This past year has been one of extraordinary progress, driven by the implementation of our Strategic Plan and a deep commitment to creating enriching, equitable, and secure learning environments for all students.

This publication showcases the impactful work guided by our Strategic Plan, which continues to serve as our roadmap for innovation and excellence. A key component of this work is our comprehensive Secondary Redesign initiative, developed to offer students a variety of personalized and meaningful pathways to success.

Over the past year, we made tremendous strides in both innovative programming and the revitalization of our facilities. We are especially excited to announce the opening of the Steinmetz Freshman Leadership Academy this fall. This new space is purposefully designed to cultivate leadership and provide a strong academic foundation for our ninth graders. The Academy joins our expanding portfolio of innovative programs, including Big Picture, now entering its third year, and our Early College High School, which continues to offer students the opportunity to earn college credit while still in high school.



We also continue to make major progress in improving our physical learning environments. We're pleased to announce the completion of renovations at Van Corlaer Elementary School, which will reopen this September with modern, student-centered learning spaces. The safety and well-being of our students and staff remain a top priority. This year, we implemented weapons detection systems at all secondary schools, a critical step in strengthening school safety. Academically, we are proud to report districtwide growth in English language arts and mathematics, reflecting the dedication of our educators and the hard work of our students and families. To better communicate student progress, we also redesigned our secondary report card, making it more transparent, informative, and helpful for families.

One of the highlights of this year is that we passed our seventh consecutive budget with no tax increase, approved with overwhelming community support. This achievement reflects both fiscal responsibility and strong community partnership.

None of this progress would be possible without the unwavering support of our entire Schenectady community. To our exceptional teachers and staff, thank you for your dedication, passion, and commitment to student success. To our parents, guardians, and caregivers your partnership and trust mean everything. 
The district will continue to set annual goals, strategies, and progress monitoring measures aligned to the strategic plan in an effort to validate actions, monitor progress, and consider adjustment.



Smart Transfer

10 Schenectady seniors earn college degrees while in high school

Located at Center City in downtown and at SUNY's main campus, the Schenectady Smart Transfer Early College High School is a grant-funded program that allows high school students to obtain associate's degrees while earning their high school diplomas. In 2025, ten Schenectady graduates completed the program, earned their degrees and can transfer to a four-year college to complete their bachelor's degree. Funded by New York State Education Department, Smart Transfer is a partnership between SUNY Schenectady, University at Albany, SUNY Delhi and Schenectady High School. Students apply and are accepted in 8th grade after undergoing a multi-stage application process and then participate in a rigorous 6-week summer program at SUNY Schenectady.



Senior awarded full scholarship through QuestBridge Program

Schenectady High School senior Raymond Franco has been awarded a full four-year scholarship to Boston University through the highly competitive QuestBridge National College Match program.

Out of over 25,500 applicants, only 2,627 students were matched with a college partner. Raymond's scholarship will cover tuition, housing, meals, and other expenses—allowing him to fully focus on his education and future without financial burden.

School Connections

The Schenectady City School District and the City Mission of Schenectady have a strong partnership through the School Connections program, which provides essential items like clothing, shoes, and school supplies to students in need. Secondary schools address school safety and climate concerns

The safety and well-being of students, staff, and visitors is always a top priority for the Schenectady City School District. When the school community raised concerns early in the 2024-2025 school year, the district was quick to respond by holding events to gather feedback and discuss how safety could be enhanced.


After collecting input from all stakeholders, the Board of Education approved a four-tiered plan designed to enhance safety and the school climate. The plan includes:

- Comprehensive Support for Mental Health and Well-being
- Expansion of Staff, Resources, and Services
- Intentional Professional Development for Stakeholders
- Weapons detection technology to help ensure a safe and secure learning environment

Before implementing weapon screening systems in the schools, district leaders held a safety fair in October providing the school community an opportunity to learn about available systems and their features.

The district then partnered with two companies and began planning for the implementation of weapon screening and bag scanning technology in each of our secondary schools.

The systems were installed at Schenectady High School after the winter recess, and the three middle schools following the February break.

The Schenectady City School District adopted its latest strategic plan, "Schenectady 2030", on October 23, 2024.

This plan outlines the district's vision and goals for the next six years and is supported by four key pillars:

- Student and Graduate Success: Equipping students with the academic skills and capacity for successful lives and careers.
- Passionate People: Recruiting, training, and supporting a dedicated workforce focused on growth, wellness, and continuous improvement.
- Partnerships with Families and Community:
 Building strong relationships with families and community members, expanding after-school programs and community school models.
- Efficient Systems and Equitable Resources:
 Ensuring financial stability, maintaining facilities, and allocating resources equitably to create safe learning environments.

The plan emphasizes inclusivity and equity, with new strategic priorities set within each pillar to accelerate goal achievement and address equity gaps. The plan was developed with input from various stakeholders, including students, parents, staff, and community members, through listening sessions and surveys. Top priorities identified during this process included safety, programs and services, rigorous curriculum, highquality teachers, and a positive school culture.























































Colleen Keough Named 2025 New York State Teacher of the Year

The New York State Board of Regents named Colleen Keough, a second-grade teacher at Hamilton Elementary School, the 2025 New York State Teacher of the Year. This prestigious honor is awarded annually to an educator who exemplifies a deep passion for teaching, strong community engagement, and an exceptional impact on students' lives.

Ms. Keough has dedicated her entire 16-year career to the Schenectady City School District. She began as a first-grade teacher at Paige Elementary, later taught fourth grade at Hamilton, and now teaches second grade at the same school. Known for her dedication and leadership, she has received several awards, including the district's 2024 Teacher of the Year and the 2023 Passionate Educator Award.

In addition to her classroom excellence, Ms. Keough actively supports school and community initiatives. She works with volunteer programs like Reading is Fun and the Foster Grandparent Program, and is heavily involved in school committees. She also helped establish a Parent Teacher Organization, launched a school store, ran book fairs, and brought back the school mascot, Hammy, to boost school spirit.

Her leadership extends beyond academics. She organizes donation drives, supports health and safety efforts, and connects families to critical resources in times of need.

As New York's Teacher of the Year, Keough will serve as a statewide ambassador for educators and is now the state's nominee for the National Teacher of the Year Program.

Chancellor Lester W. Young Jr., Commissioner Betty A. Rosa, and NYSUT leaders praised her commitment, compassion, and lasting impact, calling her a beacon in education and a role model for teachers statewide.









District Teacher of the Year







Pamela Eighmie, a math teacher at Schenectady High School, was named the Schenectady City School District 2025 Teacher of the Year on Wednesday, December 18, 2024. Superintendent Dr. Carlos M. Cotto, Jr., during a surprise announcement at Schenectady High School with Eighmie's family members, students, and colleagues present.

Eighmie has been teaching math in the Schenectady City School District for 26 years. She's built relationships and has had a lasting impact on the hundreds of students that she has taught over the years. Students say that her classroom is welcoming, calm, a safe space, and a haven where they always feel supported. Students describe Eighmie as generous, selfless, attentive, kind, caring, and an amazing teacher. Many shared that they respect Eighmie and that she changes every life she touches. Colleagues laud her ability to connect with students.

Eighmie's colleagues say she is supportive, a mentor, passionate, compassionate and has a unique ability to connect with students. "Her knowledge, consistency and willingness to support students through challenges have made her one of the district's most loved and respected teachers," said Brian Ledbetter, My Brother's Keeper Program Specialist who is also a former student of Eighmie. "I am just one example of the countless students that have benefited from crossing paths with Ms. Eighmie.

Combat Robotics Club

Schenectady High's Combat Robotics Club Sparks Innovation and Creativity

The Schenectady Combat Robotics Club at Schenectady High School is giving students hands-on experience in the exciting world of combat robotics. Founded by English teacher Mr. Davis, the club introduces students to STEM through designing, building, and battling their own robots. On June 9, 2025, the club hosted its first-ever Robot Rumble during A and B lunch periods — serving as a final project for the class. The event crowned two students, Amir and Davon, as the school's first Robot Rumble champions.

During the 2024-25 school year, the club made its third annual visit to National Havoc, a competitive combat robotics league in Norwalk, Connecticut. Two students qualified for the main tournament, marking another major milestone for the program.

Student voices highlight what makes the club special. Senior Bri shared, "What got me interested in robotics was that there weren't many women — or women of color — involved, so I decided to be that change." Seeram Ramdeo was amazed by the design process: "I was just working on this on the computer... now it's in my hands, now in the arena. That's insane!"

Alyssa, a senior, joined after a connection with Mr. Davis in English class. "He told me about the club, and I stayed because I liked it." Kenny added, "It let me be creative and build what I wanted without limits."

Mr. Davis, who began competing with his sons in 2019, continues to compete and continues inspiring students through innovation, competition, and creativity.

Student Board of Education representatives is one way that district leadership hears from students who represent their peers. Construction at Van Corlaer Elementary School began in July 2024 and was completed just in time for the school year to begin in 2025. Students who normally attend Van Corlaer attended Fulton School. This work is included in the SCSD Revitalization Plan 2030.

» New Turf Field at Mont Pleasant: In October, the district held a ribbon-cutting at the new athletic facility located at Mont Pleasant Middle School. The project included a new turf field and eight-lane rubberized track, bleachers to seat nearly 2,000 spectators, plus a brand new concession stand and restroom facilities. An expanded parking lot for Mont Pleasant Middle School was also constructed next to the field.





Steinmetz Freshman Leadership Academy Set to Open

In an effort to ease the transition from middle school to high school, the Schenectady City School District is launching the Steinmetz Freshman Leadership Academy for the 2025-2026 school year. Nearly 500 incoming ninth-graders will be the first students to learn in the newly renovated building.

This program is designed to provide a smaller, more supportive learning community with a dedicated staff and a robust support system. The academy will focus on helping students adjust academically, socially, and emotionally, laying a strong foundation for future achievements.

The curriculum will feature "Freshman Experience Courses", which are designed to be engaging and relevant. These courses will allow students to explore different interests and career fields before they choose a "Leadership Community Pathway" in tenth grade. The academy will also offer a variety of clubs and sports to help students feel connected to their school community.

SCSD Education Foundation 43 teachers receive

43 teachers receive grants in 2024-25

Partnering with families and the community is one of the district's four pillars and one of those partnerships is with the Schenectady City School District Education Foundation.

The Schenectady City School District Education Foundation is a local non-profit that partners with the school district to enhance learning opportunities for students. Since 2006, the foundation has awarded more than \$550,000 in grants to classrooms. In the 2024-2025 school year alone, almost \$60,000 was awarded to 43 teachers across the district.

Grant Highlights from 2024-2025

Girls on the Run: Grants covered travel and registration fees for teams from Howe and Paige schools, allowing students to participate in this positive youth development program.

Forensics Bone Lab: Schenectady High School students can now study forensics in greater detail using grant-funded replica skeletal bones to determine age, sex, ancestry, and trauma.

BPL Library: Students in Big Picture Learning classes at Washington Irving Educational Center created their own library. They selected books that interested them, and then unpacked, labeled, and shelved the new books.

Positive Behavior Trophies - Yates Elementary School is using high-quality trophies as a monthly positive motivation incentive for classes. The winning class gets to display the trophy in their classroom. The program has had a positive impact on student attendance.
