

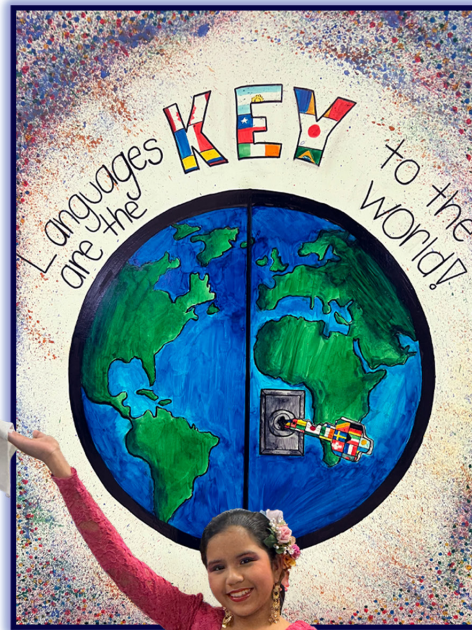

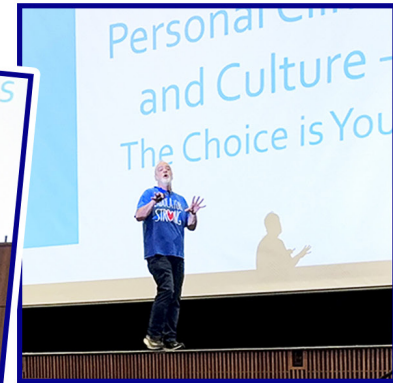


Superintendent's Conference Day

For the afternoon session, staff came together as a unified group at the Hauppauge High School auditorium for an icebreaker with Dr. Murphy, to applaud this year's recipients of the Superintendent's Eagle Award, and listen to this year's keynote speaker Gerry Brooks.

The Superintendent's Eagle Award was created to recognize employees who demonstrate unwavering dedication to the District and Hauppauge Community. Hauppauge Breaks Ground on Tennis Courts and Practice Field as Part of Bond Improvements



As part of the 2023 bond, the Hauppauge School District is excited to announce the commencement of construction on new tennis courts and a grass practice field at Hauppauge High School. Construction officially began with the removal of old soils and tennis courts, followed by the installation of drainage systems. Work is currently underway with compaction and grading around the courts and field, and trenching for lighting conduits is nearing completion.

The tennis court construction began in February and is expected to be completed by May 2025, with the courts slated for use in June 2025.

As spring approaches, construction will also begin on new handball, volleyball and basketball courts at Hauppauge Middle School.

Phase two of construction is scheduled to begin in the summer of 2025 and will include the installation of two synthetic turf fields, enhancements to the baseball and softball fields, the renovation of the science research room and the construction of an exterior security booth with access gates at Hauppauge High School. Additionally, baseball and softball field upgrades will take place at the middle school, along with districtwide masonry repairs, HVAC upgrades and classroom door and hardware replacements.

The district thanks the community for their continued support as we work to enhance our schools for the benefit of students, staff and the entire community.

Hauppauge Middle School Celebrates World Languages Week



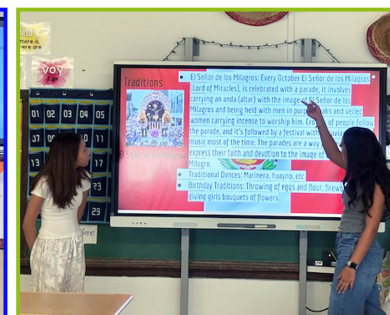
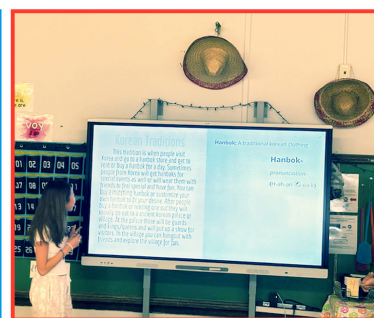

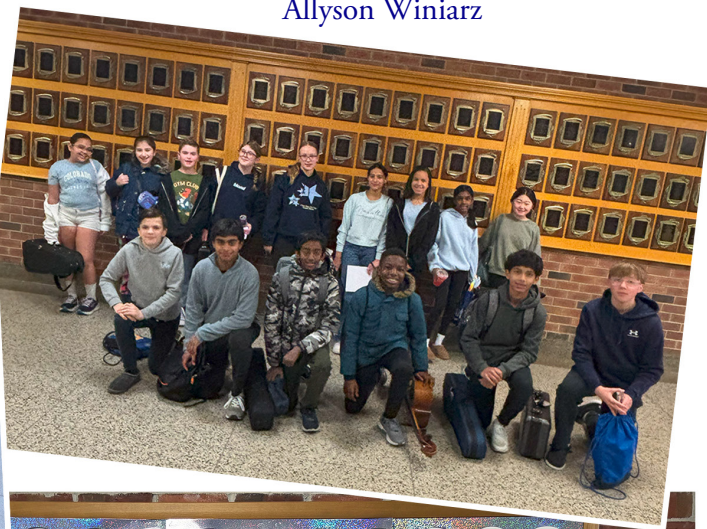
Hauppauge Students Shine at SCMEA All-County Festival

Hauppauge Codin' Eagles Threepeat as L.I. Junior Code Conquest Champions!

On Friday, March 21st, the Hauppauge Codin' Eagles secured their third consecutive Junior Division championship at the 7th Annual Long Island Code Conquest Jr. Hackathon, held at Hauppauge Middle School. *This victory also marked the team's fifth consecutive championship overall, including their wins in the 6th-grade division in 2022 and 2021.*

Led by captain Ishaan Maheshkumar, the team included 8th graders Nicole Dorsey, Bruce Langlois, and Jake Catania, and seventh graders Tyler Lee, Pranav Ramkumar, Aditri Arun, Alex Mariani, Blake Benway, and Jackson Schwartz. Together, they outperformed 12 other schools to claim the trophy with the help of proud coaches Brian Ferrara and Amy Thompson who guided the team through weeks of preparation. When asked about the performance of the team, Coach Thompson said, "The energy and dedication from our team were unmatched. Each member brought their unique strengths to the table, and together, they pushed through challenges, collaborated seamlessly, and ultimately crushed it. The commitment and teamwork displayed throughout the hackathon were truly inspiring—proving that when we come together, we can achieve anything."

The Code Conquest Jr. Hackathon is an annual coding competition where seventh and eighth grade students from across Long Island use their skills in Python, Scratch, HTML, and Piskel to conquer territories on a map and score points. According to Hauppauge Director of CTE Digital Learning and Innovation Leslie Brophy, "the Hackathon showcases collaboration as schools come together, each contributing their unique strengths while competing against one another." This year's map was titled "Code Conquest: Mongolian Conquest," which focused on the era of Genghis Khan and Mongolian culture.

A total of 374 programs were created during the three-hour competition in an attempt to control the 24 territories on the map. Hauppauge ended the day with 16 points, capturing 8 territories, including 3 two-point territories, and defeating the Capital Defense Projects (CDPs) of 3 other teams. The team's strategic approach was evident, as they held off map attacks until the final moments, allowing them to surge to first place with less than 15 minutes remaining in the competition. "I was happy to see all the time and energy spent preparing pay off for the team," said



Coach Ferrara. “Their ability to stay the course and stick to the team strategy, even when it felt like we were falling behind was impressive. I am very proud of the team effort.” This year, there was a single auto-gate worth one point that teams had to complete to unlock the two-point territories. Hauppauge was one of seven teams to get through the auto-gate, which was crucial for unlocking the more valuable territories.

Hauppauge’s success was built on teamwork and effective strategy. The team adopted the “Turn the Map Blue” approach, waiting until the final moments of the competition to make their move. This tactic paid off, and every member of the team contributed to the victory. Some standout performances included:

Nicole Dorsey, *who won two Sprite Editor territories with an incredible still life drawing of a Snow Leopard and an animated Falcon.*

Tyler Lee, *who secured two territories with Hatch programs about Mongolian Ankle Bone Shooting and Mongolian Hunting.*

Pranav Ramkumar, *who created a survival game in Python where players must survive the harsh Mongolian winter, and a Hatch program simulating the Mongolian Yam system of message delivery.*

Jake Catania, *who captured a territory with a game where the player is a scientist in a 13th Century Observatory making a groundbreaking discovery.*

Alex Mariani, *who won a territory by creating a game where the player collects armor pieces to prepare for battle as a Mongolian Warrior.*

Aditri Arun and Ishaan Maheshkumar, *who worked together to complete the auto-gate quiz - both also secured CDP territories, telling the story of the team’s journey in Hatch and HTML respectively.*


Bruce Langlois, *who created the program that unlocked the auto-gate, allowing the team to capture valuable two-point territories.*

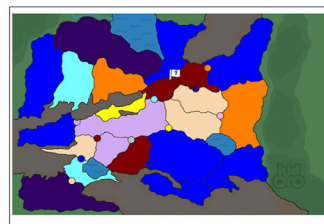

It was a great day for Hauppauge, as the school also served as the host of the competition for a third straight year. They once again did a phenomenal job thanks to the efforts of Leslie Brophy, Steve Swanson, Michael Koehler, Stewart Henry, Laurie O’Keefe, Annamaria Isernio, and the rest of the IT Team, and the custodial staff, buildings and grounds, and the security staff. The coaches and members of the Codin’ Eagles appreciated being able to compete on their home turf again and wanted to give a big thank you to all involved, as well as the kidOYO team for organizing the annual event and the kidOYO mentors who judged all the project submissions, for making sure the event went off without a hitch. This would not have been possible without their dedication and expertise.

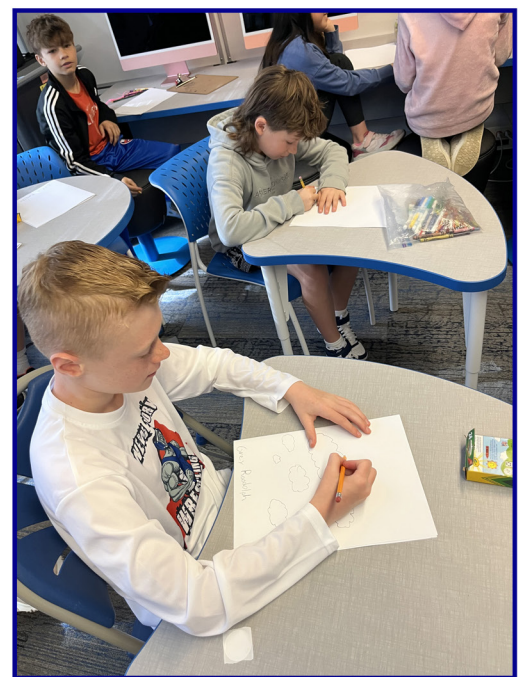


Bretton Woods Students Go On a Storytelling Journey

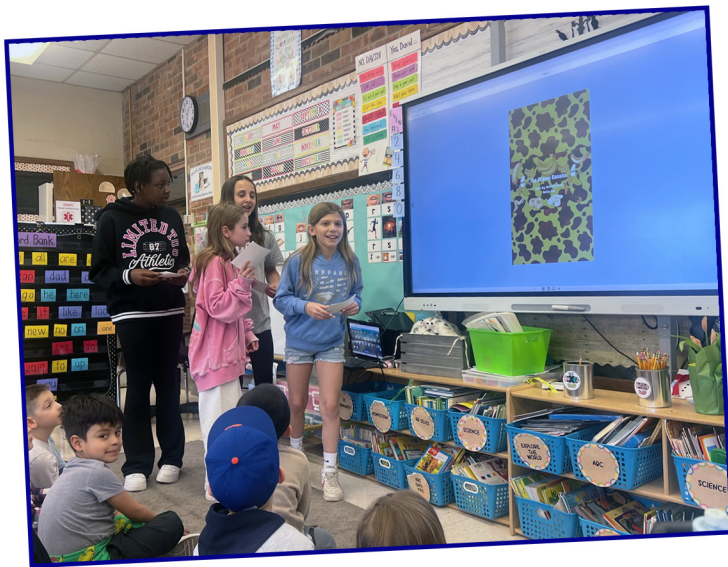


Bretton Woods 5th Graders Share Stories and Spread Kindness

The teachers plan to continue this inter-grade activity throughout the year, fostering a sense of community and mentorship among the students.



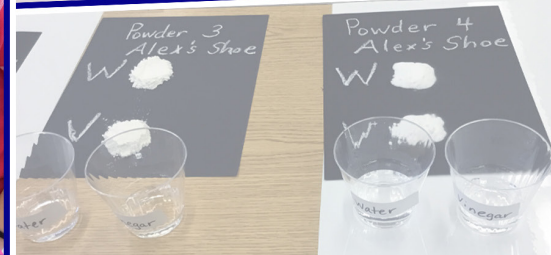
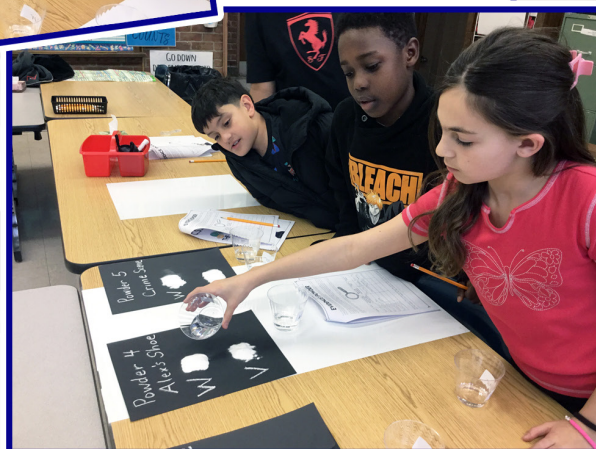
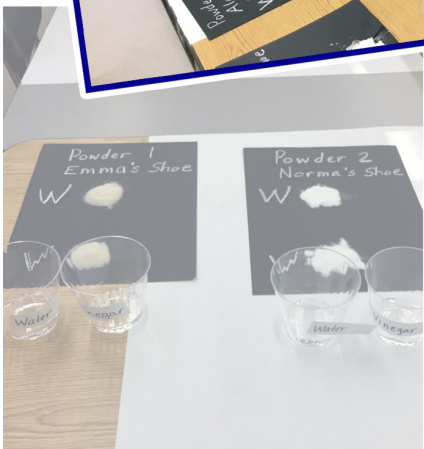
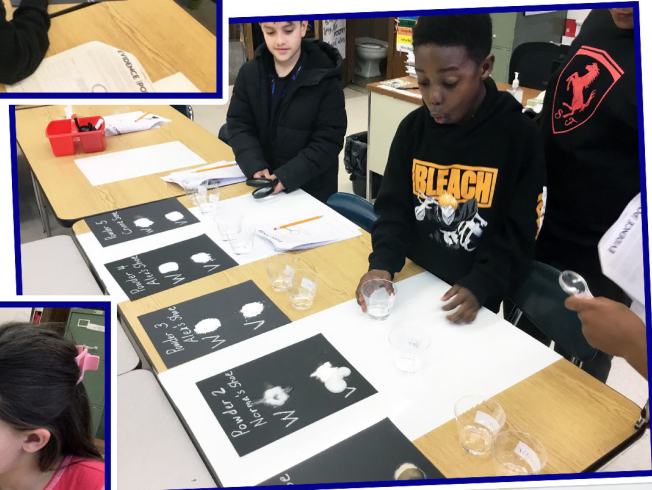
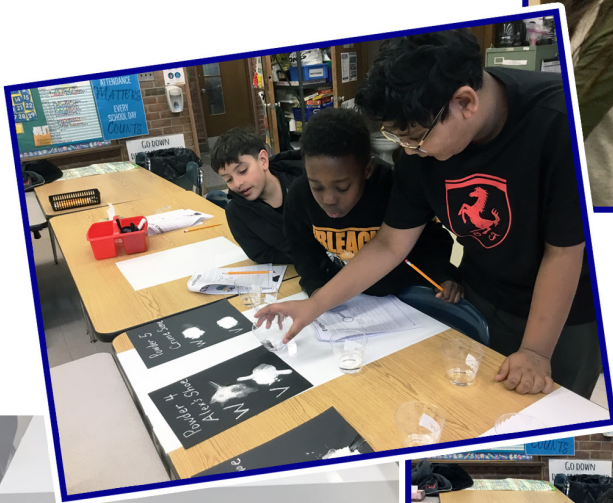
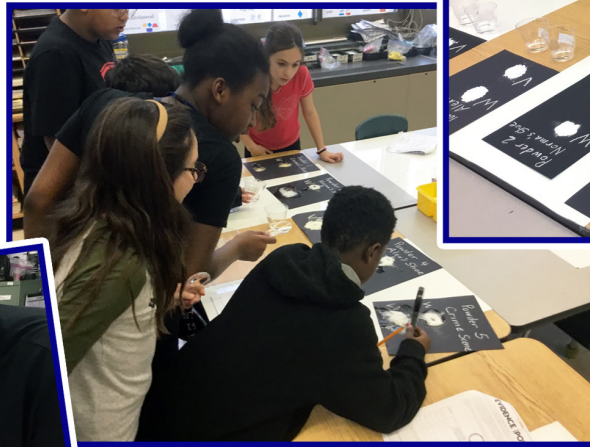
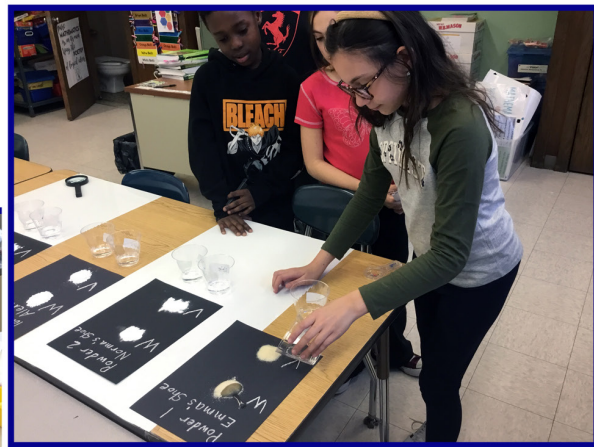
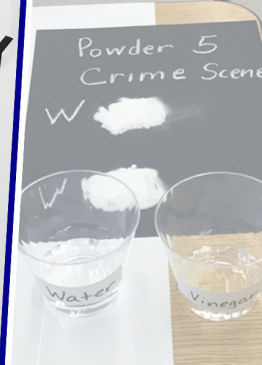
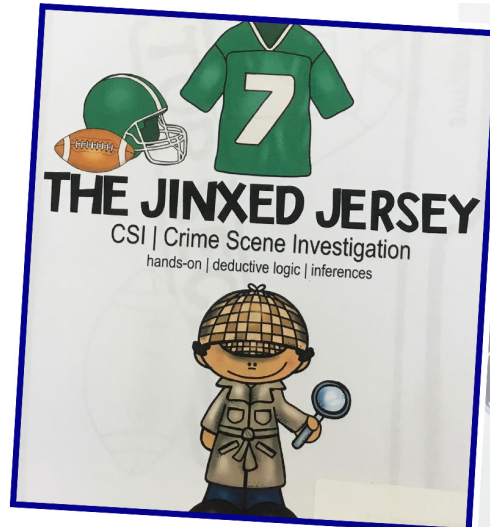
The Bretton Woods Forensics Students Are Busy Solving Their Next Case!
