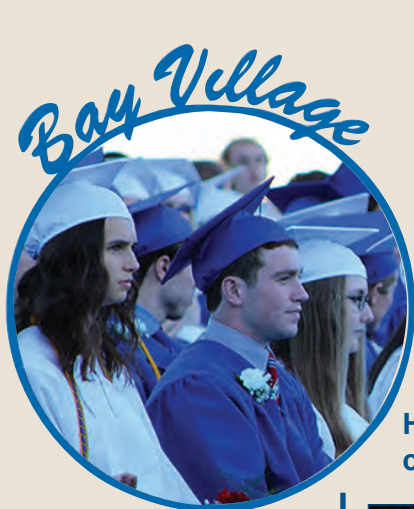

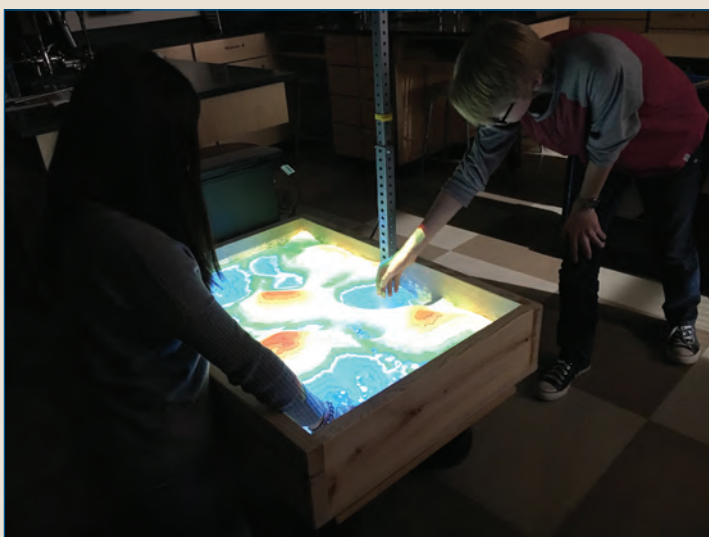
The importance of technology in education

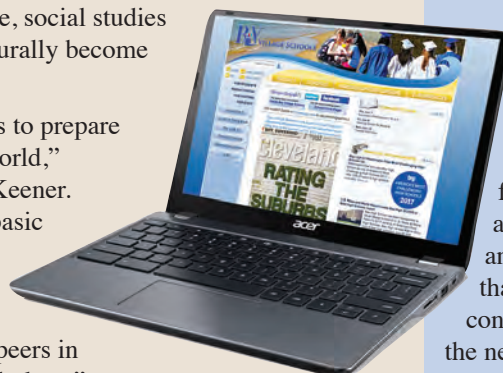
Technology has changed education in much the same way it has transformed business, medicine and other disciplines. It is a powerful tool that makes communication, data management, planning, analysis and visualization more efficient and effective than ever before.

Our fully-networked classrooms give students direct, instant access to a world of information for research, allow them to collaborate with other students, and allow teachers to communicate with them and track their progress.

Software for problem-solving and creativity build technological proficiency as an inherent part of the learning process. As students learn math, science, social studies and language arts, they naturally become adept at using technology.

"We owe it to our students to prepare them for a fast-changing world," said Superintendent Clint Keener.

"Technology comprises a basic skill set they need to produce, to participate, and to compete with their peers in college and the workplace."



Bay High pilots one-to-one computers

Along with getting their textbooks this fall, Bay High freshmen and sophomores will be issued Google Chromebooks. Students will be able to take the compact laptops home and keep them until they return them at the end of the school year.

"The timing is good for this," said Superintendent Clint Keener. "We've had an opportunity to watch other districts roll out one-to-one programs, and we have learned from some of their challenges."

BHS students have been allowed to bring their own internet-connected devices -- phones, tablets and laptops -- to school for some time, school officials said. Jason Martin, BHS principal, said teachers have been training to effectively integrate technology into lessons.

"The access to technology doesn't magically make for better learning," he said. "It's the way teachers use it that makes it effective. Our teachers are ready to take advantage of this additional technology access for students."

The school board has been investing in classroom technology in several ways. A bond issue approved in 2012 funded upgrades for internet access in every building and eliminated "dead zones" that prevented students from connecting. Also, funds from the new Ohio casinos were

earmarked for technology, allowing the purchase of classroom sets of Chromebooks for instruction and online testing. In addition, a new technology coordinator was hired to oversee hardware, software and network issues, as well as to help teachers plan how they could best use technology to help their students learn.

"We're much better prepared to make the most of one-to-one computers now than we would have been even a year ago," Keener said. "And we're in a position where we needed to add more classroom Chromebook sets anyway."

Char Shryock, director of curriculum, said that teachers are finding supplemental learning materials online, or even creating their own in digital formats.

"Students need access to all the resources teachers are using, and they often need to access them from home," she said. "While the majority of our families have home internet connections, they may have only one computer that family members share."

Shryock said students having their own Chromebooks loaded with all the applications they use in school would remove obstacles that could interrupt or prevent a student from doing homework or exploring a study topic.

"By putting the technology into the hands of the students, we are allowing them to determine how to use the tool to help them be successful learners," she said. She explained that students can use the Chromebooks to more easily collaborate on projects and research topics, communicate what they have learned to their teachers and peers, and apply innovative approaches to a problem or task.

Brian Reynolds, technology coordinator, said that the plan is to issue Chromebooks to freshmen and sophomores this year, and to new freshmen and seniors the following year. All BHS grade levels will be on the one-to-one program within two years.

"This year we will be focusing on perfecting the management of these computers," Reynolds said. "We'll make sure parents are comfortable with how we're protecting them from damage liability or any other worries they may have. Of course, we'll also be working with teachers to ensure we make the most of this new resource."

Students and their parents will need to consent to a special user agreement, and a small fee will cover potential damages or losses of the equipment. "These are very sturdy laptops," Reynolds said, noting that they have heavy-duty cases and will come with protective shells. If lost, the computers can be remotely disabled so they cannot be used by anyone other than the assigned student.

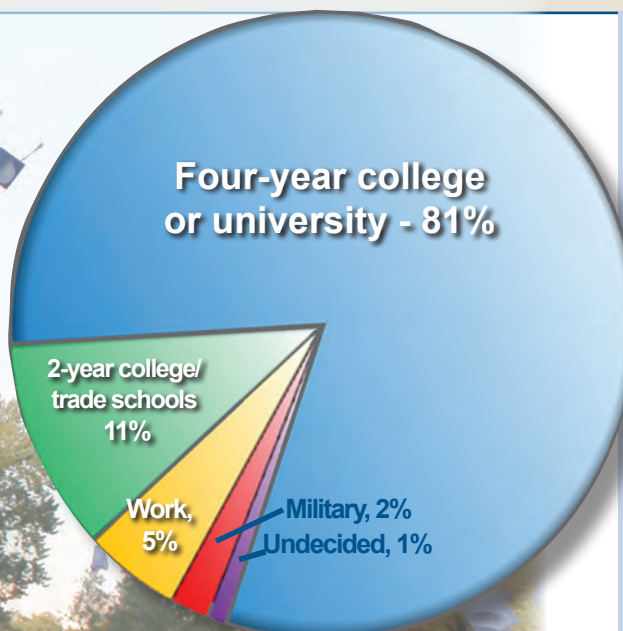
New website, phone app, messaging system

The school district is moving to new mass communication technology in August. New website and phone app technology will work better on smartphones, where 40% of district website traffic originates. Phone apps for website information and for school messages integrate smoothly with both the new website and the new messaging system.

"It has been about 10 years since the district developed its current website and phone messaging system, and technology has changed a great deal since then," said Superintendent Clint Keener. "Parents, staff, students and others should find these updates easier to use with their phones."

The website address, www.bayvillageschools.com, will remain the same. Parents will receive information about opting in for text messages from schools and the district.

National Merit Finalist and Commended Students

Four Bay High graduating seniors achieved PSAT scores among the highest in the nation

Bay High senior Will Huntington was named a National Merit Finalist. Huntington earned the prestigious academic distinction with his score on the 2015 Preliminary SAT (PSAT). The nationwide pool of semifinalists represent less than 1 percent of the 1.6 million students from 22,000 U.S. high school who take the PSAT in their junior year. The number of semi-finalists is proportional to the state's percentage of the national total of graduating seniors.

In addition, three Bay High seniors qualified as Commended Students scoring in the top five percent of test takers nationwide: Phillip Lally, Shawn Simko and Carter White.

Will Huntington will attend The Ohio State University and major in economics. The Rockets baseball player would like to coach baseball as a teacher, but he also has a strong interest in the nonprofit world. He has been Bay High's leader each year in organizing the St. Baldrick's fundraiser, and has held leadership positions in Bay High's Youth Philanthropy Fellowship and Student Council. He has volunteered with Bay High's PAL group assisting students with special needs, as a cook at Village Project, and as a tutor and mentor at Cleveland Boys and Girls clubs. He is a member of National Honor Society. He has also traveled to Kentucky with the Appalachian Service Project to work on repairing homes of low income residents.

Phillip Lally will attend the University of Notre Dame and major in English. He would like to be a writer, either as a news journalist or perhaps a writer of fiction. He has served as president of Bay High's A Cappella Choir and vice president of Bay High's Thespian Society. He has served three years on Student Council, is a member of Bay High's Choraleers and was part of Bay High's Academic Challenge team.

Shawn Simko will attend Coe College and major in physics. He would like to be a professor of physics or a researcher. He was a member of Bay High's Academic

Challenge team, science club, has participated in Destination Imagination competitions. He played trombone in Bay High's Marching Band. He has also been involved in Boy Scouts.

Carter White will attend Miami University and major in business management or analytics. He is not sure what he wants for a career as long as it is something that is interesting enough so that he truly enjoys his work. He has been a member of the Rockets football team, plays lacrosse and recreation center basketball. He is a member of the National Honor Society and participated in Model UN.

Announcing his retirement effective August 1, 2018, Superintendent Keener said he planned to give our Board of Education more than a year to search for his replacement.

"We'll turn things over in good order," he said. "I am confident this is the right time to retire and pass the reins to the right person."

Along with academic excellence, the school district is in solid financial shape, having passed an operating levy in 2016. It has also completed an extensive facilities upgrade to five of its older buildings thanks to a \$16.8 million bond issue passed in 2012.

The Board of Education will hire a consulting firm to conduct a search this year for Superintendent Keener's replacement.

Schools address mental health and social issues

National statistics on suicide, drug addiction/overdose and mental health problems are climbing, and it would be unrealistic to expect that families in our Bay Village Schools would not be affected by these trends.

"We are working to help students deal with issues like managing anxiety, building good relationships, internet safety and making good life choices from an early age," said Superintendent Clint Keener. "We also offer parent information on these issues through meetings and workshops. We know that our children may encounter these kinds of obstacles to a successful life, and we want to give them tools for dealing with these challenges."

Bay High held two programs addressing mental health and drug overdose/suicide last year for students, parents and community members. Bay Middle School and Westerly Elementary parents can attend a Mental Health First Aid Training workshop series this year.

Parents and others can stay informed about resources available, such as Bay Family Services (a partnership with the City of Bay Village), presentations and more through the district's website and its Facebook and Twitter accounts.
