Head Start provides comprehensive child development services to predominately economically disadvantaged children and families. Head Start has a special focus on helping preschool children develop early reading and math skills they need to be successful in school. Additionally, Head Start promotes school readiness by enhancing the social, cognitive, and emotional development of preschool children. This is accomplished through the provision of educational health, nutritional, social, and other services to enrolled students and families.

Parent, teacher, and community participation in our School Advisory Council (SAC) is essential to our continued improvement and success. All stakeholders are invited to be on the SAC committee and to attend all meetings. All parents, teachers, and community business partners receive an invitation to participate at the SAC meeting via FOCUS email, school website announcement, ClassDojo post, school newsletters, and monthly school calendars. Monthly SAC meetings are currently held the first Wednesday of every month at 3:00 pm in Discovery's Media Center. All families are welcome and encouraged to become active members in SAC and asked to provide meaningful input into the development of all plans related to the improvement of Discovery Elementary. The SAC committee provides input regarding the development, implementation, and evaluation of the following: the School Improvement Plan (SIP), the Title I Parent and Family Engagement Plan (PFEF), the Title I School-Family Compact for Learning, the Title I Annual Needs Assessment Survey, and how the Title I funds reserved for parental involvement will be used. More than 50% of the members of the SAC are parent (non-employee) representatives, with every effort to create a committee representative of our school population. The other SAC members are community members, business partners, and school staff. Additionally, all stakeholders will be asked to complete a survey in the Spring of 2024 to evaluate the program as a whole and which events/topics they would like to participate in for the following year.
How will the needs of families be assessed to plan future events?	Families are asked to complete a survey at the conclusion of each event. Families will have the opportunity to list any topics/events that will benefit them for the current school year. In addition, all stakeholders are asked to complete a survey in the Spring of 2024 to evaluate the program as a whole and which events/topics they would like to participate in for the following year.
What are the barriers for parents and families to attend workshops/events and how do you overcome these? (transportation, translation, etc)	Discovery will work hard to minimize any barriers for parents and community members. According to numerous surveys, the main barrier that parents have is their work schedule. They are unable to come to events during or immediately after school due to work obligations. To maximize participation, we have added more evening events to meet the needs of all our families. Another barrier is information not being communicated or received by the parents in a timely manner. Discovery sends home multiple notices and invitations starting at least two weeks prior to the event. Discovery is also sending home a monthly calendar and school newsletter, posting information on our website, sending an email/announcement via FOCUS, and posting on ClassDojo and social media to inform all stakeholders of upcoming events. Additionally, Discovery is sending home a translated version to applicable families. Translators are also available during all Title I family events and are made available upon request during any conference between the parent and teacher.
How are flexible dates and times for meetings, events and/or workshops offered? (Give examples)	Discovery Elementary has a strong belief in the importance of family involvement and offers a variety of meetings at convenient times for families to attend throughout the school year. We have scheduled our SAC meetings for Wednesday afternoons at 3:00 pm as indicated in parent surveys. Families are encouraged to contact Discovery to address specific needs/requests to make participation possible. Parent workshops will be held, and materials will be provided to educate families on how to help their child(ren) at home. Families will learn how to monitor their child's progress and work with educators to improve the academic achievement of their child. These events will be offered at different times, as requested in parent surveys, directly after school and later in the evening. The evening events will be held on different days and will last over a period of two hours to ensure that parents are able to
