Intermediate School Partakes in the Kindness Rocks Project

Intermediate Principal, Monica Daigler, and her teaching staff came up with a fun project for their students to kick off the school year. There has been a lot of buzz about The Kindness Rocks Project which is a movement that encourages people to decorate rocks with inspirational messages and leave them in public places for people to find as random acts of kindness. Many staff members shared with Mrs. Daigler that they found some when they were vacationing over the summer and how fun it was logging on to the Facebook page written on the back of the rock and sharing where they found it.

"Our theme this year for PBIS is Acceptance, Kindness Rocks," says Mrs. Daigler. "I started off the school year with reading a book called "Only One You" which is written by Linda Krantz. It's a very cute story with pictures of fish and it talks about life lessons and how it is okay to be different or unique. At the end of the story it asks, how you are going to make it a better place. We issued that challenge to our students."

Students were given brainstorming sheets and asked how they would make the world a better place like recycling or being kind to animals. They then sketched out what their kindness rock would look like based on their ideas. Art teacher Lindsay Abramo helped the students translate those ideas into artwork. "Some of the students kept to their original idea and others decided to take it into another direction," says Mrs. Daigler. "Their assignment was to make a unique rock that meant something to them."

The rocks that the students made will find a permanent home in the school's rock garden. But since the idea is to share with others and pay it forward, the teachers made their own rocks over the summer and those will be gifted to the Rising Star Students each month who can choose one from the display and hide it in plain sight in the community. They created a Facebook page (<https://www.facebook.com/pg/StarpointIntermediateRocks>) for the school so that people could write where they found them and students would be able to track where the rocks ended up and how their kindness is being spread in the community.

Fifth grader, Nora King, was awarded Star Student of the Month and hid her rock at the Cambria Town Park. "I was so excited. I wrote a letter at the beginning of the year that my goal was to be a Star Student and I achieved it right away! I really like the idea of Kindness Rocks. It's a lot of fun and I think that when people find the rocks they will be happy and inspired."



Message from the Superintendent



Top Priority at #OneStarpoint = School Safety

"If teachers and students do not feel safe, they will not have the psychological energy for teaching and learning." - Dr. Robert J. Marzano

There has never been a time in the history of the Starpoint Central School District when we have been more focused on enhancing instructional effectiveness. Teachers are using a district-wide model of lesson design and delivery; focusing on research-based instructional strategies that we know increase student learning. Professional development consisting of classroom-embedded learning has become commonplace in Starpoint. Yet, can I say that this is our top priority? The answer is no.

Echoing the quote above from Dr. Marzano, the most dynamic teacher will be ineffective and the brightest student's learning will be stalled when placed in an environment where they do not feel safe. As safety is our highest priority, we have made and will continue to make changes to Starpoint to enhance the safety and security of the campus.

Following the announcement of my appointment as Superintendent of Schools in March of 2016, the Board of Education and I made it a priority to add a full-time School Resource Officer to the 2016-17 budget. We are blessed to have Sheriff's Deputy Craig Beiter on campus every day to protect your children and assist them in making positive decisions in their lives. In his short time here, Deputy Beiter has become a fixture across the district.

Having Deputy Beiter on board made the implementation of our next intervention that much smoother. Starpoint has increased our focus on practicing Lockdown, Lockout, and Shelter-in-Place drills. Is it sad that we have to put such an emphasis on training our staff and students to

respond to potential threats inside or outside our school buildings? Yes. Is it necessary? In my opinion, absolutely. Students and staff need to know what to do in a Lockdown situation as well as they know how to exit the building in the case of a fire.

You may notice more changes in the months and years ahead. Entrances at each building will be enhanced to provide additional layers of security and our camera system will continue to be upgraded on a weekly basis. Supervision of entrances after-hours will be strengthened and events and activities, such as our community education program, will be funneled into two or three buildings rather than being scattered across the entire campus.

These changes to enhance security may make Starpoint's campus feel a bit different; however, the Board of Education and I feel they are unequivocally necessary. Every change is being made with one goal in mind: Making the Starpoint campus as safe and secure as possible so your children can focus on learning.

Fricano students in Miss Carolyn Schaus', Mrs. Jena Zubricky's and Ms. Marie Vergils' self-contained classes have been having a great time every Monday. The classes have been heading out to Bud Bakewell Rink on Riverside Street to participate in SABAH which provides adaptive ice skating. "It's a wonderful opportunity for our students to learn how to ice skate while working on self-help, social, emotional and academic skills," says Miss Schaus.

The students started their adventure this October. They will be working on their skating skills, which will result into choreographed musical routine at First Niagara Center in March when they will perform in front of an audience. "We will be skating with other classes who have similar needs and similar academic abilities," says Miss Schaus. "The students learn to skate through academic activities. These activities range from ELA skills such as word families, sight words etc. to math skills such as counting, number recognition and math facts. The SABAH program does a great job of incorporating academic activities while teaching the kids to skate. It's the coolest program because it gives the kids a chance to be successful in something outside of school. I think the parents are really excited about their kids participating. It gives them an activity they can do as a family once the child learns how to skate."

The students have loved skating every Monday and can't wait to hit the rink. "Are we skating today? Is it time to go?" laughs Miss Schaus. "None of them have skated before this. It is a whole new experience for them. It's awesome!

Starpoint High School recently hosted their second career fair. Assistant Principal Michael Moran says the idea was hatched by the school's counselors. "What we are trying to do here is have students see beyond high school. Our school counselors have adopted as our motto, "Begin with the End in Mind". Starpoint Offers Students and Community Members Technology Support at Collaboratory Café

As everyone is aware, technology has infiltrated almost every part of our lives. At the Starpoint Central School District there has been a big push to implement the use of technology across the district. "It is one of our missions and is part of the Smart Schools Grant we have received, it has allowed us to develop a plan for the use of these Chromebooks, iPads and tablets across the district," explains Middle School sixth grade teacher Rich Vittoria.

Mr. Vittoria is a twelve year member of the District's Technology Committee. "Over the past few years we have seen a significant increase in computer/internet use for assignments, Parent Grade Portal, Google Classroom and Google Apps for Education. As the District continues to fulfill its mission to facilitate the development of 21st century ready students, we realized that there are many students and residents who don't have access to broadband internet, updated computers and printing ability."

Last spring, after seeing the need in the District, Mr. Vittoria proposed an idea of the development of the Collaboratory Café. "We have had an excellent response to using technology and our teachers are trained in it, but we realized when we started implementing it that there are a number of students that don't have up to date computers or a tablet at home or possibly don't have internet access. So I had a brainstorm about what we can do to help the kids other than giving them paper copies or letting them come in early or stay late or come in on a study hall. What if we had a computer lab, but it wasn't just for the students? What if we opened it up after hours to their parents, residents or employees?"

Mr. Vittoria's vision is for two open labs, a quiet one where people could just work or browse the internet. Then a second one that would be staffed with an employee who is very familiar with computers applications and understands Google Apps for Education, the District website and the Parent and Student Portals and be able to assist parents and students on how to access them. It would also be a collaboration lab where students could work together, discuss projects, assignments and do research together." It is free to the public and is open one night a week and rotates through Tuesday to Thursday, a different day each week. The times would stagger too and some nights operate 2:30-6:30pm or 3:10-7:10pm. There would also be an online help desk that students and residents can call or email if they need help. Mr. Vittoria, who is coordinating the labs, will try to get back to everyone who leaves messages within a day or two.

This is the first year of the Collaboratory Café and Mr. Vittoria says he is excited about the café and hopes that it will receive positive feedback from the students and the community. "We are going to see where it goes and then we will evaluate it and see if we need to adjust days or times. We will be tracking to see if the people using the lab are residents or students and we will look at the data and take it from there. It is open to everyone in our school district and if they just want to come in and browse the internet, they can. Starpoint is the heart of the community and our hope is that it will bring people together. You know, if you build it, they will come."



Mentoring Program Enhances Middle School's Culture of Kindness

Starpoint Middle School has been participating in the student orientation and transition program WEB, which stands for Where Everybody Belongs. The national program came to the attention of teachers, Chris Johnson and Brian Scully, through the principal at the school, Mr. Bryer. The Starpoint School District was the second one in the area to take part in it. "There was a flyer and he asked if we wanted to go for training, so we went," says Mr. Johnson. "It was eye-opening for us. It was the best professional development we have ever seen." Mr. Johnson and Mr. Scully were so impressed that they have since become national WEB trainers working with teachers, counselors, board members, principals and superintendents to implement the program in their districts.

The program centers on selecting 8th graders to mentor the incoming 6th graders. For many students the transition to the middle school can be somewhat challenging and it is a way to introduce them to the school in a safe and friendly manner. Two 8th grade mentors work with ten 6th graders and arrange activities throughout the year. Their job is to make the students feel welcomed and celebrate their achievements whether it is birthdays or awards they have received.

This year over 100 students applied for 43 mentor positions. The WEB coordinators, Mr. Johnson, Mr. Scully, Danielle Alterio and Amy Griesmer, were not surprised by the huge number of applicants. "It's a testament to the program on how many of these kids applied to be mentors, it's over half of the 7th grade. It shows the success of the program and the impact it made on them as incoming 6th graders," says Mr. Johnson.

"The number one criteria we look for in the applicants is are they kind to other kids," says Mr. Scully. "Sometimes what we see in front of the classroom is completely different from what they are like outside of the classroom. We do an extensive background check on the students by talking to their teachers, the lunch monitors, the bus drivers and our administrators. We have them fill out a survey and rank the applicants on their leadership qualities and their kindness. There is a tryout where we bring them in to do activities together to see who steps up and takes the initiative to organize the group. Those are the ones we are looking for."

All the WEB coordinators say that the program has made an impact on the whole school. "The 6th graders are nervous when they come in that first day and look like deer caught in the headlights," says Mr. Scully. "We have this orientation with the

mentors who give them a tour of the building and then they have activities with them and the kids just have a blast. In that three to four hour period, they see how our school operates and how we do things. They come up as 7th graders and they know what WEB is and they remember the activities and the impact it has made on them."

Ms. Alterio says they work very closely with the mentors on lessons they can share. "We give them a bare bones outline to cover and then they go right in and take leadership and focus on making an impact on those 6th graders. They fly with it." "The growth we see in the 8th grade students has been the biggest surprise to us and the most satisfying part," says Mr. Scully. "Chris and I have them in the 7th grade and from what they are as a 7th grader to what they are as an 8th grader from being part of this program is unbelievable. Students that come to us and don't say a word, grow into these incredible people who organize events, take initiative in class and when they see things that need to be done at the school to make it better, they do it without hesitation."

"If we look at the school and how it was nine to ten years ago, it is not only the students we have seen a change in, we are changing the culture of the teachers as well," says Mr. Johnson. "They love the way the students are behaving and they know that WEB has a lot to do with that." The WEB program also show kindness to the teachers. "We

brought in a masseuses for them and say WEB's Got Your Back. We have a Christmas breakfast every year where the kids make the food for the teachers. The teachers love it. It's something they look forward to."

Ms. Alterio says that Mr. Johnson and Mr. Scully deserve a huge amount of gratitude for what they do with their WEB training. "They are very humble, but they were instrumental in bringing WEB not only to us, but to other school districts who are starting the program like Ken-Ton and Lewiston-Porter. "They are spreading kindness around."
