Superintendent's Message

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It is hard to believe that we are quickly approaching the mid-point of this school year and already preparing for the next one. With the exception of a couple bumps, the 2007-2008 school year is going well and our students have already made significant accomplishments this year. BEA students and staff are working hard and performing well.

We celebrated the first graduation from our BEA Cyber Academy in September 2007. The transition to Everyday Math, while not without some growing pains, is happening successfully in K-2, with the expectation of moving into third grade next year. Our teachers in all grades have been participating in math training programs throughout the year. The Raytheon-sponsored program, MathMovesU, was an educational and inspirational math experience for our students, highlighting how math permeates our lives and is so necessary for our occupations. Our reading and science programs are also transitioning to higher, more intense levels again this year. Our Girls Volleyball team made school history with both individual and team accomplishments. All of our district facilities really are busy places from sunrise to sunset for students, staff, parents, and our Bald Eagle Area community.

As discussed in the renovation article in this issue, we are beginning the 20-year cycle of renovations with the High School and Wingate Elementary School. Thus far, the Facility Advisory and Facilities Study committees have met for selecting an architect and for further refining and prioritizing what needs to be accomplished in this cycle for these two schools to serve our students, staff, and community until about 2030. There will be some difficult decisions to be made, as not everything that would be wonderful to have will fit into our construction budget. Hopefully, we will all come to agreement by April of just what we want to have done in this renovation cycle. We have scheduled an informational public meeting for all concerned residents to provide input on the project on February 28, 2008, 7:00 p.m., in the High School cafeteria. If the Pennsylvania Department of Education approval process goes as scheduled, we expect the actual renovation work to begin during the summer of 2009.

Our students and staff still have a lot of educational ground to cover in the last half of the school year. The PSSA requirements to make Adequate Yearly Progress in both Math and Reading have increased significantly this year. We need every hour of instructional time we can squeeze into the next few months to be able to perform our best when those tests are given. Regular student attendance is such an important part of that equation. We truly have no educational minutes to spare.

I am honored to have been part of the successful Bald Eagle Area mission for most of my life and look forward to working with our Board of Education, our students, staff, and community as we reach for higher levels of achievement and student success.

Spotlight on BEA FAMILY

Kindergarten teachers start BEA students on the path of excellence.

The Bald Eagle Area community and, in particular, our youngest students, are fortunate to have the most loving, capable, nurturing kindergarten teachers that can be found anywhere in the country. Jason Bair, Tammy Bierly, Jennifer Houser, Jennifer Murray, Jayne Pillot, Mary Price, and Sherri True work together as a group to plan instruction, and meet once a month to share ideas and strategies they are using in their classrooms.

Our four elementary schools feature quality, full-day kindergarten programs that build the foundation to launch our fledgling eaglets off to a terrific educational flight as they begin their thirteen years at BEA. We presently have seven full-day kindergarten classrooms throughout the district with an average class size of sixteen. The classrooms are spacious, bright and beautiful, and always chock-full of educational exhibits. Many folks, at one time, minimized the educational importance of kindergarten, and, many schools, including Bald Eagle Area, offered only a half-day program until just a few years ago.

Half-day kindergarten had been described by some as, “a play period separated by an obligatory nap.” That does not happen here at Bald Eagle Area! Our full-day program, prepared by educational experts, has all but erased the image we once had of kindergarten. Our reading and writing program is very intense. Many of our students now exit kindergarten knowing both how to read and write stories with 6-10 sentences, using punctuation and capitalization. Just a few years back, that formal reading and writing process only started in first grade.

Students also learn Everyday Math, social skills, and good work habits, too. Our FOSS science program introduces them to the wonders of science as they learn the skills to observe plants and

animals; the physical properties of fabric, wood and paper; and much, much more. With the guidance of our wonderful kindergarten teachers, they learn all of this while having a very enjoyable experience throughout the year.

Kindergarten students visit the computer laboratory at least once a day, usually in the afternoon when attention spans may be lagging, to be engaged by Imagination Station. The children LOVE to work on this colorful, interesting, fast-paced online program. Imagination Station offers yet another learning style that addresses each individual student's needs at a level that is challenging, but not frustrating, and serves to reinforce what the kindergarten teacher has introduced earlier.

We proudly feature our Bald Eagle Area family of kindergarten teachers in this issue as a talented, enthusiastic, loving team whose members are always excited, prepared, and warmly willing to help each new student begin a path that will surely lead to success at BEA and in life.

With that pre-game cheer, the girls' team is off for another round of intramural field hockey. Bald Eagle Area was one of the 27 recipients this year of the GoGirlGo! grants, which were awarded by the Women's Sports Foundation.

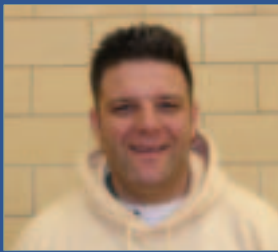

John Gribble / Business Manager/Administration Building

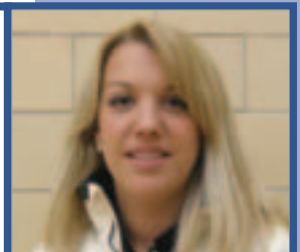

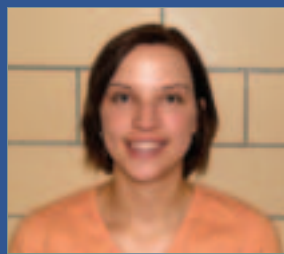

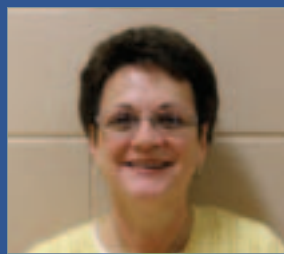
Laura Hine / Family & Consumer Sciences/High School

WINGATE ELEMENTARY Launches Project Wisdom

Wingate Elementary School has recently expanded its curriculum to include an exciting new character education program called Project Wisdom. In a world where many students routinely face challenging situations that require practical social skills and strength of character, trends in education are supporting programs like Project Wisdom that teach bedrock concepts such as integrity, respect, confidence, courage, honesty, and diligence. In fact, schools across the country are now covering these topics along with the traditional cornerstones of education: reading, writing and arithmetic. More important, emerging data indicates that effective character education improves academic achievement.

Wingate is proud to be one of over 14,000 schools nationwide utilizing this collection of daily words of wisdom. Project Wisdom's messages are rich in history, culture, and literature, and work to develop responsible and caring individuals. The messages inspire, teach and encourage students to reflect upon the larger issues of life.

Each morning, Wingate students hear a short message containing a quotation from a historic figure, celebrity, or modern hero that reinforces the topic of the day. The 60-second announcement is narrated by Principal Jim Orichosky, and ends with the same phrase each day, "Be kind, be responsible and be the best you can be. The choice is yours."

The Wingate staff has taken the program a step further by organizing the messages into monthly themes. Each month features a particular character trait, which is reinforced during the school day through journal writing activities and classroom meetings (part of the Olweus Bullying program). At the end of the month, two students from each classroom are recognized at a special luncheon for their "strength of character." The themes for this school year are: October/Responsibility, November/Cooperation, December/Generosity, January/Respect, February/Compassion and Caring, March/Perseverance, April/Courage, and May/Self-Control.

Wingate Principal Jim Orichosky says, "The program helps all of our students start every day on a positive note and also helps them think about being kind and responsible in all situations."

THE FUTURE IS NOW

Eight BEA high school teachers are glad to have a COW. In fact, they volunteered to have one.

In the technological world, COW is an acronym for Computers on Wheels – the mobile cart with 30 laptops connected to it that will be wheeled into the classrooms for students to use in their studies. Eight COWs were just part of the equipment received from the \$215,494 Pennsylvania State Classrooms for the Future (CFF) grant. CFF is a three-year investment to provide laptop computers, high-speed Internet access, and state-of-the-art software to high school classrooms across the state. Digital projectors, digital cameras, digital video camcorders, wireless access points, and interactive smart boards (a very large computer screen visible to the entire classroom, where the instructor uses his/her finger as the mouse) were also part of the grant. Bald Eagle Area received the computers and equipment in December, and the installations were completed by Christmas.

BEA decided to have two teachers from each of the core high school subjects – language arts, math, reading, and science – participate. High school teachers who volunteered, John Coltabaugh, Tara Deitrich, Scott Krise, Marie Lomison, Diane Lucas, Gretta Markle, Gary Spotts, and Leanne Yeagley, each received a laptop for classroom use.

Participating staff members attended much training, including 30 hours of required online instruction. Bill Corkill, BEA's Instructional Technology Specialist, was selected to be the CFF Coach, a position required under the grant. He will help the teachers to find better ways to integrate technology into their classrooms.

Today's students live in a digital world, so it is fitting that they should be educated and engaged using the technology they use everyday in their away-from-school lives. CFF will prepare our students to successfully use equipment and technology that are commonplace in colleges and universities, corporate offices, production plants, and just about anyplace they will go after graduating.

At BEA, the future is now. We are excited to be a part of it.

Howard elementary students each have a special goal this school year, after watching an assembly in which they learned about a book by Brian Tracy entitled, "Eat That Frog". ADULT EDUCATION CLASSES

Winter/Spring 2008

The Bald Eagle Area School District (BEASD) will offer an Adult Education Program for the Winter/Spring 2008 Session. Class descriptions, course cost, and beginning dates are listed below. District policy requires that at least 10 people register for a class before it will be held. In some cases, class size is limited, and registrations will be taken on a first come, first serve basis. Registration will remain open until Friday, February 8, 2008. Interested persons should complete the registration form and mail it, along with a check payable to Bald Eagle Area School District for the amount of the class cost. Registrations can be made over the phone, but will be held until a check for the class fee is received. Please do not send cash. In the event that we do not receive the required 10 people for a class, your check will be returned. Any questions regarding the Adult Education Program can be directed to the Superintendent's Office in the Administration Building at 355-4860 or 355-3737, Monday-Friday, between the hours of 8 am and 4 pm. Please ask to speak with Nancy Fisher.

INTRODUCTION TO COMPUTERS – This is the perfect course for new computer users or those who have never had any formal orientation to the Windows environment. You will learn to identify different types of hardware and their functions, how to customize the Windows environment, and much more. Class will be held at the Bald Eagle Area Middle/Senior High School on Monday & Wednesday from 7 pm - 9 pm, beginning Monday, February 25, and will continue for 6 weeks. Cost: BEASD Resident - \$50.00, Non-resident - \$100.00.

BEGINNING WATERCOLOR — This course is designed to introduce watercolor techniques to beginners. Those who have some experience using watercolors are welcome. Class will be limited to ten students (ten people must register before the class will be held) in order to accommodate individual needs. Examples of what will be covered include What Colors Are a Good Beginning?, Color Mixing, What Happens When the Brush Hits the Paper?, etc. Instructor will be Janet Riggio, who is an art teacher at Wingate Elementary School and an exhibiting watercolor artist. Class will be held at the Wingate Elementary School on Tuesday and Thursday from 7 pm – 9 pm, beginning Tuesday, March 4, and will continue for four weeks. Cost: \$40 registration fee, plus an additional \$35 for supplies that can be purchased the evening of the first class. If a student prefers to purchase his/her own supplies, a list will be available.

MICROSOFT WORD/EXCEL – This course provides a focused introduction to two important features of Microsoft Office. It is designed to teach the basics about Microsoft Word and Microsoft Excel that you need to know for practical tasks at school, at work, or at home. Prerequisite: Typing skills. Class will be held at the Bald Eagle Area Middle/Senior High School on Tuesday & Thursday from 7 pm - 9 pm, beginning Tuesday, February 26, and will continue for 6 weeks. Cost: BEASD Resident - \$50.00, Non-resident - \$100.00.

INTRODUCTION TO PHOTO EDITING – In this course, we will explore the ABC's of digital photo editing (cropping, red-eye removal, adjust lighting and color, etc.) as well as ways to artistically enhance and "retouch" digital photos. We will also explore ways to restore printed photographs using photo editing software, how to make digital photo collages and photo slideshows, and where to find and use free photo-editing software for use on your own personal computer. Instructor – Rosemarie W. Cox. Class will be held at the Wingate Elementary School on Monday and Wednesday from 7 pm – 9 pm, beginning Monday, March 3, and will continue for four weeks. Access to a digital camera or images on CD required. Cost: \$40.

WHY IS BEA RENOVATING WINGATE ELEMENTARY AND THE HIGH SCHOOL?

We have had this question asked many times by both citizens just driving by both facilities mentioned in the question, and by visitors to our buildings. Looking both inside and outside of these buildings, it would be easy to conclude that a present renovation is unnecessary. But those who are responsible for maintaining both attractive and functional facilities are well aware of mechanical and building structural components within the buildings that are nearing, or are beyond, their predictable life span. In a few paragraphs, we will try to explain why the projects need to be initiated now.

Bald Eagle Area began a renovation cycle with all district buildings in 1989, starting with Wingate Elementary and the High School. Renovations at Mountaintop, Howard, and Port Matilda Elementary schools followed later, ending in 1997.

The Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE) provides substantial financial assistance to school districts when they either build new facilities or renovate existing facilities. Their rule of thumb for renovations of existing facilities is to only provide this financial assistance every twenty years.

The twenty-year limitation is right around the corner for us now at the Wingate Elementary School and the High School. After an extensive approval process, PDE will pay for up to 75 percent of all renovation costs. Simply, if Bald Eagle Area spends ten million dollars on an approvable project, PDE would pay up to 7.5 million of that total amount. But again, they will only provide this reimbursement every twenty years.

Presently, both Wingate Elementary and the High School have some high cost items that, although you can not see them from the outside, will have to be addressed in the near future. For example, the entire roof system at the high school is now five years past its normal predicted life span. It will need to be replaced in the not too distant future, and the replacement cost for just the high school roof alone will exceed one million dollars. If replaced as part of a PDE-approved renovation program, the cost to district residents will only be one-fourth of that amount, or \$250,000. And there are other deferred maintenance items in both buildings that need addressed, including plumbing and electrical service replacement, emergency generator upgrades, state-mandated handicapped access upgrades, and needed upgrades to the air conditioning, heating, and ventilation systems.

Planning a renovation every twenty years makes economic sense. Because of PDE participation, BEA will be able to upgrade the facilities at Wingate Elementary and the Bald Eagle High School, with needed improvements, at only a fourth of the cost, rather than the entire amount.
