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SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE



Dear Watervliet Community,

I hope this correspondence finds you well and that you are getting through the winter months. I know that while some of our population enjoyed those snow days, let's be honest- the kids, I recognize it does cause families to adjust on the fly, and that can be frustrating. I appreciate your patience, and please know there is a lot that goes into those decisions, and at the core is the safety of our greatest community resource- the children.

It has been a pleasure to once again serve the community of Watervliet in the capacity of school superintendent. My 23 years here are truly the highlight of my career. While there have been bumps in the road in my time with you, I think we have worked through issues and come out on the other side better for listening. It is my hope that during the next few months, we identify your next school leader. The Board of Education will be making decisions in March, and I encourage you to attend the interviews. This is a big decision. I completely trust your Board of Education and know they will follow through with what is best for the District and, most importantly, the children of Watervliet Public Schools.

We have been busy with construction planning. In 2024, the community of Watervliet voted affirmatively for a bond presented by the school district. The construction will happen in three phases over the course of the next two and a half years.

This summer, unit vent replacement will take place in select areas of the high and middle schools. This will allow for some well-deserved cooling in the hot months and improved efficiency over the years. In addition, four restrooms in need of refreshing will be renovated with new plumbing, ADA accessible facilities, with new fixtures and flooring.

These improvements will greatly benefit the students of Watervliet and add value to the spaces. On behalf of the students, staff, and Board of Education, thank you for your support, and we will deliver for you.

As we look forward to spring and spring break, it can be an exciting time. We get a little more light in our evenings, kids get outside more, and the activities at Hays Park heat up. I encourage you to continue to talk with your child about school and what is going well for them, and if there are struggles during this busy time. Our goal is to close as strongly as we began. Please take care, and as always, know you can reach out to me if you think I can be of service.

GSRP PRE-SCHOOL

Great Start Readiness Program is a state-funded free preschool program and its income-based qualifications change yearly. GSRP is administered locally through Berrien RESA. Children countywide who turn four by September first are encouraged to apply. However, in-district children receive first consideration for the Watervliet GSRP as mandated by state law.

Watervliet's GSRP Coordinator is Tiffany Williams and she is assisted by Ashleigh Bobay. Both women have children in the Watervliet School System and Ashleigh is herself a Watervliet Graduate.

GSRP students are exposed to a variety of large and small group activities throughout the day, focussing on literacy, math, cognitive, social, language, and physical development. During the morning the children learn and grow through play and exploration in the classroom. They enjoy a morning breakfast and lunch provided by our nutrition program at the school. GSRP has its own playground and outside play is great gross motor activity. With their growing minds and bodies in mind, there is a rest time in the day to help our preschoolers reset for the afternoon.

"The students love exploring and building in our block area, creating castles, houses and buildings, says Williams. "We transform the dramatic play area throughout the year to go along with our study that we are working on, creating a music area during our instrument study, a light exploration lab for the light study, and a bakery during the holidays for cookies, donuts and cakes."

"For children this young, preschool is typically the start of social development and learning. Many students have never been in a daycare or school setting before. Helping them to grow with others and build the confidence to do things for themselves is a big part of our program," Williams says.

Parent meetings are scheduled throughout the year to share information about various topics such as the importance of routines and consistency, fostering independence in their children, fine and gross motor skills development, as well as their child's academic growth. It truly is a partnership with families at this age, building up the children and giving parents tools and resources to use at home.

Williams says the excitement and newness that the students find in learning is very rewarding. "They are little sponges and absorb so much throughout the year; the growth that they have from September to May is incredible."



Tiffany Williams grew up in Lansing, MI. She holds a bachelor's degree in Elementary Education from Western Governors University. She previously worked as the director of a large daycare center in Colorado and has also run a home daycare. Tiffany and her husband Howard have four boys who keep them busy with all of their sports and activities. This is her 8th year with GSRP.




♪♪ Celebrating 20 Years of Musical Excellence: Mr. Brandon Mattson

This year marks Mr. Brandon Mattson's 20th year of teaching elementary music in Watervliet, and his impact can be heard far beyond the walls of his classroom.

Over two decades, Mr. Mattson has shaped the musical journey of thousands of students, creating a strong foundation that feeds directly into our middle school and high school programs—and for many students, into a lifelong love of music. When asked what he is most thankful for, Brandon quickly points to the welcoming community and unwavering support of Watervliet. That support, paired with his passion and talent, has allowed his programs to flourish year after year.

A visit to Mr. Mattson's classroom is something special. Each day, students participate in engaging and joyful lessons that provide instruction that goes far beyond the basics of music; teaching confidence, collaboration, creativity, and expression. Students don't just learn music—they experience it.

Mr. Mattson's elementary choir programs are rooted in a simple but powerful belief: *students who want to perform should be given the opportunity*. Because of this philosophy, countless students have stepped onto stages they may have never imagined. Choir experiences have taken students to Mackinac Island, where they stayed at the Grand Hotel; to Miller Auditorium, where they learned about the history of Broadway before attending a performance of *Wicked*; and to Gurnee, Illinois, where students earned a top rating in the Treble Choir Division at the Music in the Park Festival.

Closer to home, his choirs are deeply connected to the community. South Elementary first-grade choir students have the opportunity to perform at the Coastline Children's Film Festival, while second, 4th, and 5th grade choir students proudly participate in the Hometown Christmas Parade, spreading music and joy throughout Watervliet.

Mr. Mattson's influence extends well beyond his elementary students. He has been invited to present at the Michigan Music Conference in Grand Rapids five times, sharing his expertise with fellow educators. He has served as a mentor to student teachers, helping shape the next generation of music educators. Since 2016, he has taught elementary music methods for educators at Western Michigan University, and many of his former university students have visited his classroom to witness the "magic" of his instruction in action.

During the summers, Brandon continues to bring music to life through a highly successful community music program, offering instruction in voice, ukulele, piano, guitar, and violin. Students, staff, and community members—from ages 5 to 75—come to learn, grow, and perform. Each summer concludes with a public showcase, celebrating both progress and passion.

Beyond music, Brandon is deeply rooted in family and perseverance. He met his wife, Brenda, just out of high school, and they will celebrate 19 years of marriage this July. Their son Brendan, 14, is a freshman at Mattawan and a dedicated travel hockey player, while their daughter Braelynn, 17, is a senior at Mattawan and dual-enrolled at KVCC. Brandon has also completed four marathons, a reflection of the same dedication and discipline he brings to his teaching.

Watervliet is truly blessed to have such an incredible talent shaping our students—not only as musicians, but as confident, courageous learners. Mr. Brandon Mattson's legacy is one of inspiration, opportunity, and lasting influence, ensuring that the future of music in our schools and beyond is in exceptionally strong hands.





The dogs helped demonstrate ways they assist others by providing comfort, reducing stress, and bringing smiles to those who may be having a hard day. It was a fun and meaningful experience that helped students learn the importance of caring for others and taking care of their own feelings too.

As part of our PBIS program, during the first trimester, North School students who met behavior expectations earned a special trip to the movie, *Pets on a Train*. To attend, students worked hard to earn enough Pride Tickets to fill a fish bowl and maintained fewer than two personal referrals. This reward celebrated positive choices, responsibility, and teamwork. In the second trimester, students continue to earn Pride Tickets while also focusing on controlling the noise level in the cafeteria during lunch, helping create a calmer and more enjoyable environment for everyone. They are working toward another fun trip in March.

At North School, we are working hard to strengthen our school community through Capturing Kids' Hearts. Our classrooms have already done a tremendous amount of meaningful work to build connections and trust. Students are welcoming one another with student greeters, sharing affirmations, and beginning each day by celebrating good things happening in their lives. Classrooms have also created Social Contracts together, outlining how everyone wants to feel and how we agree to treat one another each day.



In addition, Leadeworthy lessons are being incorporated into Mrs. Roland's Behavior Games and our monthly Roundtable meetings, helping students practice leadership, responsibility, and positive decision-making. Through these intentional efforts, North School continues to build a strong, caring community where students feel valued, connected, and ready to learn.

As part of our Capturing Kids' Hearts work, we asked teachers to reflect on their experiences by naming the 10 things they love about North School. This activity gave staff an opportunity to celebrate what makes our school special, highlight the strengths of our community, and recognize the positive relationships, dedication, and culture that make North a great place to learn and grow. Their reflections reinforced the strong sense of pride and connection we are building together at North.

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Middle School Highlights: Growth, Opportunity, and Pride



Despite a winter filled with weather-related interruptions and a challenging end to the first semester, our middle school students and staff continue to demonstrate resilience, commitment, and success. We recently completed our mid-year NWEA assessments and were thrilled to see **tremendous academic growth across grade levels**, a testament to the hard work happening in classrooms every day—even when schedules were less than ideal.

In addition to academic growth, we are seeing meaningful gains in **school culture and community** through the continued implementation of **Capturing Kids' Hearts (CKH)**. By focusing on relationship-building, intentional connections, and creating emotionally safe classrooms, CKH has helped strengthen student engagement and foster a greater sense of belonging across the building. Students are more connected to adults and one another, classrooms are grounded in shared expectations, and we are seeing positive momentum in how students approach learning, behavior, and leadership. These relationships are foundational to the success we are seeing academically and socially.

Beyond academics, our students continue to thrive through meaningful experiences and opportunities. On February 14 we hosted our **Valentine's Day Dance**, a semi-formal event that gives students the chance to dress up, connect with peers, and enjoy a fun, safe evening together. Events like these play an important role in building community and belonging at the middle school level.

Our **Student Council** has had an especially impactful year. During Thanksgiving, they organized a successful **Food Drive**, collecting boxes of food to support **six families** facing challenges this year. They also represented our building with pride at the recent **School Board Recognition Meeting**, and this winter they are sponsoring a **shoe collection drive** to raise funds and collect shoes for those in need.

Student leadership and enrichment continue to shine across the building. The **Honor Society** has been actively fundraising to support an upcoming trip to **Nashville**, while **E-Sports** is in full swing and continuing to grow in participation and success. Our **Middle School Robotics Team** recently finished **11th at the Coloma Invitational**, the highest placement in the program's history—an exciting milestone for our students and coaches.

We are also proud to share that our middle school has once again been recognized by **U.S. News & World Report as a Top Middle School**, marking the **third consecutive year** of this distinction. This recognition reflects our ongoing commitment to strong instruction, student support, and continuous improvement.

TCIS Training Strengthens Support for Students at WPS

Watervliet Public Schools continues to prioritize safe, supportive learning environments through ongoing staff development in **Therapeutic Crisis Intervention for Schools (TCIS)**. This year, **more than 50 WPS faculty and staff members** have completed TCIS training, strengthening our collective ability to support students both academically and emotionally.

TCIS, developed through **Cornell University**, is a research-based crisis prevention and intervention model designed to help educators:

- Recognize student stress triggers
- Use proactive relationship-building strategies
- Apply effective **de-escalation techniques**
- Respond safely and respectfully when students experience emotional or behavioral challenges

The focus is always on prevention first — building connection, understanding behavior as communication, and helping students regulate emotions before situations escalate.

Training at WPS is led by **Jamie Dawson, High School Counselor, and Christina Powers, High School Principal**, both certified TCIS trainers. Their leadership ensures staff receive consistent, high-quality preparation rooted in compassion, safety, and practical classroom application.

To keep skills strong and accessible:

- **Two full 4-day TCIS trainings are offered each year** for faculty and staff.
- Staff who have completed certification participate in a **1-day refresher every two years** to maintain best practices and stay current with strategies.

This ongoing investment reflects WPS's commitment to equipping staff with tools that foster calm classrooms, strong relationships, and positive outcomes for students. We're proud of the many educators dedicating time to this important work and the positive difference it continues to make across our school community.

The HS Student Council Food drive was a huge success. Thanks to the incredible generosity of our students and staff, we collected over 1,100 food items to donate to the Living Water Food Pantry right here in Watervliet. #PantherPride

Watervliet Public Schools Partners with Berrien County Hearing Impaired Program

Do you have a concern regarding hearing and audiological services?

The Berrien County Hearing Impaired Program performs hearing evaluations for children ages birth through grade 12 in which licensed audiologists identify or rule out hearing loss.

If hearing loss is identified, audiologists can:

- *discuss what sound amplification options a family may have for their child
- *help with the selection, fitting, and service of hearing aids, as well as troubleshooting cochlear implants
- *help with the fitting of assistive listening devices in the form of personal FM devices and classroom FM devices
- *provide professional in-services for teachers and school staff on the signs/causes/treatments of hearing loss, how to troubleshoot hearing aids, cochlear implants, and/or FM system issues a student may have in the classroom, and education on hearing conservation

Students can be referred for a hearing evaluation by:

- *Doctors
- *Teachers
- *Service providers
- *Parents


