
Friendships become strong; football games, club activities, parades, pep rallies, dances provide hours of outside entertainment—and suddenly this building of brick and plaster comes alive.








SCIENCE DEPARTMENT






To everyone at T. H. S. the library plays an extremely important part. From the wide selection of 6,000 books, students may select books for book reports, pleasure reading, and class projects; use the 14 sets of reference books for themes, term papers, and information for classwork; read magazines and newspapers; secure articles, pictures and drawings from the verticle file; obtain filed magazines by first using "Readers Guide;" and for those students who have a vacant period, it provides a well disciplined, quiet place for study.


