TRANSITION RESOURCE GUIDE

Transition services are a coordinated set of activities for a student with a disability that:

- is designed to be a results-oriented process that is focused on improving the academic and functional achievement of the student with a disability to facilitate the student's movement from school to post-school activities, including post-secondary education, vocational education, integrated employment (including supported employment), continuing and adult education, adult services, independent living, or community participation; and...
- is based on the individual student's needs, considering the student's strengths, preferences, and interests; and
- includes instruction, related services, community experiences, employment, and other post-school adult living objectives, and if appropriate, acquisition of daily living skills.

To facilitate quality planning for a successful transition to postsecondary education and career opportunities for students with disabilities, Brevard Public Schools will:

- begin the transition process during the student's seventh grade year, or when the student attains the age of 12, whichever occurs first. In addition, students will be administered an annual transition assessment which will help guide goals, agency partnerships, and outcomes.
- ensure the IEP team has an operational plan in place that is implemented on the first day of the student's first year in high school or when the student attains the age of 14, whichever occurs first.
- provide a statement of the student's intent to pursue a standard high school diploma and a Scholar or Merit designation which documents discussion of the process of deferment of a standard high school diploma for a student with a disability who meets the requirements for a standard high school diploma.
- ensure the IEP in effect at the start of the student's graduation year includes a signed statement by the student's parent or guardian, or by the student if the student is of majority age and rights have transferred, that documents understanding of the deferment process and identifies whether the student will defer the receipt of a standard high school diploma.
- provide the student and parent with information about specific services and programs for students with disabilities and referral forms, links, and technical support for accessing such services and programs. See below.
