



## Summer vacation.







The Fairview Tigers played like champs but came up with their first winless season ever. Head coach Buster Wellek had this to say about the season: "It was very trying, but the kids were willing."









of practice also improved team cooperation.


The consensus on the team was that one of the best parts of the season was beating Girard twice! Also, playing in tournaments was another favorite.







all around. Many players, including myself, work hard in anticipation of districts." These matches were held at Pennbriar Athletic Club.





### Girl's Tennis






















## Hooping It Up











When they do this they always end up getting caught in the process or after they throw the item.



because he must be healthy for wrestling and football." GO TIGERS!!!



twice. They were accidents, but my hand hurt."



# Participation in Extracurricular Activities: Is there enough?




After researching this project, we found that the majority of people interviewed felt that our school needs more participation and spirit. If the majority of the people feel this way, hopefully this will change in the future.





class has made me understand Hispanic Americans."




All the band members will cherish forever the memories of their 1998 season and are looking forward with great anticipation to next season.











































New opportunities, obstacles, and friends will come along in the future and that is why there is





