





#### 3 YEAR OLD PRESCHOOL HIGHLIGHTS: A FUN WEEK OF LEARNING!

We learned about the learning ladder during our S.M.A.R.T time on Tuesday. Then since we have learned almost all of our big S.M.A.R.T movements, we were able to start to go into the S.M.A.R.T room for the large course by the end of the week. We also learned did a near/far activity to help work our eye muscles. During phonics we were able to listen to two words and see how they rhyme. We were able to start to look for some rhyming words in one of our stories that we reread called Quenten Blake's ABC book. We also started to look at words that all have the same sounds. Then we took two words and worked on smashing them together to make one word. At the end of the week read the book Chicka Chicka Boom Boom two times and focused on different vocabulary words and different parts of the book including retelling the story. We even had a Chicka Chicka Boom Boom tree in our room to help tell the story. for social skills we reviewed our listening bodies at carpet time with our friend Josie (the puppet). She also brought in her atten-to-scopes to help us learn about how to focus. We also introduced the concept of self talk and how it can help us to pay attention and do what is ask. Josie did a great job of helping demonstrate how this works. Fine Motor Journals were also introduced this week.
