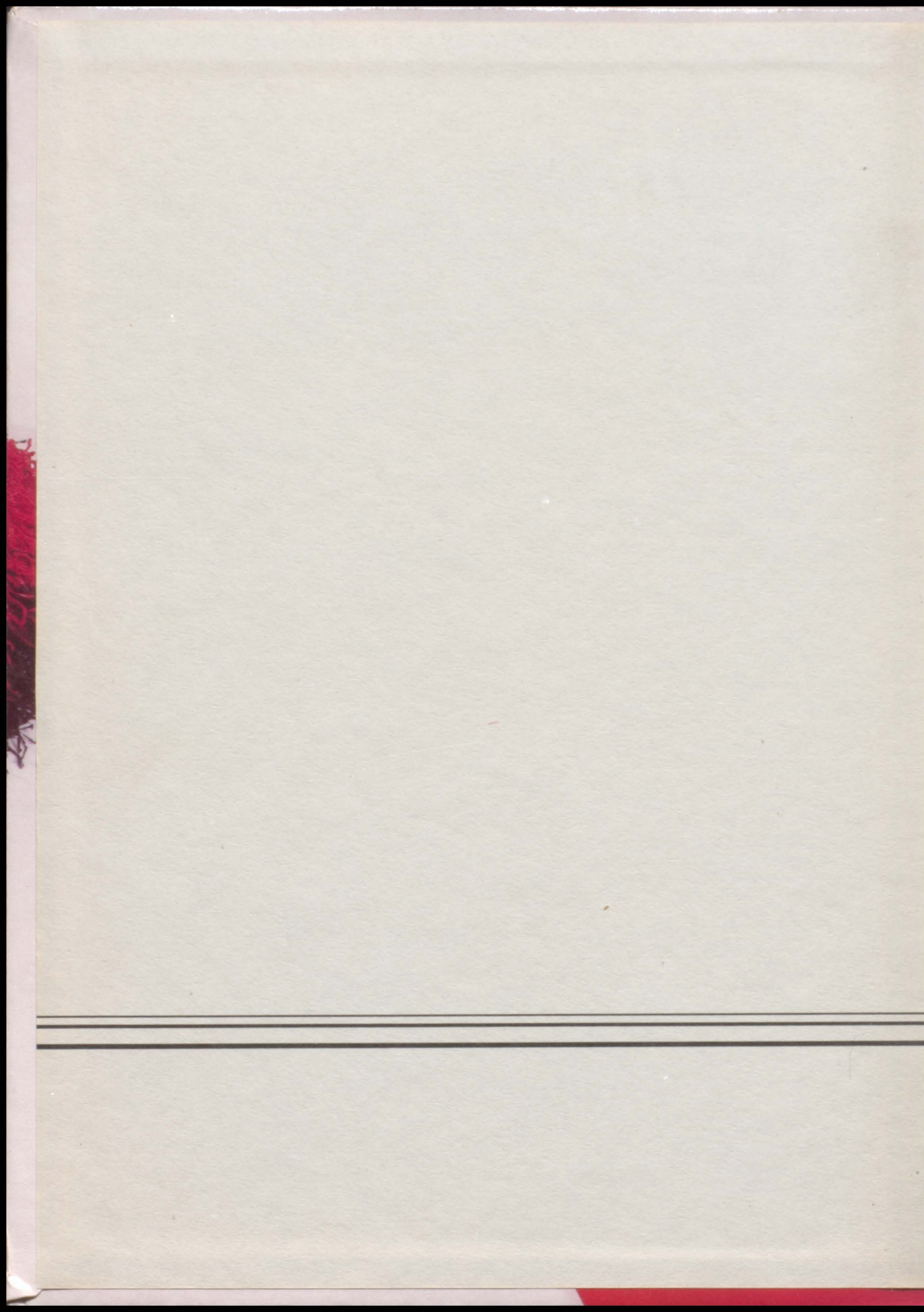

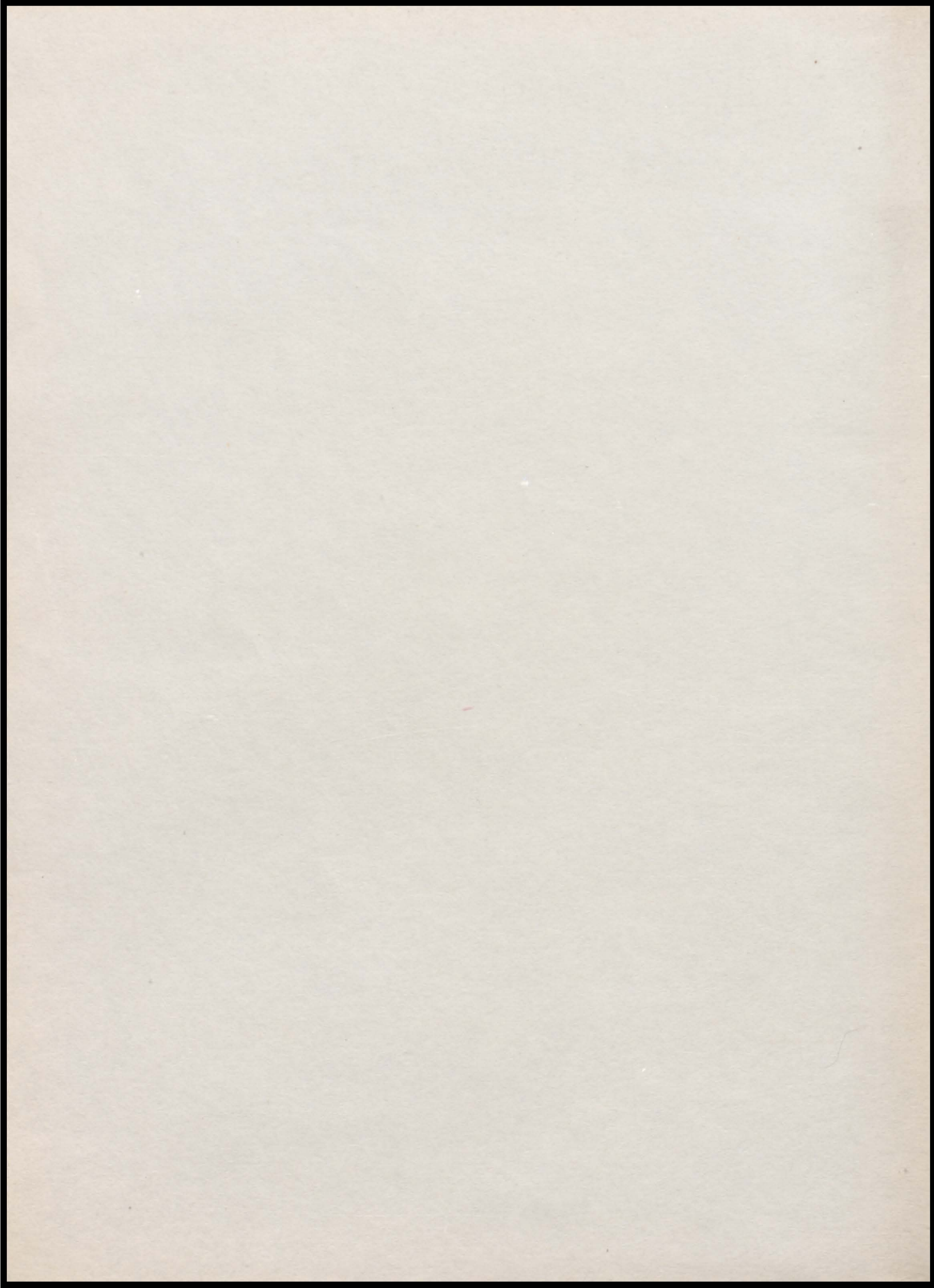

There were other changes that made this year a new beginning. Seniors were no longer let out at 2:30, and the hour long homeroom in the morning and study halls became things of the past.

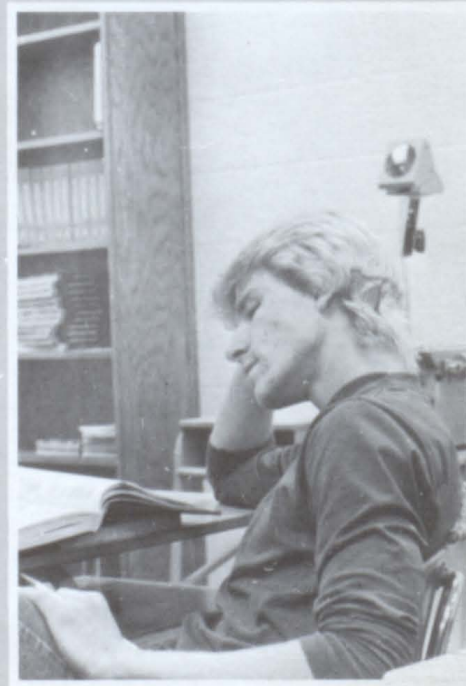
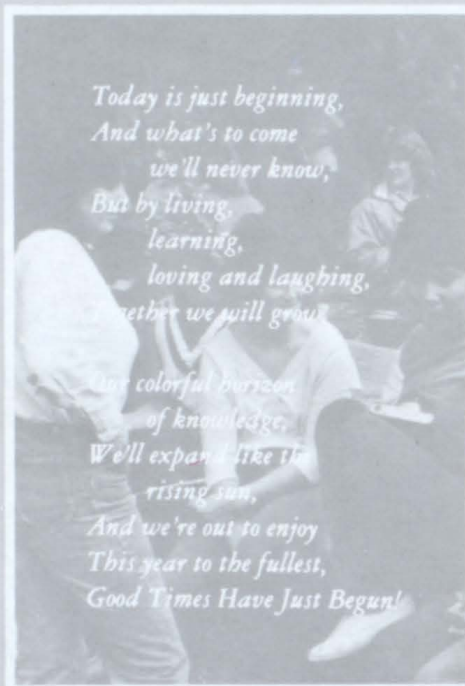
It seemed like the students took more interest in their classes. With no study halls, they started taking classes that they would need for college and future jobs.

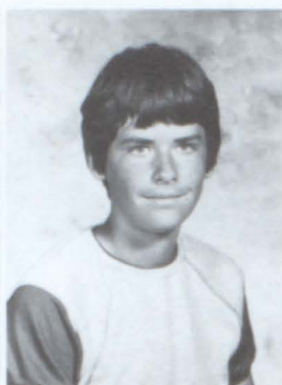

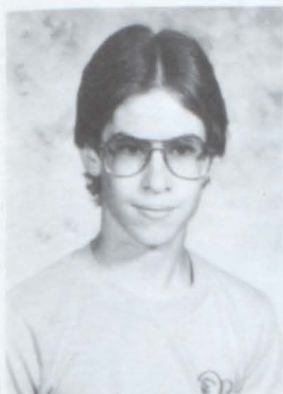

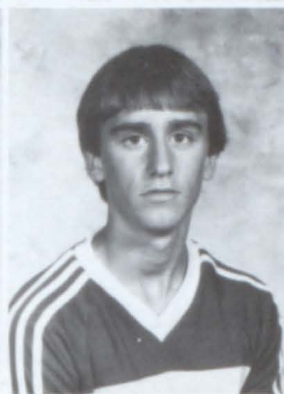

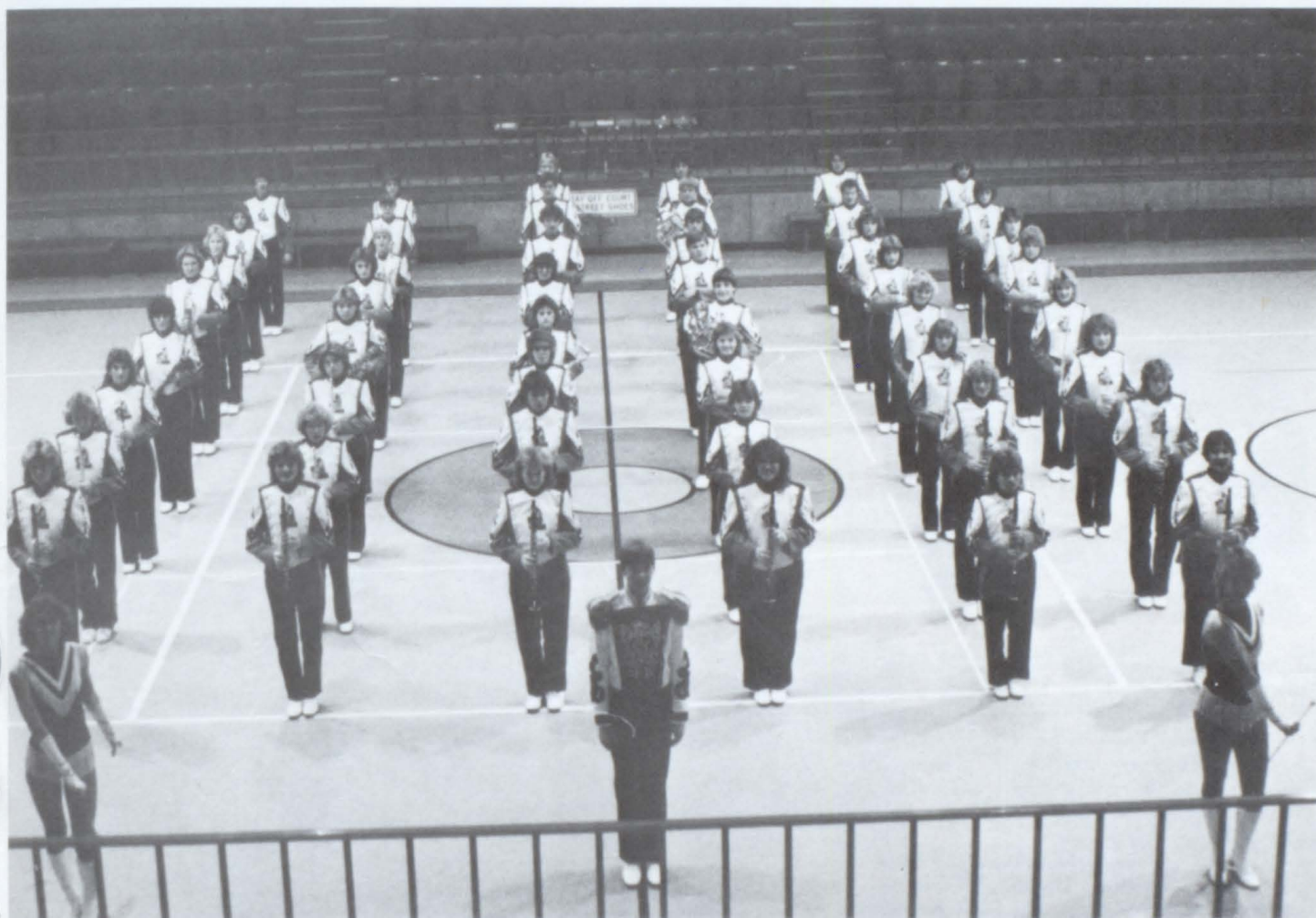

"The play was about adventure. It showed that you've got to have 'the right amount of sitting quietly at home and the right amount of adventure' to have a happy life," she said.

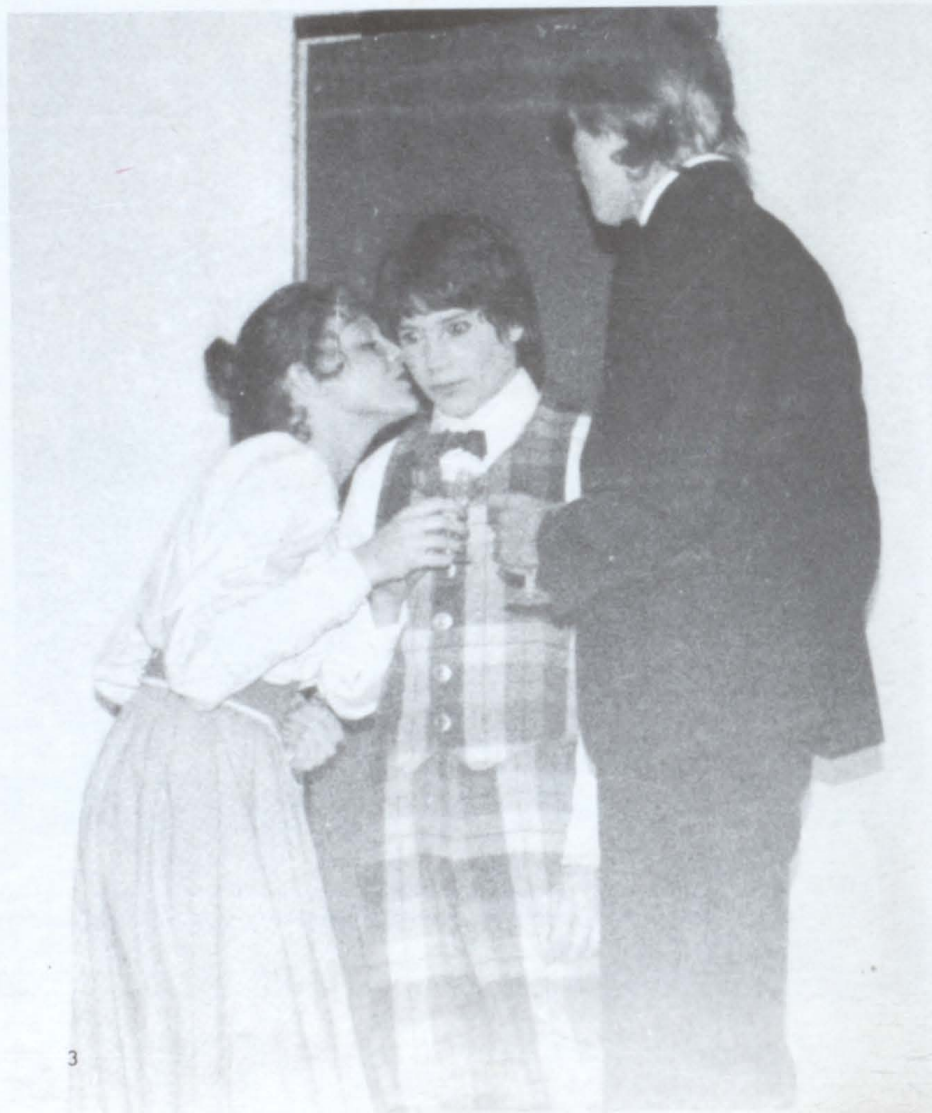
"I thought the play went very well, and everyone worked hard to make it a success. I was very pleased with their performance," Schramm added.

The Plainville meet proved to be the harriers' biggest win as they easily outscored second-place Oberlin 28-70. Brett Fuller, senior, led with a 10:37 fifth-place time, followed by Mike Weber, senior, with a 10:38 sixth place. Also, Mike Honas, sophomore, finished eighth with 10:41, and Darrell Ptasehek, senior, ninth with 10:42.

By the end of the season, the team had accumulated three firsts, two seconds, one third, and one fourth.

Mr. Hulse, cross country coach, said it was a good season that ended on a bad note at regionals. The fourth place finish at regionals kept the team out of state competition. Paul Patten, senior, qualified individually by finishing seventh, and placed 35th at state with a time of 11:11.

Hulse said, "I am optimistic about next year and I'd like to see quite a few go out. I would also like to have a full girls' team."

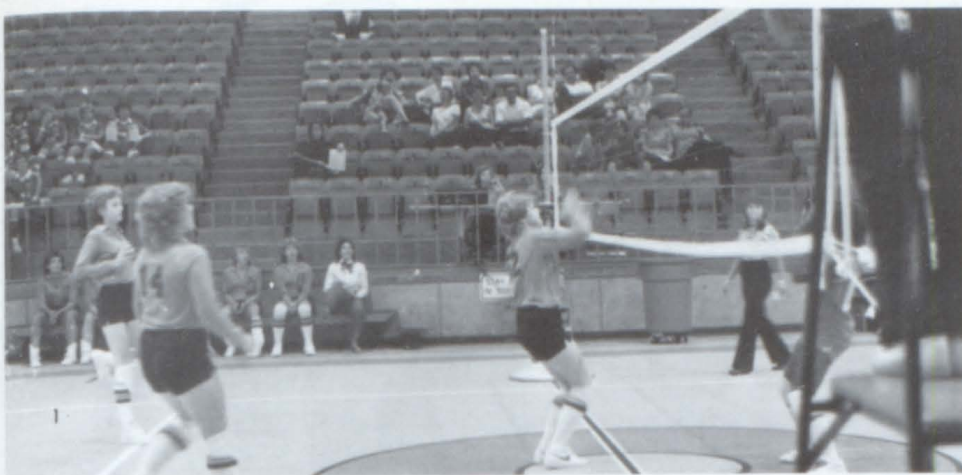

Bender said, "I saw a lot of good things from the sophomore and junior classes. They have potential and should help us in the seasons to come."



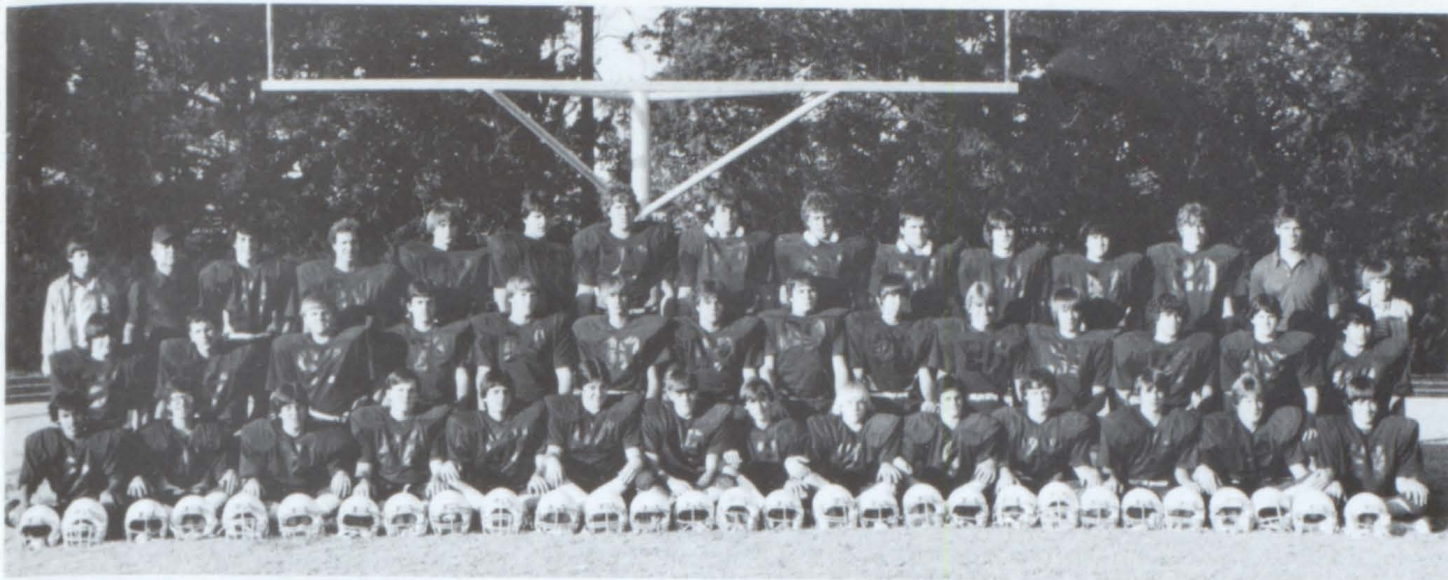

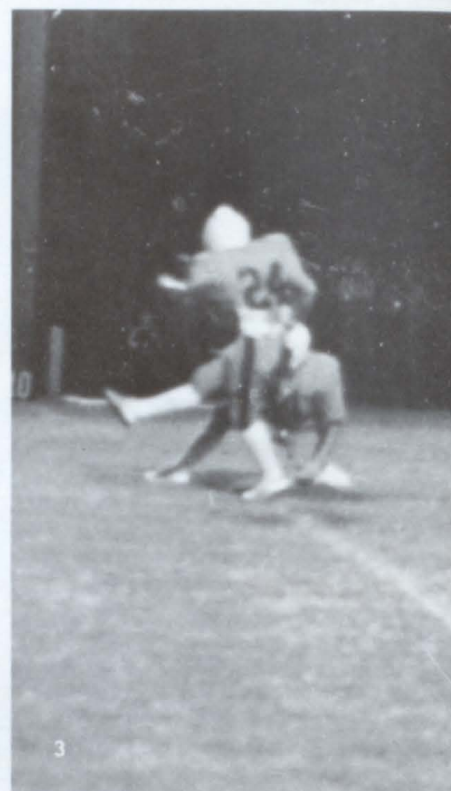

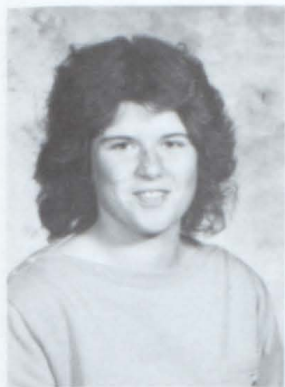

On April 22, the FFA had their Parent Appreciation Banquet.

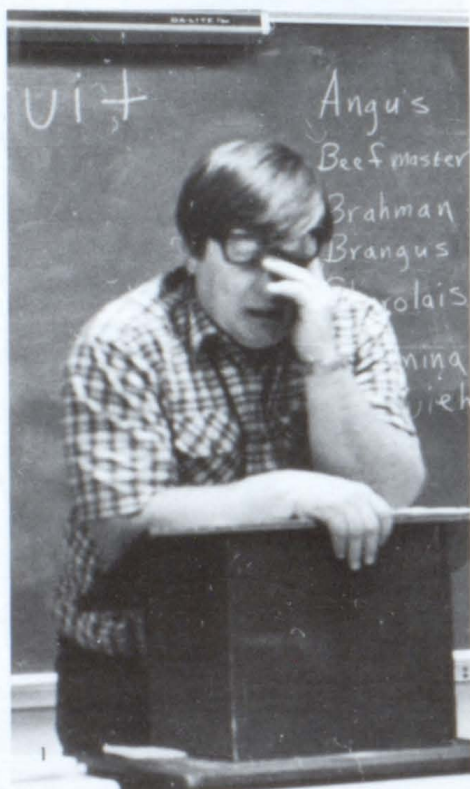

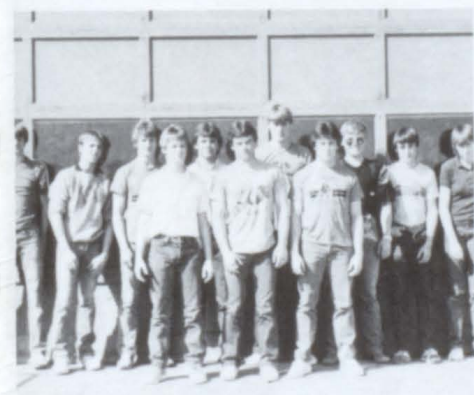

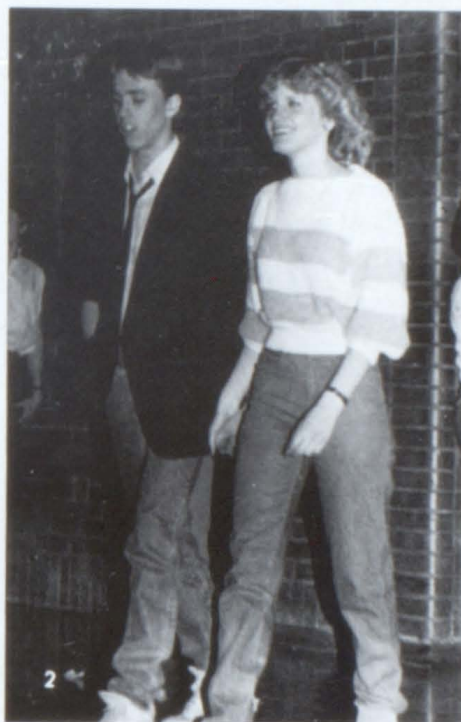

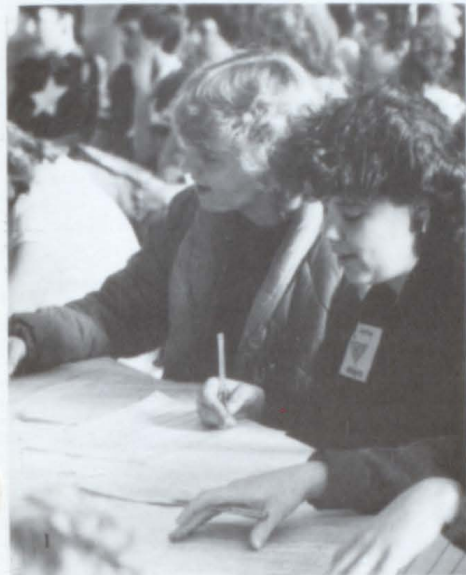

Faulkender has an optimistic attitude toward next year.

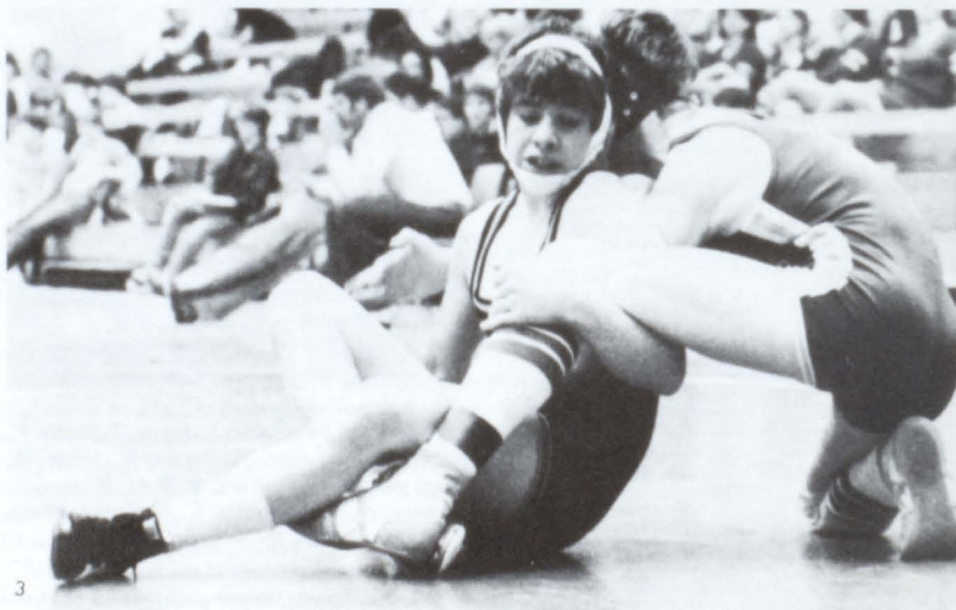
"Next year we have the same potential as this year, but you cannot live on last year's glory," Faulkender said.

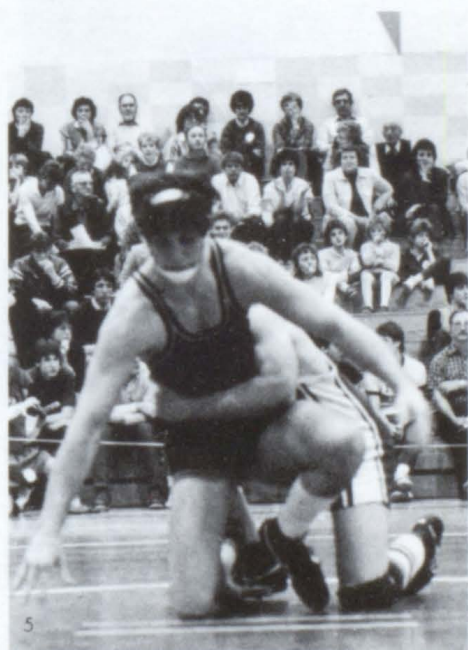
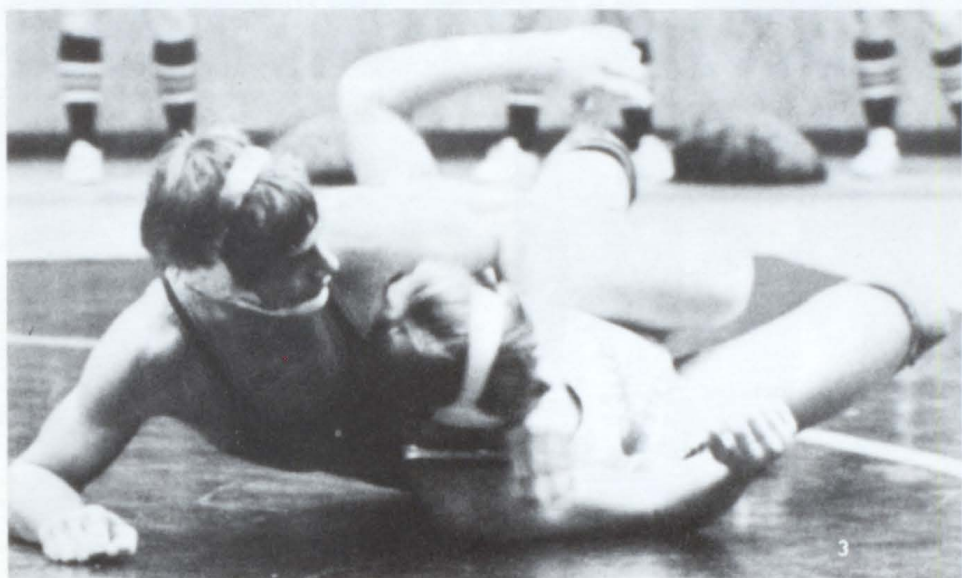

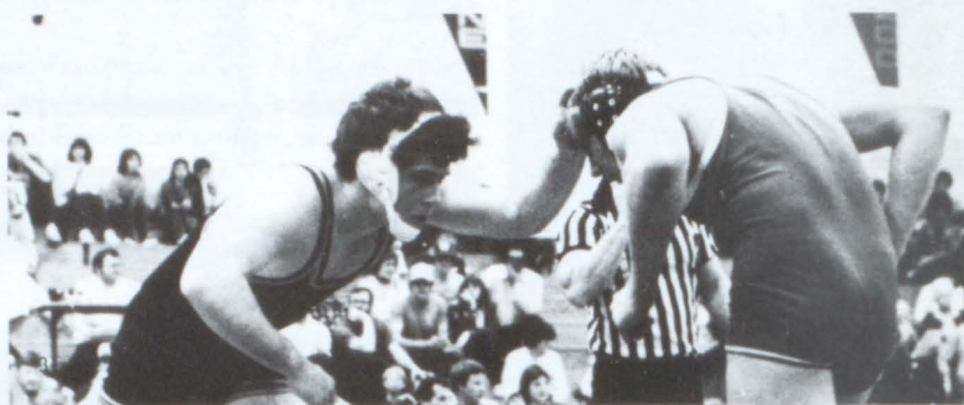

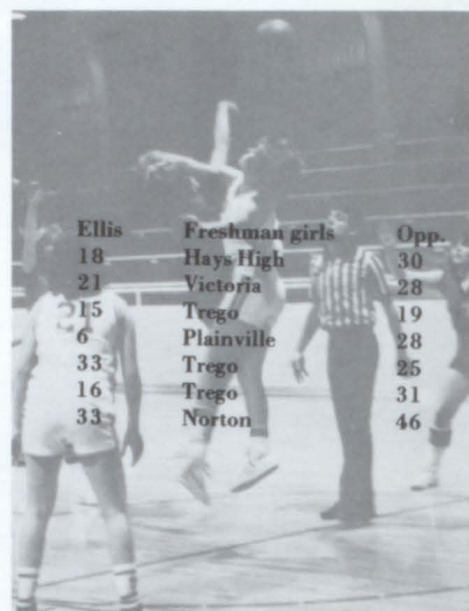

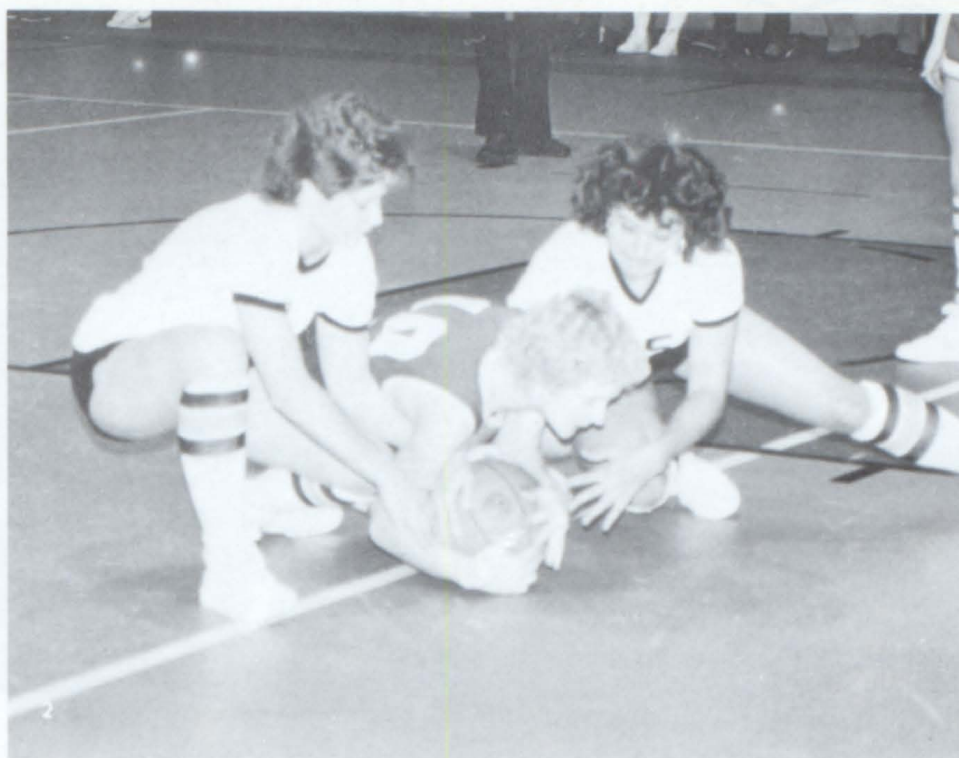

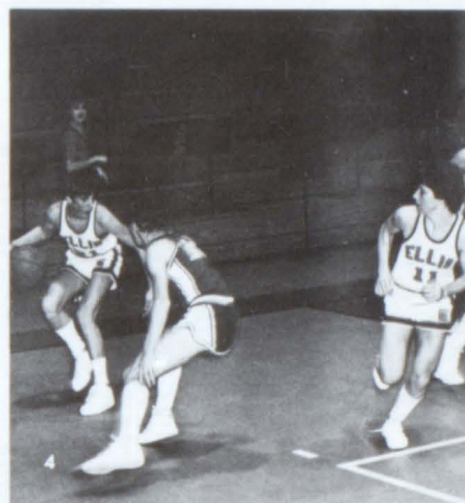
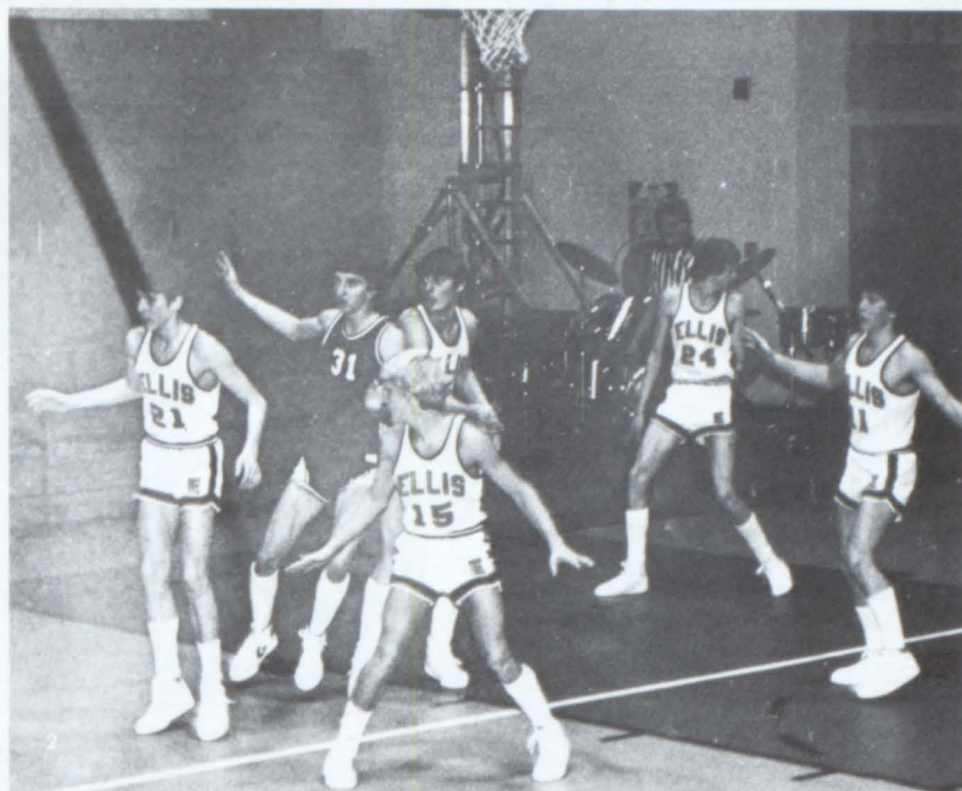

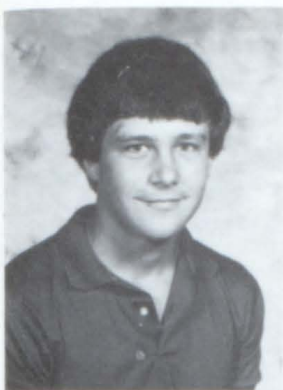

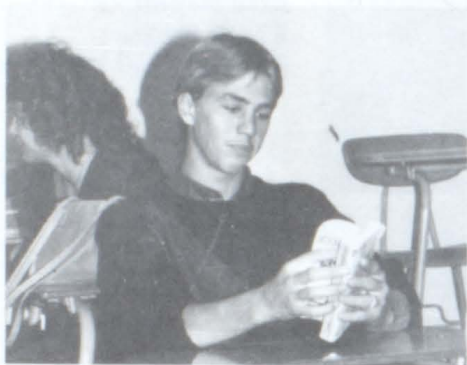

went to switch it, she knocked us both down in the bathroom at grand state," said Karen Fox.

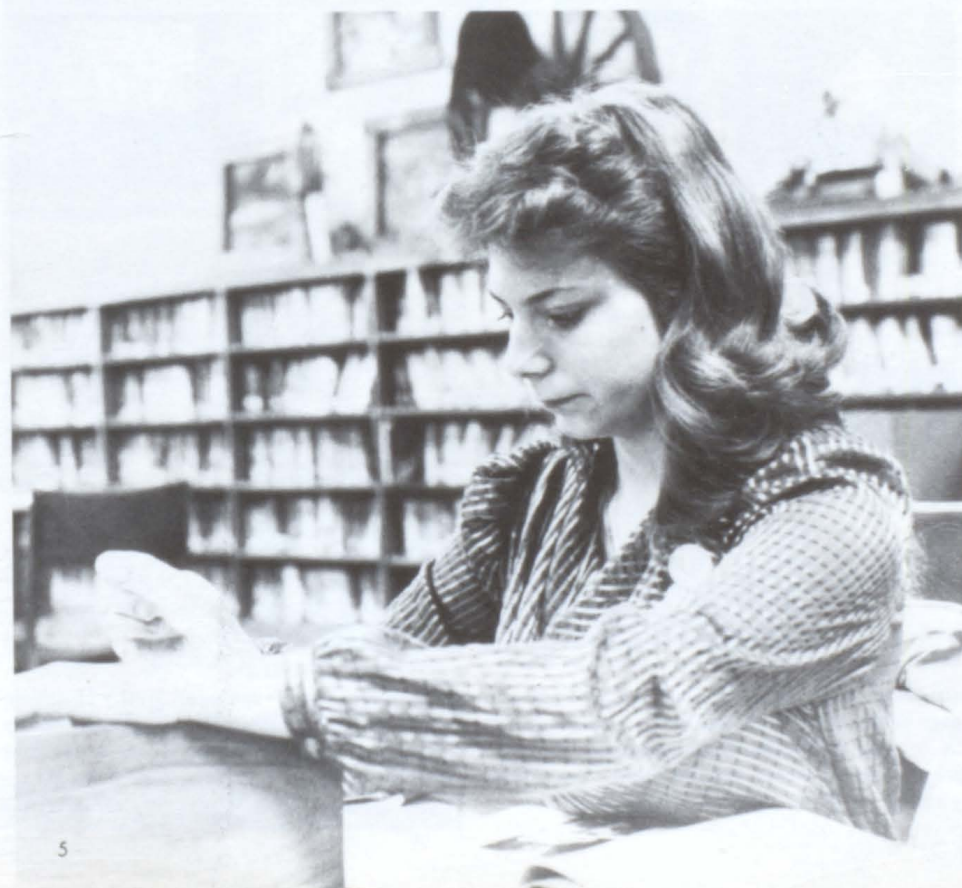
"The time when I slapped Amanda Groff in our duet, and I gave her welt marks on her face," said Mary Weber.

"Getting a birthday cake with a naked lady on it from my band students," Mr. Dietz said.

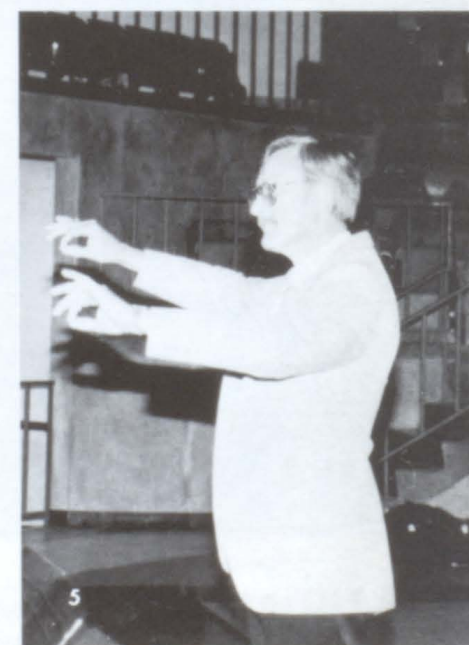

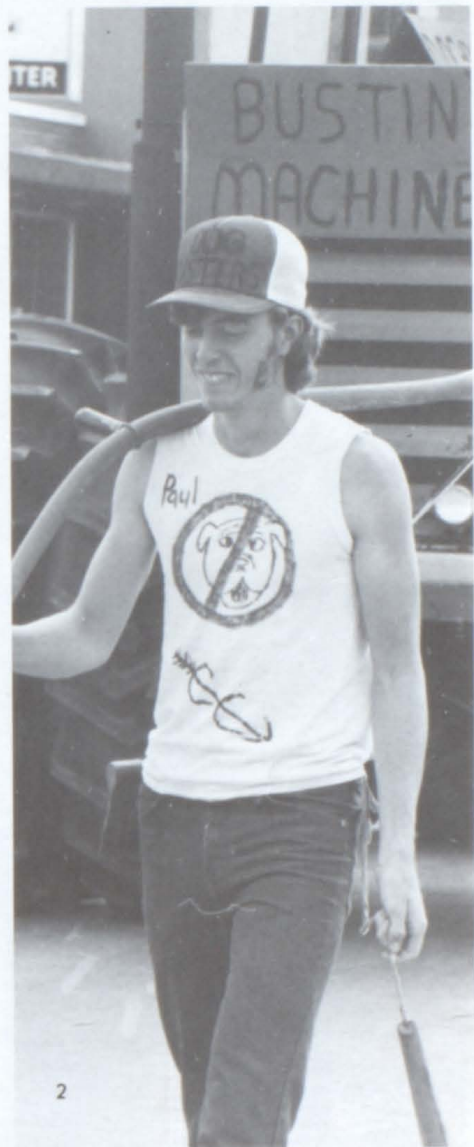

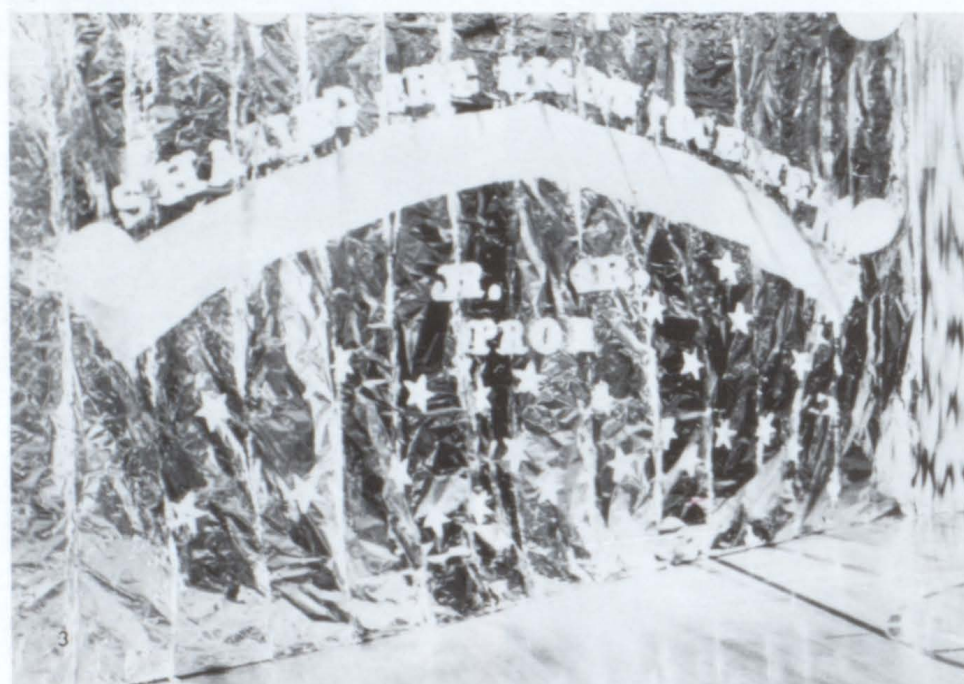

Also in local news, highlights included Travenol closing and the Fort Hays Tigers who became NAIA national champions for the second consecutive year.

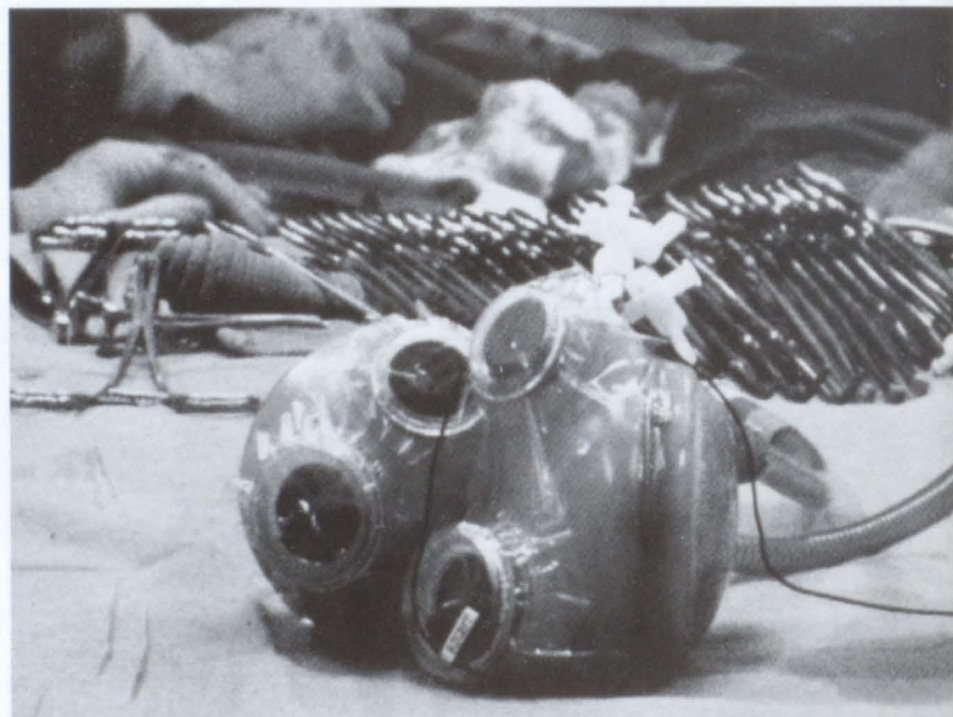
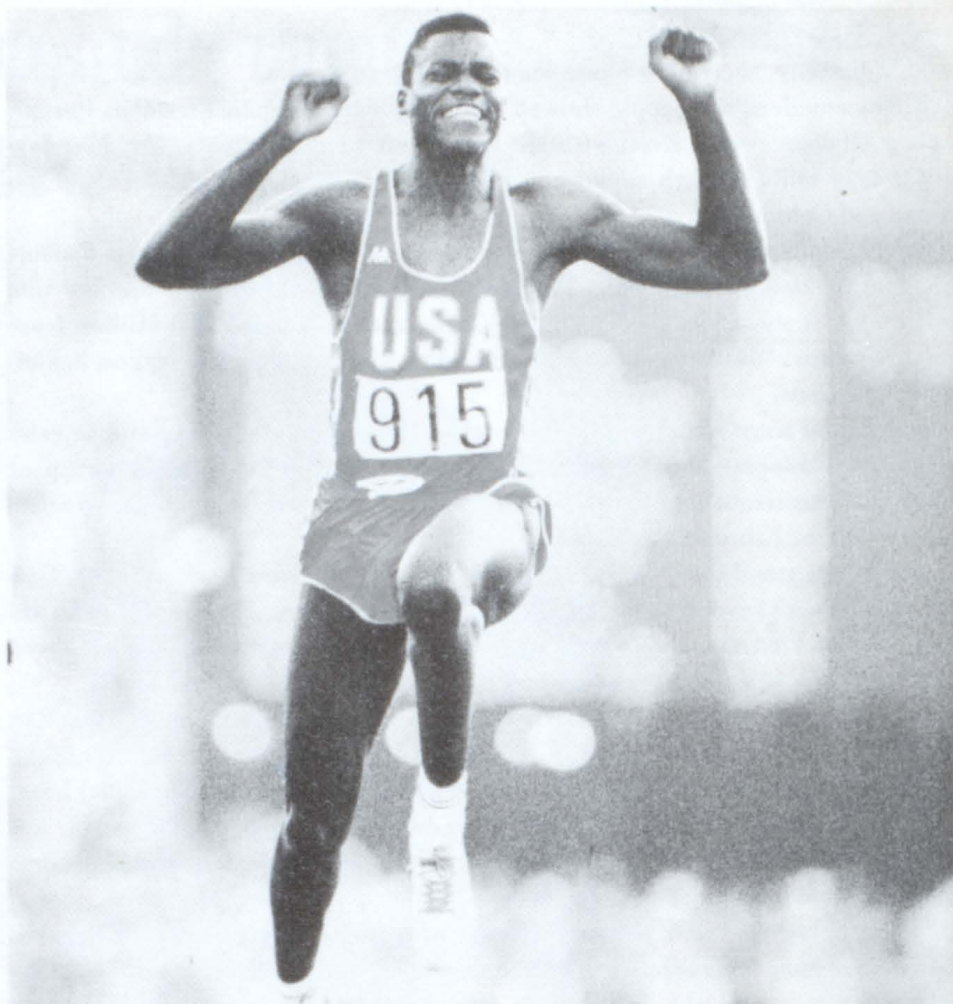
At school, a new administration meant changes in policy. Even with these changes, school spirit was high as nearly the entire student body attended state wrestling.

Locally, the death of Doc Surface, a long time school board member and resident of Ellis, was felt by all.

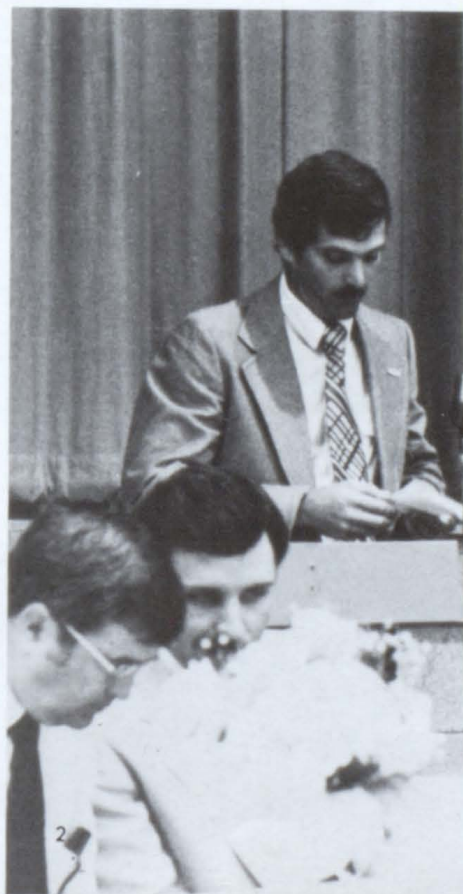

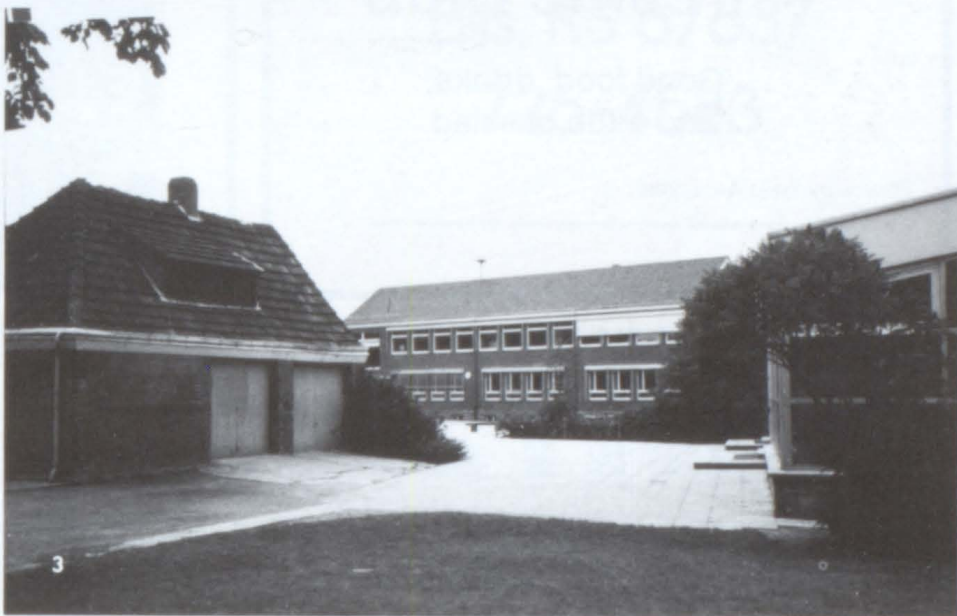
Missing You

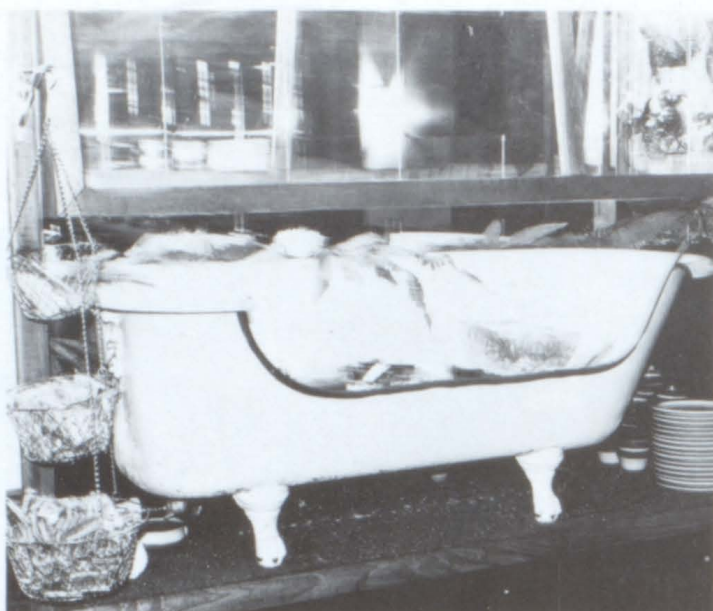

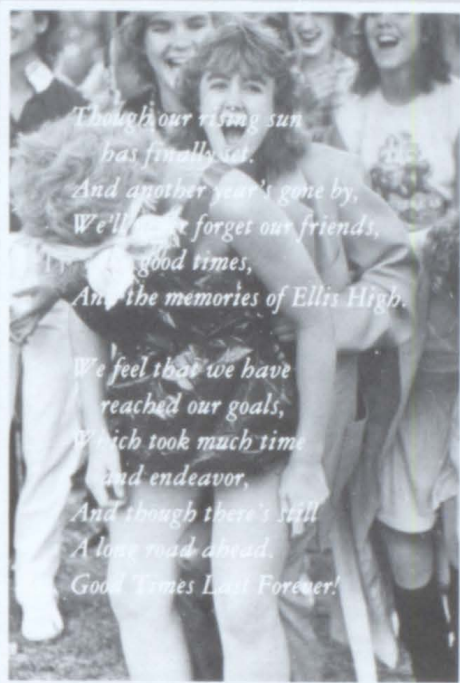
