EARLY CHILDHOOD DEVELOPMENT, TEACHING AND LEARNING

Leadership team members:

- Began discussion and planning the 2022 Summer Smart Start program.

EARLY CHILDHOOD HEALTH AND WELLNESS

The environmental health and safety specialist (EH&S) visits classroom monthly, or more if needed, to ensure all classrooms are following health and safety regulations and meets regularly with the Head Start director.

The dental hygienist provided resources and support to families with children who required follow up oral health care.

ERSEA/PARENT FAMILY AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT (PFCE)

The program is currently accepting pre-applications for the 2022 -2023 school year. <u>Pre-applications</u> are available to all interested families via the <u>Head Start website</u>, email or by U.S mail. (1302.13 Recruitment)

INFORMATION AND GUIDANCE FROM THE OFFICE OF HEAD START (OHS)

On April 14, 2022, <u>Program Instruction</u> was issued regarding the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2022. The funding level for programs under the Head Start Act is \$11,036,820,000, an increase of \$289 million over fiscal year (FY) 2021. This increase includes \$234 million to provide all Head Start, Early Head Start, and Early Head Start-Child Care (EHS-CC) Partnership grant recipients a 2.28% cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) and \$52 million for quality improvement. Each grant recipient may apply for a COLA increase of 2.28%. Each grant recipient will be allocated an amount of quality improvement funding proportionate to their federal funded enrollment. A funding guidance letter will be issued shortly to specify each funding level and additional instructions on how to apply for these funds.

TIME TO SHINE WEEK CLASS OBSERVATIONS APRIL 5-8

Information:

- Exact day for each school will not be determined till Monday, April 4, 2022 and schools will not be informed until the morning observers arrive. This is done due to last minute changes that may have to be made.
- We will not need any additional help from building staff and will have minimum impact on any school activities.
- Teachers should inform their coach if they have any planned absences ANY OF THE DAYS observers are scheduled.
- Only those staff who are in classroom on a regular basis should be in the classroom during observations.
- Observation time for each classroom can be any time from the beginning of the day till rest time. This can include breakfast, snack and lunch times. Recess can be observed IF there is structured games or activities.
- Family Advocates are responsible for procuring a space for observers to meet and supporting the classroom during rest time so that the teaching staff can meet with observers.
- Our Leadership Team has been assigned to Dual-Code with each observer. They will take part in all observations and feedback sessions. This will not be the coach assigned to the school.



Other Important Information about CLASS Observations


The process of CLASS reviews will involve two observation cycles. Each cycle will consist of a 20-minute period during which the observers watch classroom interactions and take notes followed by a 10-minute period for recording codes. All adults in the classroom will be observed equally.

Although the CLASS observation data is in not associated with formal evaluation for teachers and instructional assistants, it is critical that everyone understands the importance of the tool in helping Head Start staff provide a quality program for children and maintain our grant funding.
