & Campus Scope**

The work on the Bus Maintenance Garage includes **Asphalt Paving Replacement** and **Boiler/ Heating Upgrades**.

## **Proposition 2: Enhancements and Future Growth**

Proposition 2 represents **additional scope beyond the aid ceiling and quality of life upgrades.** It allows the District to enhance student opportunity and community use. **It can only pass if Proposition 1 passes.** The total projected cost for Proposition 2 is **\$10,990,000.** 

## A Dire Need for the Athletic Complex

The investment in the **Multi-Sport Artificial Grass Athletic Complex** is driven by the severe and dangerous conditions of our current fields. The state of our playing surface has reached a crisis point:

- Varsity Baseball and Softball: Our teams have been unable to host a single home game on our campus
  for the past three consecutive years due to unplayable field conditions, forcing our athletes to compete at
  off-site locations.
- **Soccer Field:** While currently playable, the turf is uneven and not ideal, leading to increased risk of injury and inconsistent competition.

A new artificial turf complex would provide a safe, high-quality, and reliable surface for all our student athletes and allow our teams to proudly host games on our campus once again.

## **Strategic Investment in the Agricultural Program**

The New Agricultural Program Building is more than just a facility; it is a smart, strategic investment designed to maximize State Aid. **This program is steeped in many years of pride and tradition here at Northern Adirondack CSD**, and this new facility will ensure it thrives for generations to come.

The structure is designed to contain a much-needed Agriculture Classroom and Lab Space along with the necessary facilities for bathrooms and storage. This additional classroom and lab capacity significantly enhances our ability to provide rich, hands-on learning experiences, directly supporting the skills outlined in the NYS Portrait of a Graduate framework. Specifically, it will foster critical thinking, collaboration, and applied learning through projects like soil analysis, plant propagation, and machinery maintenance. This facility will also help the program grow, potentially allowing us to include an **outdoor** growing area for harvestable fruits and vegetables that can be used directly in our school cafeteria as well as made available to the community at a produce stand in the future.

**NYSED Aid Eligibility**: By including the required instructional space (the classroom/lab) within the new building, the entire structure-including the storage and bathroom components-becomes eligible for the high level of NYSED Building Aid (our possible 89% aid ratio).

**Maximizing Local Dollars**: Had the District proposed a standalone building for just bathrooms and storage, it would have received little to no State Aid. The strategic combination ensures that local dollars are leveraged to the fullest extent possible, making this modern facility affordable for the community.

If the community approves the project on December 16th, 2025, the project will follow this estimated timeline:

- Voter Authorization: December 16th, 2025.
- Design Phase: January 2026 August 2026.
- SED Submission: September 2026 January 2027.
- Construction: Spring 2027 Fall 2028.

Hello MHS Families.


