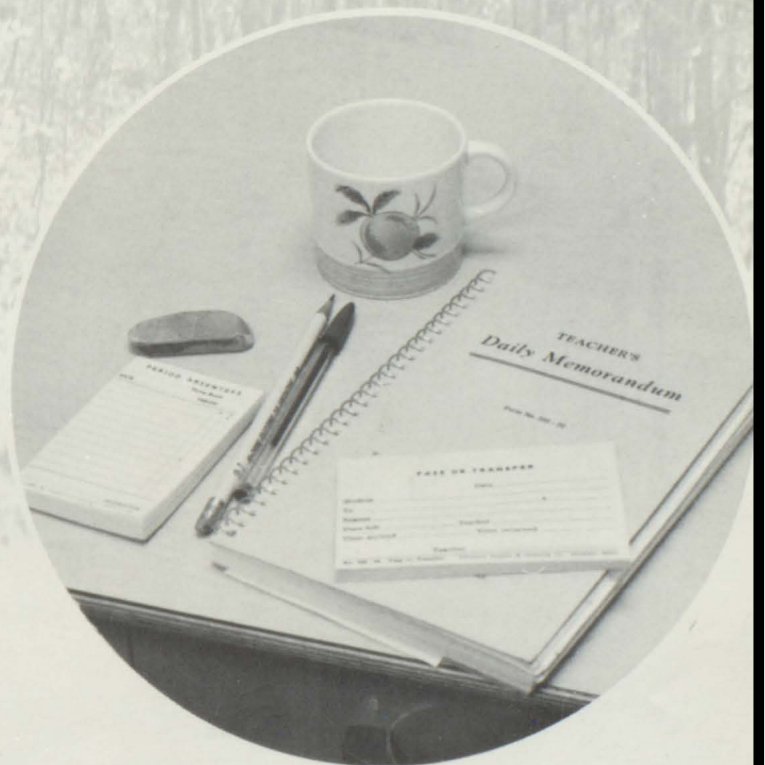
Beginning

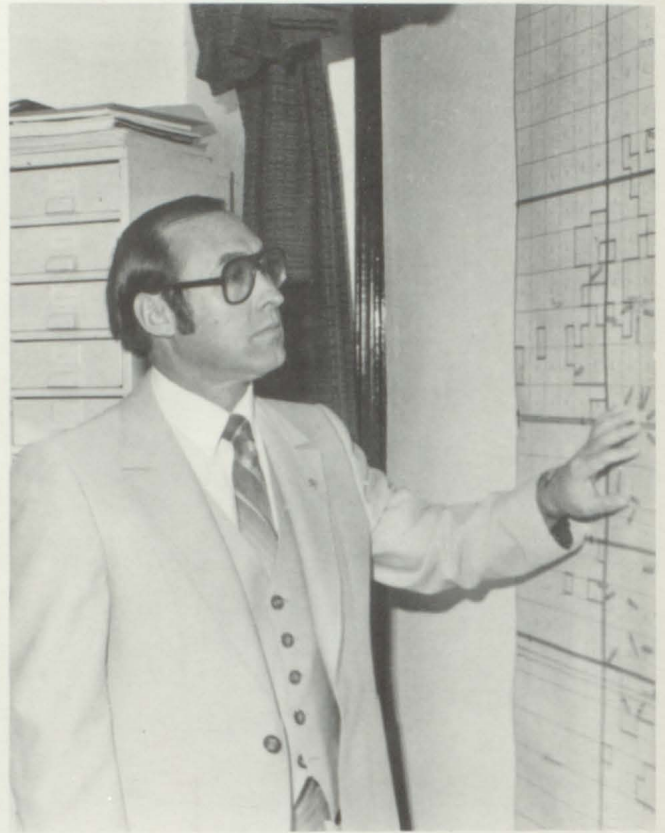
ADMINISTRATION

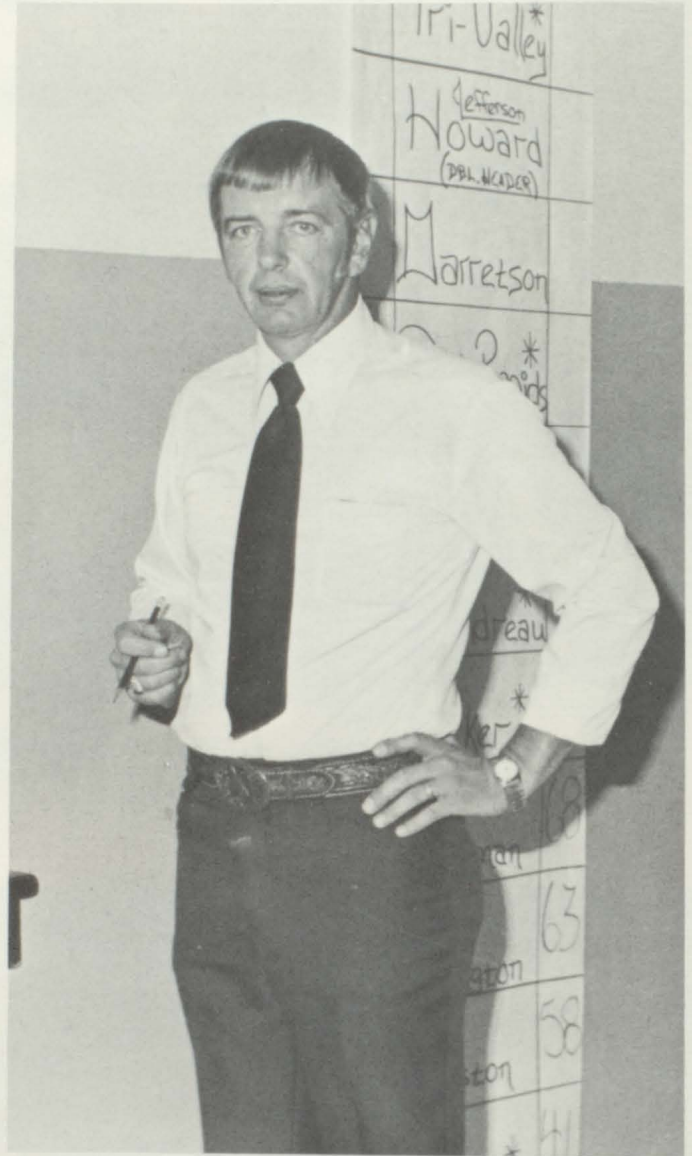

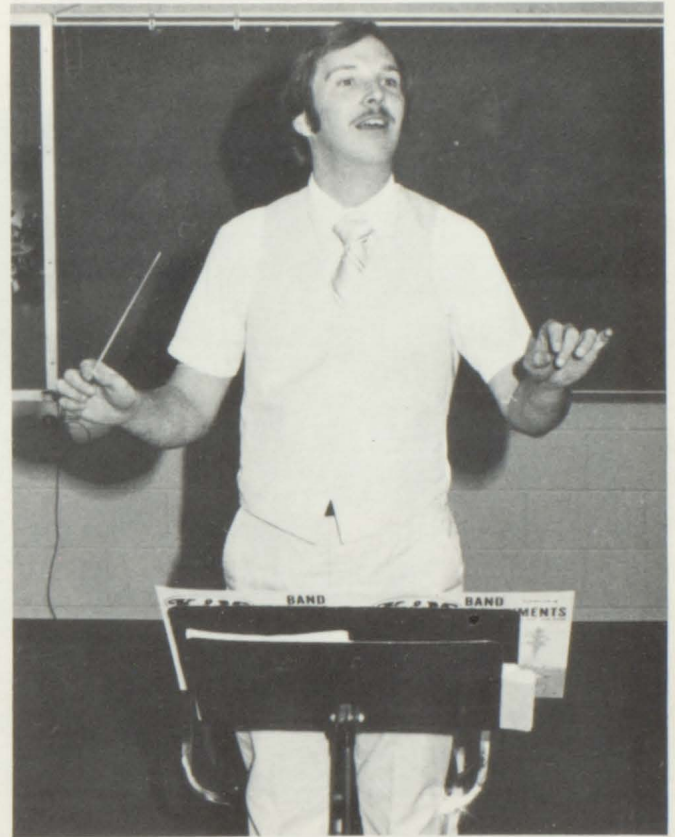

Mr. Lyle Johnson's teaching duties for the school year include accounting, shorthand, typing I, and business math. He also advises the freshman class.

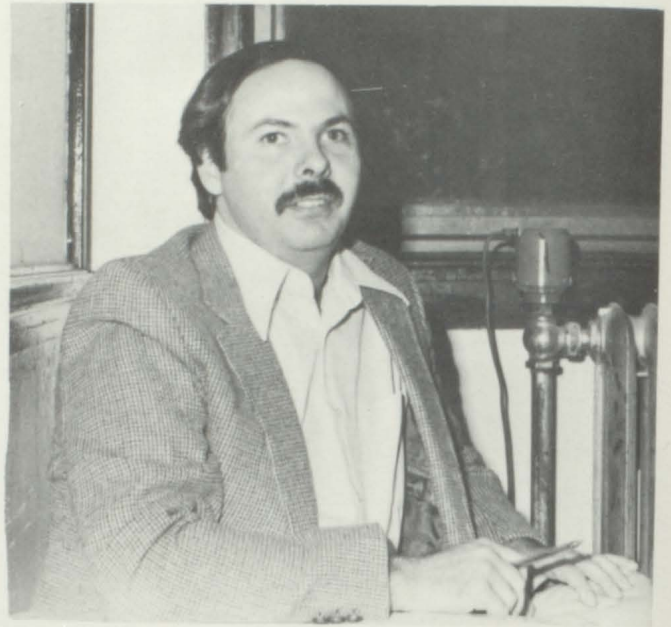

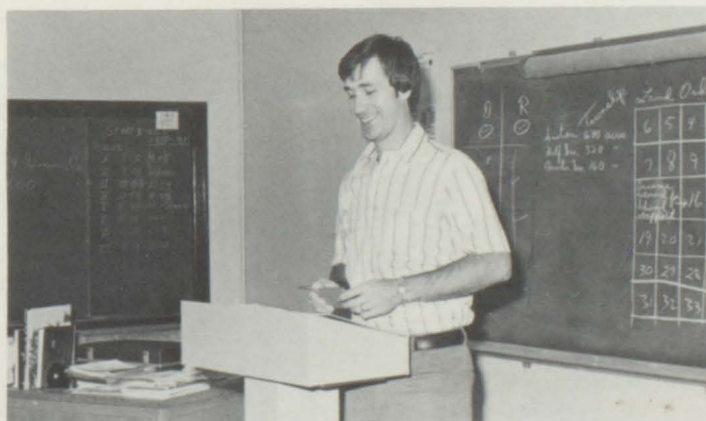

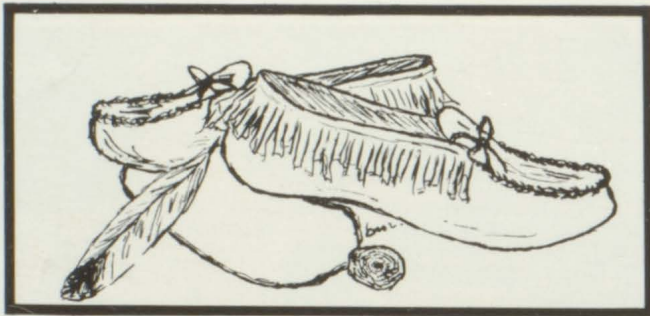

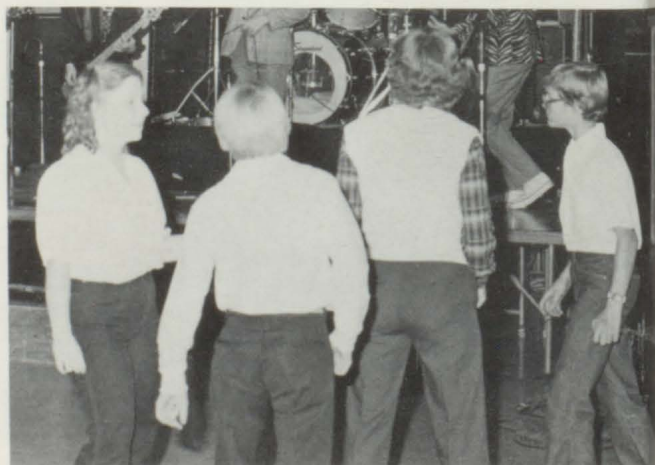

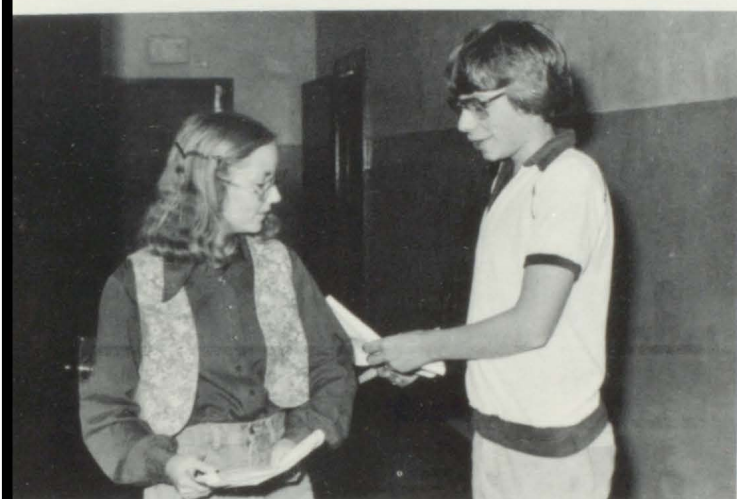

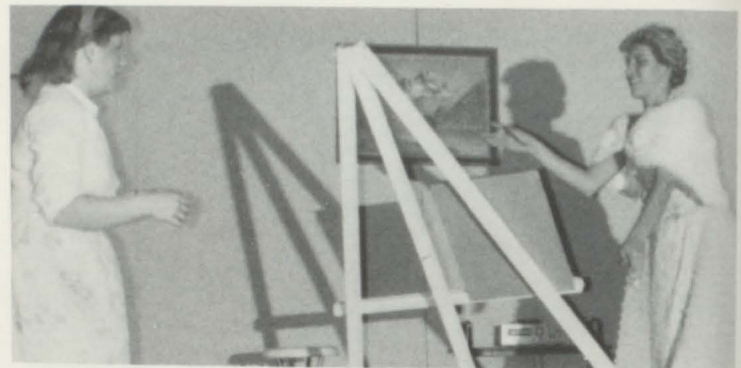

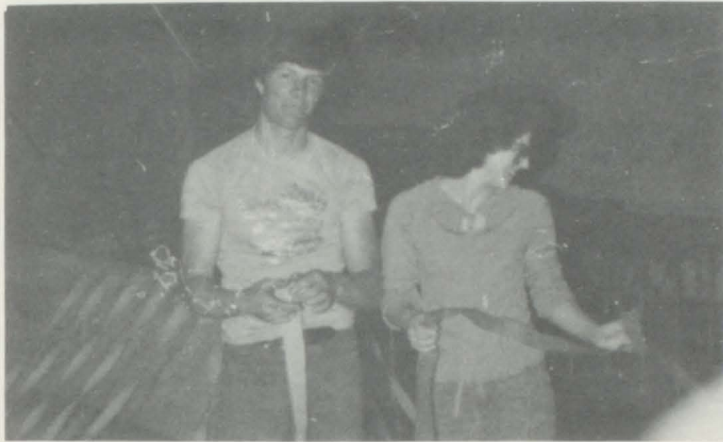

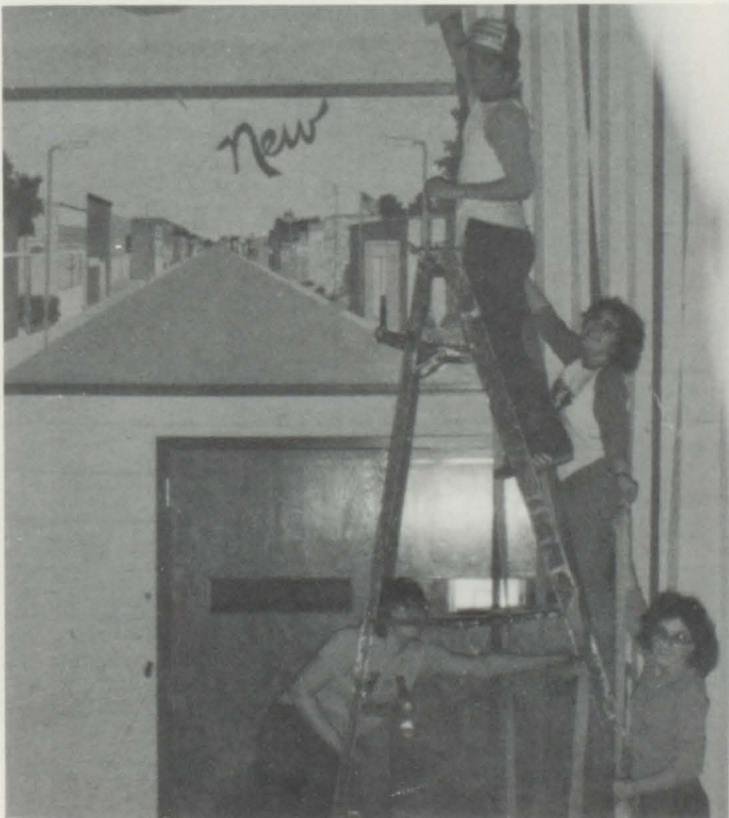

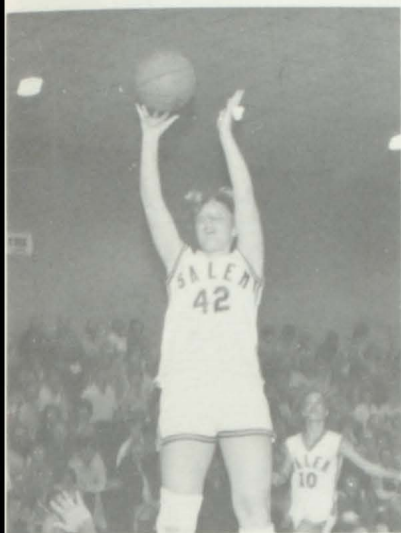

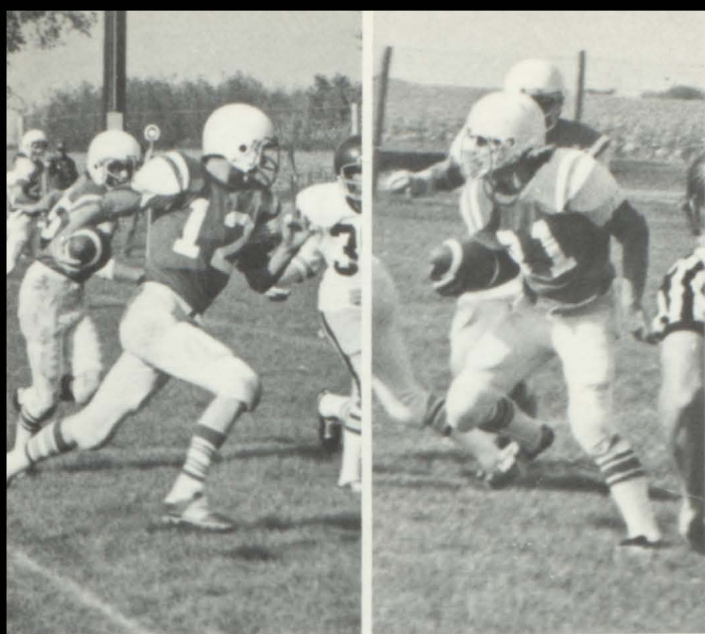

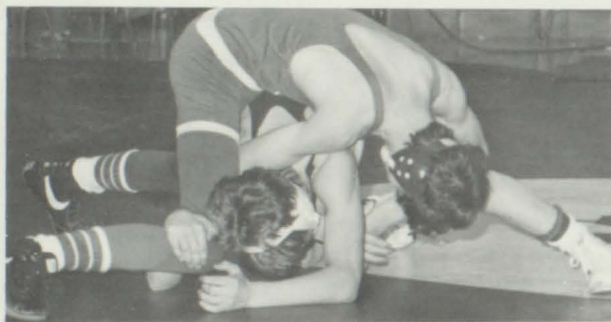

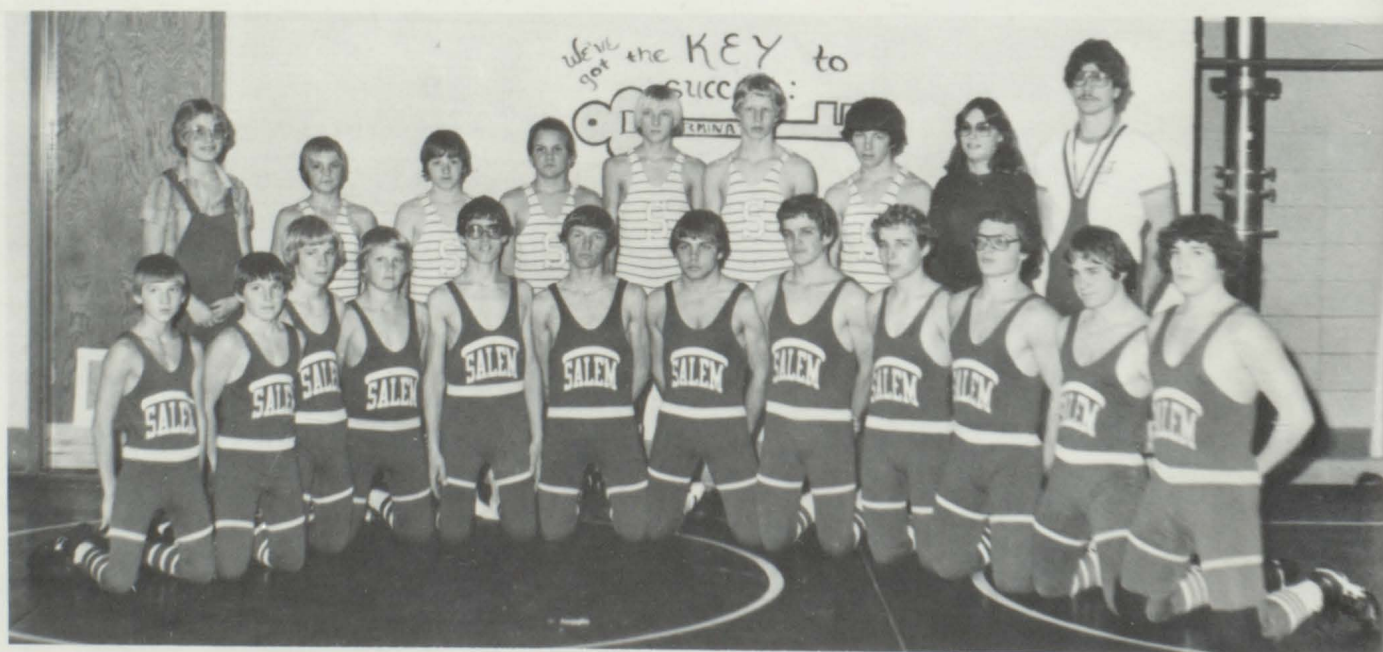

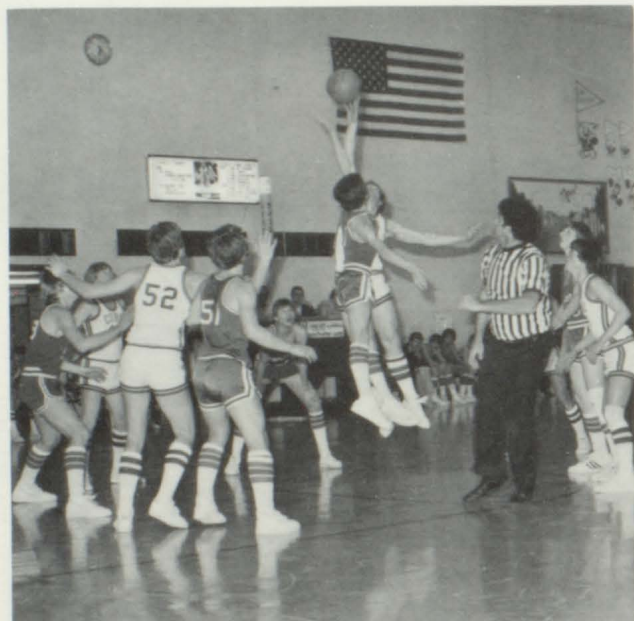

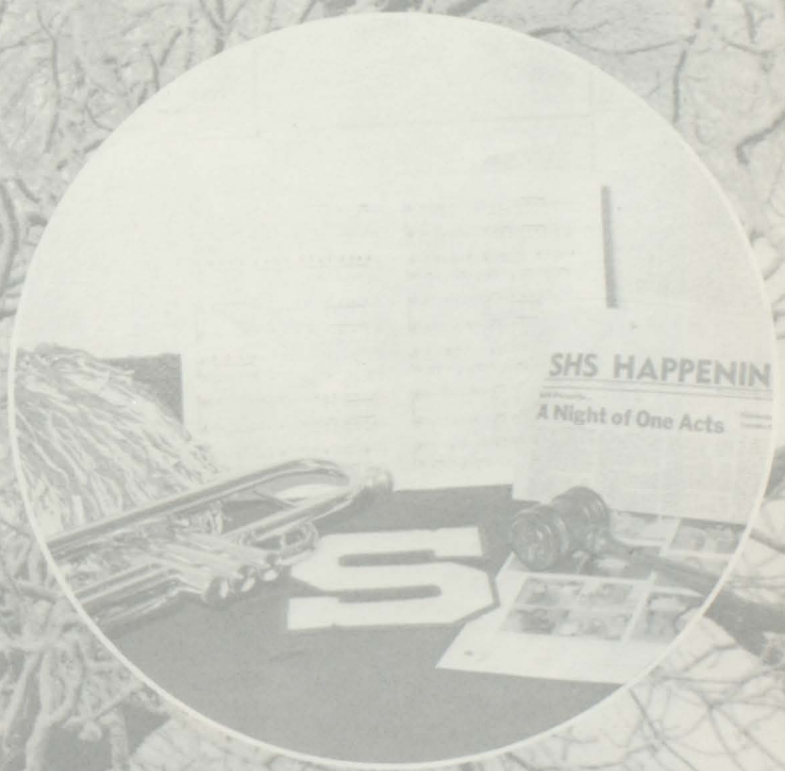

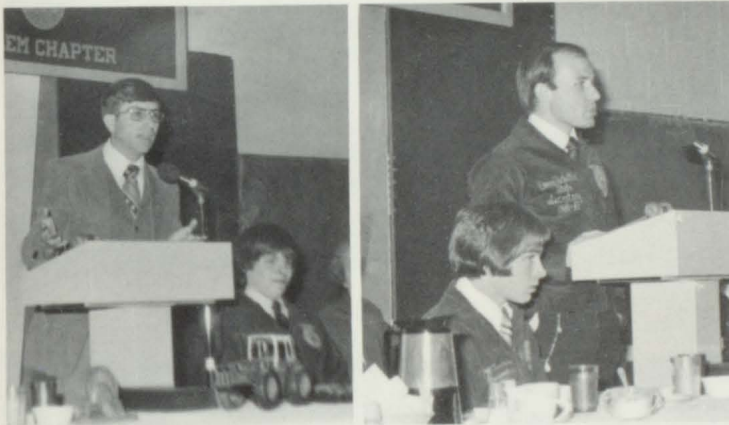

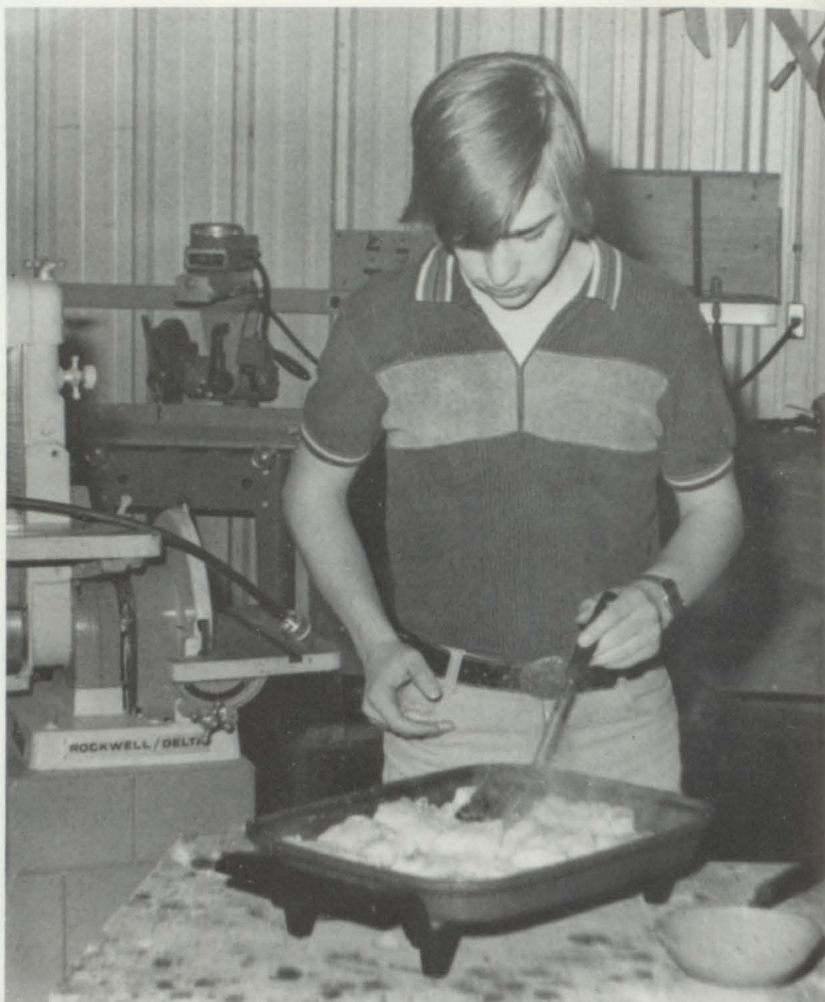

Jon Gonsor coached the football and wrestling teams this year. He had this to say about the football season: "A 7-2 season following the number of athletes we lost thru graduation the previous year surprised many people. It shows that the talent along with a winning attitude can surpass physical size and depth for the most part. We were small and quick, but had the hearts of giants. I was really proud of the way our team grew and improved over the year. Being rated in the state and winning the conference reflects the pride of our team. Everyone really put an extra effort into our success." His thoughts on the wrestling team were as follows: "I consider this year's team as a very successful one even though we finished 3-8. We were young and inexperienced; the majority of the team being made up of 7th, 8th, and 9th graders. They were pushed and molded by the fine upper classmen we had. Placing third at the White Lake Tourney was one of the highlights of the year. But the most impressive accomplishments were seen by the improvement of our young wrestlers.

Gene Danielsen was the head coach for the boys' and girls' cross country teams this year. His comments on the overall season were: "I was pleased with the hard work and effort extended throughout the year. I would have to classify the season as a successful one. Some accomplishments of this season were winning the Big Sioux Conference meet in both boys' and girls', and finishing second in both boys' and girls' regional meets, qualifying the teams for the state meet. As for next year's season, it could be an outstanding year as all of the runners were underclassmen and women, and will be returning next year." Mr. Danielson also coached the boys track team. Early in the year he

had a few comments on the upcoming season: "We will have a young inexperienced group, but a group with lots of enthusiasm. Some of the goals for this season are to win the conference meet and qualify the team members for the state meet."

As a first year head coach for the girl's basketball team, Jack Rasmussen had these words to say "The 1980 season was a rebuilding year for us. Of the five returning letterwinners from the 1979 season, not one received alot of playing time. Even though we had a losing season (5-15) our record did not indicate the kind of season we had. Eight of our losses were by five points or less. The season was a learning experience for us. The highlight of our season was finishing third in the Big Sioux Conference. Mr. Rasmussen also coached the girls' track team. Early in the season he had this to say about the upcoming season: "We have an excellent group of returning letterwinners from our 1980 State Championship Team. We will not have the depth that we have had in the past, but we should be almost as strong as last years' team if everyone runs to their potential. We hope to keep the winning tradition going strong in Salem for many years to come.

Heading the boys basketball team was coach Jim Montgomery. Some of his comments on this year's season were as follows: "The Cubs, after a fast start, ran into an early season drought, but played superbly for the last half of the season and finished second in the Big Sioux Conference. I felt Salem was a much better team than their overall record of 13-8 indicated. After a disappointing 4-6 first half the Cubs finished strong going 9-2 in the second half of the season. Wins over Marion and Freeman highlighted the season."

Seniors Spring To A Great Year

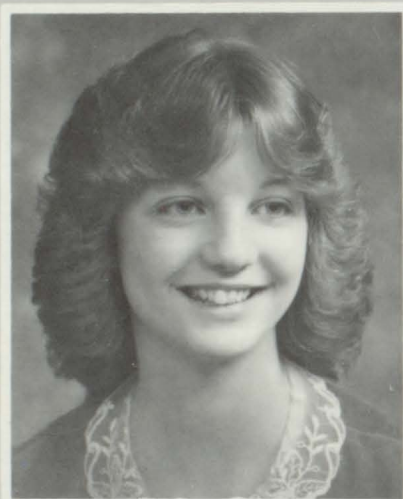
