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## Dear Parents and Guardians,

I hope you're enjoying a restful summer. I'm writing to inform you about an important new state law regarding student cell-phone use that goes into effect with the upcoming school year.




### What's changing?

As of August 1, 2025, **North Dakota law requires all public K–12 students to stow away personal electronic devices**, such as cell phones, tablets, smartwatches, or gaming units, during the entire school day—from the moment school starts until dismissal. This policy is commonly referred to as a **“bell-to-bell” phone free policy**.

These devices must be securely stored—typically in lockers, lockable pouches, or designated parking stations—and remain inaccessible throughout the school day.

### Why was this law passed?

Lawmakers, educators, and child mental health advocates championed this change because:

-  It reduces distractions and improves student focus.
-  It addresses rising concerns about mental health challenges tied to screen time and social media.
-  It fosters more positive social interactions between students and teachers.

Governor Armstrong described it as “a game changer” supporting both academic and emotional wellbeing.

Nedrose School is now working on:

1. Crafting our policy on approved device use during non-instructional times.
2. Beginning the implementation of Yondr pouches (see below).

More information—including details about our school-specific implementation—will be shared during orientation and posted on our website.

Starting in the upcoming school year, we will launch the [Yondr Phone-Free Schools Program](#)—a proven, bell-to-bell approach that supports student focus, well-being, and connection by removing mobile phone distractions during the school day.

For over a decade, Yondr has helped schools across all 50 states and more than 35 countries build healthier, more engaging school cultures. Their pouch-based program, combined with hands-on guidance and dedicated support, has led to powerful results:

- 86% reported improved safety and student wellness
- 84% saw increased engagement in class
- 68% experienced academic gain
- 44% reduced behavioral referrals

### How the Program Works

Each student will be assigned a Yondr pouch—a secure, lockable case for storing personal devices. Students are responsible for bringing their pouch to and from school each day and keeping it in good condition.

- **Upon arrival:** Students power off their phone, AirPods, and smartwatch (or switch to airplane mode), place all devices in the pouch, and lock it during their first period class.
- **During the day:** Students keep the locked pouch in their backpack or locker.
- **At dismissal:** Students unlock pouches at designated stations to retrieve their devices.

This process is quick, simple, and will be supervised by staff as part of our daily routine.

As this is a state mandate, students will be held accountable for the state law in the following matrix:
