
























Sophomore Robert Huebel gets into position to overtake his opponent during the Seneca game.












Debate: A Duel of Wits



The idea of the Investment Club was brought to the attention of Mr. Harvey Long, F.H.S.'s economics teacher, by Michael Wilhelm and Christopher MacGregor. After several meetings with a local stock broker, a contract to be signed by the student and the student's parents was drawn. 





All students are required to take four semesters of physical education, one per year, to graduate. Both the girls' gym teacher, Mrs. Retkowski, and the boys' teacher, Mr. Stuyvesant, carry a wide variety of sports in their curriculum. Everything from badminton to water polo, from diving to soccer. Mrs. Retkowski is also a certified instructor in CPR and dedicates a week each semester to teaching CPR. Students who

Mr. Huntley has applied for a grant to purchase another group of computers to give the school Desktop Publishing capabilities," commented Mr. Bencivenga, course instructor.

Home Art is one course offered in the Art Department, headed by Mrs. Schoeller. This unique class teaches students how to draw layouts and floor plans for houses.



Students also learn about interior decorating, architecture, and the different materials used for building houses. 
