CONTENT AREA SPECIALIST REPORT: JANUARY 2021

EARLY CHILDHOOD DEVELOPMENT, TEACHING AND LEARNING

Leadership team members:

- analyzed and reviewed coaching Action plans and discussed next steps
- are participating in curriculum reviews in collaboration with BPS early childhood programs
- continue developing school readiness goals and alignment to the Head Start Early Learning Outcomes Framework (HELOF)
- continue to provide weekly Practice Based Coaching observations, to include feedback and data chats with teachers, instructional assistants, and family advocates.

EARLY CHILDHOOD HEALTH AND WELLNESS

New students are screened when they enroll in the program. Rescreening is being conducted on children who did not pass the initial screening.

New this year! With parent permission, children are eligible to receive a free dental exam at their school site, from our dental hygienist.

Kinder Konsulting is currently providing mental health services to ten students, while 8 families are in the process of completing initial meetings. (1302.45 Child Mental Health and Social and Emotional Well-Being)

The Environmental Health and Safety Specialist, conducts regular site visits, to ensure the program maintains healthy and safe learning environments. Support and corrections are provided when needed.

ERSEA/PARENT FAMILY AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT (PFCE)

The program is currently accepting pre-applications for the 2022 -2023 school year. <u>Pre-applications</u> are available to all interested families via the <u>Head Start website</u>, email or by U.S mail. (1302.13 Recruitment)

Vacant seats are reviewed on a weekly basis. Selections are made from the waiting list that ranks children according to the program selection criteria. (1302.14 Selection Process)

This report includes proposed selection criteria for Board and policy council approval. Criteria for agency considerations is established utilizing data from the 2021 community assessment. Selection criteria prioritizes income eligible families, homelessness, children in foster care, age, eligibility for special education and includes a scoring mechanism for over-income families.



Child: Help! The man is falling out!





























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



BELOW IS THE STORY OF THE HEAD START LOGO AND WHY IT LOOKS THE WAY IT DOES



Peter Masters conceptualized the National Head Start logo in 1965. He used building blocks (common play toys and learning tools) as a metaphor for the development and growth of children through Head Start. To reflect the fact that Head Start is a national program operated by the Government, Masters added a representation of the American flag. He chose red and white stripes and an arrow, printed in reverse on a blue background. The arrow is the common denominator of all antipoverty programs and symbolizes upward mobility.

The two squares represent early childhood by suggesting building blocks. The arrangement of the blocks represent stairs by which this can be accomplished. The vertical stripes represent the child and parent. The arrow pointing upward represents the direction out of poverty and on to the future. The colors red, white, and blue represent the United States and the many opportunities it provides for its citizens.
