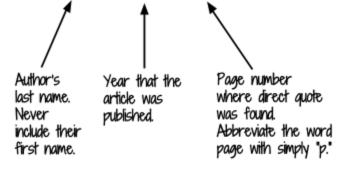
For use in citing nonfiction/informational texts

APA parenthetical citations include the following separated by commas:

- → Author's last name
- → Year of publication
- → Page number (when citing a direct quote)

Example: "Today, scientists know that volcanoes can have a major impact on weather worldwide" (**Tarshis, 2014, p. 24**).

★ Unknown author? Cite the source by its TITLE. Write out the ENTIRE title when using it in the sentence starter, but only use the first word or two in a parenthetical citation.



PROVE IT with evidence

Evidence is critical in writing to show your reasoning. Here are some ways for you to include evidence into your writing.

	→	According to the text,

CITE YOUR TEXTUAL EVIDENCE CORRECTLY

Name the author in the sentence starter.

- → According to **Tarshis (2014)**, "Most volcanic clouds quickly dissipate, but Pinatubo's eruption cloud rose so high that it mixed with water and gases in the stratosphere" (p. 22).
 - ◆ The author's **last name** should come <u>BEFORE</u> the direct quote.
 - ◆ Include the **year published** right after the author's name in parentheses.
 - ◆ At the end of the direct quote, include the **page** number in parentheses followed by the period.

Name the author in the parenthetical citation.

- → In the text it states, "Most volcanic clouds quickly dissipate, but Pinatubo's eruption cloud rose so high that it mixed with water and gases in the stratosphere" (Tarshis, 2014, p. 22).
 - ◆ After the direct quote and before the period, add the author's last name, year of publication and page number in parentheses.

Are you quoting something directly from the text? Word for word?

Then give the author credit by making it a DIRECT QUOTE and putting it in quotations!
