

Awareness of world politics and the United States government provoked the students to study and consider the man who ran for political positions in 1968. 

"Three for Friday"






The various principles of grammar and spelling rules were taught in the English classes. Students utilized the knowledge they had gained when they wrote themes and essays. The final challenge was presented in senior English in the form of a research paper. The paper contained at least 2,000 words, and all students completed one in order to pass the course.

Students who were planning on attending college or those who had future plans for an occupation in which a foreign language would be useful, were enrolled in the Spanish and Latin courses. Wider horizons and broader outlooks were acquired through the study of the country's history and arts. Huey Hazen preferred sitting in the wastebasket rather than at his desk one morning in Spanish II. This sight offered a break in the daily routine.

































Not for Ourselves, But for All




Senior year brought a flurry of activities that kept everyone so busy they wondered where the year had gone. Finally came the trip, and the 12 years of work seemed worth it. Baccalaureate, awards day, and commencement came all too suddenly for some. Smiles and tears revealed the mixed emotions. As the class of '69 formed the friendship circle, the symbols changed once more. The tassel was a reminder of memories of yesteryear. The future beckoned them to make their dreams a reality and to fulfill their motto, "Not for ourselves, but for all."
