
ADMINISTRATION


Always in action is Miss Susan Barber who is the interpreter at SHS. She also teaches sign language and is a senior advisor.






The 1983 seniors were awarded the Grand prize float. They were awarded Grand prize three out their four years at SHS.

The popular video game Pac-Man" provided the idea for the sophomores' third prize float.











The Show Must Go On

"The Diary of Anne Frank" was presented by Salem High's thespians on April 14 and 15 at the Salem Armory. Director Dale Wintemute, along with Student Director Celeste Sabers and Technical Director Richard Moose, delighted audiences with one of the most ambitious productions in SHS's history.

This play is the dramatization of the diary of Anne Frank, a 13 year old girl, who, with her Jewish family and four others, went into hiding in an attic in German-occupied Amsterdam, Holland in July of 1942. The play describes the hardships, anxieties, and happy moments the Franks, the Van Daans and Mr. Dussel shared during the two years they occupied their tiny hiding place. Despite the efforts of Miep and Mr. Kraler, two German citizens who aided the Franks by bringing them supplies and protecting them as much as possible, the Nazis finally arrested the Franks and their guests in August of 1944. Only Mr. Frank survived the German death camps.
















We Want Muscles





We've Got The Beat!











The McCook County Ministerial Association held a Baccalaureate Service on May 11 in honor of the 1983 class.




