

Third & Fourth Grade Bicycle Skills Clinic in PE

April 1 - May 2, 2024

We're gearing up to learn about bicycle safety! Students in 3rd and 4th grade will have the opportunity to learn and practice bicycle handling skills as part of their PE class.

To help us prepare for these lessons, please review the information below.

EQUIPMENT

If your child has a bicycle and **already** bikes to school, they will be encouraged to practice on their own bicycle instead of the loaner bikes that will be provided by the **Space Coast TPO**. Now is a great time to ensure that their bike is in good working order! Take some time to make sure their tires are pumped up, their brakes operate well, and their pedals and chain are moving smoothly. **Helmets are mandatory! If your child has a helmet, please send it in with them. If they do not, helmets will be provided. I can keep student's helmets in the PE room.**

CLOTHING

Please ensure your child is wearing the proper bicycling attire on PE days. Remind them that loose-legged pants can get caught in the bicycle chain (it has happened!), creating a safety hazard and ruining their pants with chain grease.

HAIRSTYLES

To ensure the best helmet fit, aim to keep hair in styles that force hair tight against the scalp and toward the nape of the neck. If choosing a hairstyle, avoid high ponytails, buns, or any style that will bundle hair at the top of the head.

Dear Parent/Guardian,

The purpose of this letter is to inform you that your student will take the computer-based Grade 4-6 Benchmarks for Excellent Student Thinking (B.E.S.T.) Writing assessment on April 3, 2024. The B.E.S.T. Writing assessment is administered in one 120-minute session, and students may work up to half of a typical school day.

If you or your student would like to review the computer-based practice test at home, the practice tests and answer keys are available at https://fsassessments.org/families.html.

Please review the following policies with your student before testing:

- **Electronic Devices**—Students are not permitted to have any electronic devices, including, but not limited to, cell phones, smartphones, and smartwatches, at any time during testing **or** during breaks (e.g., restroom), **even if the devices are turned off or students do not use them**. If your student is found with an electronic device or is found using Bluetooth/wireless headphones/earbuds during testing, his or her test will be invalidated.
- Testing Rules Acknowledgment—All tests include a Testing Rules Acknowledgment that reads: "I understand the testing rules that were just read to me. If I do not follow these rules, my test score may be invalidated." Prior to testing, test administrators read the rules to students, and students acknowledge that they understand the testing rules by clicking a checkbox beside the statement in the secure browser indicating they understand the testing rules.
- Discussing Test Content after Testing—The last portion of the testing rules read to students before they click the box to accept the Testing Rules Acknowledgment states that because the content of all statewide assessments is secure, students may not discuss or reveal details about the test content (including the passages, prompts, and writing responses) after the test. This includes any type of electronic communication, such as texting, emailing, or posting to social media sites. Please make sure your student understands this policy prior to testing and remind them that "discussing" test content includes any kind of electronic communication, such as texting, emailing, posting to social media, or sharing online. While students may not share information about secure test content after testing, this policy is not intended to prevent students from discussing their testing experiences with their parents/families.
- Working Independently—Students are responsible for doing their own work during the test and for protecting their answers from being seen by others. If students are caught cheating during testing, their tests will be invalidated. In addition, the Florida Department of Education (FDOE) employs Caveon Test Security to analyze student test results to detect unusually similar answer patterns. Student tests within a school that are found to have extremely similar answer patterns will be invalidated.
- Leaving Campus—If your student leaves campus before completing a test session (e.g., for lunch, an appointment), he or she will not be allowed to return to that test session. If your student does not feel well on the day of testing, it may be best for him or her to wait and be tested on a make-up day. Please remember not to schedule appointments on testing days.
- **Testing Accommodations**—If your student has an Individual Education Plan (IEP), a Section 504 Plan, or is an English Language Learner (ELL) or a recently exited ELL, please contact the school to discuss the testing accommodations that will be provided for your student.

Essay Prompt: "Why I Want to Be an Astronaut"

- Imagine the vast expanse of space stretching out before you, the Earth a small, fragile orb amidst the infinite darkness. Now, consider the extraordinary individuals who venture into this unknown territory, exploring the cosmos beyond our planet's atmosphere. As a student, you have the opportunity to ponder your future and the potential paths it might take. Reflect on why you would want to embark on the awe-inspiring journey of becoming an astronaut.
- Consider the following questions as you craft your response:
 - What is it about space exploration that captivates your imagination?
 - How do you envision contributing to humanity's understanding of the universe as an astronaut?
 - What personal qualities and skills that you possess, or aspire to develop, which would make you well-suited for the challenges of space travel?
 - Describe a moment or experience in your life that inspired your interest in space exploration and ignited your desire to pursue a career as an astronaut?
 - How do you believe advancements in space technology and exploration will impact life on Earth, and what role do you envision playing in shaping this future?
- Essay should be 500 words or less. Can be handwritten or typed.
- Responses should be original, thoughtful, persuasive, and demonstrating a deep understanding of the challenges and rewards that come with venturing beyond the confines of our planet.

Essay Rubric: "Why I Want to Be an Astronaut"

- Content and Understanding
 - Addresses all aspects of the prompt comprehensively.
 - o Demonstrates a clear understanding of the significance of space exploration.
 - Provides specific examples and details to support points.
- Passion and Motivation
 - o Conveys genuine enthusiasm and passion for space exploration.
 - o Articulates compelling reasons for wanting to become an astronaut.
 - o Shows a strong personal connection to the subject matter.
- Relevance and Clarity
 - o Maintains focus on the main topic throughout the essay.
 - o Presents ideas in a logical and organized manner.
 - Writing is clear, concise, and free from excessive jargon.
- Innovative Thinking and Creativity
 - o Demonstrates originality in ideas and perspectives.
 - o Offers creative insights into the future of space exploration.
 - o Utilizes imaginative approaches to address challenges and opportunities in space.
- Personal Reflection and Connection
 - Reflects on personal experiences and influences that sparked interest in space exploration.
 - Establishes a strong connection between personal values/aspirations and the astronaut career path.
 - Engages the reader through compelling anecdotes or reflections.
- Grammar, Style, and Mechanics
 - o Demonstrates proficiency in grammar, punctuation, and spelling.
 - Exhibits a consistent writing style appropriate for the academic context.
 - o Uses language effectively to convey ideas and evoke imagery.

Scoring:

- Excellent (5): Essay excels in all aspects, demonstrating exceptional insight, passion, and clarity.
- Proficient (4): Essay meets expectations across all criteria with solid content and presentation.
- Competent (3): Essay adequately addresses the prompt but may lack depth or coherence in some areas.
- Developing (2): Essay demonstrates basic understanding but lacks depth or clear organization.
- Insufficient (1): Essay does not effectively address the prompt or lacks coherence and clarity.
