

I created this piece using watercolor paint on different pieces of paper so that I would be able to layer each piece, adding more dimension. I also used colored pencils to add in smaller details. My artwork is inspired by Junji Ito and his grotesque illustrations, more specifically his manga series Uzumaki. The meaning of this piece is the way social media has its users constantly under its watch. The eye in my piece acts as the platform (the app) and the woman represents its users. The woman's eyes are blacked out. She doesn't have the ability to see through her own eyes, only through what the algorithm wants her to see.

































Burns ON BLAST!
