












Later on in the year the drama class went to CWC to present, “*Christmas in November*.” It was a huge success, and everyone did a great job. They had the audience constantly laughing.





Don't Judge a Book by its Cover











Having seen improvements in English, the district decided to apply co-teaching to math subjects as well. Scott Groenke, teaching with Caleb Stevens, says, “Co-teaching is awesome. Mr. Stevens is awesome. It allows us to feed off each other in positive ways. And though we cannot really predict what the scores will look like, we can say that the students are being exposed to multiple problem-






"This season was so much fun! My favorite part was playing in the games against Shoshoni because they are our rivals."






