ATHLETIC TRAINING SPOTLIGHT

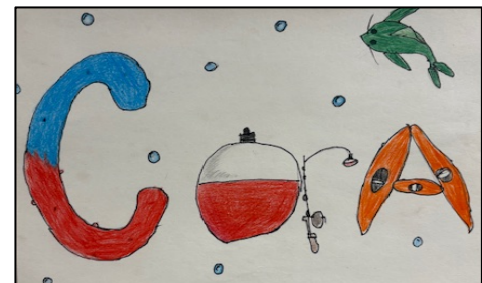
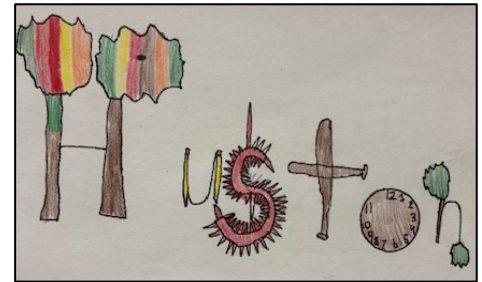
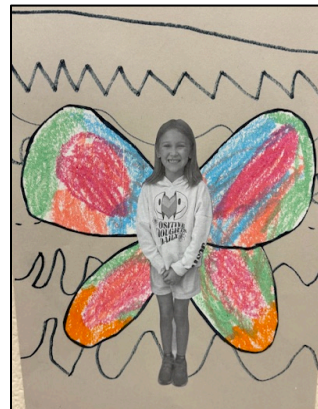
Athletic Trainers are essential members of the healthcare team, especially in school athletics, where they play a critical role in keeping student-athletes safe and healthy. Their responsibilities go far beyond taping ankles and responding to injuries on the field/court. Athletic trainers are healthcare professionals who specialize in injury prevention, clinical evaluation and diagnosis, immediate and emergency care, treatment and rehabilitation, and overall wellness and education. They develop injury prevention programs, conduct physical assessments, manage acute injuries, provide first aid and CPR, design rehab plans, and work closely with physicians, coaches, and families to ensure each athlete's health and safety. Athletic trainers are also trained to recognize conditions such as concussions, heat illness, and other sport-specific risks, making them a vital part of every athletic program.

Becoming an athletic trainer requires a bachelor's or master's degree from an accredited athletic training program, supervised clinical experience, and passing a national certification exam. Athletic trainers must also maintain certification through continuing education to stay up to date with current medical and safety standards.

At Danville High School, we are fortunate to offer this high level of care through a valued partnership with Knox Community Hospital. This partnership ensures that our athletes receive high-quality care throughout the year. Through this collaboration, our certified athletic trainer, Raven Ulrey, provides dedicated support and care during practices, games, and beyond. Raven has proudly served as the athletic trainer at Danville for the past four years, and we are incredibly thankful for her knowledge, dedication, and commitment to the well-being of our student-athletes. KCH provides this service to all student-athletes for only \$6,000 per year. If it were not for the

support of KCH, this service would cost the athletic department well over \$50,000 per year, not including benefits. Athletes and families are encouraged to use the services at KCH for sports injuries and all healthcare needs. Without their support we may not be able to provide an athletic trainer in the near future.

FALLEN MEDIC HONORED WITH LIFESAVING SCHOOL DONATION

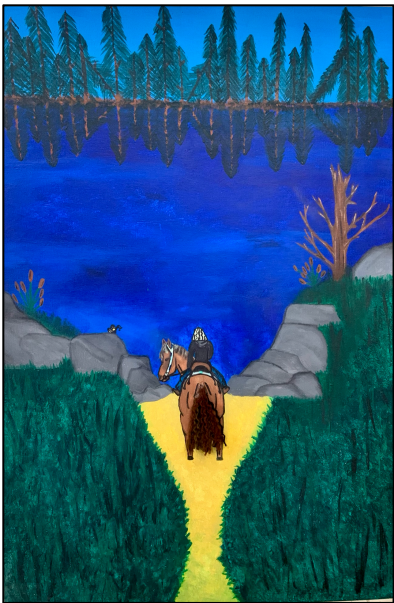
