

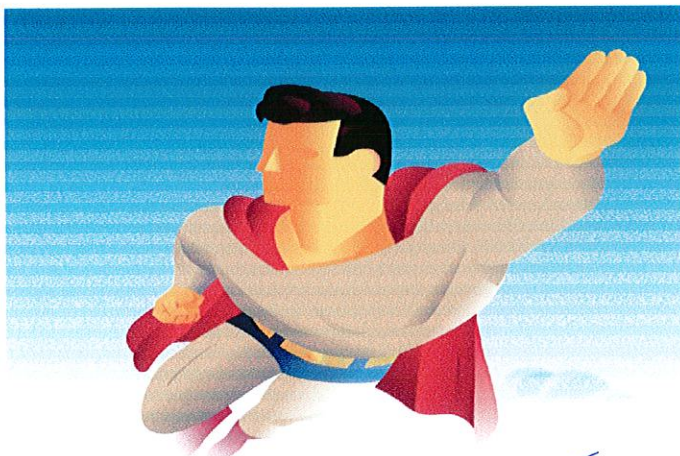

Re: Super Notes

Item 1: North Carolina State Board of Education - At the March 10th Board Meeting, I told you that Camden County High School and CamTech High School were on North Carolina State Board of Education's April meeting agenda for accreditation. I am pleased to report both high schools have been fully accredited without requiring an onsite review. As you know, accreditation is a quality assurance process. Our two high schools are the first two and only two in the state to achieve accreditation through our State Board. In addition, we were approved in all of the categories. Attaining accreditation through the State Board of Education has saved our school system approximately \$3,600.00 annually compared to accreditation through AdvancEd.

Item 2: Governor's Safe Schools Task Force – Earlier this week, I reported that along with Rodney Parker, I was scheduled to meet with Chip Hughes, Chair of the Governor's Safe Schools Task Force on April 21st to discuss the state of our schools' safety and lobby for funding through Safe Schools for security upgrades. I have prepared the attached information which is currently a work in progress but is a good reflection of steps taken to

ensure safety and upcoming projects which will enhance safety measures already in place. Any suggestions you may have to offer are welcomed and appreciated.

Item 3: Letters to Legislators: I wanted to share with you copies of my draft letters to Representative Steinburg, Senator Cook and Governor McCrory. Permission to use lottery funds to relieve budget restraints for the upcoming school year would help remedy a great fiscal need for our school system. I would like to mail these letters on Monday but before I mail them out, I would appreciate hearing from you as to your thoughts and/or input.

Item 4: Meeting Notes: Adequate Public Facilities Coordinating Committee – Attached is a copy of draft notes from the March 23rd APFO Meeting.

Item 5: Other Local Current Expense Fund – During our Budget Work Session on Monday night (April 4th), when we were reviewing *Other Local Current Expense Fund*, Ms. Aydlett asked what EDS of EDS Medicaid Reimbursement Program stood for. EDS is the system that runs the Medicaid Reimbursement Program; EDS stands for Electronic Data System.

Item 6: Audit Services – In the April board package, *Consent Agenda Item C* is a copy of our contract to continue auditing services with Donna Winborne. You will see that the pages are numbered but the last page we have is *Page 5 of 8*. I asked Ms. Perry to check with the auditor for explanation. Ms. Perry was told we should have through Page 5 and that the remaining pages (6-8) do not apply to us. Those pages (6-8) are used only if the entity has a component unit. Since we do not have a component unit, it is correct that we end with Page 5.

Item 7: If Out of the Office – I was asked earlier this week about administrator backup at each school when the principal is out of the office. Each school has furnished me a list showing the order of first, second, third and fourth in command.

Item 8: Membership Data – I am attaching our most recent Membership Data report as an information update.

The following is a brief recap of safety measures and events leading to greater emphasis on safety and security for the Camden County Schools. This is prepared for presentation to the Governor's Safe School Task Force for their review, opinions, suggestions and/or other assistance.

Background on the schools of Camden County:

Grandy Primary School serves students in grades K-3. There are approximately 600 students. This school campus also houses the NC Pre-K students in two mobile units. These students are not counted as part of the school's enrollment, but rather served through the Albemarle Smart Start and housed on this campus. Grandy Primary School was originally built in 1960 with additions in 1969 and sits on approximately 23.1 acres. This school has a single door entrance. Once anyone enters the school, they are able to venture down any of the three hallways even though the office is directly visible. Without viewing a camera, the parking lot is blind to anyone in the main office.

Camden Intermediate School serves students in grades 4-6. There are approximately 450 students. Camden Intermediate School was completed and opened in January of 2008. This school sits on the same land of Grandy Primary School. The two schools are joined by a common hallway and shared gymnasium. There is a double door entrance at this school, meaning once you enter the first door, there is a second door to pass through. There are two sets of doors one could use; however, only one set is unlocked for entrance. The office staff is able to see the parking lot through the windows from their office.

Camden Middle School serves students in grades 7-8. There are approximately 300 students. Camden Middle School was originally built in 1950 with additions in the 1960's and renovations in or around 2002. There is also a gym which is a separate building from the main school building. Camden Middle School is the only school located more than a mile from the Sheriff's Department and is the only school located off of the "main" road of Highway 158 or 343. Camden Middle School sits on approximately 16.9 acres. On two sides of the school are wooded/swamp land. Across the road from CMS is an open field and wooded area. There have been instances of hunters being seen around this area. This school has a double door entrance. The parking lot is visible from the main office; however, there is limited staff in the main office at any given time. Entrance from the bus parking lot is locked except for student entrance from the buses.

Camden County High School serves students in grades 9-12. There are approximately 450 students at this school. This school was originally built in 1950. There were additions in the 1970's with renovations completed on or around 2003. There are two front doors one could use to enter the high school, but one side remains locked at all times to limit entry points. This school has a single door entrance. Once one enters the building, the cafeteria is easily recognizable on one side, but the office is not quite as obvious. One could easily pass by the

office and enter either hallway or gymnasium. The parking lot is totally blind from the office. Persons who enter would only be seen by camera before entering the office.

CamTech High School serves students in grades 9-12 and sits on the same campus of Camden County High School. This school serves approximately 150 students. This school is a series of modular units located behind the main high school. These modular units have been in place since CamTech opened in 2005. There are students who come into the main high school during each class period to take various classes such as art, band, foreign language and PE. They enter through the breezeway doors that remain unlocked during the day. The doors of each modular unit remain unlocked as student travel throughout them constantly. Access to the main office unit is a simple trailer door with immediate access into the main office on one side or classroom on the other.

Recent Events

This year, Camden County Schools has been the target of a bomb threat and two anonymous phone calls to 911 with threats to attack the high school. With each of these, students and parents were notified. On another occasion, a similar 911 call was made late in the evening with a threat to blow up Grandy Primary School. Again, parents, students and staff were notified. With each of these events, additional law enforcement presence was requested and acknowledged.

These threats are most concerning as at this time the calls made to 911 have yet to lead to any arrest or leads for further information. Law enforcement has reported the calls were made from a Magic Jack system and subpoenas have been issued for the IP address, but all authority levels have failed to receive any information from that request. When law enforcement originally traced the calls, they came back as a location of the "police sub station" in South Mills (Camden County) and another from a field in South Mills (Camden County). It was also discovered by law enforcement that the same number was used to call in similar threats in the state of Illinois. The most recent call was made on the from what sounded like a young or teenage male voice claiming to blow up and shoot up Grandy Primary School. The date this was to occur was March 28, 2016. This was the first scheduled on the school calendar as a holiday.

As anticipated, student attendance on the dates when schools communicated receiving these threatening calls was lower than on most days. Camden generally has a student attendance rate around 96% daily at each school. On the dates of the threat, student attendance at each of our schools was significantly lower.

As a result of these recent calls, there has been an increased emphasis on school and student safety as a renewed priority. These calls have led to many questions regarding school safety and have become a distraction to some in the community that are overshadowing the impressive academic record of the school system.

Actions to date:

1. In previous years, Camden County Schools has purchased cameras for each yellow school bus. The cameras for the buses were replaced two years ago to upgrade and provide cameras that have the ability to capture audio as well as video. This is a digital system rather than the old VCR system. Additionally, stop arm cameras have been installed on 8 of our 23 yellow buses with 10 more scheduled to be added this year.
2. There are camera systems in place at each school with at least 16 cameras on each system. The cameras systems in the schools were upgraded to allow for a color picture as well as providing the ability for the cameras to be rotated from office of the principal, School Resource Officer or office of the superintendent. The placement of the cameras was done so with input from the School Resource Officer at the time. At this time there are 16 cameras at each Grandy Primary School and Camden Intermediate School, 25 at Camden Middle School and 32 between the two high schools.
3. The schools were used by various community groups and as a result, keys were copied over time. Over the past year and a half, all door locks have been re-keyed. All teachers now have a key to their classroom and they have been instructed to teach with their doors locked (or in locked mode) to allow for quicker security of the room. Additionally, principals were instructed to inform their teachers to keep their doors in locked mode with the doors open when they are not being used. This will allow for a location for students/staff to go if they are on their return from elective classes, lunch, etc.
4. There have been outdoor lights replaced at the high school and a light added two years ago for the back parking lot area. This was done to help illuminate the area and deter any trespassing during the evening hours.
5. There were two (2) School Resource Officers for the schools until approximately four years ago. One was assigned to the high school campuses and one to the middle school. The second officer was removed by the local sheriff's department and as a result, the sheriff's department now has uniformed officers make school sweeps at least once a day at the middle school and elementary school campuses. They generally do this twice a day. It may be worth noting, there are several deputies who have children as students in our schools. It is also worth noting there are children or spouses of Elizabeth City Police, Pasquotank County Sheriff's Department, NC Highway Patrol and Alcohol Tobacco and Firearms department in our schools not to mention the numerous children and spouses of the US Coast Guard and US Navy.

The communication between the schools and local law enforcement can be described as very good. Exchange of text messages, phone calls and frequent visits are evident and continuous. In the past three years, the camera system access became available to local law enforcement on a few of their computers in their vehicles.

6. Intruder drills are now required by law. This became legislatively mandated to occur at least annually this year. Camden County Schools began these drills on an unannounced basis at least three years ago. Prior to that, there were scheduled and announced “lockdown” drills.” While the law requires only one, Camden County Schools have conducted multiple drills during the past three years. These drills have occurred at least three times thus far this school year. To further this, panic buttons were installed over the summer at each school and central office. There are two such devices in each location. These are tested monthly and are used during the “intruder drills.”
7. Students at the high schools continue to have to register their vehicle and are given parking tags and assigned parking spaces. Staffs at the high schools are given similar parking tags for their vehicles and are also given assigned parking spaces. This is not true for any of the other schools or the central office.
8. Lobby Guard is utilized at each school. The initial purchase of Lobby Guard was made approximately twelve years ago. These were for the three existing schools (Camden County High, Camden Middle and Grandy Primary). Two additional units have since been purchased for CamTech High School and Camden Intermediate. There are many features that could be purchased to go along with this system. Currently this is used to detect any registered sex offender who may be seeking entrance into our schools.

Concerns / Priorities

It should be noted, these are priorities from school personnel perspective, not by personnel trained in school or building security.

1. Secure funding to install a “buzz-in system” for the entrance into each school. Contact has already been made to the door and lock company the schools work with. This total is anxiously awaiting arrival. This is a current request for a capital improvement request from the county as well as a possible request for the use of lottery funds.

Rationale: This will force office personnel to be aware of every person entering the building. Office staff or staff in general, may not be aware of visitors coming into the building at any given time. While it is recognized this is not a full proof measure of ensuring student or staff safety, it does at the least let everyone know they are under surveillance and staff knows they are entering the building.

2. Radios that provide for communication between each school, from each school to central office and each school with local law enforcement. The radios our schools currently have are for internal communication with their schools only.

Rationale: Students are required to have recess. This places a reasonably large number of students and staff from the elementary school outside on a daily basis. There is a large field next to the playground area with access from several locations including a boat ramp area. By having immediate communication to central office and/or law enforcement, staff will have more immediate communication with proper personnel in the event of a missing student, accident with injury, or trespasser/intruder.

3. Re-key the buildings and doors to use a “hotel key” type system. This key will be a part of staff identification badge.

Rationale: By making the key a part of their identification badge, staff will be more identifiable as well as preventing duplication of keys to individuals outside of the schools.

4. Signage upgrades on each campus to include notice of being under surveillance while on campus, where visitors report, no weapons, no smoking, driving directions with speed limits, etc.
5. Room numbers placed on exterior windows to allow for law enforcement to use drawing of the schools to identify each room location from inside and outside.
6. Fencing the area of the playground around Grandy Primary School and Camden Intermediate School.

Rationale: This will provide for an area of greater security barrier to keep visitors who may be walking the track or use the “park area” from students and staff who are at recess. This will also be true for after school day-care when access to the park is greater as the park area is also used for youth recreation baseball/softball, football and high school soccer.

7. Purchase a Barracuda Defense System or similar type product to offer quick lock to door from inside the room without a key.

As we move deep into another budget season with the schools, I wanted to bring to your attention a matter specific to Camden County Schools and with this matter, I am wishing for your assistance. As you are aware, Camden County Schools have produced an impressive academic record for several years and has garnished the public praise from many. This has been done through careful planning, dedication and with modest spending.

Camden County Schools' expenditures per student are not exorbitant; in fact they are barely equal to that of the average district in the state. Our schools built a fund balance to prepare for these years, and for each of the past three years, our budget included the use of over \$700,000 of available fund balance to simply keep the services we offer. This year, we are left with just over \$400,000 available to use.

As our Board of Education prepares the proposed budget, it includes the use of ALL available fund balance as well as a request to our local government of \$432,000. This figure is based on a projected 3% pay raise for all employees, increases in hospitalization, increases in Social Security costs, and increases in retirement costs. If the requests are not met by the local government, Camden County Schools will be forced to give up employees and some other services. All of these reductions cause great concern to student safety, overall morale, and student/teacher performance.

At this time, there are no immediate construction projects for our schools. What I am seeking is the permission for the Camden County Schools to use available lottery funds for school operations for the 2016-17 school year.

Thank you for your consideration. I will make myself available to meet with you or provide any additional information you may need. I also thank you for your willingness to listen and make decisions believed to be in the best interest of this great state.

I. Update on Noblitt property

Mr. Porter reported that the Board of Commissioners had approved contract with ET Hyman to prepare a Soil & Erosion plan to obtain a clearing and grubbing permit for the Noblitt property. We anticipate clearing about 43 of the 60 acres to avoid encroaching on existing wetlands. Commissioner Meiggs stated and the committee agreed that the clearing project should be bid with sealed bids. The group discussed various methods of disposing of the debris and agreed that the RFP should include requesting prices for the different methods.

II. Update on uses of Camden High School

Mr. Renshaw explained that the Board of Commissioners had just received a consultant's assessment report on space needs for county offices and noted that with multiple projects being planned each decision affects the others. He also asked if the school system had a set of floor plans for the school, and if so a similar assessment of the high school could be accomplished without the added cost of measuring every room. The committee discussed several optional uses for the existing high school including potential for county administrative offices, possible relocation of library, combination uses that moved one or another of the high school programs, and others. Mr Hawkins made a motion seconded by Mr. Meiggs that the school system share the school floor plans with the county and that we proceed with an assessment to determine potential reuses of the building. The motion passed unanimously.

Roger Morgan: (If there was a bus driver issue or we need to see a bus video.)

If Marie is out Maria Brickhouse will be the point of contact and follow the same procedure above.

If Lazar, Byrum, Ivins, Brickhouse, are out then Tami Griffin or Sharon Dunavant will be the next point of contact. Everyone will follow the same procedures above.
