American author William Faulkner once said, "Read, read read. Read everything -- trash, classics, good and bad, and see how they do it. Just like a carpenter who works as an apprentice and studies the master. Read! You'll absorb it." In his career, Faulkner published 13 novels, many short stories, and won the Nobel Prize for Literature, so he knows a little something about reading and writing. And while he spoke these words more than 60 years ago, his point is just as valid today (maybe even more so) than it was then.

Our world has become so technology dependent in recent years that many of us are so busy listening and watching that we are no longer reading...anything. When we want the news, we listen to the news anchors or turn on the radio. When we want to figure out how to fix something, we watch a YouTube video. When we want to chat with friends, we FaceTime them.

Reading books and longer articles is one of the

best ways to learn how to think critically, understand complex issues, and separate fact from fiction. And, research has shown that

- 6 minutes of reading can reduce stress by two-thirds
- Readers are 28% less likely to suffer from depression
- Elderly people who read regularly can reduce their risk of developing Alzheimer's by 2.5 times over non-readers.

Words are so important in our society, and in order to harness the power of our words, we need to read. As Tom Stoppard, a British playwright, said, "Words are sacred. They deserve respect. If you can get the right ones, in the right order, you can nudge the world a little." So, try to add a few minutes of reading to your day - everyday. And it doesn't matter what you read - just take the time to do it.

Why Do I Have To Learn This?

"Why do I have to learn this?" and "When will I ever use this?" are two questions commonly asked by students of their teachers. And while many students want teachers to provide a specific example of when they might use the information a teacher is providing, the truth is that there isn't usually one specific example that fits as the answer to most of these questions. Much of what you are learning right now in your classes is meant to develop skills that you can use in a variety of situations in the future.



Regardless of what you think your future profession may be, you will at some point be required to problem solve, work with others, be flexible, try again after failing on your first attempt to fix something, and communicate with others. While you may think that learning physics has nothing to do with your plan to open your own business, keep in mind that it is estimated that most people will have 12 jobs during their lifetime and that on average, college students change their major at least 3 times. So, those lessons you think are irrelevant right now might become really important to you in the future.

And now, as you sit in each of your classes, stop focusing on a specific instance when you might use the exact piece of information you are learning, and instead consider how you might use the skills you are developing (and often don't even realize) through the learning of this material. For example, while being able to complete a proof in geometry might seem pointless to you right now, consider how proofs require thinking. You start with a problem and you work step-by-step to arrive at a conclusion. In doing this, you are learning how to think logically and how to take various things you know to be true and use them to solve problems that are unlike anything you've ever encountered before.

Shift your mindset about learning and begin to think about all the valuable skills you are developing. Class discussions help build communication skills. Group projects foster your ability to work with others. Essays allow you to present ideas in a logical, coherent manner. Instead of asking "Why?" start saying "Why Not!" According to the 2023 World Economic Forum's Future of Jobs report the most important skills for workers to have are

- 1. analytical thinking
- 2. creative thinking
- 3. resilience, flexibility, & agility
- 4. motivation & self-awareness
- 5. curiosity & lifelong learning
- 6. technological literacy
- 7. dependability & attention to detail
- 8. empathy & active listening
- 9. leadership & social influence
- 10. quality control



Official Cambridge AICE Certificates are In!

Students who took and passed a pre-AICE or AICE exam in the May/June 2023 testing session at RHS, will receive an official certificate to document their scores. This certificate, which looks like the example one on the left, is the ONLY copy of this document that students will receive. RHS does not get a copy for its records.

Mrs. Matthews has already handed out many of these certificates to current RHS students and will continue handing them out in the coming week. Class of 2023 graduates and early admitted students can pick up their certificates from the RHS guidance office during regular school hours.

We recommend that students put these certificates in a safe location where they can be accessed as needed in the future.



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

My Four Kids Went Through the College Application Process: What I Learned

When you have four children, you can pretty much guarantee that you'll have four different experiences for every situation. Somehow, at first, I didn't appreciate that this fundamental truth would also apply to the college application process. After all, I knew what I knew; my children's father and I had taken a pretty linear approach to our college careers — we graduated from high school, went on to college, and then to law school. Our paths were pretty direct.

As parents to teens, though, we soon realized that what worked for us wouldn't necessarily, nor should it, work for our kids. The college application process, in addition to being a learning experience for us all in a technical sense, would become more of a journey of self-exploration for our family.

7 things I learned about the college application process

I'll start here: the college application wasn't like this when I was a kid. I mean, seriously, I used a typewriter to complete my applications. There was no Common App. No Naviance. Just a Barron's book and a few chats with the guidance counselor during school hours. This? This process today? It's mind-boggling, which is why I learned fast that micromanaging the process would get me nowhere.

1. Your teen knows more than you do - Maybe it's because I'm "old." Maybe because I'm not a techie and know when to let someone else take the computer reigns. Whatever the reason, I got the memo that my teens knew more about the college admissions process than either (1) they let on that they did and (2) I gave them credit. Like anything else, when a person, including my children, was motivated, they did their homework.

2. Teens know what they want and what's good for them more than

you think - So when a teen isn't "into" the college application process, the beginning of this next step in their evolution, not just their education, take heed. Ask them, "Hey, what's up? Is everything OK? How are you feeling about the college application process? Is there anything you'd like to talk about because I'm always here to listen." These are important questions to ask because it might very well be that your child *is* excited about what's to come but is also really nervous, understandably.



3. Your teen's already stressed enough - Don't ratchet up the stress more by burdening them with *your* vision of *their* future. As I said earlier, your teens, as did mine, had a very strong picture of what they wanted, and, unknown to me at the time, college wasn't one hundred percent part of that plan for all of my kids. As it stood, I sent one off to college to play football, but after one semester, he told me he'd be much happier enlisting and becoming a Marine. So, he did.

He found his passion, and no, it didn't include a college degree, at least for now. The same was true for his younger brother, who realized that he'd be much happier using his self-taught technical skills elsewhere after starting an engineering program.

These are expensive lessons to learn once you've paid admission and room and board for a teen who isn't sure, so begin having those conversations before you start.

4. College is super expensive - Long before you begin paying for tuition, room and board, books, and travel expenses, you'll find that the entire college application process, from start to finish, is pricey. Even more so if you hire a private college advisor who, by the way, doesn't know your teen like you do or how your teen knows themself. Even if you hire the best, most well-intentioned private college advisor, keep in mind that they cannot know what your child or you, for that matter, aren't telling them. They're not mind readers or fortune tellers, after all.

5. Your child will wind up where they belong (at least right now) - Yes, that's right. You, me, our teens, we all live in the present. Not the past. Not the future. The situation we're in and the circumstances we have are what we have to work with right now. Remember, the college application process is a time for exploration, not absolutes.

6. If the college your teen chooses turns out not to be a good fit, transferring can be an option - I've met many parents of kids who got to their dream school, and it wasn't what they hoped for or expected. Or the school was, but socially, they didn't find their way. So they gave the college application process another look, decided to give transferring a go, and had an entirely different experience the second time around.

Life lesson: our choices don't always work out, and figuring out how to bounce will undoubtedly be one of the most important lessons a person can learn. And, shock of all shocks, it's a lesson that isn't learned in a classroom.

7. Gap years are wonderful opportunities for growth - Gap years have become more popular than they were when I was growing up, and I wish they had been. Having the opportunity to explore the country, travel abroad, work, and find your passion becomes more challenging as you go through life having heavy obligations: a spouse, children, a mortgage, bills, a demanding job, and pets.

Not until you are an empty nester and retired will you know such freedom again, but it won't be the same; you'll look at your newfound freedom with a different set of eyes. This isn't bad, but it is different from having a world of experiences in front of you as you move into adulthood.

8. College is only one stop on your teen's path to adulthood - Neither college admissions nor a college degree can make you an adult. Tuning 18 won't do it either. However, learning to advocate for yourself and make decisions that serve you will help.

With all of its twists and turns, the college application process can give your child their first glimpse at independence if you allow it to.

Letting go of your child is part of your learning, too. The best part of the college application process is the opportunity you and your child have before you to learn about yourselves.



TEST YOUR AICE KNOWLEDGE

Check out these options from a previous AICE Psychology test and see if you could answer these questions.

Steve is planning an experiment, using the technique of observation, to compare the level of frustration shown by shoppers in different types of shops. He has set up cameras to help measure the behaviour of shoppers in shops selling basic goods (things that are essential) and shops selling luxury goods (things that are not essential).

Steve is concerned that situational variables could be a problem in his study. (i) Suggest two situational variables that could affect Steve's study. (worth 2 points) (ii) Explain how each of the situational variables that you suggested in (a)(i) could be a problem in Steve's study. (worth 4 points)

Answers:

(i) 1 point for a relevant situational variable up to 2 (No points for participant variables). Examples: How busy the shop is / how many customers there are; How many staff there are; The music playing

(ii) 1 point for explanation of situational variable + 1 point for detail x 2. Example for how busy the shop is / how many customers there are: Being crowded may make the shoppers frustrated (explanation); This is important because if there is a difference it is due to crowds rather than the type of shop (detail)
