On March 17, 2023, AATF recognized FMRHS as Exemplary with Distinction; the highest level of exemplary recognition. This prestigious award recognizes the outstanding quality of the FMRHS French Program; FMRHS is one of ten high schools in the country to receive the award.

The exemplary French program at FMRHS offers maximum learning opportunities for students, including dual enrollment, Advanced Placement, and student teaching opportunities. Over the past three years, the French program has expanded significantly under the oversight of its sole instructor, Madame Rebecca Fortgang. The program makes use of innovative and creative methods in teaching, gives standards-based assessments, and offers numerous cultural activities beyond the classroom.

French Club is one of the largest and most active clubs at the school. Students in the French program are invited to participate in multiple field trips per month to supplement their classroom experience. Trips include Francophone cultural outings such as Poutine Fest, Prêt-à-Parler, Keene International Festival, Cirque du Soleil, and Mardi Gras that allow students to further develop their language skills and investigate French culture.

The French program participates in the AATF National French Contest, Fleur Délics baking contest, New Hampshire Association of World Language Teachers conference, and AATF conference. French students are eligible for induction into the French Honor Society and currently there are five members with five more to be inducted this year. FMRHS is proud to also have two French Honor Society Alumni.

Madame Fortgang demonstrates excellent preparation and enthusiastic dedication to her work. Administrators, parents, students, and graduates have all praised the program and its teacher in glowing terms. Many of the students plan to continue their studies of French at college or use their skills in their chosen profession. Madame Fortgang was the 2022 French Teacher of the Year for the Franco-American Centre.

Grace St. Pierre, President of French Honor Society, shares, “My experiences in French class and French Club have shaped the way I view the world and helped me understand my place in it.” Kaleb Houle-Lawrence adds, “Without the French program in my high school career, I wouldn’t have found myself. I would wager to bet that this program, with all its components, has shaped the current version of myself and will continue to shape me in the future.” Kaleb continues, “Watching the program grow and prosper through these last four years has provided me the opportunity to recognize the value of teamwork and community. Without the strong comradery we have within the French program, the experiences of several students at Fall Mountain would not have been the same.”

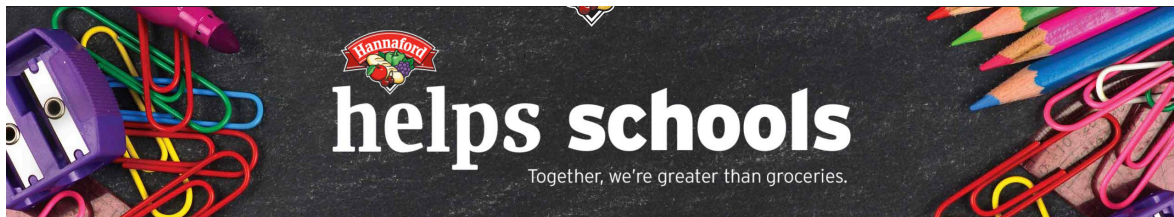

The day began with an introduction by the student leaders of HYPE and then there were five students from HYPE who shared their stories of self determination and overcoming adversity. After the student speakers shared their stories, all participants broke off into small student-lead discussion groups surrounding this year's theme. Students then had a quick wrap-up discussion and then enjoyed lunch at UNH's Holloway Dining Commons. Students also had some free time to check out the beautiful campus of UNH and talk with fellow HYPE attendees.

All students who attended really enjoyed the event, including the Seniors who attended last year and the Juniors who said they are excited for HYPE next year. Junior Cam Fuller said this about HYPE, "It was very inspiring that it was a mostly student run event and touched on some very important topics that the schooling system needs to handle. The split into groups showed the similar opinions students felt and the ability to gauge conflicting opinions on the subject." Senior Kassidy Ransom said, "HYPE was an excellent way to get a little bit out of your comfort zone and talk to people you have never even seen before. It is also pretty cool to see how many different high schools around NH participate in this conference!"

The Fall Mtn. Scholarship Fund supports ALL TYPES of Continuing Education.

As students, parents and adults of all ages contemplate how to fund continuing education, Fall Mountain Scholarship Fund (FMSF), formerly Dollars for Scholars, is reinforcing their ongoing commitment to provide funding for all types of degrees and technical certifications. Applications are due by April 14th.

The rising price of education has created a national student-debt crisis. The education marketplace is fundamentally different today than it has been in the past. Careers in Technical Education (CTE) and the pursuit of technical certificates, particularly in more rural areas, is on the rise. Alternative credentials are already held by 45% of workers, while 49% are considering earning one.

About 39% of respondents said they planned to take a course to receive a license, and 40% said they planned to take a course for a verified certificate. Those percentages match the share of respondents who said they planned to enroll in a two-year or four-year college.

“Technical certificates can be a complement or alternative to traditional college paths and certainly strengthens a person’s job opportunities” said Rich Nalevanko, Chairman of Fall Mountain Scholarship Fund. “We look forward to highlighting the extensive CTE programs offered by FMRHS which include Animal Science, Health Pathways, Digital Design among other programs”, Nalevanko added.
