# Advanced Placement (AP) Program

The College Board's Advanced Placement program is a nationwide program consisting of over 30 college-level courses and exams in subjects ranging from art to statistics offered at participating high schools. Students earning a "qualifying" grade on an AP exam can earn college credit or advanced placement for their efforts.

According to the College Board, "...More than 2,900 universities and colleges worldwide grant credit, advanced placement, or both to students who have performed satisfactorily on the exams, and approximately 1,400 institutions grand sophomore standing to students who have demonstrated their competence in three or more of these exams."

Studies have shown that students, who complete a solid academic core, including advanced courses, are more likely to be successful in college. Many school counselors have found that AP courses provide the challenging content necessary to engage all types of learners.

#### **AP Exams**

Given in May (free of charge) to students who enrolled in an AP course during the school year. Students must earn a 3 or better on a scale from 1-5 to earn college credit. (Check individual college and universities websites for which courses and scores are required to give college credit.)

## **AP Diplomas**

## **Brevard Public Schools AP Diploma**

Granted to students who have taken and passed (score of 3 or higher on exam with a passing grade in the course) a minimum of 6 full-year AP courses (six credits) or a combination of full-year courses and semester courses totaling six credits chosen from three different subject areas of the six subject areas listed (Language/Literature, Social Science, Math, Science, Humanities, Capstone)

## **College Board Capstone Diploma**

Granted to students who have taken and passed a minimum of 6 full-year AP courses (six credits) or a combination of full-year courses and semester courses totaling six credits from any discipline, with AP Seminar and AP Research being two of the courses taken.

## **College Board Awards**

AP Scholar - must score 3 or higher on three or more AP Exams

<u>AP Scholar with Honor</u> – must score at least 3.25 on all AP Exams taken AND score 3 or higher on four or more of these exams.

<u>AP Scholar with Distinction</u> – must score at least 3.5 on all AP Exams taken AND score 3 or higher on five or more of these exams.

<u>State AP Scholar</u> – granted to one male and one female student in each US state and the District of Columbia with scores of 3 or higher on the greatest number of AP Exams, AND THEN the highest average score (at least 3.5) on all AP Exams Taken

<u>National AP Scholar</u> – granted to students in the U.S. who receive an average score of at least 4 on all AP Exams taken, AND scores of 4 or higher on eight or more of these exams.
