## What you can do to promote early learning

- Play with your child and provide opportunities for them to play. Play is essential for healthy brain development.
- Turn off the TV. A young child's brain is largely shaped by his/her development. Children need activities that stimulate the frontal lobe by involving all the senses, not just passive viewing.
- Read and talk to your child. Phonemic awareness of sound comes from listening to the human voice.
- Model the joy of learning and discovery. Go to parks, the beach, zoos and take children on walks. These types of activities stimulate early learning.
- Connect with your child. Connections boost children's brain potential, encourages cooperation, promotes learning and literacy, increases attention, decreases power struggles and builds loving bonds.
