The first day of School Year 2026/2027 for students will be Wednesday, August 19, 2026 with all students in attendance except Jefferson Elementary which has an altered starting schedule. This will be a full day of school with cafeterias in operation and buses operating on their regular schedule.

- ✓ Students in grades PreK-2 will report to Jefferson Elementary at 8:00 A.M. Student drop-off is from 7:15am until the tardy bell rings at 8:00am. All students will be dropped off in the front of the building. Bus students will be dismissed at 2:15pm from the front of the school. Preschool and kindergarten walkers and their siblings will be dismissed at 2:15pm. First and second grade walkers will be dismissed at 2:25pm.
- ✓ Students in grades 3-6 will report to Leona Middle School at 7:45 A.M. 3rd & 4th will be dismissed at 2:25 P.M. and 5th & 6th will dismiss at 2:30 P.M. Bus students dismissed at 2:25.
- ✓ Students in grades 7-12 will report to Shadyside High School at 7:40 A.M. with first homeroom beginning at 7:45 A.M. and will be dismissed at 2:40 P.M.

FREE OR REDUCED PRICE LUNCH PROGRAM

The Free/Reduced Price Lunch Program will continue this year. This program, sponsored by the Federal Government, provides a free or reduced price lunch for each child who meets the criteria for need, as established by the Federal Government. Eligibility criteria and application forms are made available online starting August 1st and paper applications are able to be sent home per request, except where direct certification is completed. **We urge all eligible parents to complete the online or paper application and return to your child's school of attendance as soon as possible.**

CAFETERIA



Cafeterias are available to ALL Shadyside students enrolled at Jefferson Elementary, Leona Middle, and Shadyside High School! All three schools will be serving breakfast and lunch each day that school is in session. Lunch and breakfast menus will be uploaded to the school website near the end of each month for the upcoming month for each school. Please review these menus as they are sent home and understand that they are also available to you on the school's website. We do our best to serve what the menu states; however, occasionally circumstances beyond our control require that the menu be modified without notice. Free and reduced lunch/meal applications will be sent home on the first day of school. Please make sure to complete the free and reduced meal online application or return a paper application to your child's school in a timely manner.

All three schools will offer breakfast to the students this year. Breakfast for students not qualified for free/reduced meals is \$1.50. **Students need to be seated and eating breakfast before 7:45am at Jefferson and Leona and 7:30am at Shadyside High School.** Tardy students will not be able to receive breakfast except when parent has contacted the office or a bus route is behind schedule.

Jefferson Elementary and Leona Middle School students will continue a closed lunch program for SY 26/27 the lunch period will be from 11:00 A.M. to 11:30 A.M. for 1st and 2nd grade at Jefferson and 3rd and 4th grade at Leona and 11:30 A.M. to 12:00 P.M. for preschool and kindergarten at Jefferson and 5th and 6th grade at Leona. Students must stay in the building for this lunch period. Students are not permitted to walk home on their own. Students may purchase a lunch or bring a lunch from home. Pop is not permitted to be sent in for ANY breakfast or lunch period.

We are EXCITED to announce the opening of a full-service cafeteria at Shadyside High School! Students will eat in the multi-purpose room. Students in grades 7-10 will participate in a closed lunch program and will NOT be permitted to leave the school for lunch. They will be held in the school for lunch periods daily! This closed lunch program has been instituted for the safety and protection of our students. Students in grades 11-12 are strongly encouraged to participate in the school lunch program or bring a packed lunch; however, they are welcome to continue with the open lunch procedure that we have done in the past. The lunch period for Jr. High Students (grades 7-8) is from 10:57 A.M. to 11:32 A.M. and the lunch period for the High School (grades 9-12) is from 11:45 A.M. to 12:20 P.M.

The upcoming school year is quickly approaching with all staff returning to school on Monday, August 17, 2026. Open house will be from 3:30pm until 6:30pm on Monday, August 17, 2026. First and second grade students with last names A-M only will return to school on Wednesday, August 20, 2026. While first and second grade students N-Z only will return to school on Thursday, August 21, 2026. First and second grade will be doing a staggered start and only attending one day, either Wednesday or Thursday to develop initial relationships with teachers and peers and all students in first and second grade will begin regular attendance on Friday, August 22, 2026. Our dedicated staff members have worked endlessly this summer to prepare our facilities and curriculum for the students and families of Jefferson Elementary as they do each summer. In just a couple short months, each classroom is emptied, floors are stripped and waxed, light fixtures, windows, storage areas, etc. are cleaned and sanitized, and our offices/hallways are treated in the same manner. A lot of time, effort, and dedication from the custodial and maintenance team is required to complete these tasks. I thank them for their continued dedication to preparing our facility for our staff, families, and most importantly, our youngest learners in the Shadyside Local School District! First Day Procedure for Jefferson Elementary

School doors will open daily at 7:15am for bus students and those students that will be dropped off in the morning. Parents that will be dropping off students in the morning, please keep the roadway clear! Do not double park on Jefferson Avenue, park only on the curbside of the street. Please allow your child to walk up to the doors independently. We must keep traffic flowing and allow for more vehicles to park to drop off students as well. If the area in the front of the school is full, please drive around the block until there is parking available. All students must be in class by 8:00am when the tardy bell rings each morning. Students will go directly to the gym/cafeteria upon arrival for breakfast and to wait for dismissal to classrooms. The classroom teachers and office staff will monitor tardiness and attendance daily. Any student arriving after 8:00am must report to the office **WITH** their parent or guardian to sign in tardy and get an admission slip for their classroom teacher.

Lunch and recess times are as follows: first grade and second grade will have lunch from 11:00am until 11:30am and recess from 11:30am until 12:00pm each day. Preschool students will have recess from 10:30am until 11:00am and kindergarten will have recess from 11:00am until 11:30am. Preschool and kindergarten students will have lunch from 11:30am until 12:00pm each day. All students will eat lunch in the cafeteria. Lunch and breakfast menus will be posted on the school website near the end of each month for the upcoming month. Lunch and breakfast menus are also sent home with students at the end of each month for the upcoming month. The price of a school lunch will be \$3.50 and breakfast \$1.50. Reduced breakfast charge is no charge and reduced lunch charge is no charge for families qualifying for reduced meal prices. Free and reduced lunch/meal applications are online and paper applications are available to be sent home per request. Please make sure to complete the online free and reduced meal application as soon as possible beginning August 1, 2026. Information will be sent home and posted on social media.

Afternoon announcements begin at 2:10pm. Bus students are dismissed using the front doors of the school at 2:15pm. Preschool and kindergarten walkers and their siblings will be dismissed first at approximately 2:15 p.m., followed by 1st and 2nd grade walkers at 2:25 p.m. Parents picking up students must drive vehicles through the north entrance of the school and follow traffic patterns behind the school. Only preschool and kindergarten students and their siblings are dismissed at 2:15 p.m. The gate will be closed until 2:15 p.m. Please do not arrive early as there is no area for parking. Adults picking up students in the walker line or vehicles that may arrive earlier than permitted and get in line must loop around the block. Please understand that Jefferson Avenue is a one way, running north to south, from 1:45 p.m. until 3:00 p.m. If a student needs to leave school early, please send a note or call the office. All students will be dismissed from the office. Parents must sign the child out before leaving. No student will be permitted to wait outside the building.

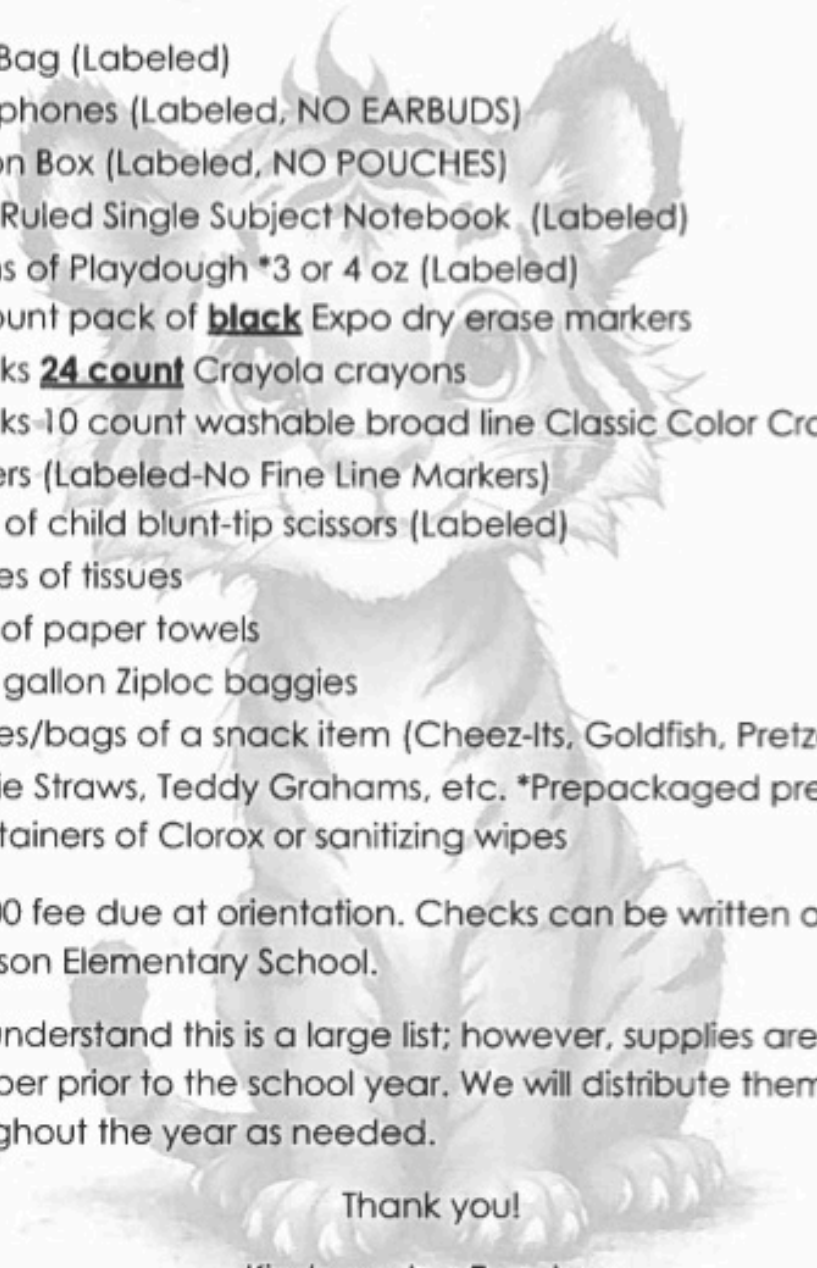

What is Title 1?

Title 1, Part A of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) provides financial assistance to States and School Districts to meet the needs of educationally at-risk students. The goal of Title 1 is to provide extra instructional services and activities, which supports students identified as failing or most at-risk of failing the State's challenging performance standards in mathematics, reading and writing.

How does Shadyside receive Title 1 money?

First, the Federal Government provides funding to each state. Then, each State Educational Agency sends money to its school districts. How much money each school receives is determined by the number of low-income students attending that school.

Title 1 at Shadyside

Jefferson Elementary is a School-Wide Title 1 school. This means that schools with at least 40% of their student population from low-income families are eligible for Title I, Part A schoolwide programs, or schools identified as Priority or Focus schools. In Ohio, Title I, Part A, school wide programs are designed to improve the overall academic program of a school, particularly for struggling students, by leveraging Title I funds alongside other federal, state, and local resources. These programs aim to ensure all students, including those who are most at-risk, have a fair opportunity to meet state standards. A school wide program requires a comprehensive needs assessment that identifies the academic needs of students, especially those who are failing or at risk of failing. Our top goals this year are to improve our chronic attendance/tardy rates and to achieve 80% in all tested areas.

All students will come in the front of building (South entrance) when they are dropped off on Leona Ave. Be careful as you drop off and pull out into traffic.

Please do not drop off your child before 7:25 a.m. to help with overcrowding in the gym.(First bell to homerooms do not ring until 7:40 a.m.)

3rd/4th grade will be dismissed out front(South) at 2:25 p.m. and 5th/6th out the back (North) at 2:30 p.m.

DRESS CODE FOR LEONA MIDDLE SCHOOL

Dress code requires cooperation between home and school. Past practices have been appreciated and we want the students to be comfortable and safe. Dress shall not be disruptive to learning, opposed to predominant community standards, or endanger student safety. General guidelines include:

1. Inappropriate pictures/messages such as liquor advertisements, sexually suggestive messages or drug related messages are not permitted.
2. Shorts and skirts must be at or below the fingertips. Shorts will be permitted when announced by the principal.
3. No blouses or shirts that expose the midriff, or that have an inappropriate neckline.
4. Teeshirts (including undershirts) or pants (including those that have rips or holes) that do not provide proper coverage are not permitted. **This includes designer jeans.** Holes/rips above the knee are not acceptable without proper coverage underneath. Halter tops, tops without backs or straps or spaghetti straps are not appropriate. Tank shirts must fit appropriately and include straps with a width of approximately three fingertips
5. Excessive makeup is not permitted and will be removed upon arrival to school
6. Footwear must be appropriate to insure hygiene and safety. Open toed shoes, flip flops and heels are not permitted.
7. Flagrant hair coloring is not permitted. Hairstyles that disrupt the academic process are not permitted.
8. No visible body piercing or any facial or tongue piercing will be permitted with the exception of the ears.
9. No hats, hoodies overhead, headbands, or bandanas are to be worn in the building.

Final interpretation of appropriate dress and grooming reside with the building principal and/or his or her designees. Every attempt will be made to correct the problem at school before contacting the parents to correct the situation.

Hello and happy summer!

Congratulations to everyone on a very successful 2025-2026 school year. Our school saw many updates and changes through the last year and I thank everyone for their contributions and pride in our school!

A big thank you goes out to our community families and parents. It is absolutely IMPOSSIBLE to do what we do here at Shadyside High School without your support and efforts. Thank you for the strong values you instill into our students and thank you for the positive, supportive climates in your homes and in the town. This town beams “Pride” and I am so happy that is passed on to the next generation.

A big congratulations goes out to the Class of 2026!! I wish everyone in the Class of 2026 the best of luck in the future. If you ever need anything, please reach out to us!! We’ve hit some highs this past year that could not have been possible without our super students and their hard work! We’ve just spent the last school year as the highest performing High School in Belmont County. We were rated a four-star school by the Ohio Department of Education and Workforce and we are hoping for a high rating this year, too. The test scores are back and are the best they’ve ever been. We are consistently outpacing state averages in every tested area and sub category! Our ACT scores are through the roof, as well.

A big thank you goes out to our custodial staff that performs the tasks to ensure our students’ and staff health. We will maintain the same level of nightly “deep cleaning” that we’ve used for the last few years to cleanse classrooms and hallways.

Speaking of a clean and welcoming building, our custodial and maintenance staff are hard at work refinishing floors and touching up the walls to get SHS ready for the fall. I want to thank Tommy Duncan, the entire custodial staff, and the student workers on the summer work crew. Without all of your efforts, we would not have a functional facility. As a reminder, our entire catalog of classes is intended to be taken in a face-to-face manner, in person, at SHS. In the interest of academic performance, students must be in attendance. Educational research supports a strong correlation between absenteeism and low academic performance. While we recognize that there are times when a student must miss school due to illness or other issues, we strongly advise these absences be minimized.

We do have two virtual learning opportunities available at Shadyside. The first is our traditional Edmentum program. Students registered for these classes should be prepared to traverse an entire year’s worth of curriculum at their own pace and under their own guidance. While our teachers can make the best effort possible to help a student with an Edmentum class, there should be no expectation of guidance from the school should with these classes. The other option is our new Virtual Learning Program (VLA.) In VLA, the student actually has access to a teacher through an Online interface to help with the educational process. The VLA program is bit a more intensive and may only be utilized with prior approval from administration.

Safety has always been at the forefront of our planning at Shadyside Local Schools. This year is no exception. We are constantly evolving and adjusting to make our buildings as safe as they can be for our students and staff. This year, we will continue to use our single point entrance plan. ALL STUDENTS will enter through the main doors at the front of the building. Upon entering, high school students will turn left and use the tables in the gym hallway to sit while waiting for the opening bell. Students may also stand in the art room hallway or gym/auditorium hallway. Senior high students may not pass the office in the main hall before the opening bell rings. High school students should also refrain from entering the gym prior to first period. Junior high students will no longer enter the multi-purpose room doors. They, too, will enter the main entrance at the front of the building and then turn right. Junior high students will still wait for the opening bell in the multi-purpose room. Junior high students may not go to the art hall or gym/auditorium hall before the opening bell.

All side doors will remain locked at all times and be considered “exit only.” Any student caught opening a door to allow access to the school will be subject to the student handbook for creating a safety hazard.

I believe that this entry plan maintains the separation of senior high and junior high students in the morning while creating a situation where there is only a single point of entry. This entry will be supervised by staff, administration, law enforcement, or any combination of the three every day during morning drop-off times. Reminder that the opening bell rings at 7:40 AM and first period begins at 7:45 AM. THERE SHOULD BE NO STUDENTS ROAMING THE HALLS PRIOR TO THE OPENING BELL AT 7:40 AM. A note to students: personal accountability will be of a HUGE emphasis this year. You must be where you are supposed to be at all times. Students that are found to be truant in-school, which means you’ve gone to classroom or location not previously approved, will face increased disciplinary actions. This is simply a safety precaution and something that we value at SHS. Additionally, students will be expected to attend the classes on their schedule, in order, with no alterations for any reason. Students will no longer be permitted to gain a pass to another classroom during any period of the day. This includes leaving study hall.

For the first time since the early Eighties, possibly the Seventies, we will have a cafeteria at Shadyside High School that will serve breakfast and lunch each day. Regular breakfast price will be \$1.50 and regular lunch price will be \$3.50. We will require 7th grade, 8th grade, Freshman, and Sophomore students to stay in for lunch and eat in the cafeteria. You may purchase a lunch or bring your own from home. Please no food delivery to the school through local establishments or online delivery options like DoorDash. Juniors and Seniors are encouraged to take advantage of the cafeteria area but will be allowed to leave for lunch as part of the open-lunch program.

Students will have the privilege in participating in our one-to-one Chromebook program at SHS, too. Every student will get a Chromebook to use throughout the year. Students MAY NOT bring their own tablets or laptops to school as these devices do not meet our software requirements and tend to circumvent most of our Internet security, thus creating a safety hazard. Students are reminded that the device is the property of the school and they are simply borrowing the Chromebook. It must be cared for and returned in the same condition at the end of the year. Also, given that students have Chromebooks, there will be NO CELL PHONES or TABLETS in class. Students are encouraged to leave their personal devices at home. If you are a student that drives to school, please leave your device in your car. Students that bring their device to class will be required to store the device in a phone caddy during class. Students may not access their device during class time, including time when a student leaves the room to go to the bathroom, another class, or office.

Any student that attempts to conceal their device for the day and uses it for ANY REASON (including but not limited to: checking messages, checking the time, as a calculator, etc.) will have their device confiscated and sent to the office. Students may be searched for concealed devices. Headphones and ear buds are also prohibited. Anything that could potentially interfere with a student's ability to hear creates a learning obstacle as well as a safety hazard. Smart watches that are used inappropriately are also subject to the technology policy and may be confiscated. Discipline measures for these violations will be increased for this coming school year as Shadyside Local School District aims to coincide with the new State regulations put in place concerning cell phones.

In addition to the rules and regulations of the building, parents always want to know what sort of supplies their student may need for the upcoming year at SHS. My answer is that different teachers at the high school like different things. There is no real supply list because supplies are not really universal through SHS. Most teachers would prefer that you keep a three-ring binder specific for their class. A folder for each class would probably be the minimum. Beyond a place to keep documents for the classes, writing utensils are very important. Pens and pencils would be required in most academic rooms and marking instruments like colored pens, markers, or highlighters would be an added luxury, but not necessarily a requirement. Most assignments are either provided on hard-copy in class or digital through Google Classroom, so there is no real need to purchase an excessive amount of notebook paper. One small notebook per class would be more than enough. Something like a large, multi-subject notebook would sort of take care of all needs, depending on your organizational preferences.

I want to take this opportunity to welcome everyone back to Shadyside High School. Thank you all for your continued support of what we are doing at SHS. Our staff is wonderful, our students are incredible, and our families and community are sensational. What a town, what a school!

EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Athletic Eligibility is Based on Each Grading Period

Grades 9-12. In order to be eligible in grades 9-12, a student must be currently enrolled. During the preceding grading period the student must have received passing grades in a minimum of five-one credit courses or the equivalent, which counts toward graduation. In addition a student must have maintained a 1.25 grade point average. A student enrolled in the first grading period of 9th grade must have passed 5 subjects carried the preceding grading period in which the student was enrolled. There is no make up for failures during summer vacation to permit eligibility for athletics.

Grades 7 and 8. A student enrolling in the seventh grade for the first time will be eligible for the first grading period regardless of previous academic achievement. Passing five (5) credits are required.

Summer school grades earned may not be used to substitute for failing grades from the last grading period of the regular school year. Coaches will maintain and supervise lists of those ineligible as provided by Athletic Director.

NON-ATHLETIC ELIGIBILITY

In order to be eligible for a non-athletic extracurricular activity a student must: Have received passing grades in a minimum of five one-credit courses or the equivalent, which counts toward graduation. Must have maintained a minimum of 1.25 grades point average. The G.P.A. required may be set higher by that group, club or organization.

ATTENDANCE

The educational program offered by this District is predicated upon the presence of the student and requires continuity of instructions and classroom participation. Regular and punctual Attendance shall be required of all enrolled Shadyside High School students during the hours that the school is in session. When in attendance, students are expected to be present, on time, and participate in all classes and study halls. Daily attendance of students is a matter of great importance as shown by the fact that prospective employers always check attendance. Student attendance and promptness to school is the primary responsibility of the student and his/her parent/guardian. It is also the responsibility of the student and parent/guardian to use discretion when scheduling appointments, planned absences, and early dismissals.

In accordance with state law, the Superintendent or his designee shall require from the parent of each student or from an adult student who has been absent from school or from class for any reason, a written statement of the cause for such absence.

The Ohio Department of Education (3321.04 RC) and School Board consider the following factors as reasonable excuses for time missed at school and will be considered excused absences:

- A. Personal illness or medical appointment with an accompanying physician's statement.
- B. Illness in the immediate family that requires the student to stay home as determined by the Principal
- C. Quarantine of the home
- D. Death in the immediate family (maximum 3 days)
- E. Religious observation in which a student is personally involved.
- F. Emergency situation in which a parent can work out no other solution as determined by the Principal or for such good cause as may be acceptable to the Principal
- G. Court appearance for child

Examples of unexcused absences are employment, oversleeping, missing the bus, car trouble of any kind, running non-emergency errands, shopping, and running out-of-school errands.

Upon return to school the student must provide a written excuse to school administration within seventy-two (72) hours to verify the absence. Any absences not verified within the seventy-two (72) hour window will be deemed unexcused regardless of the nature of the absence. It will be the responsibility of the student to receive make-up work from the teacher and to have such returned by the specified date as set by the school. Teachers have the authority to assign zeros for all work that is not made up by the specified date. With exception of pre-approved absences, students have the same number of days missed to complete make-up work. For example, if a student misses two days, the make-up work is due on the third day back to school.

When a student is absent, the parent or guardian should call the school between 7-9 a.m. to inform school officials that their child will not attend school that day. As required by law, if the office does not receive a phone call by the completion of attendance a school representative will attempt to contact the home.

Appointments -Doctors, Dentist, etc...

Appointments should be made outside school time. If this is not possible the student should bring a note from home requesting early dismissal. The student's handbook will be signed, indicating the time the student will be released. Students must sign out in the main office upon leaving. The Principal may call the doctor's office to verify the appointment. When students return to school they need to provide a slip from their doctor, dentist, therapist, etc. verifying the appointment date and time. If they return to school the same day they should sign back in.

Vacations

We encourage vacations involving students to be taken during school vacation time. Students who go on vacation during school time are given an unexcused absence. If a parent who wishes his/her child to vacation during the school time presents a written request to the Principal prior to going and each of his/her teachers sign the request, then the child may make up any missed work at the convenience of the teacher and within the guidelines for make up work.

College Visits

Seniors are permitted two approved visits to colleges. Application forms for college visits must be approved three days in advance by the Guidance Office. and Principal. Juniors may be permitted one approved visit to a college. Same rules apply as for seniors. Only under extenuating circumstances will college visits be permitted during the month of May.

Sanctions Excessive Absences

Other than specified above as excused absences, all other absences shall be considered unexcused absences. When a student meets the following thresholds, the corresponding actions will be taken by the School District in accordance with Ohio Law (ORC 2151.011):

Habitual Truancy [2151.011(B)(18)] is defined as absence of thirty (30) or more school hours consecutively or forty-two (42) hours/month or seventy-two (72) hours/year without legitimate cause.

1. Hours Threshold One [38 school hours/month or 65 school hours/year] for excused or unexcused absences:
 - a. Send letter home to parent/guardian
 - b. Truancy Intervention Plan must be developed for student
2. Hours Threshold Two [30 or more consecutive school hours or 42 school hours/month or 72 school hours/years] for unexcused absences:
 - a. Absence Intervention Team assigned within seven (7) days

- b. Make three (3) good faith attempts to engage parents to determine if Children's Services referral is needed
- c. Within fourteen (14) days of assignment of Absence Intervention Team, an Absence Intervention Plan must be developed
- d. Within seven (7) days of Plan being developed, provide in writing to parents

3. If juvenile refuses to participate or fails to make satisfactory progress on plan, a complaint will be filed with the Juvenile Court no later than sixty-one (61) days after plan implementation.

Summary

Number of Hours Absent	Policy
1-65 School Hours	Parent note required and accepted to validate absences. No discipline assigned.
65 + School Hours	Official documentation required in addition to parent note to validate absences. If official documentation is not received within 72 hours of returning to school, attendance restitution will be required and further discipline may be assigned.
65 + School Hours WITHOUT proper documentation	Absences are treated as unexcused.

NOTE: Any student that misses more than sixty-five (65) hours/year may be required to complete attendance restitution to make up for missed academic time. Attendance restitution may be completed through detention, Saturday School, or other means justifiable by administration.

Methods of Communication with Regards to Attendance Problems

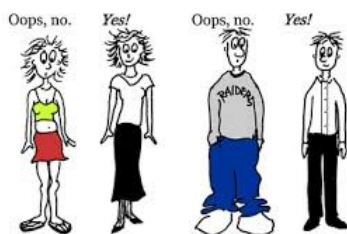
1. Teachers will compile daily attendance and report concerns to the High School office.
2. Days absent will be displayed on quarterly report cards.
3. Written correspondence will be sent home when the following thresholds are met:
 - a. A student is absent for thirty-eight (38) school hours
 - b. A student is absent for sixty-five (65) school hours
4. Other informal means of communication such as phone calls may be used as needed.

SENIOR EXEMPTION POLICY

Second Semester Exam Exemption:

- "B" average or above in a course taken by a Senior can exempt them if they meet the following criteria:
 - B or A average if your course for the entire year consisting of semester one and semester two.
 - No more than eight (8) absences for the year. Please remember two (2) college days are excused and not counted. Field trips, shadow days, practice days are all arranged through the Principal's Office. Example: JETS or LT practice at sectional or FEA shadow are excused and not counted.
 - Students can take exams if they desire.
 - This is for seniors only, not upperclassmen.
 - Extended illness of five (5) or more days are considered in the count of absences for this senior privilege.

DRESS CODE



- When dress and grooming appear to endanger the safety of the student or interfere with the school's mission to teach discipline, etiquette, and grooming, students will be directed to modify their dress and grooming.
- Suggestive, profane, tobacco or alcohol logos/advertisements are not permitted on any clothing.
- Any makeshift patches, unusual designs, or inappropriate markings are not permitted. Students are not permitted to wear "colors" or any other "gang identifiers".
- Students' shirts/blouses must have shoulder straps that are at least three (3) finger widths wide (spaghetti strap shirts/tanks are not permitted) and be long enough to be tucked in (bare midriffs are not permitted). Shirts and blouses must be buttoned to a suitable non-suggestive length. Shirts and blouses must be snug under the arm (basketball jerseys alone or loose fitting sleeveless shirts are not permitted).
- No see-through garments are to be worn.
- Underwear must not be visible.
- Coats and jackets are not to be worn to class.
- Hats, caps, toboggans, or any other head wear are not to be worn or carried in school during the school day.
- Wallet chains, spiked collars, bracelets or heavy chains are not permitted.
- Shorts, skorts, skirts, dresses, and rompers must be below arms length (finger tips).
- Hair should be clean and neatly groomed. No unusual hairdos and/or colored hair calling unnecessary attention to oneself.
- Facial hair must be clean and neatly groomed. Beards that are of excessive length and potentially cause a safety issue are not permitted.
- No protruding facial piercings (hoops, connecting chains, pointed studs, etc.)
- No flip-flops or shower shoe
- Body Piercing is not recommended. If it is distracting or a safety concern then it must be removed.

- Questionable dress and appearance for which there are not guidelines will be ruled on by the principal and his advisory staff. Common sense and good taste will guide us in this decision
- Students who violate the dress code will have to change before they are permitted to go to class. Students that are unable to remedy the dress code violations will be assigned In School Alternate Placement for the day.

Students who violate the dress code will have to change before they are permitted to go to class. A second violation of the dress code will result in a detention.

All students entering KINDERGARTEN must show complete immunization records for DTaP, Polio, Hepatitis B, MMR and Varicella vaccines.

All students entering 7th GRADE are required to receive TDaP and Meningococcal A vaccines.

All students entering 12th GRADE are required to receive a second Meningococcal A vaccine given on or after the 16th birthday.

Please make arrangements with your child's health care provider or the Belmont County Health Department (740)695-1202 to schedule an appointment.

Written proof of these vaccines must be turned in to the school office before the start of 2026-2027 school year.

DIRECTORY INFORMATION OF STUDENTS



Directory information, which includes the student's name, address, telephone listing, date of birth, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height, dates of attendance, date of graduation, and awards received, is made available to opposing schools for athletic events, colleges and universities upon request, and the various branches of the armed forces, upon request.

Parents who wish their student's name deleted from such releases must submit a written request to the building principal.

PUBLIC'S RIGHT TO KNOW

The Board supports the right of the people to know about the programs and services of their schools and makes efforts to disseminate appropriate information. Each principal is authorized and expected to keep the school's community informed about the school's programs and activities. The release of information of District wide interest is to be coordinated by the Superintendent.

Business of the Board is discussed and decisions are made at public meetings of the Board, except such matters as are properly discussed in private executive sessions.

The official minutes of the Board, its written policies, its financial records and all other public records are open for inspection in the Treasurer's office during the hours when the administration offices are open.

Records pertaining to individual students and other confidential materials are not released for inspection by the public or any unauthorized persons, either by the Treasurer, Superintendent, or other persons responsible for the custody of confidential files. Only that information deemed "directory information" may be released from an individual student's file, and only after complying with the regulations prepared by the administration for the release of such information. Student records that consist of "personally identifiable information" generally are exempt from disclosure. Student directory information, however, is released unless the parents have affirmatively withdrawn their consent to release in writing.

Any individual who wants to obtain a copy of a public record may request to have the record duplicated on paper, on the same medium on which the record is kept or on any other medium the Superintendent/designee determines that the record can reasonably be duplicated as an integral part of normal operations.

The District may ask that the request be put in writing. However, the District must notify the requester that it is not mandatory to do so.

The District provides an opportunity for a records requester making an ambiguous or overly broad request to revise the request by informing the requester of the manner of which records are maintained.

If a public records request is denied, the District provides an explanation with legal authority as to the reason for the denial of the request.

If the person seeking the copy makes a choice under this provision, the District must provide the record in accordance with that choice if available to the District. A fee may be charged for copies. The District may require the fee charged for copies be paid in advance.

The person making a mail request pays the cost of postage and other supplies in advance. The number of mail requests sent to any one person is limited to 10 a month unless the person certifies in writing that the records, or the information in them, will not be used for commercial purposes.

The Board's public records policy is posted in a conspicuous location in the central office and in all other District buildings and employee handbooks provided by the District.

Notice to Residents of the Shadyside Local School District

Child Find is the process of identifying, locating, and evaluating all children from age three to twenty-one who may have a disability and may be in need of special education and related services, regardless of the severity of the disability. The district seeks to identify through child find, all children in the Shadyside Local School District who attend a public or non-public school within the district or who are homeless or wards of the state, and who may be in need of special education and/or related services.

The Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) is a federal law that assures children and youth with disabilities a free appropriate public education (FAPE) in the least restrictive environment (LRE). The Shadyside Local School District provides a continuum of special education programs and services for preschool and school-age students with disabilities.

A child with a disability is a child having a cognitive disability (e.g. developmental delay), hearing impairment (including deafness), visual impairment (including blindness), a speech or language impairment, a serious emotional/behavioral disturbance, an orthopedic impairment, autism, traumatic brain injury, other health impairment, specific learning disability, deaf-blindness, or multiple disabilities.

Parents, relatives, public and private agency employees, and concerned citizens are asked to help the Shadyside Local School District find any child who may have a disability and who may need special education and related services.
