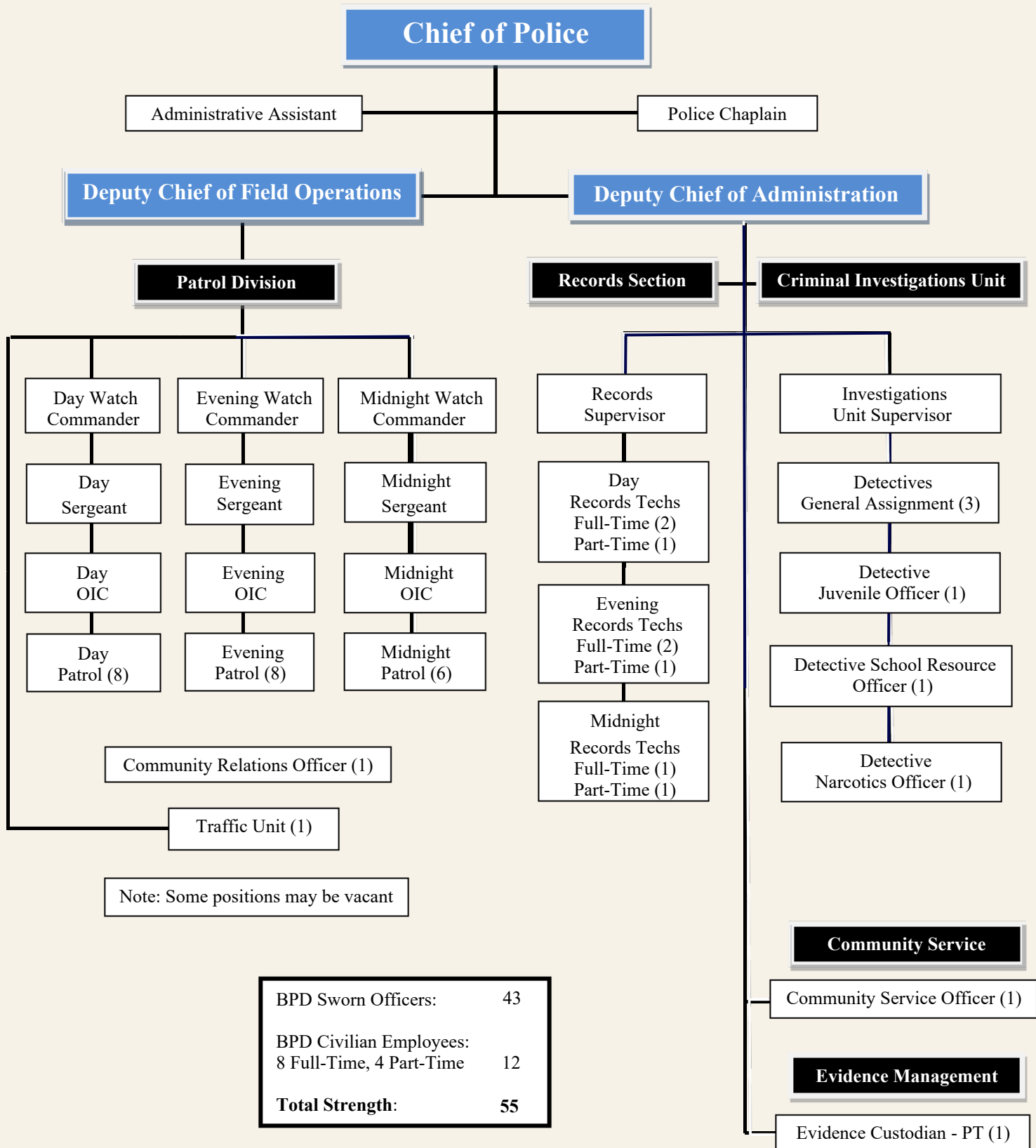

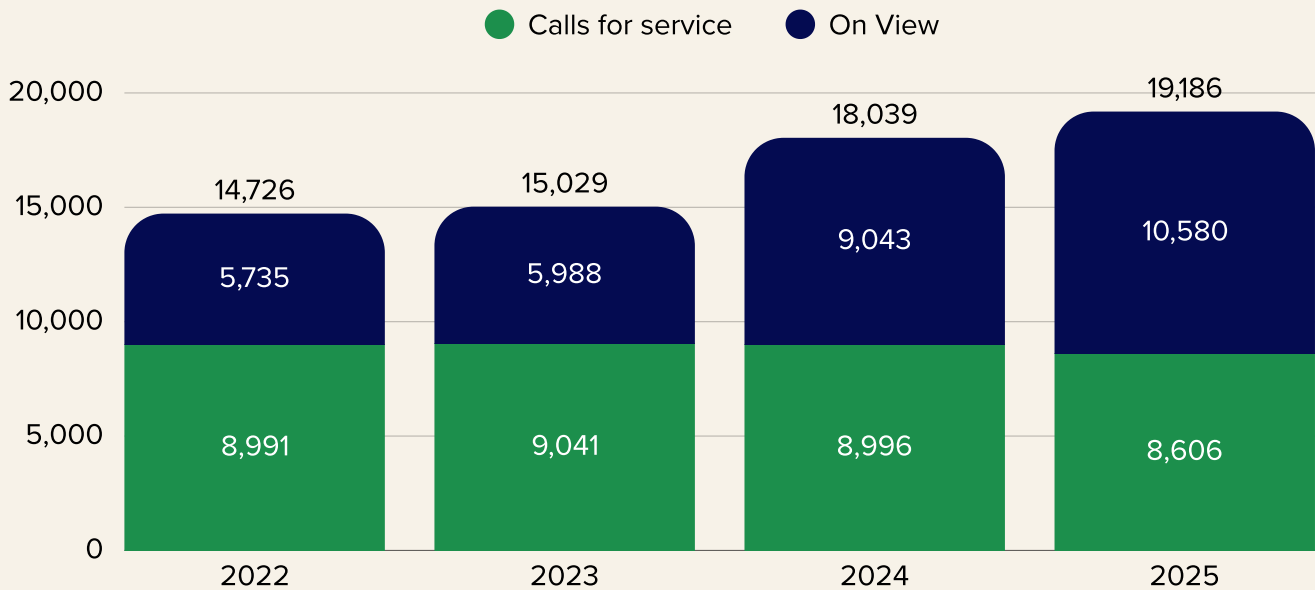

Calls For Service in 2025

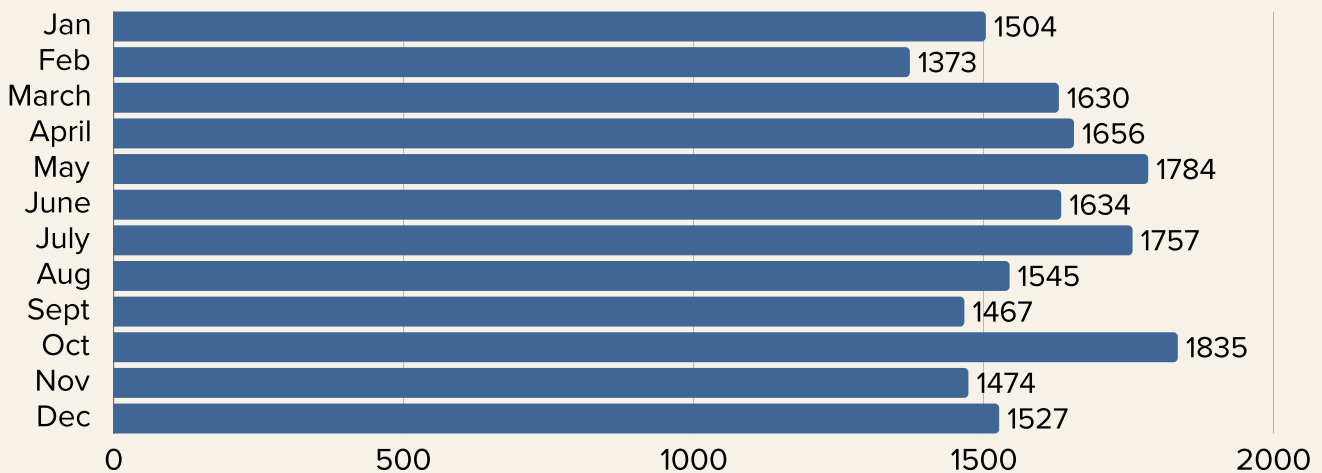


The department responded to 8,606 calls for service in 2025. Another 10,580 calls were initiated by officers pursuant to on-view traffic offenses, business checks, and the investigation of suspicious activity. The total number of calls handled in 2025 was 19,186. This number represents a 6.3% increase in the total number of calls handled by Batavia Police Officers in 2025 when compared to the preceding year.

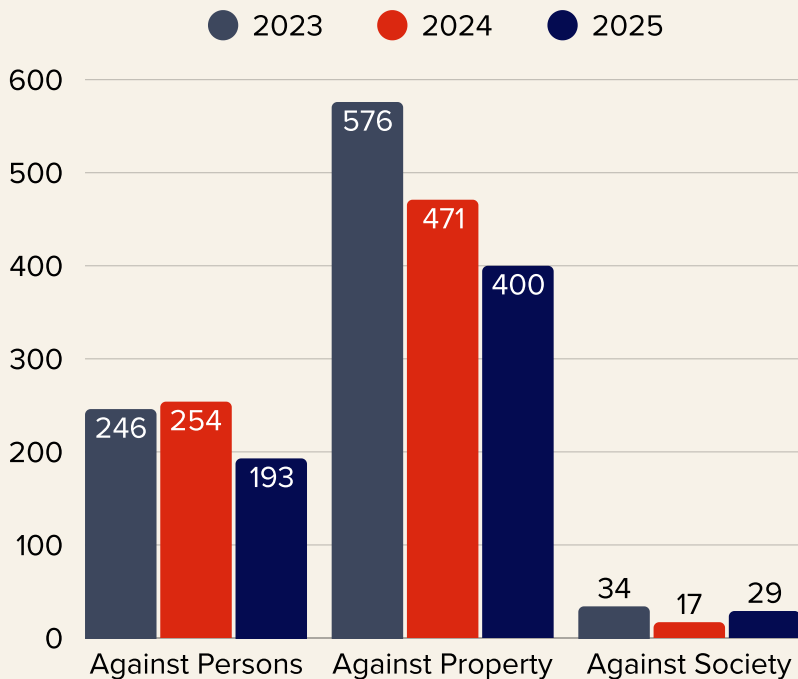

Criminal Activity Type By Year

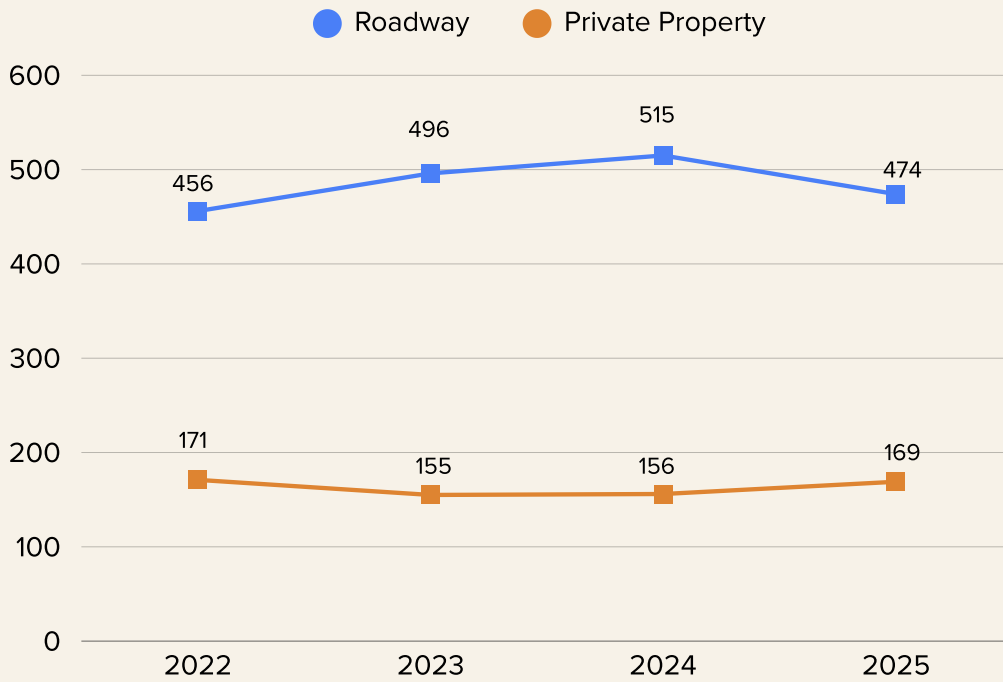

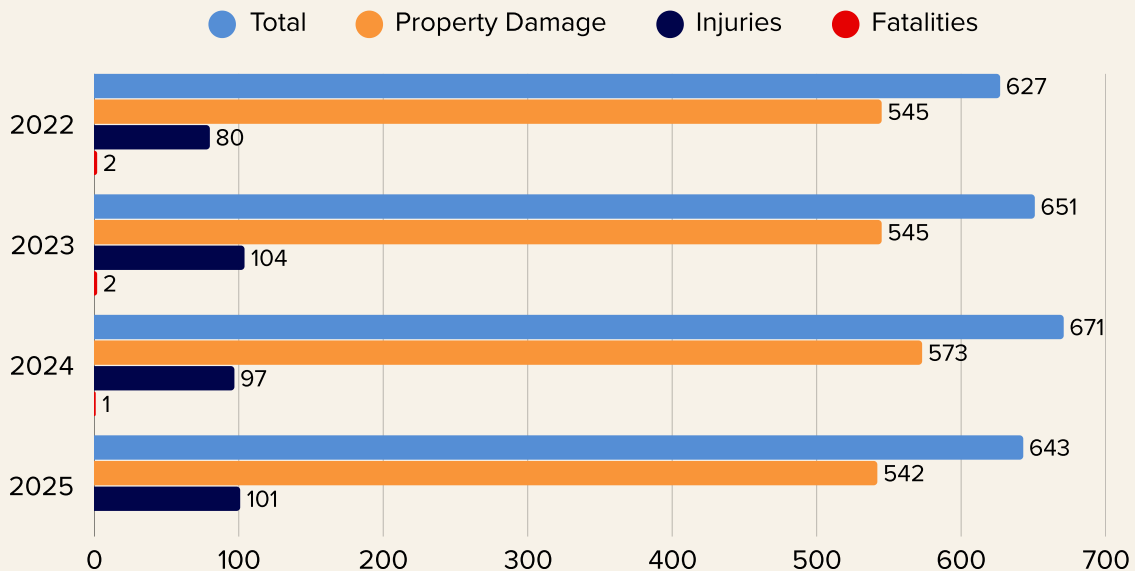
Traffic Crashes in 2025



Traffic Crashes By Year



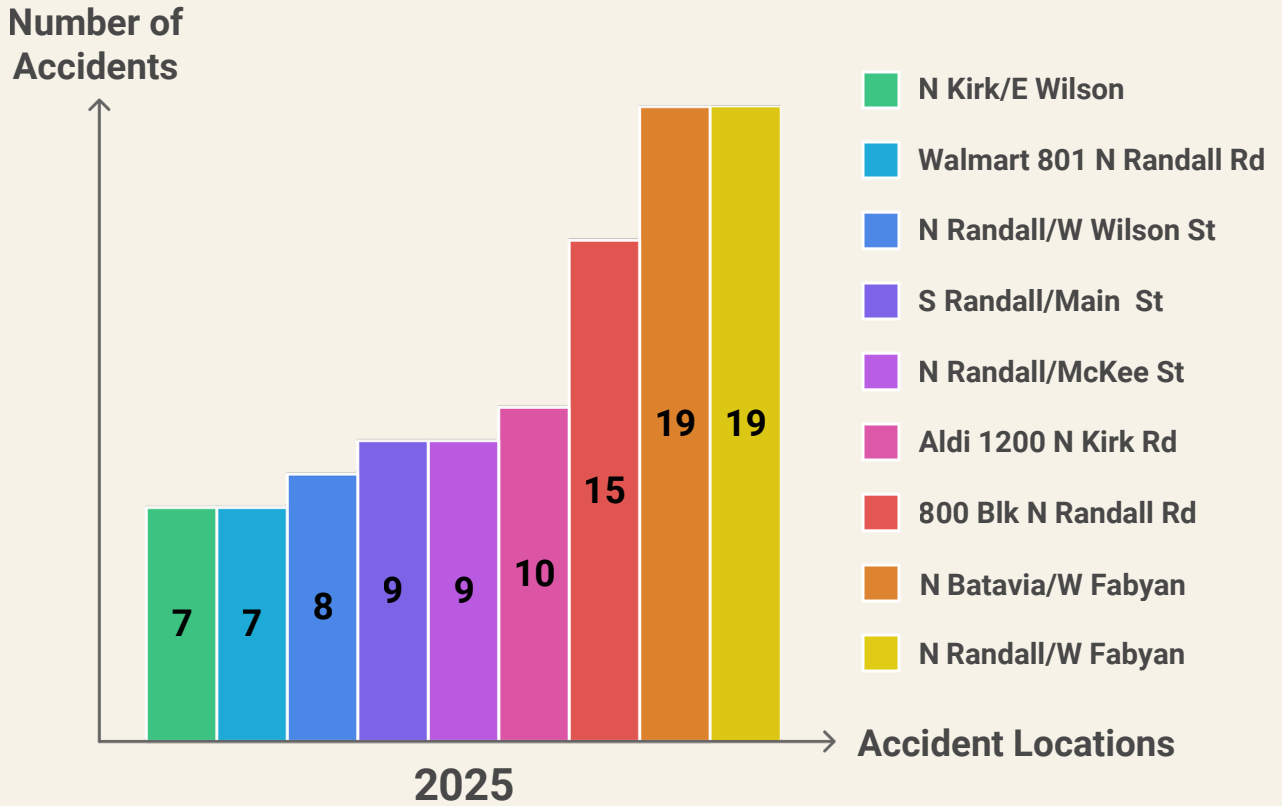
Traffic Crash Types By Year



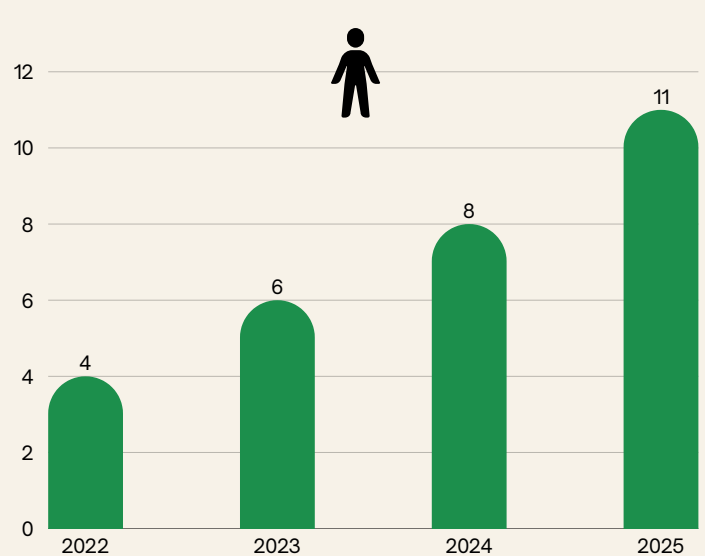
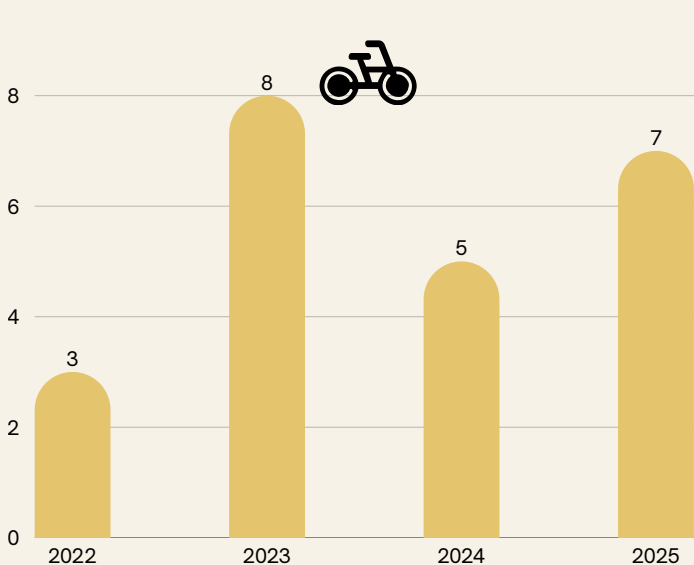
Traffic Crashes in 2025



2025 Top Crash Locations



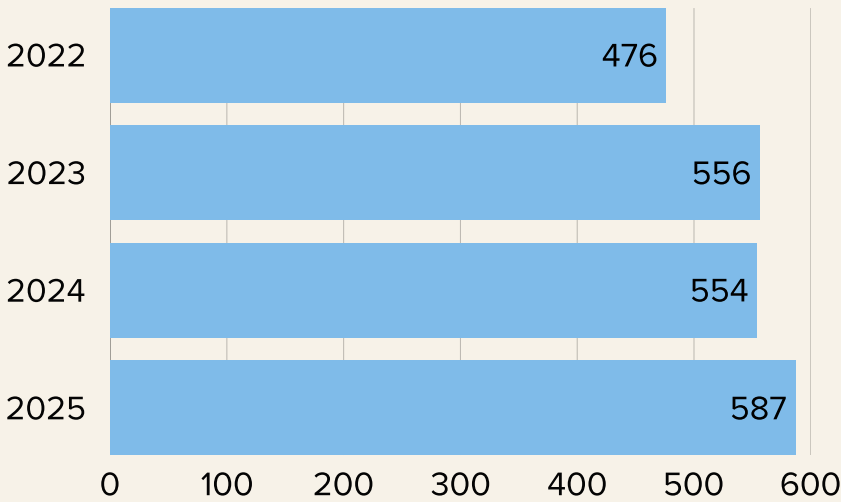
Pedalcyclist/Pedestrian Crashes By Year

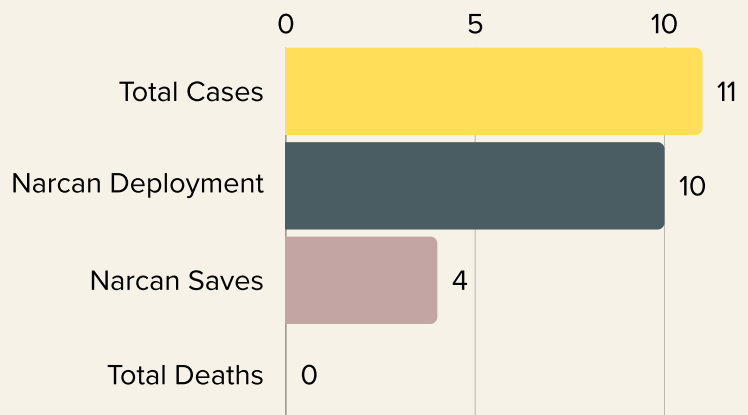


The Police Department routinely receives Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) requests for public records concerning police incidents and investigations. Common requests include arrest reports, accident or traffic reports, and in-car camera and body-worn camera footage. Eligible records may be subject to redaction by the department’s FOIA officers in accordance with state law.

Opioid Cases *In 2025*

Opioid use continues to be a significant societal problem. When abused, these dangerous narcotics can cause respiratory depression and lead to overdose deaths. Batavia officers are equipped with Narcan, a life-saving medication that reverses opioid overdoses by blocking the effects of opioids. Timely administration of Narcan can restore normal breathing within a matter of minutes.

Opioid Cases in 2025



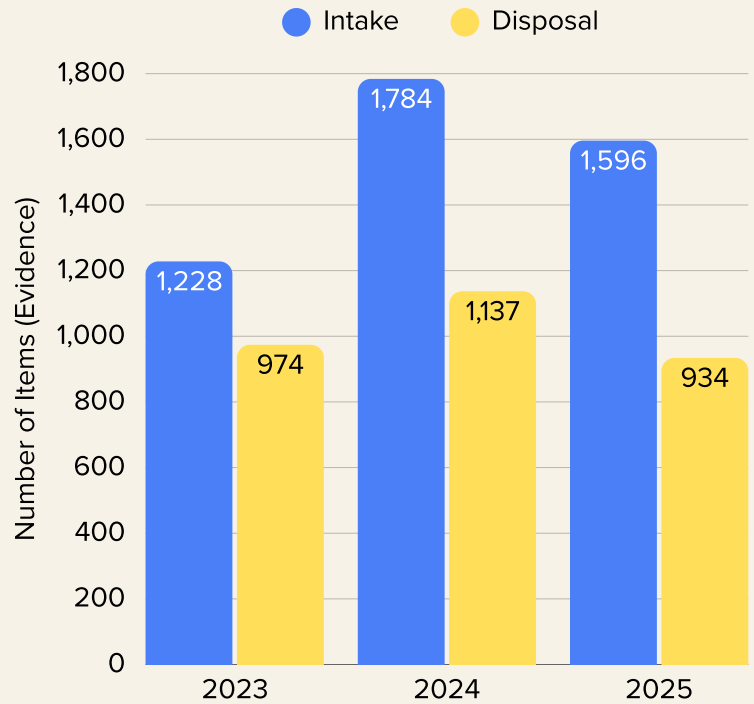
Evidence and Property Room

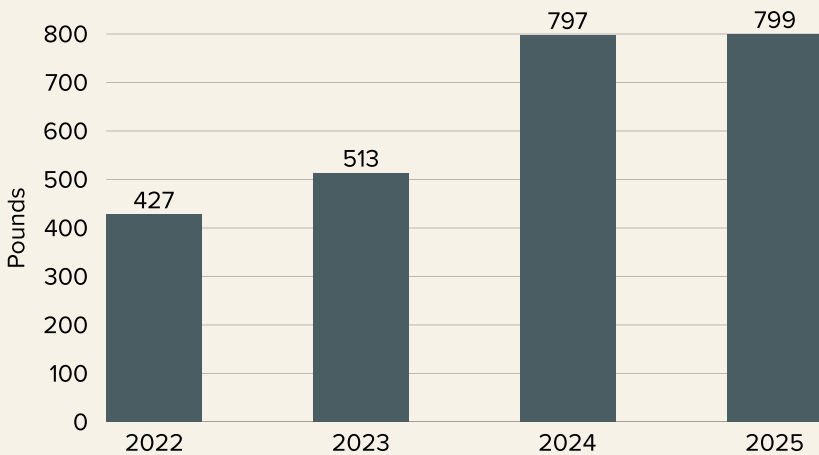


The Batavia Police Department conducts annual inventory audits of the evidence vault. In January 2025, a full inventory of the evidence room was completed in conjunction with the retirement of Chief Mazza. The audit confirmed that all items were properly accounted for and that the evidence vault was in good order. Additional spot checks are conducted throughout the year.

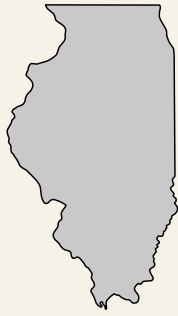
The Evidence Custodian manages the evidence and property room, cataloging all items brought into the evidence vault. He also oversees the proper disposal of evidence once a case has been adjudicated and a court order authorizing disposal has been received.



Unwanted Medication



The department maintains an unwanted medication disposal box in the police department lobby which is available 24-hours a day, 7-days a week. The box provides a secure, convenient, and environmentally responsible way for the public to dispose of medications, which helps to prevent accidental poisoning, substance abuse, and environmental contamination.



Grant Funding In 2025

Grant funding plays a vital role in supporting police departments by providing resources for essential equipment and initiatives important to community safety. In 2025, the department strategically sought grant funding to enhance traffic enforcement efforts and procure valuable equipment, reducing the financial burden on citizens. The department remains focused on aggressively pursuing grant funding opportunities in the coming years in order to better serve the community, adopt new technologies and minimize the impact on city resources.

<p>ILEAS TASER GRANT \$17,926.90</p>	<p>Tasers provide officers with a less-lethal force option that has been associated with the reduction in injuries to both officers and suspects. They also aid in de-escalation and force avoidance from the mere display of the equipment. The grant provided the department with six Axon Taser 7's at no cost to the department.</p>
<p>IDOT MINI GRANT \$17,600.00</p>	<p>Provides increased department staffing for targeted traffic enforcement, specifically focused on the offenses responsible for the most serious injuries and deaths; speeding, seat belts, impaired driving, and distracted driving.</p>
<p>IDOT STEP GRANT \$8,013.69</p>	<p>Provides funding for law enforcement to conduct high-visibility, proactive patrols aimed at reducing crashes and fatalities, specifically targeting impaired driving, seat belt usage, speeding, and distracted driving during high-risk times.</p>
<p>IDOT EQUIPMENT AWARD \$1,750.00</p>	<p>Provided the department with a handheld speed enforcement tool that isolates a single vehicle in traffic using a tight beam, generally considered the most precise device used in police speed enforcement.</p>

In 2025, the department recieved funding or equipment totaling **\$45,290.59** dollars.

IDOT Traffic Enforcement *Grant Summary*

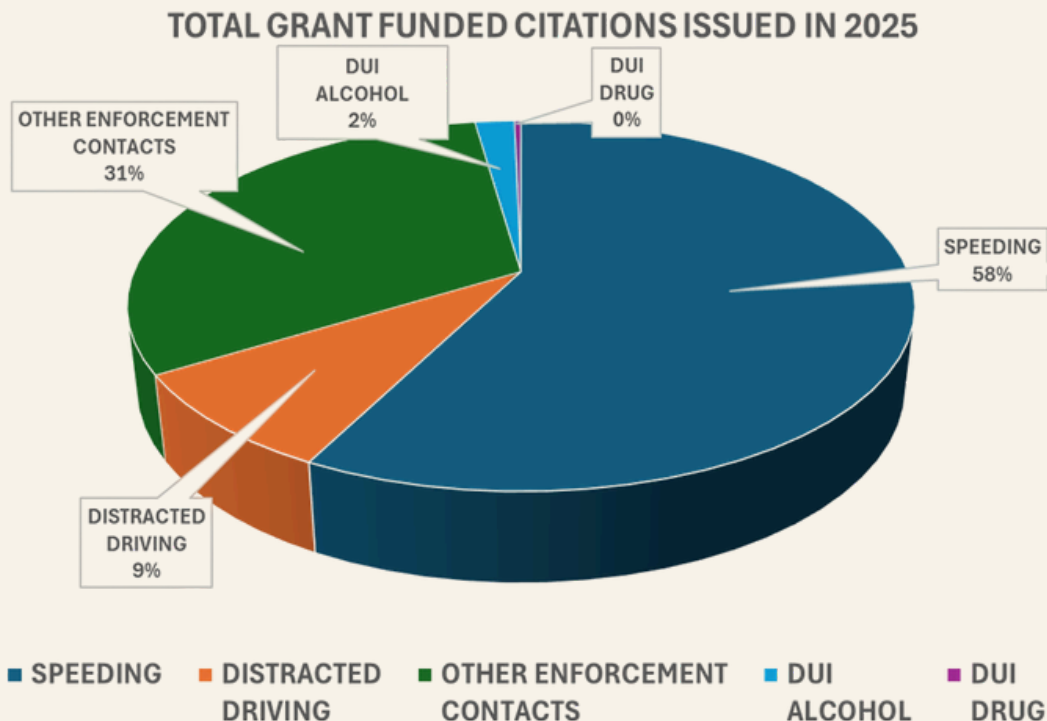


The Batavia Police Department remains committed to promoting traffic safety through proactive enforcement and evidence-based initiatives.

In 2025, the Department participated in two federally funded traffic safety grants administered by the Illinois Department of Transportation: the FY25 Mini-Grant and the FY26 Sustained Traffic Enforcement Program (STEP).

As part of these grant efforts, Batavia officers conducted eight enforcement campaigns, totaling **331.75** hours of dedicated traffic enforcement. These grants provide reimbursement for overtime expenses for traffic enforcement campaigns specified by the I.D.O.T.

During these campaigns, officers conducted **343** traffic stops, resulting in **317** citations. Enforcement activity also included **7** DUI arrests, **10** criminal arrests, and citations issued to **9** drivers operating with a suspended, revoked, or invalid driver's license.



Investigations Unit in 2025



The investigations unit handles a wide array of criminal and administrative investigations. In 2025, the detectives were assigned 321 cases that required investigative assistance or follow-up. Of the assigned cases that have been closed, the investigations unit had a clearance rate of 68.5%. A clearance rate is a detective unit's performance metric that measures the percentage of crimes solved, either by arrest or exceptional means, relative to the total number of cases investigated.

Beyond traditional criminal investigations, the Investigations Division is tasked with many other responsibilities. One of the primary responsibilities for this unit includes conducting background investigations for liquor license applicants, solicitors, and peddlers in the city. These checks ensure that business owners and others doing business within the city do not have criminal records that could make them a danger to residents. Backgrounds are specifically aimed at preventing fraud, theft, or scams targeting vulnerable populations.

Liquor License

Backgrounds completed:

The liquor license background investigation includes fingerprint-based criminal history checks, detailed record reviews, and verification of compliance with the City of Batavia Liquor Code. Checks are also done for video gaming and tobacco licenses.

Solicitor and Peddler

Solicitor backgrounds include fingerprint-based criminal history checks and a thorough review to ensure compliance with city code requirements and ensure the subject has not previously violated local ordinances regulating soliciting.

The Investigations Division conducts periodic compliance checks throughout the City of Batavia to ensure businesses adhere to laws prohibiting the sale of alcohol, tobacco, and access to video gaming by minors.

Major Case Review *in 2025*

January 2025

Armed Robbery

Officers responded to an armed robbery at a gas station in the 1400 block of E. Wilson Street. The store clerk reported being robbed at gunpoint just prior to calling 911. Officers conducted an immediate area search, assisted by Kane County Sheriff's Office deputies utilizing a drone and K-9 unit. The suspect was not located. No injuries were reported.

February 2025

Juvenile Pedestrian Crash

Officers responded to a traffic crash in the 200 block of N. Kirk Road involving an 8-year-old pedestrian. The investigation determined the child crossed outside of a marked crosswalk approximately 300 feet from the intersection. The juvenile sustained non-life-threatening injuries. The driver was found not at fault and no citations were issued.

February 2025

Pedestrian vs. Semi-Truck Crash

Officers investigated a traffic crash at the intersection of Kirk Road and E. Wilson Street involving a pedestrian struck by a semi-truck. The pedestrian was legally crossing in a marked crosswalk with the walk signal illuminated. The driver was cited for Failure to Yield to a Pedestrian in a Crosswalk and No Valid Registration. The pedestrian was transported to a local hospital in stable condition.

March 2025

Attempted Home Invasion

Officers responded to a suspicious person call in the 400 block of S. Jefferson Street. Investigation revealed a male subject damaged a residence's front door and attempted to force entry into the home. The suspect was located and arrested. A search revealed he was also armed with a box cutter. After consultation with the Kane County State's Attorney's Office, the suspect was charged with Attempted Home Invasion with a Dangerous Weapon, Criminal Damage to Property, and Disorderly Conduct.

April 2025

Domestic Battery and Unlawful Restraint Investigation

Officers responded to a report of two adult females and multiple children being held against their will inside an apartment in the 1200 block of E. Wilson Street. Due to the potential presence of a firearm, officers established a perimeter, obtained a search warrant, and requested assistance from the Kane County Regional SWAT Team. A tactical entry was conducted, resulting in the safe recovery of all victims and the arrest of one male suspect. One victim was treated and released on scene. No firearms were located. Charges included Violation of an Order of Protection, Domestic Battery Causing Bodily Harm, Domestic Battery Insulting/Provoking Contact, and multiple outstanding warrants.

Major Case Review *in 2025*

August 2025

Officer Involved Shooting

The Batavia Police Department responded to the 1200 block of E Wilson Street for a 3rd party report of a suicidal subject committing self-harm. It was later learned that the subject was in the residence with his two juvenile sons and not allowing them to leave. Responding officers were able to safely extract the juveniles from the apartment before the suspect began to open fire with a rifle. The suspect was later found deceased inside the residence from a self-inflicted gunshot wound. There were no injuries to officers or innocent civilians.

September 2025

Child Sexual Abuse Material (CSAM) Investigation – Chiropractic Office

A CyberTip from the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children initiated a major investigation into a local chiropractic business. The investigation revealed that the business owner secretly recorded over 180 patients, including children, using hidden cameras placed throughout the office. Victims ranged from young children to adults, primarily females. The suspect was charged with over 17 felony counts related to CSAM offenses. The investigation remains ongoing.

September 2025

Commerical Burglary Arrest

Officers responded to a burglary in progress at a smoke shop in the 2000 block of W. Wilson Street. Forced entry through the front door was discovered and thousands of dollars in merchandise was reported stolen. The suspect was later identified, arrested, and charged with Burglary and Criminal Damage to Property over \$500.

November 2025

CSAM Investigation - Residential Offender

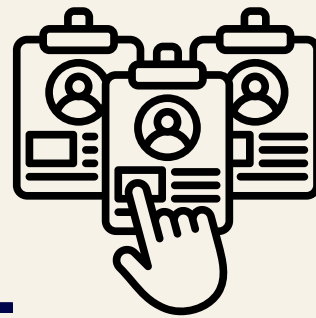
Following notification from the Chicago Police Department, officers conducted a CSAM investigation involving a Batavia resident. Search warrants were executed on the suspect's residence, phone, and vehicle, resulting in the discovery of additional evidence. The suspect was charged with multiple felony counts of CSAM dissemination and possession involving victims under 13 years of age.

December 2025

Homicide Investigation

Officers responded to an apartment building in the 100 block of Church Street after a male reported killing his wife. Officers took the suspect into custody without incident. Inside the apartment, officers located a female victim suffering from life-threatening injuries. Despite life-saving efforts, the victim was pronounced deceased at the scene. The Kane County Major Crimes Task Force assisted with the investigation. The suspect was charged with two counts of First Degree Murder. The incident was determined to be domestic-related with no ongoing threat to the community.

Summary of BPD *Hiring Process*



The Board of Fire and Police Commissioners (BFPC) is responsible for hiring Batavia Police Officers. The board is made up of three civilian commissioners appointed by the Mayor. The board conducts entrance examinations, administers the physical agility test, and establishes the police officer eligibility list. Applicants are contacted in rank order from the eligibility list as they advance in the hiring process.

The Investigations Division is tasked with conducting thorough background investigations for prospective police officers. These extensive reviews are essential to maintaining the department's high professional standards and ensuring public trust.

The Board of Fire and Police Commissioners and the Batavia Police Department remain committed to a rigorous and deliberate hiring process, recognizing that careful candidate selection directly impacts service quality and community confidence.



The in-depth background investigation includes fingerprinting, verification of employment and personal history, law enforcement record checks, neighborhood canvasses, reference interviews, and a polygraph examination. Candidates are interviewed by the Board of Fire and Police Commissioners and if selected, must successfully complete psychological and medical evaluations prior to appointment.

In 2025, the Investigations Division completed five background investigations to fill one sworn officer vacancy, underscoring the department's commitment to a thorough, selective, and integrity-driven hiring process.

Community Relations *Program*



2025 was the first full year of the department's reimagined Community Relations Program. The program and community relations efforts have created meaningful opportunities for officers and residents to connect outside of traditional calls for service. Through engaging events and outreach, the department strengthened trust, encouraged open communication, and reinforced positive relationships with the community and local businesses.

Key events in 2025 included Coffee with a Cop, participation in the Batavia Farmer's Market, Cones with a Cop, National Night Out, and Cocoa with a Cop. Officers also provided tours, educational presentations, and engaged with local scout troops while supporting numerous community-sponsored events. These efforts helped maintain a visible, approachable police presence throughout Batavia.

The department also continued to build and strengthen partnerships with organizations and neighborhoods such as the Batavia Apartments, The 100 Club of Illinois, Batavia Public Schools, area hospitals, dispatch centers, and local businesses. These collaborations enhanced regional cooperation and community support.

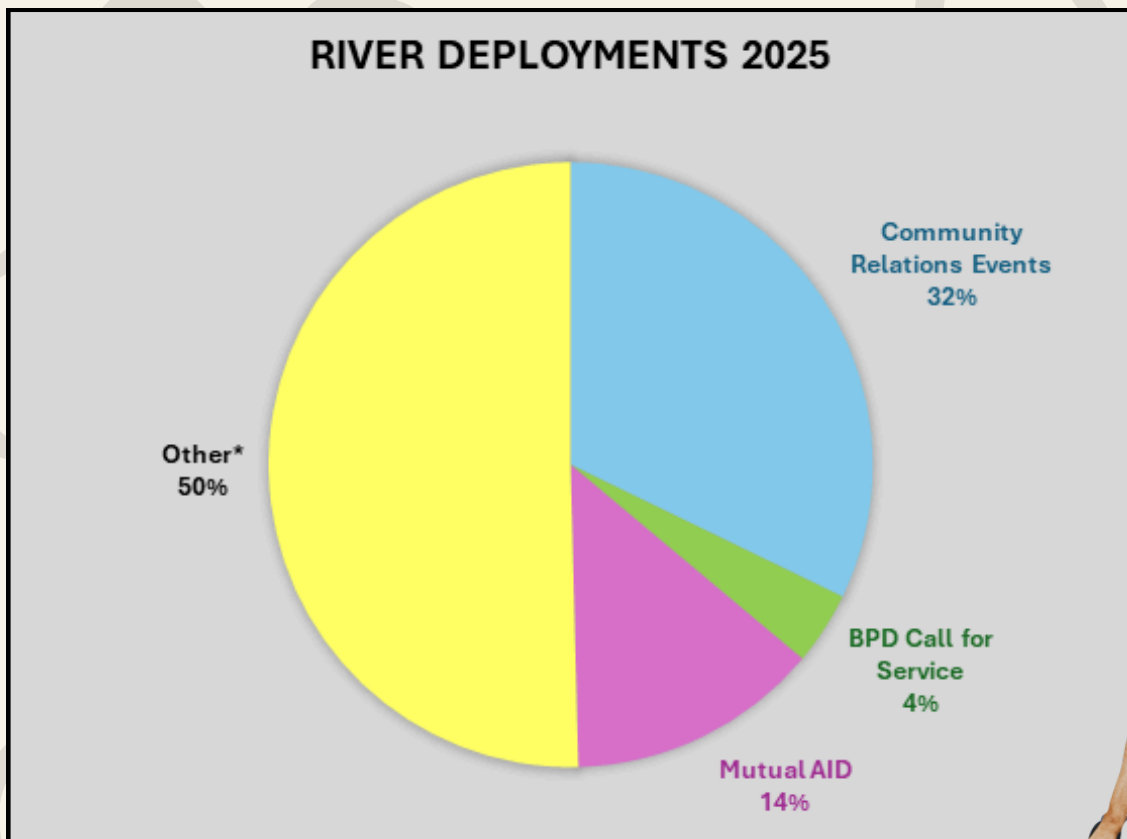


Community Relations *Program*



2025 marked the first full year of service for the department's Comfort Dog, River. Throughout the year, River completed basic obedience training and attended multiple professional events designed to prepare her for her role as a comfort animal. River was also repeatedly deployed throughout 2025, with deployment time exceeding 124 hours of service. River actively supported calls for service and critical incidents, assisted with community outreach efforts, provided mutual aid to area jurisdictions, and provided wellness-focused engagements, both scheduled and spontaneous.

These initiatives reflect the Batavia Police Department's continued commitment to community engagement, partnership-building, and proactive public service.

Department Training *In 2025*



The Batavia Police Department remains committed to providing continuous, high-quality training for all sworn personnel. In 2025, the department's 43 officers completed a total of 3,291 hours of training, excluding time spent in the basic police academy and the field training program. On average, each officer received 76.5 hours of professional development throughout the year.

The department also recently implemented the PepperBall Launcher as part of its ongoing effort to enhance officer safety and provide effective less-lethal options during critical incidents. The addition of the PepperBall Launcher strengthens the department's commitment to modern policing practices, responsible use of force, and the overall safety of the community.

Department Training In 2025



The department training program is built around three primary components:

- **External Training** (1,600 hours, 48.6%)

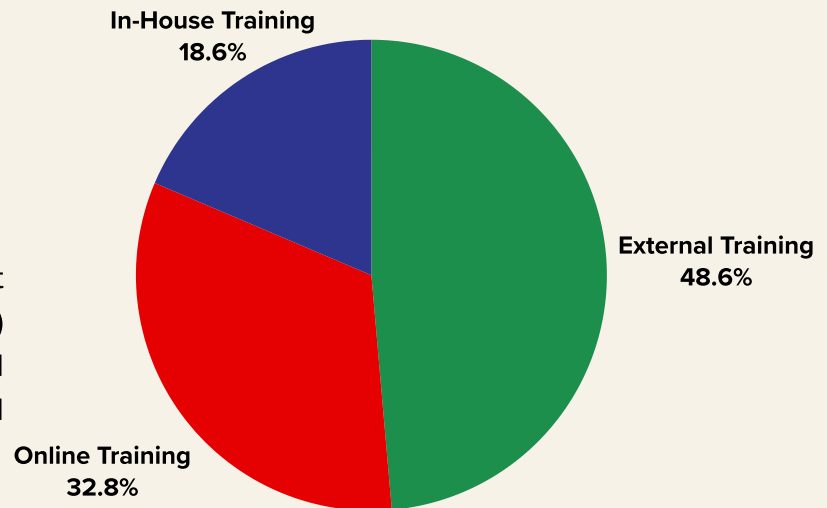
Officers attend specialized courses such as Accident Reconstruction, Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) training, Evidence Technician, Drone operator, and other specialized or advanced professional development opportunities.

- **Online Training** (1,079 hours, 32.8%)

Monthly online modules reinforce key concepts, tactics, and best practices. These courses also provide timely updates on changes in state and federal law.

- **In-House Training** (612 hours, 18.6%)

More than one-quarter of Batavia Police Officers are certified to instruct state-approved, scenario-based courses including Active Threat Response, High-Risk Vehicle Stops, Defensive Tactics, and Immediate Trauma Care.



The Department places strong emphasis on ensuring a high percentage of officers are trained in skills critical to effective and safe policing:

- **Crisis Intervention Training (CIT):** 88.4% of officers are CIT-certified. This 40-hour course prepares officers to recognize and appropriately respond to individuals experiencing mental health crises.

- **Impaired Driving Enforcement:** 81.4% of officers have completed A.R.I.D.E. (Advanced Roadside Impaired Driving Enforcement) training, and 88.4% are certified Breath Analysis Officers—both essential qualifications for effective DUI enforcement.

Subject Resistance In 2025

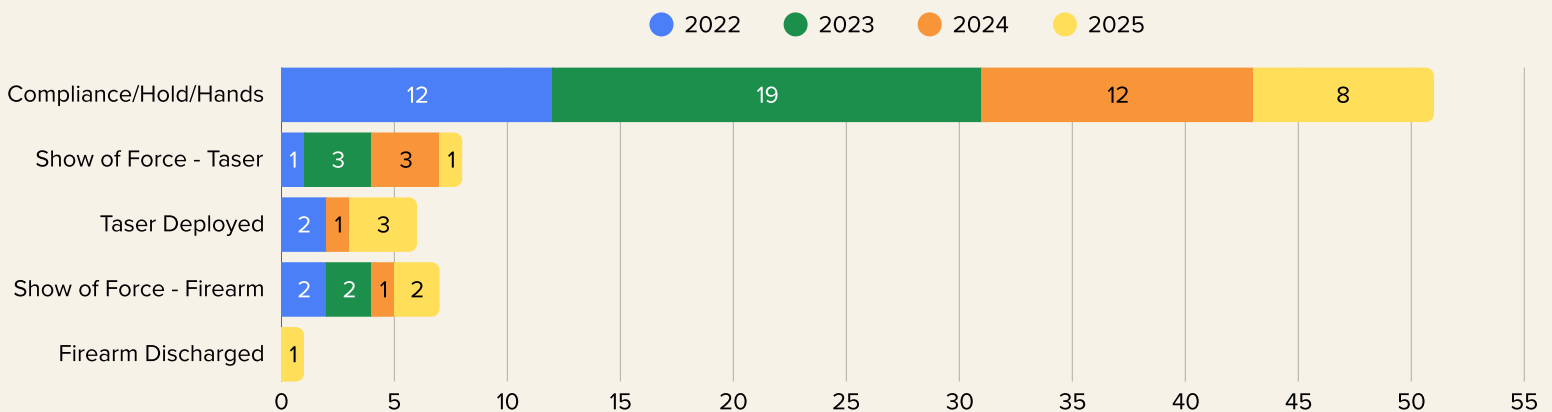


The Batavia Police Department strives to use force only when absolutely necessary and as a last resort when other opportunities to de-escalate a situation have failed or are otherwise unreasonable. In 2025, Batavia officers responded to or initiated a total of 19,186 calls for service. Of those calls, Batavia Officers encountered resistance in fifteen (15) incidents. When compared to the total number of calls for service, events requiring the use of force by Batavia Police Officers accounted for approximately 0.078% of all law enforcement interactions. The term “use of force” encompasses a wide array of possible police tactics when subject resistance is encountered. In the overwhelming majority of cases, the force used by Batavia Officers is low level arm/wrist controls with a low probability for injury to officers or the subject providing resistance. Each of the fifteen (15) use of force incidents in 2025 were found to be compliant with state law.

Occasionally, police departments receive complaints related to employee conduct or other concerns with the police services provided. Of the department’s 19,186 calls for service, the department received citizen complaints on two (2) occasions, or 0.01% of calls for service. Both complaints were investigated and determined to be unfounded.
