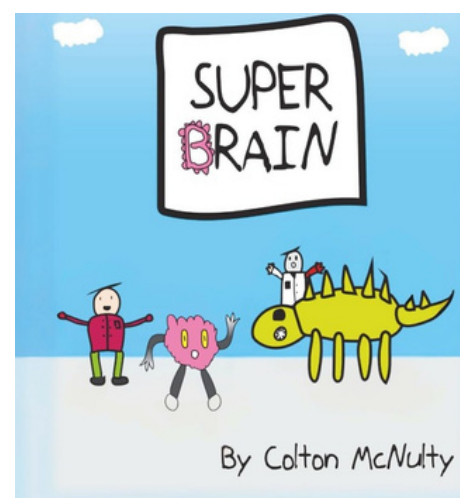

HVS Thespians Shine at Michigan Festival

Students from Huron Valley Schools delivered outstanding performances at the annual **Michigan Thespian Festival** held in Lansing. Thirteen students from Lakeland High School and IA-West, members of Thespian Troupe 7905, competed in 11 individual events, earning 3 Superior Ratings & 7 Excellent Ratings. Two seniors, **Jake Cole** and **June Spencer**, were given a combined total of more than \$750,000 in scholarships.

Milford High's Thespian Troupe 4291 also saw remarkable success. 22 students attended the festival, earning Superior ratings in eleven individual competitive events. Milford High's 10-minute play earned the top score of the competition & qualified for the Michigan Interscholastic Forensics Association (MIFA) event. In addition, two Milford seniors, **Ella Kusina** and **Theo Kress**, collectively earned \$231,000 in college scholarships. Junior **Maddy Donoghue-Lozon** made history as one of just 12 students statewide selected to serve on the Student Thespian Officer Board. Together, these achievements highlight the talent & dedication of theatre students in the Huron Valley Schools.



Music Students Shine at State Event

Muir students took center stage this weekend in Grand Rapids, showcasing their talent at the state level. Congratulations to **Kenny Jenkinson** for an outstanding performance with the All-State Middle School Band—an impressive achievement that reflects dedication and hard work.

Huron Valley Honors King's Life & Legacy

Under a winter sky and the steady rhythm of footsteps, the Milford community gathered for the 21st Annual **March on Main Street**, honoring the life & legacy of **Martin Luther King Jr.** Each year, the march serves as both a remembrance and a recommitment. This year's theme, *The Great Force of Non-violence*, called on people to reflect on Dr. King's belief that non-violence is not just a tactic, but a way to build lasting community – one rooted in dignity, justice and mutual care. Speakers reminded the crowd that the questions Dr. King and civil rights leaders like Bayard Rustin raised decades ago remain urgent today: how to disagree deeply without dehumanizing one another, and how to move forward together with purpose.



Huron Valley Schools Superintendent **Paul Salah** & members of the school board attended the march. HVS Board President **Laura Dodd** shared that this event is a family tradition dating back to when her daughter rode along in a stroller, “We do it every year because we think it is incredibly important to show kindness, love & support in our community.”

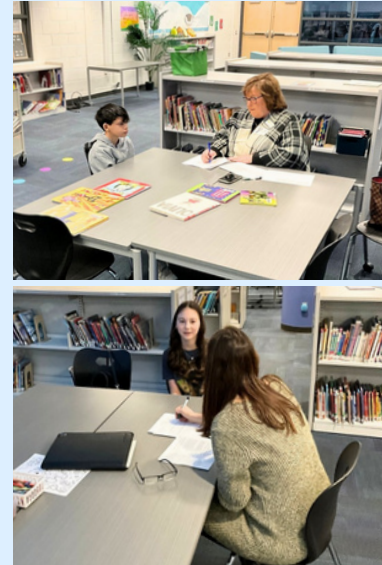

Lost for 53 Years: Milford High Class Ring Found, Returned



More than five decades after it was lost, a Milford High School class ring has made its way back to its rightful owner. **Boyce McClain**, a 1971 graduate of Milford High School, recently had his long-missing class ring returned—53 years after it disappeared. McClain lost the ring in 1971 while spending time in Central Park in downtown Milford. At the time, he never expected to see it again.

The ring was recently brought back to the Milford High School building by the individual who discovered it. Thanks to the initials engraved inside the ring, school staff were able to identify McClain as its owner and track him down.

Now living in Florida, McClain was thrilled to receive the unexpected piece of his high school past. The return of the ring serves as a reminder of the lasting connections to Milford High and the power of small details to reunite people with meaningful memories, even after more than half a century.

Supporting Your Teens with the New HVS Personal Communication Devices Policy

With the new personal communication device policy now in place, you may be hearing grumblings from your teens with the changes in cell phone and AirPods use. Our teens, and many of us, are glued to our devices. Teens are wired to connect with others and connecting through texts and social media has become the norm.

Many of our teens may feel uncomfortable with not being able to check their phones and receive notifications throughout a class period. Adjusting to this new policy will take time. Despite research repeatedly showing that remaining focused on a task is significantly impacted with every text and notification, our teens are often unaware of this impact in daily life.

Ways to support your teen with this transition:

- **Normalize the discomfort.** Listen when they complain. Their frustrations, anxiety and anger are real feelings and having a safe place to express them is important. Share with them that change is hard and feeling uneasy without a phone is common and usually fades away with time.
- **Help them practice at home.** Try short, device-free times, like meals & homework, so school doesn't feel like the only place limits exist.
- **Focus on why the policy changed.** Talk about how fewer distractions can reduce stress and improve learning.
- **Celebrate small wins.** Acknowledge when they make it through the class period or day without checking their phone — it reinforces progress.
- **Support alternative coping tools.** Brainstorm together specific strategies such as taking deep breaths, doodling, journaling or a short walk to manage the uncomfortable feelings.
- **Put your phone away too.** Teens notice when adults have their full attention during a conversation.
- **Support the HVS policy.** Knowing that you will abide by the policy is important for them to hear.
