# SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE



On behalf of the East Holmes Local School District, I am pleased to present the 2025 Quality Profile, an annual snapshot of our progress, goals and priorities. This report showcases the many ways we are advancing student learning, from classroom renovations to strong state report card results. After releasing the inaugural edition last spring, we will now provide this update each fall to share ongoing achievements and initiatives.

We are proud to be making steady progress on the Phased Classroom Renovation Project, a multi-year plan to enhance learning spaces and common areas. Careful financial planning has allowed us to complete this work during the summer months and without the need for a new ballot measure. Renovations are already complete at Mt. Hope Elementary and Winesburg Elementary, with Berlin Elementary, Chestnut Ridge Elementary and Hiland scheduled for upgrades beginning in summer 2026.

In September, the Ohio Department of Education released the 2025 State Report Card. I am proud that our district earned an overall rating of three and a half stars, continuing to meet state standards across key measures. Most notably, the district received five-star ratings in the Achievement and Gap Closing categories, demonstrating both strong performance on state assessments and meaningful support for the diverse needs of our student groups. The report card is a valuable tool for measuring progress and identifying areas for growth, and we are eager to build on this momentum.

A critical component of our ongoing success lies in our dedicated staff. Not only do our students benefit from the staff's expertise and experience, but also from the genuine care they bring to the classroom. Our teachers are committed to helping all students reach their full potential and are working diligently to bring out the best in our scholars.

We know that learning extends well beyond the classroom. From athletics to the arts, our students have access to a wide range of extracurricular opportunities that encourage leadership, teamwork and creativity. These programs thrive thanks to the support of teachers, coaches, staff and parents who help students grow and excel.

Located in Millersburg, Ohio, the district is dedicated to its mission of “inspiring excellence to prepare students in becoming productive and responsible citizens through a partnership of exceptional leadership, dedicated staff, and a supportive community.” The district is comprised of eight buildings, including seven elementary schools (Berlin Elementary, Chestnut Ridge Elementary, Flat Ridge Elementary, Mt. Hope Elementary, Walnut Creek Elementary, Winesburg Elementary, and Wise Elementary) and one combined high school and middle school (Hiland High and Middle School). Each of our buildings has its own unique and close-knit school community. With a five-year average enrollment of 1,454, East Holmes strives to inspire, prepare, and challenge all students.

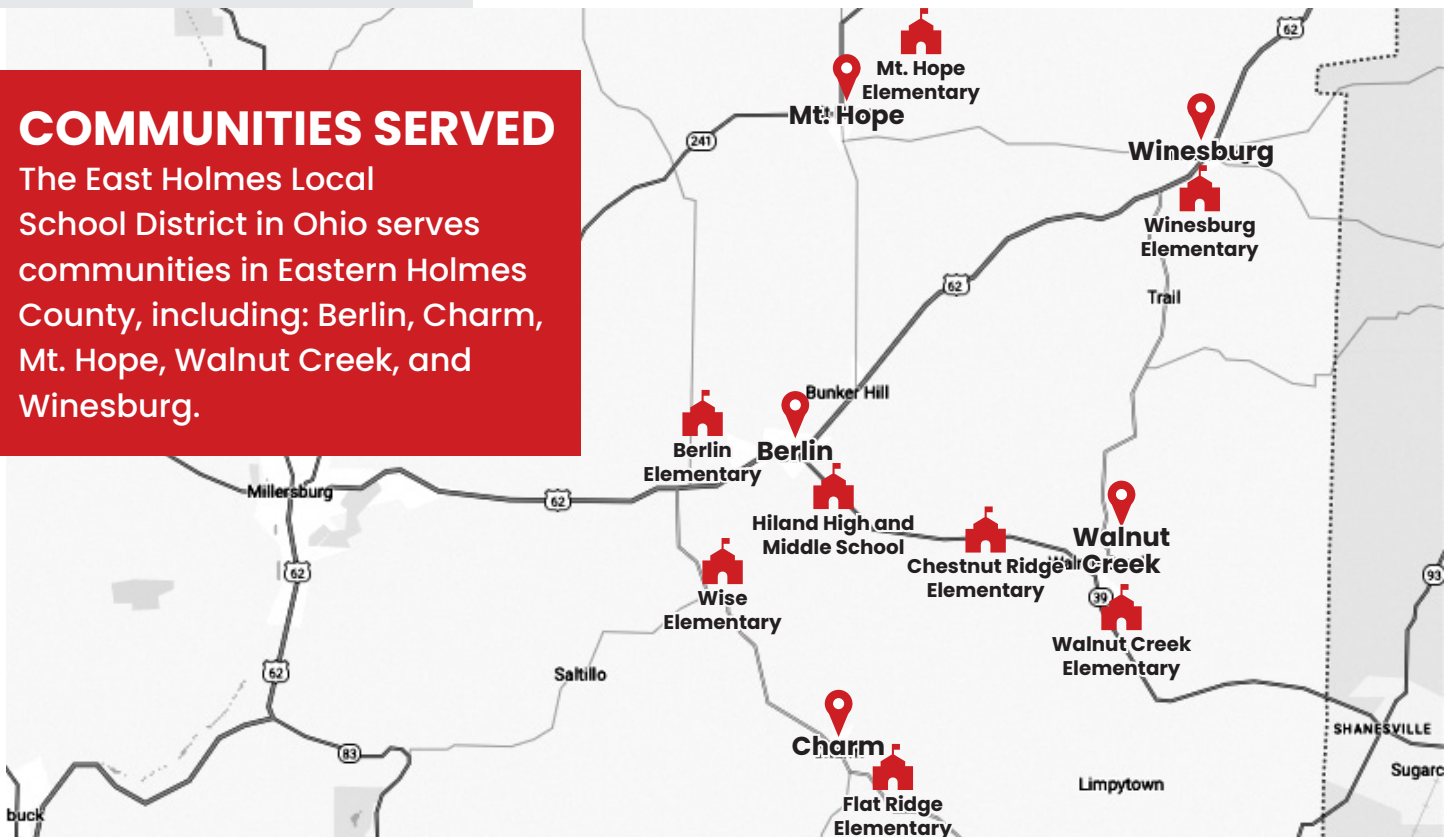

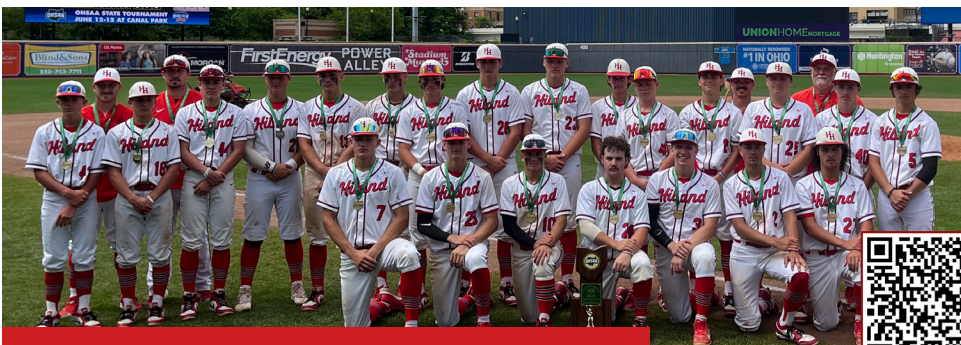

## CHOIR

### Elementary School

Choirs are offered for grades 5 and 6 at Berlin Elementary, Winesburg Elementary and Walnut Creek Elementary.

### Middle School

Grade 7 and 8 choirs are open to all students.

The Middle School Chamber Ensemble is an audition-only group.

### High School

Bel Canto is a treble choral ensemble (SSA) or mixed choral ensemble (SATB) open to students in grades 9-12.

Varsity Singers is an advanced mixed choral ensemble (SATB) open to students in grades 9-12.

Men's Vocal Ensemble is open to all Tenor/Bass students in grades 9-12.

## BAND

### Elementary Band

Our Elementary Band is made up of grade 5 and 6 students at Berlin, Walnut Creek and Winesburg Elementary. These students meet twice a week for 45 minutes and perform in two concerts during the school year.

### Middle School Band

Our Middle School Band program consists of a grade 7 and grade 8 band. The band performs in three concerts during the year and marches alongside the Hiland Marching Band during the Swiss Festival Kiddie Parade. Students also have the opportunity to participate in Middle School Jazz Band and Solo and Ensemble competitions.

### Middle School Jazz Band

Middle School Jazz Band is open to all interested middle school band students. Students learn the fundamentals of jazz harmony and rhythm and perform in several concerts throughout the year.





### High School Concert Band

Our high school band is made up of grade 9-12 students. Throughout the year, students perform in three concerts and have multiple opportunities to participate in Honor Bands and Solo and Ensemble competitions.

### High School Jazz Band

Jazz Band is made up of select 9-12 grade band students. These students audition to be a part of this elite group. They work throughout the year to perform many styles of jazz in two concerts and various gigs around our community.

### Marching Band and Color Guard

Located in the hills of Amish Country, the Hiland High School Marching Band is a small but mighty group that performs in local parades and Band Shows throughout the area.

## FINE ARTS FESTIVAL

The Annual Fine Arts Festival showcases the artistic talents and work of students from across the district.

# ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

---

## TRIMESTER GRADING PERIODS

Starting in the 2024–2025 school year, East Holmes Local School District implemented trimester grading periods for students in grades K–8, excluding Hiland Middle and High School, which continues to use nine-week grading periods.

This change comes after a district-wide update to the report cards, initiated by the Report Card Committee and supported by the majority of teaching staff. The new trimester system divides the school year into three 12-week grading periods, which offers several advantages for students and teachers alike. The extended grading periods provide primary students more time to adjust to school routines and allow all students additional teaching time between report cards, ensuring they have more opportunities to demonstrate their learning.

Trimesters also align with the district’s diagnostic assessments, which are administered three times a year. These include i-Ready and Acadience, tools that help teachers assess students’ current academic levels and identify areas requiring additional attention and subjects in which students are excelling. The consistency between the grading periods and these assessments ensures that students receive timely, targeted instruction based on their needs.

## STRUCTURED LITERACY

Structured Literacy was introduced across all grade levels in the 2023–2024 school year, aligning with Ohio’s educational recommendations and the science of reading. This research-based approach has already shown promising results, strengthening literacy instruction and fostering a more engaging learning environment.

The program emphasizes explicit, systematic instruction in foundational reading skills, including phonology, sound-to-symbol correspondence, and word structure. With new textbooks and materials, students receive tailored support through diagnostic and responsive teaching methods. Teachers provide direct instruction and ample practice, ensuring skills build progressively for a deeper understanding of reading and language.

Following a successful first year, the district remains committed to refining and enhancing Structured Literacy. Educators have engaged in extensive professional development to align instruction with the program’s framework, and ongoing student progress monitoring will help sustain academic growth. By prioritizing the science of reading, the district continues to equip students with the tools for lifelong literacy success.

## GIFTED INTERVENTION

The district’s Gifted Intervention Program provides advanced learning opportunities for identified gifted students, particularly in 5th and 6th grades. These students participate in a weekly pull-out program led by the Gifted Coordinator, engaging in small-group instruction that challenges their abilities while fostering social interaction.

Students qualify for the program based on Ohio’s Gifted Rule, which identifies those performing at high levels compared to their peers. In the gifted classroom, they explore subjects in greater depth, work with advanced materials, and engage in hands-on activities that stimulate critical thinking and personal growth. Collaboration between the Gifted Coordinator and classroom teachers ensures students are appropriately challenged across all learning environments.

While the program continues to evolve, it has already sparked excitement among students and staff. Gifted learners are demonstrating increased engagement and confidence, and the district remains committed to expanding opportunities that allow these students to thrive academically and socially.

## LEADER IN ME

The district proudly integrates the Leader in Me program across all seven elementary schools, helping students develop leadership, responsibility, and personal growth skills. Based on Stephen Covey's *7 Habits*, the program empowers students to take ownership of their development through classroom jobs, action teams, and student-led initiatives, reinforcing that leadership is within every student's reach.

The program has led to noticeable improvements in student behavior, engagement, and accountability. Teachers incorporate the *7 Habits* into daily lessons and routines, while weekly leadership time and monthly assemblies further strengthen a culture of respect and growth. Parental support also plays a key role, with the district providing resources to help families reinforce leadership skills at home.

With success stories ranging from student-led assemblies to community service projects, Leader in Me continues to make a lasting impact. As the program expands, the district remains committed to fostering confident, capable leaders in every student.

### BERLIN RECOGNIZED AS LEADER IN ME LIGHTHOUSE SCHOOL

Berlin Elementary has been officially recognized as a Leader in Me Lighthouse School, a prestigious honor that highlights the school's commitment to empowering students as leaders. Through the Leader in Me program, students practice leadership in everyday ways—taking initiative in learning, supporting peers, and contributing to school life—building confidence and responsibility for lifelong success. This recognition reflects the dedication of Berlin's staff, students, and families, and marks an exciting step in continuing to grow a strong culture of leadership across the school community.

## SUMMER SCHOOL

Summer school is offered each June three days a week for three hours. Participants explore the areas of fine arts, robotics, and reading. The goal of the program is to help minimize summer learning loss while providing the students with an enjoyable program. Class sizes are small, which allows for personalized attention and a relaxed environment.

# TEACHER AND STAFF QUALIFICATIONS

## PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT OPPORTUNITIES

The East Holmes Local School District hosts Professional Development days for staff in the fall and spring. Recent sessions focused on AI, Progress Book Training, Ready Classroom Math Training, Science of Reading Modules, and Report Card Data. Professional Development days are prioritized to keep teachers current in their knowledge of the field, especially in areas where pressing questions, concerns, or major changes may be prevalent.

## STAFF APPRECIATION

East Holmes celebrates highly qualified and experienced staff members with an annual Staff Appreciation Program held at the end of each school year. The program honors a Teacher of the Year, Classified Staff Member of the Year, and retirees. Employees who have served the district for 30, 20 and 10 years and employees who have recently earned professional licenses are also recognized.

East Holmes Local School District utilizes the “Say Something” Anonymous Reporting System (ARS) in partnership with Sandy Hook Promise, a national leader in school safety programs. This initiative is part of East Holmes’ ongoing commitment to creating a safer, more supportive environment for all students, educators, and community members.

The Say Something ARS program is designed to educate students and staff on how to identify warning signs and threats, whether online or in person, and respond effectively. Through this program, students learn to recognize at-risk behaviors in their peers, take them seriously, and act promptly. They can choose to talk to a trusted adult or report concerns anonymously via the Say Something ARS mobile app, website, or a 24/7/365 crisis hotline.

## STUDENT HEALTH

East Holmes Local Schools is committed to supporting the health and well-being of every student through a comprehensive range of services. In partnership with Akron Children’s Hospital, Bobbi Freeman, RN, BSN, serves as our district nurse. As an Akron Children’s nurse, Bobbi is based in our schools, providing expert care, promoting wellness, and helping ensure students are healthy and ready to learn. ## TRAUMA-INFORMED CARE AND COUNSELING

East Holmes Local Schools prioritizes students’ mental and emotional well-being by embracing trauma-informed care (TIC) across the district. Through staff training and professional development, educators gain insights into adverse childhood experiences and the connection between mental health and academic success, ensuring a holistic approach to student support.

A key component of this initiative is the district’s partnership with The Village Network (TVN), which provides expert assessments and tailored treatment plans. TVN staff conduct weekly and bi-weekly group meetings covering anxiety, coping strategies, and communication skills with minimal disruption to the school day. Positive feedback from parents, students, and staff underscores the program’s success, with 100% of surveyed staff noting improvements in students.

# COMMUNITY AND FAMILY ENGAGEMENT



## PARTNERSHIPS WITH LOCAL BUSINESSES AND ORGANIZATIONS

East Holmes Local Schools actively collaborates with local businesses and organizations to provide students with hands-on learning experiences and career exploration opportunities.

Community Days connect Berlin students in grades K-6 with local industry leaders through interactive sessions that enhance classroom learning. These events foster teamwork, leadership, and real-world skill development.

Each fall, fifth-grade students participate in the annual Farm Day field trip. The day offers hands-on learning as students learn about topics such as farming, forestry, soil health, wildlife, and conservation.

For middle school students, career exploration and life skills are fostered through the annual Real Money, Real World Challenge and visits to local businesses. These experiences help students connect their education to future opportunities within the community.

For high schoolers, the Life Skills Camp and Job Expo equips juniors and seniors with essential life skills and career insights. With over 100 sessions and a Job Expo featuring businesses from Holmes and Wayne counties, students gain exposure to independent living skills and potential career pathways.

Through these partnerships, East Holmes Local Schools enriches student learning, strengthens community ties, and helps prepare students for future success.



## PARENT AND COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

The East Holmes community plays a vital role in supporting student success. The Hiland Academic Booster Club and the Holmes County Education Foundation collectively provide over \$85,000 in scholarships annually, a testament to the community's investment in our students' futures.

# SAFETY AND SECURITY

---

**AT EAST HOLMES LOCAL SCHOOLS, STUDENT AND STAFF SAFETY IS OUR TOP PRIORITY. WITH COMPREHENSIVE PROCEDURES, ADVANCED SECURITY FEATURES, AND DEDICATED STAFF EFFORTS, WE CREATE A SECURE ENVIRONMENT FOR LEARNING.**

Districtwide, we conduct regular safety drills to ensure everyone knows what to do in an emergency. These include monthly fire, tornado, lockdown, ALICE (active intruder), and evacuation drills. Our schools also follow consistent practices such as locked and monitored entrances, frequent door checks, visitor identification procedures, and the use of Bolo sticks, safety film, and Threat Extinguishers.

School Resource Officer Deputy Brent Bernhardt is an important part of our safety program. He monitors arrivals, conducts security checks, supports lunch supervision, assists with drills, and leads ALICE training. His daily presence provides reassurance and helps deter potential issues.

This fall, East Holmes Local Schools partnered with the Holmes County Sheriff's Office and TMD Security Consulting to complete a comprehensive safety and security threat assessment across all school buildings. The assessment evaluated current practices, identified potential risks, and recommended improvements to building infrastructure, emergency preparedness, staff training, visitor management, and response capabilities.

Together with our law enforcement partners, East Holmes remains committed to maintaining a safe environment for our students, staff, and visitors.



# FACILITIES

## PHASED CLASSROOM RENOVATION PROJECT

In the Fall of 2024, East Holmes Local Schools launched the Phased Classroom Renovation Project, an initiative dedicated to revitalizing learning environments across our elementary schools. With funds intentionally set aside for the project, this multi-year initiative will be completed without the need for a ballot measure.

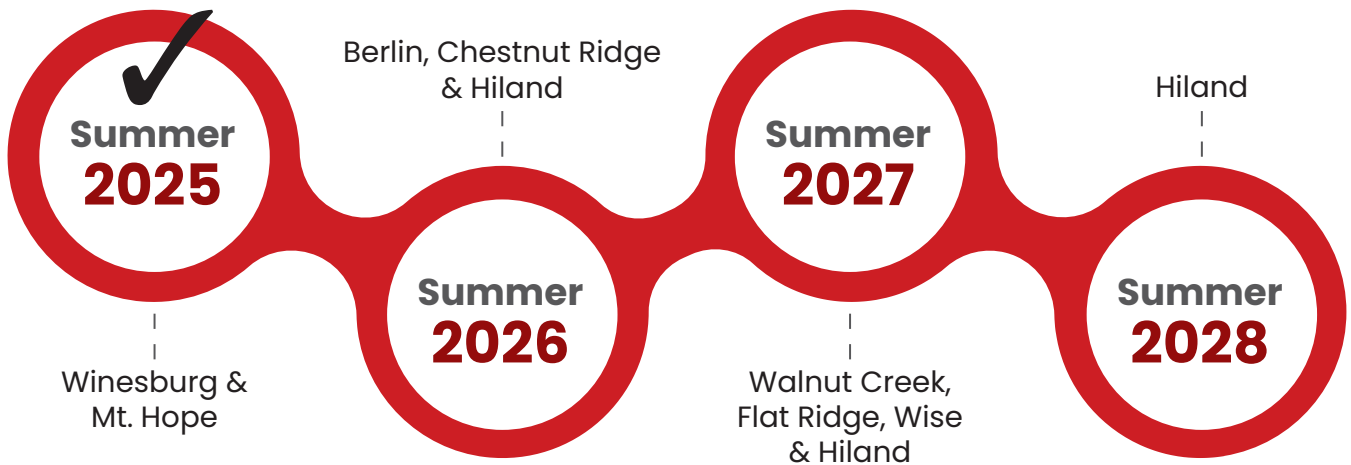
The renovation will span several summers, ensuring minimal disruption for students and staff during the school year. Aimed at refreshing over 145 classrooms and various common areas, upgrades include new flooring, fresh paint, modern lighting, and updated furniture—enhancing our learning spaces’ functionality and atmosphere.

The first phase of renovations occurred in summer 2025 at Mt. Hope Elementary and Winesburg Elementary, and were completed in time for the start of the 2025–2026 school year. In summer 2026, the next phase of renovations will occur at Berlin Elementary and Chestnut Ridge Elementary and will begin at Hiland.

We are grateful for the continued support of staff and district families as we work to enrich the learning environment for all students.

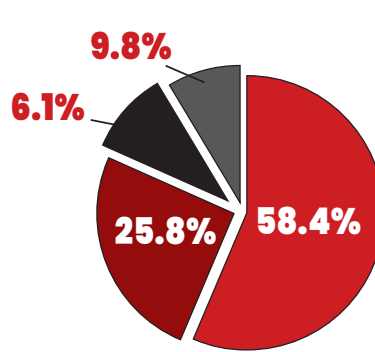

The District receives various types of funding from the Ohio Department of Education, both restricted and unrestricted, mainly in the form of state grants.

One such funding stream includes the Disadvantaged Pupil Impact Aid and Student Wellness and Success Funds, categorized under "restricted grants-in-aid" as outlined in the Five Year Forecast.

East Holmes uses Student Wellness and Success Funds to empower students with leadership skills through the Leader in Me Program, enhance student mental health support via The Village Network, improve nursing services by contracting with Akron Children's Hospital, provide physical therapy services, and enhance safety through a school resource officer.

## AUDITOR OF STATE AWARD

East Holmes Local School District has earned the Auditor of State Award, a testament to the collaborative efforts of the Treasurer's Office, the Superintendent's Office, the school district secretaries and administration, and the East Holmes Governing Board. Together, they have demonstrated exemplary financial management and transparency, achieving this notable recognition that reflects the high standards of financial accountability upheld throughout the district.

The Auditor of State Award is a prestigious accolade given to public entities that meet rigorous criteria during their annual audit. To qualify, the entity must file its audit report timely without extensions and maintain a clean audit report free from findings for recovery, material citations, material weaknesses, significant deficiencies, Single Audit findings, or any questioned costs. Additionally, there must be no other financial or management concerns noted in the audit report, nor any significant noncompliance issues.

Treasurer Daniel Reiman, along with Assistant Treasurer Ruby Shoup and Accounts Payable Specialist Heather Lehman, played pivotal roles in securing this award for East Holmes Local School District through their careful approach to ensuring precise and transparent financial practices. Their collaborative efforts underscore the district's dedication to maintaining the highest levels of fiscal integrity and accountability, as recognized by this significant award.

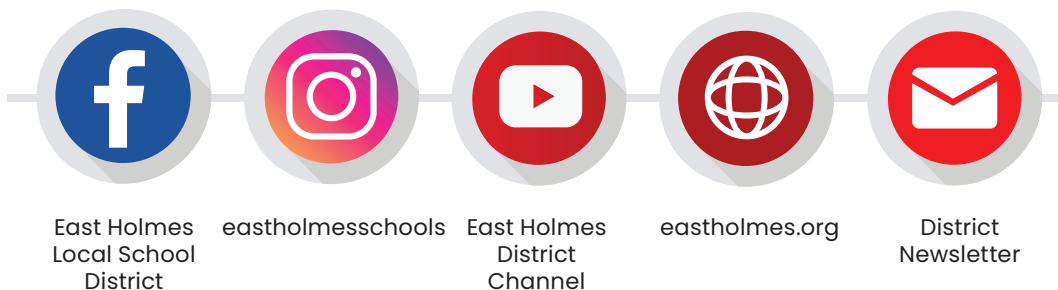
