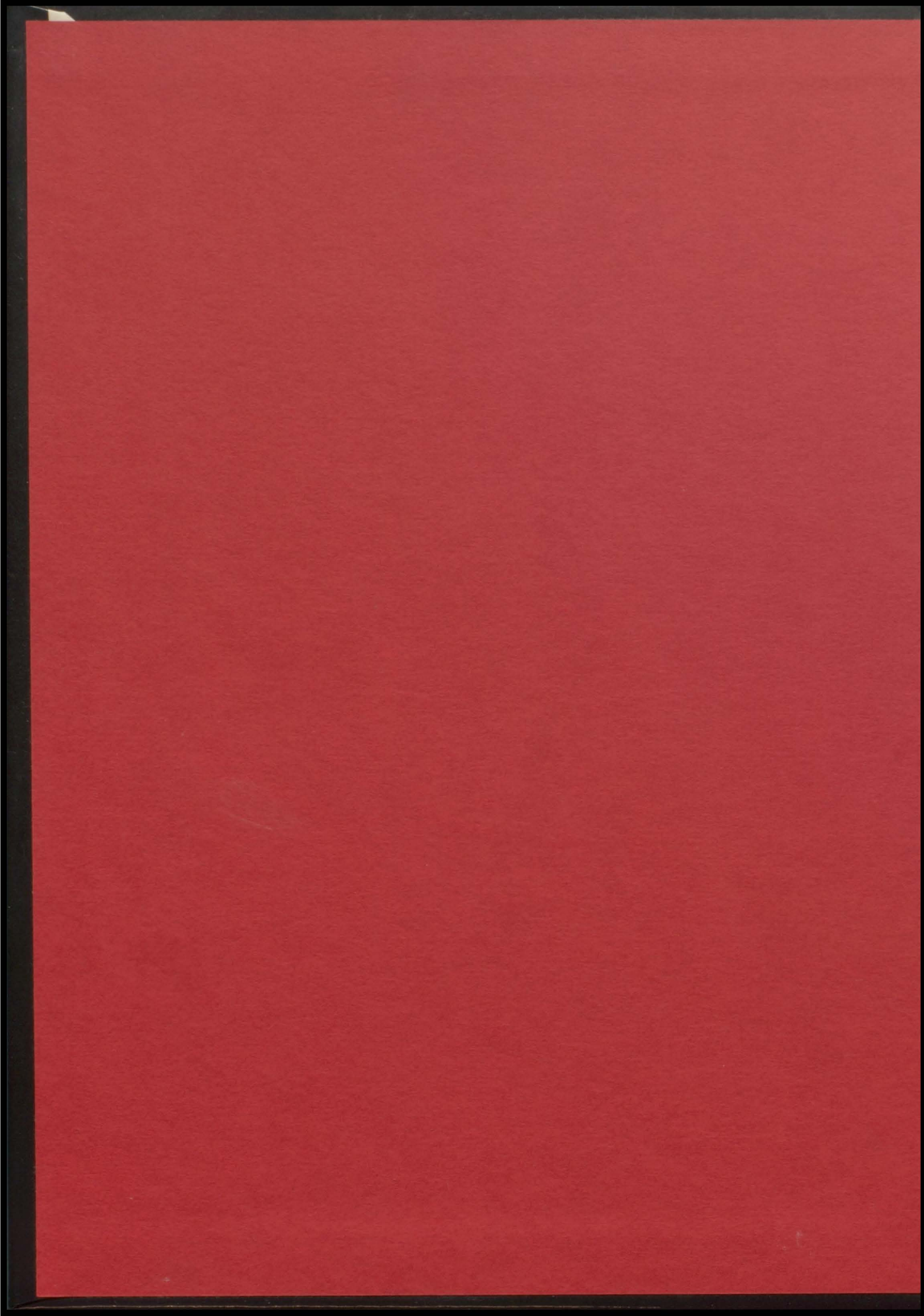


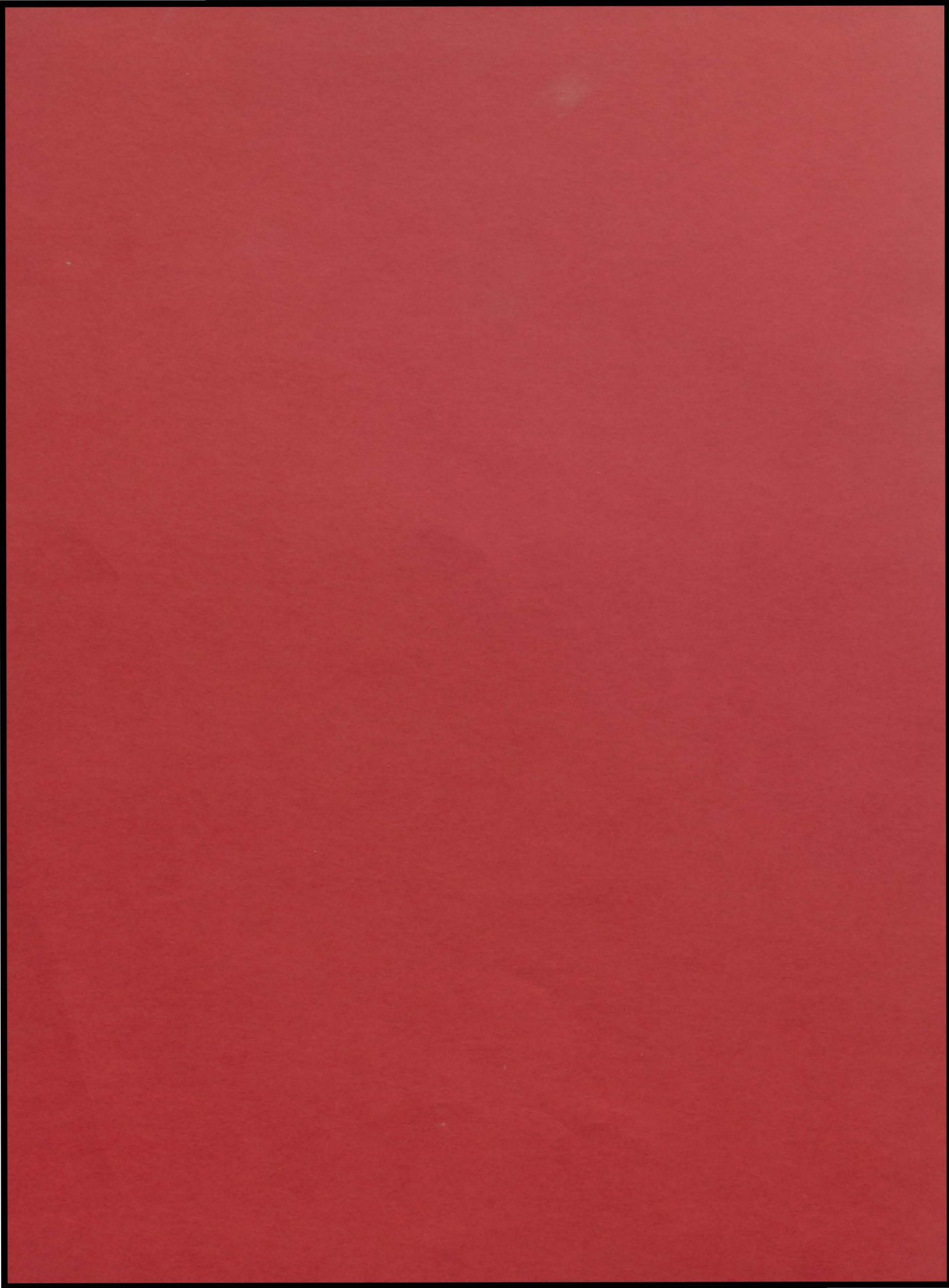


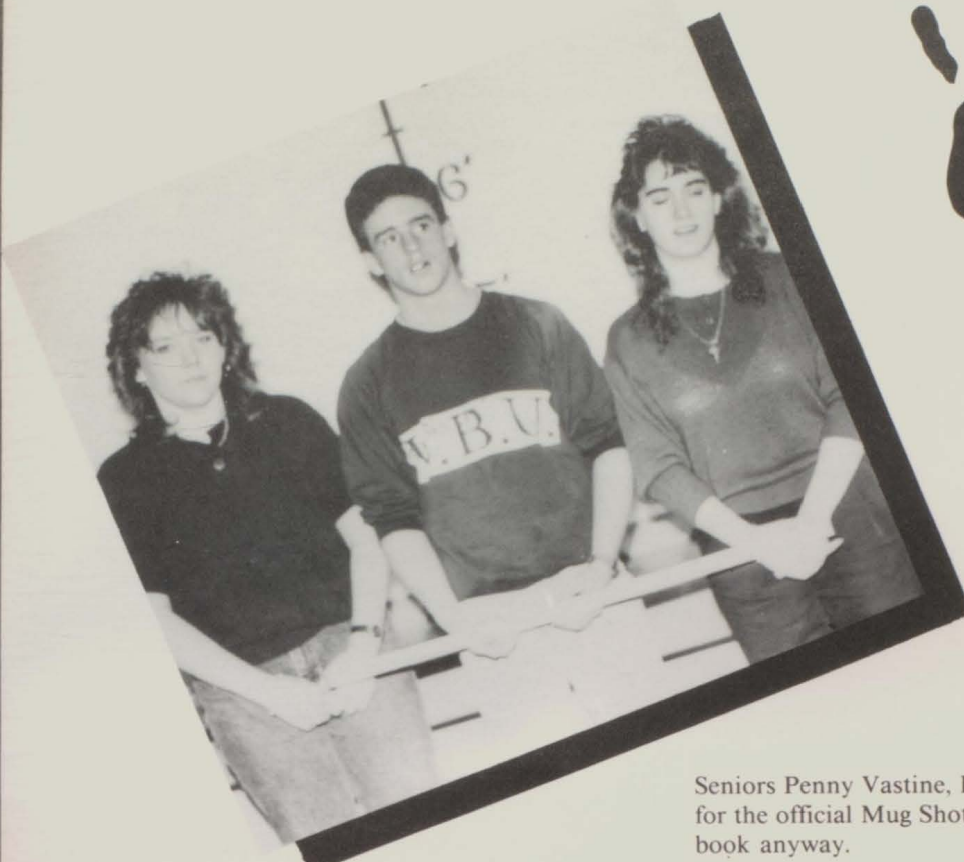

So the Faculty can make or break our high school years but we as students can make or break teaching.

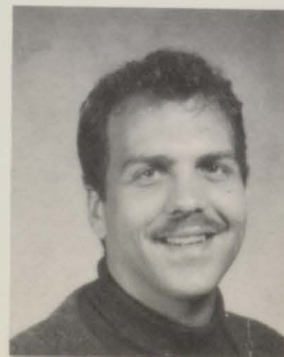

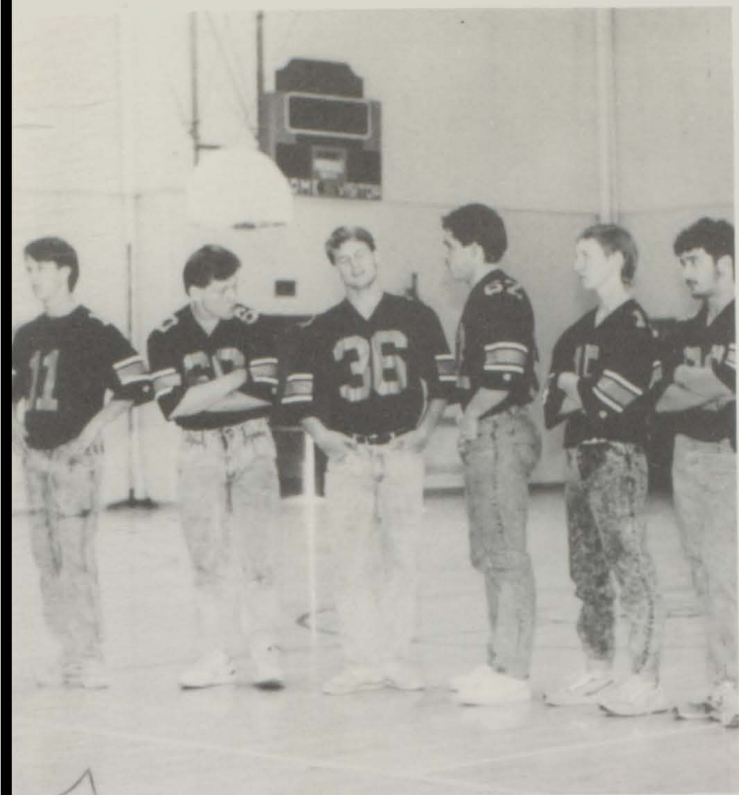
## Students get Involved

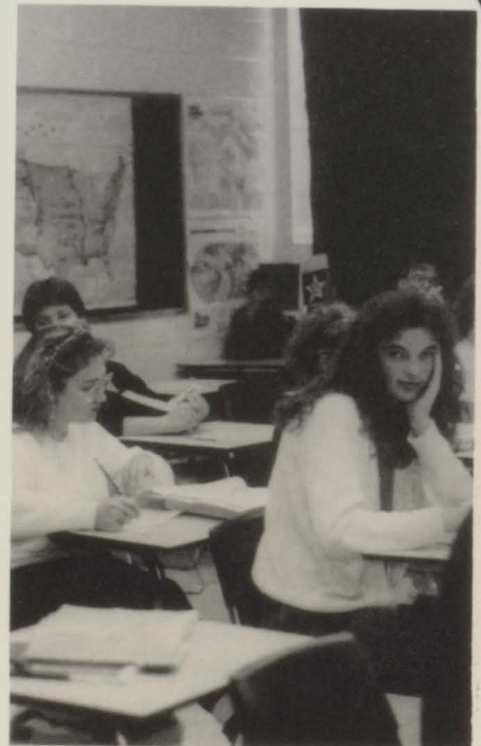

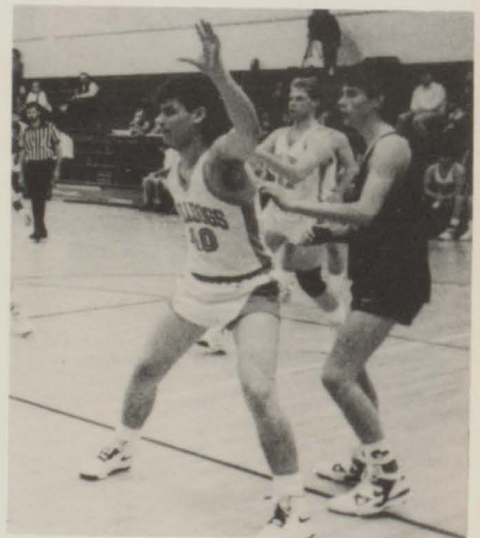

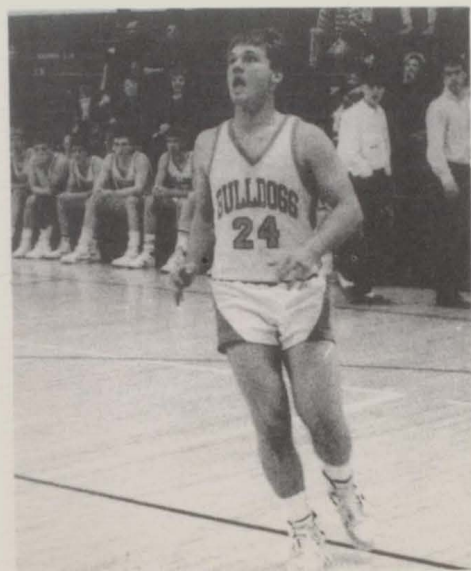

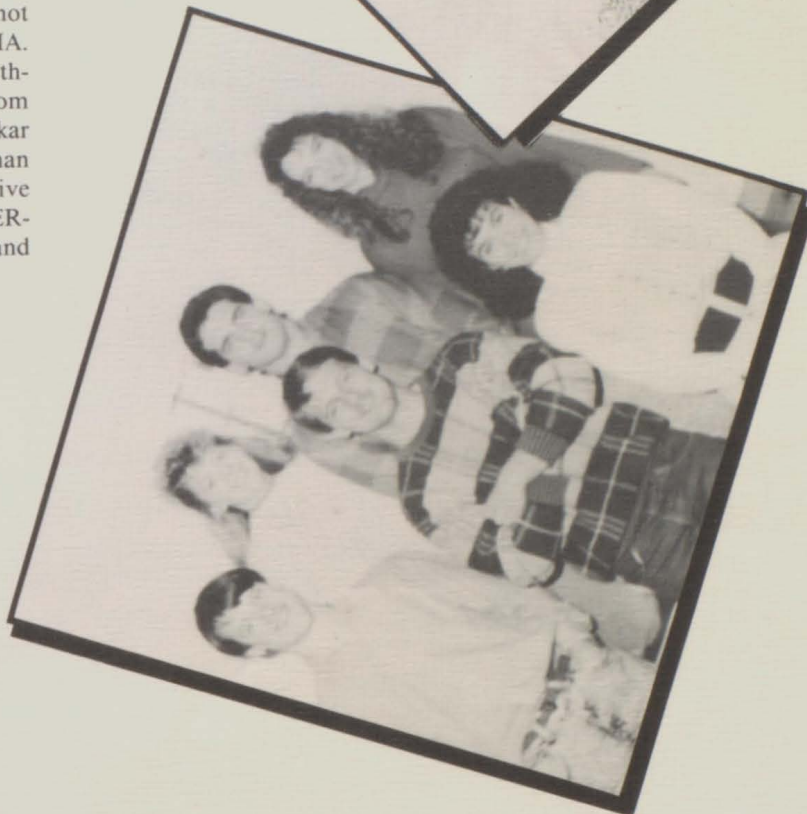
# SENIOR PROPHECY

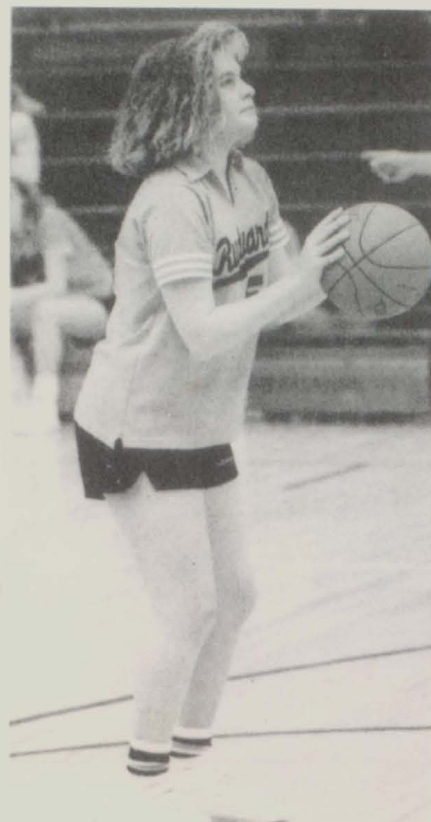


# Jr. High Girls Basketball
