ATTENDANCE

- 9 days per semester
- Doctor, religious, and court absences do not count against your 9 days per semester.
- When absent, submit letter to Ms. Elliott in attendance.
- Absences are counted per period/NOT by the day.
- Dual Enrollment, FLVS, & Collegiate HS students must sign in and out of attendance when entering or leaving the campus.

Arrival

Once you have arrived on campus you may not leave without permission. This includes going across the street to Publix, Wendy's, etc. for food.

Breakfast is available in the cafeteria by 8:15 a.m. for all students.

TARDY REFERRALS

Tardies will result in the following disciplinary action from administration:

Detentions

- Detentions will be held in the cafeteria on Thursdays.
- Students will be expected to bring school work or a book to read.
- You must be on time by reporting to the cafeteria no later than 3:45 p.m.

LOCKER ROOMS, LOCKERS

- Keep your items with you at all times.
- If you can't take it with you, keep it in your locker.
- Make sure your locker is locked and secure (don't just make it "look" like it is locked).
- Do not leave your valuables unattended especially in the locker rooms.
- Do not share a locker.
- Nothing is to be left on the floor or it will be taken.

CAFETERIA

- Keep lines orderly and do NOT cut in line.
- Remain in the assigned area during lunch.
- Please clean up after yourselves, don't leave trash on the table.
- Students are NOT to leave campus during lunch.



- Students are NOT to be on campus during class time without a hall pass.
- Running out quickly before class to go to your locker or restroom will result in a tardy pass if the bell rings and you are not in your assigned area.
- Always ask for a pass before leaving the classroom.

PUBLIC AFFECTION

Students who continue to engage in public affection after being warned will be sent to the dean's office for appropriate consequences.

DRESS CODE

- Specific Guidelines:
 - ► Head
 - No hats, curlers, or bandanas are to be worn in the buildings or hallways.
 - No hats visible on campus
 - Hair styles that are disruptive are prohibited.

Upper Garments

- A. Garments must be of length and fit that are suitable to the build and stature of the student and must NOT expose undergarments.
- ► B. Strapless garments are prohibited.
- C. Low-cut necklines are prohibited.
- D. Excessively large or baggy clothes shall not be worn.
- E. Upper garments must cover the waistline and NOT expose the midriff.



- A. Pants shall conform to the build and stature of the student, shall be worn at the waist.
- B. Pants shall not have holes or rips that are considered immodest.
- C. Shorts must have a clearly discernible inseam and <u>completely cover</u> the buttocks of the student.
- D. Dresses and skirts must reach mid-thigh or below.

Accessories

- A. Clothing, jewelry, and accessories shall not convey messages that are: crude; vulgar; profane; violent; death-oriented; gangrelated; sexually suggestive, or promote alcohol, drugs, or tobacco.
- B. Students may wear piercings that are modest and do not distract others. Piercings that connect one part of the body to another are prohibited. Dog collars, wallet chains, large hair picks, or chains are prohibited.

CELL PHONES, ELECTRONIC DEVICES

Students may use electronic devices before school, during class change, and during your lunch break while in the cafeteria and outside in the commons area.

Cell phones must be turned OFF and out of SIGHT during class time.

CELL PHONES AND ASSESSMENTS

- During <u>all</u> assessments, campus-wide, students will be required to turn their cell phones off and place them in a caddy.
- This caddy will be located in a safe and secure location in the classroom and will be visible to students.
- Refusal to do so will result in an administrative intervention which will result in an immediate ISS or OSS consequence.

Think filming others is fun

Any student caught <u>filming other students or events on</u> <u>campus</u> with a cell phone or other electronic device :

- First offense two days suspension
- 30 day revocation of cell phone privileges on campus

Posting fights on social media:

- Three days suspension
- Student not allowed to bring cell phone to school for rest of year
- Automatic suspension if you are caught with <u>any cell</u> phone for the remainder of the year

- End of Course Exam Passing score on Algebra 1 EOC
 - * Any student who does not score a Level 3 on the FCAT/FSA in reading/language arts must take Intensive Language Arts Remediation.
