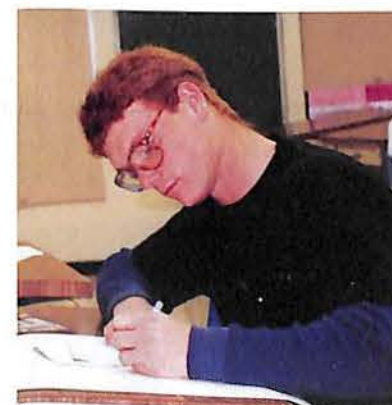

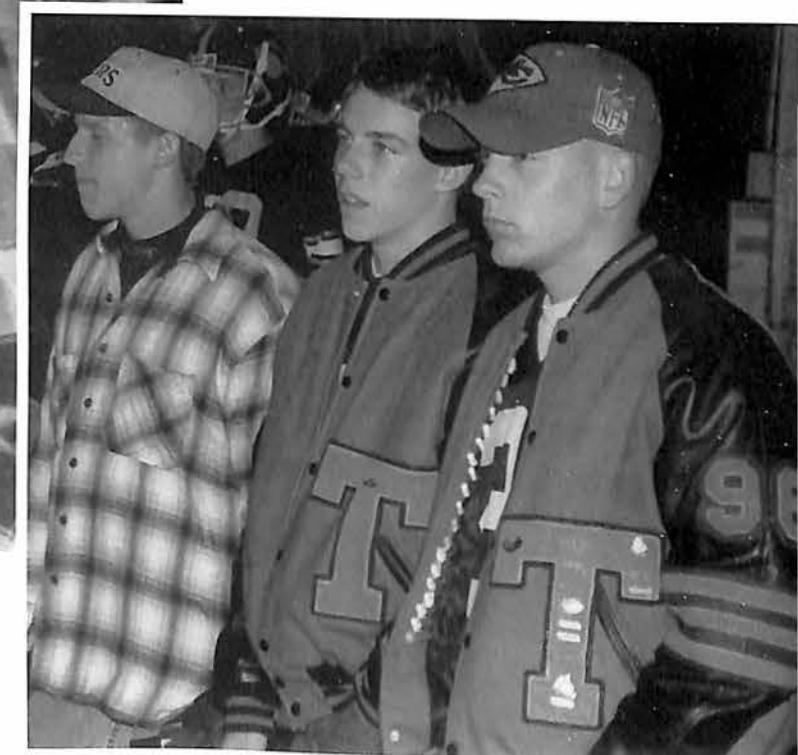

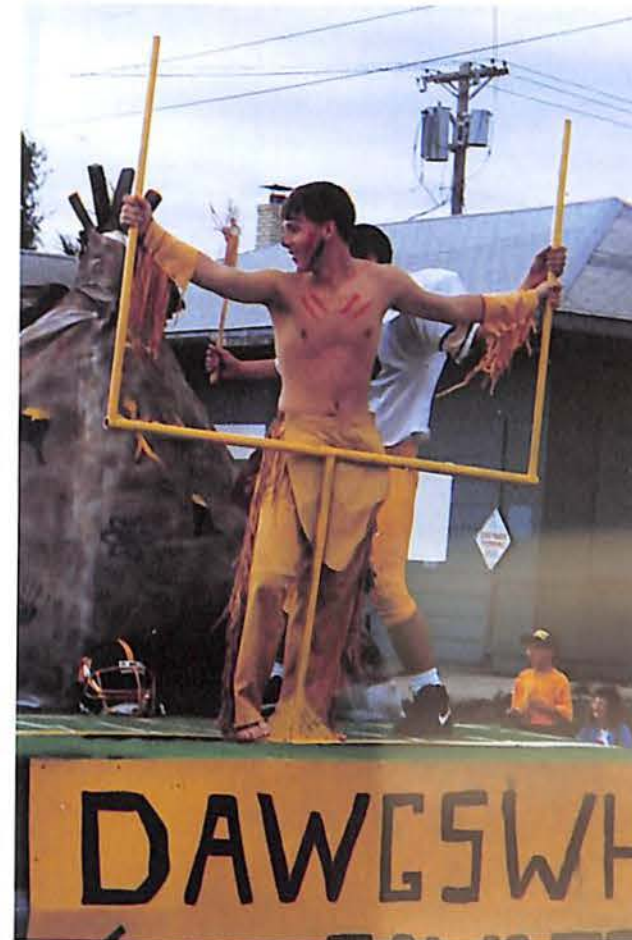

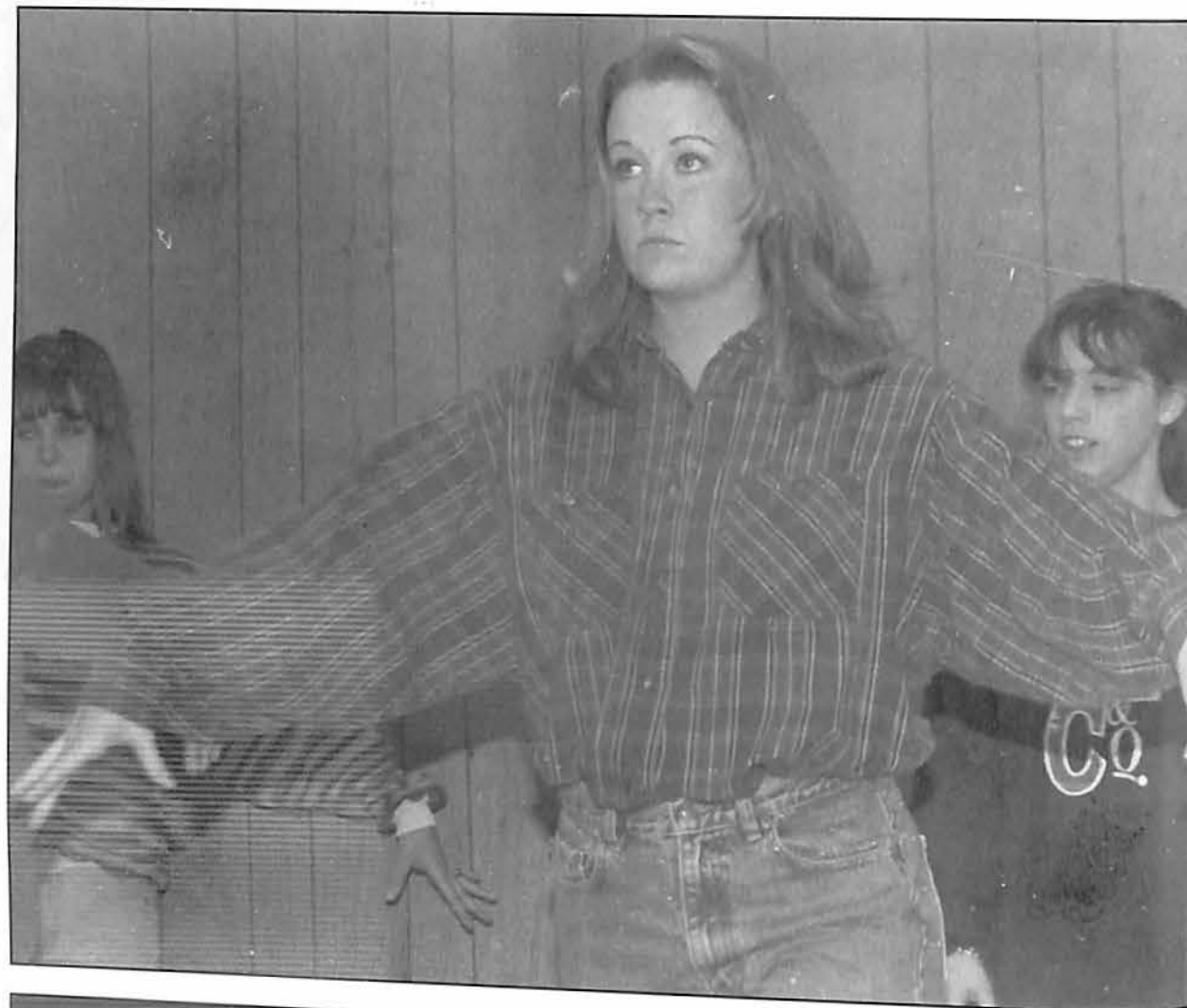

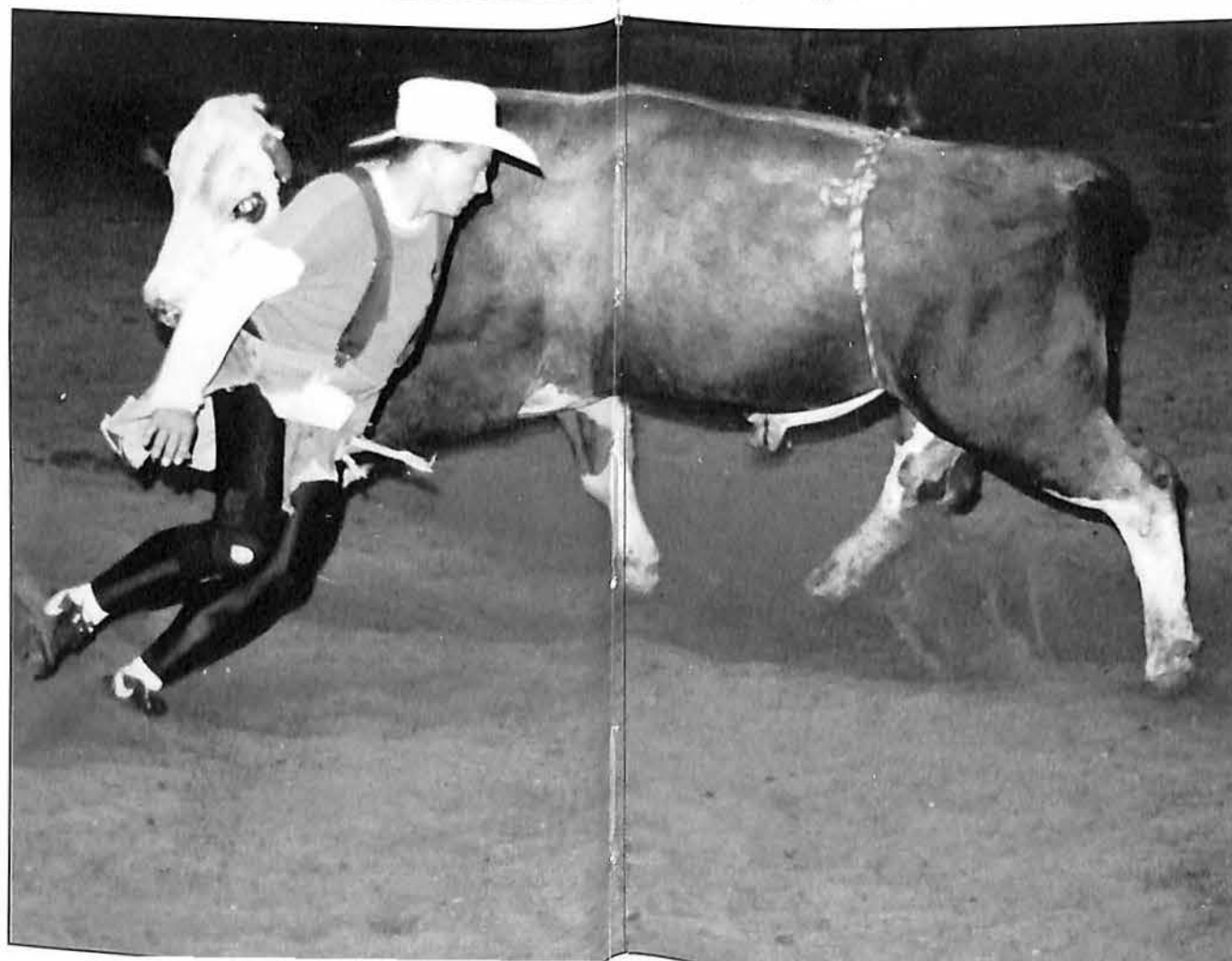

Barnwarming was

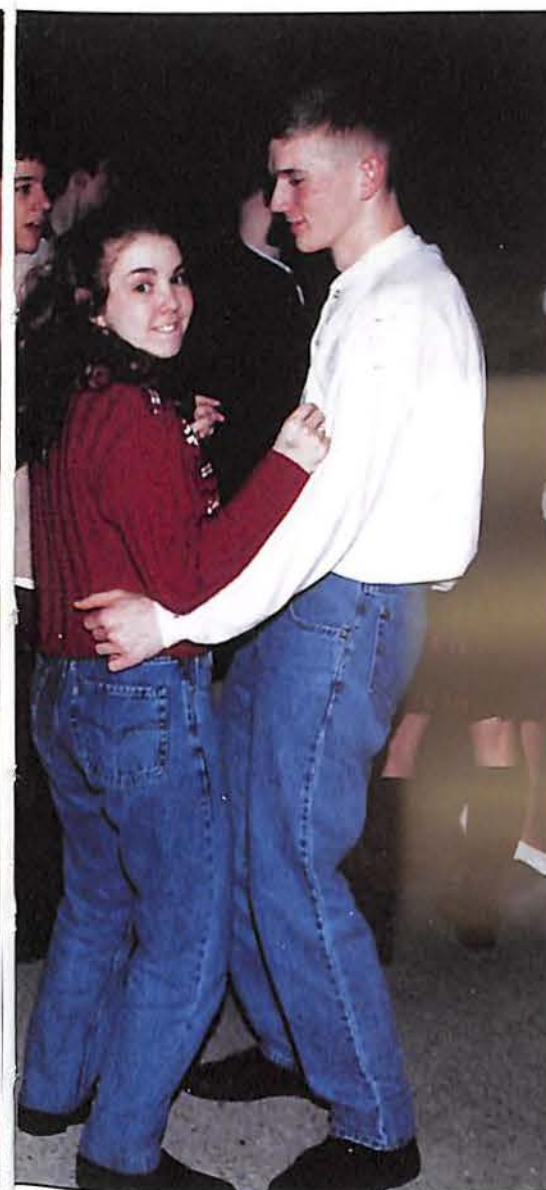

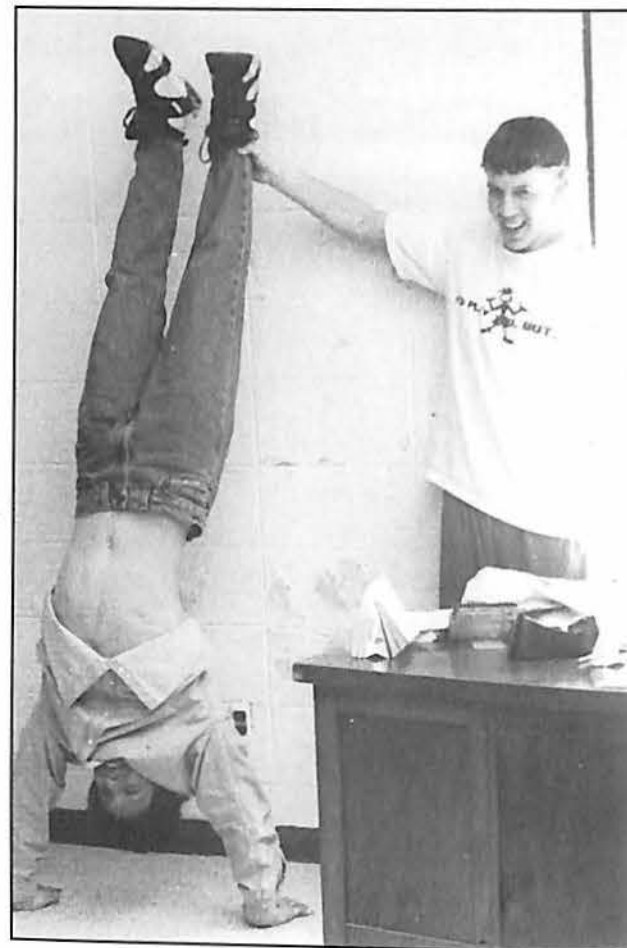

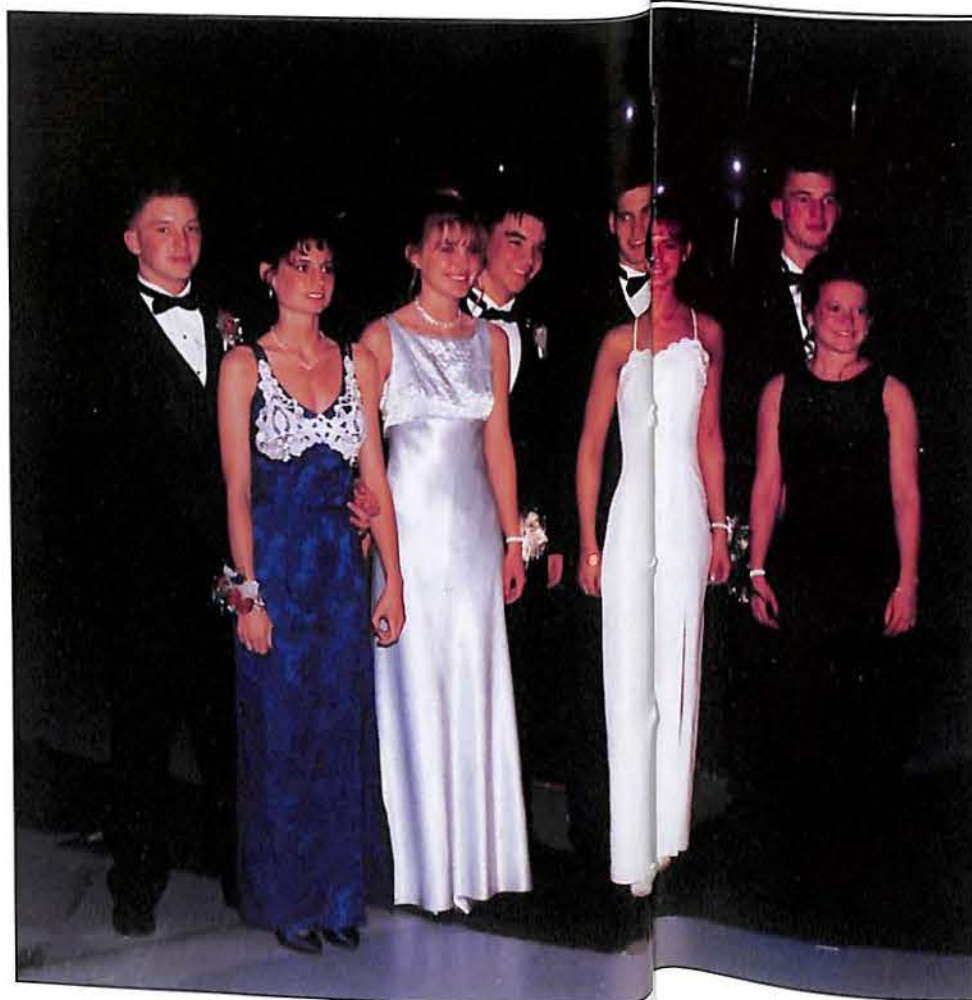

Maybe prom is a lot of hype, but it's a special night culminating the year for juniors and seniors, and it makes them feel special.

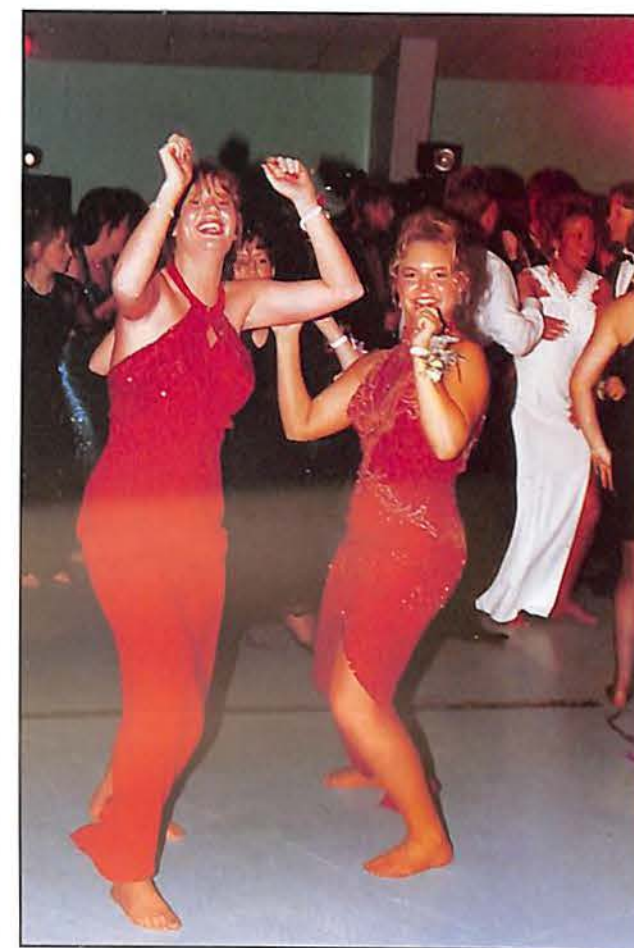

"The end of the year brings even more racket with seniors cleaning out lockers during class time," said Mrs. Siebenborn.

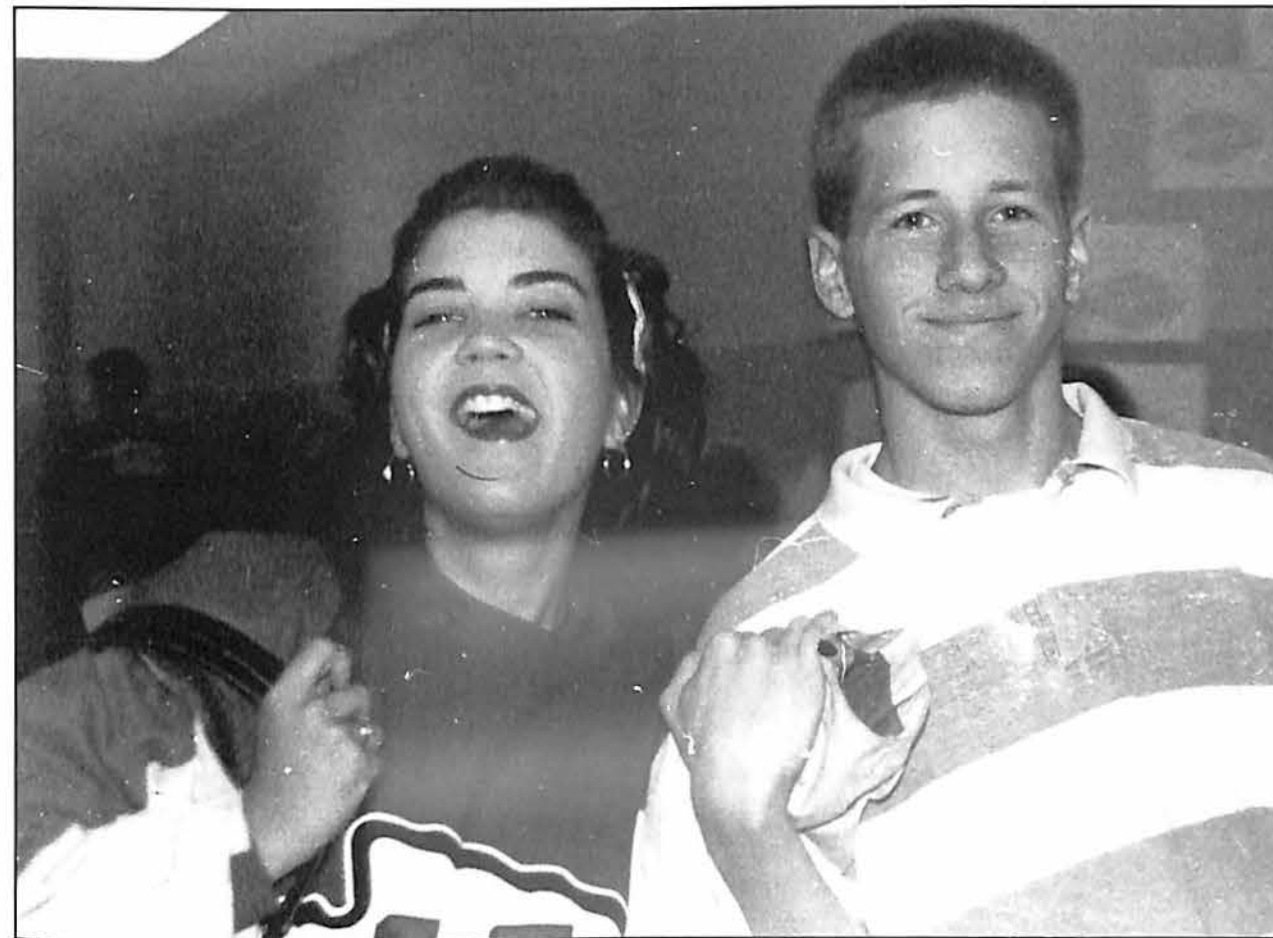
This year there was even more noise when the juniors moved into departing seniors' lockers.

"I couldn't wait until those seniors cleared out. I sneaked out during English III and moved all of my stuff to Locker 5," said junior Mandy Johnson.

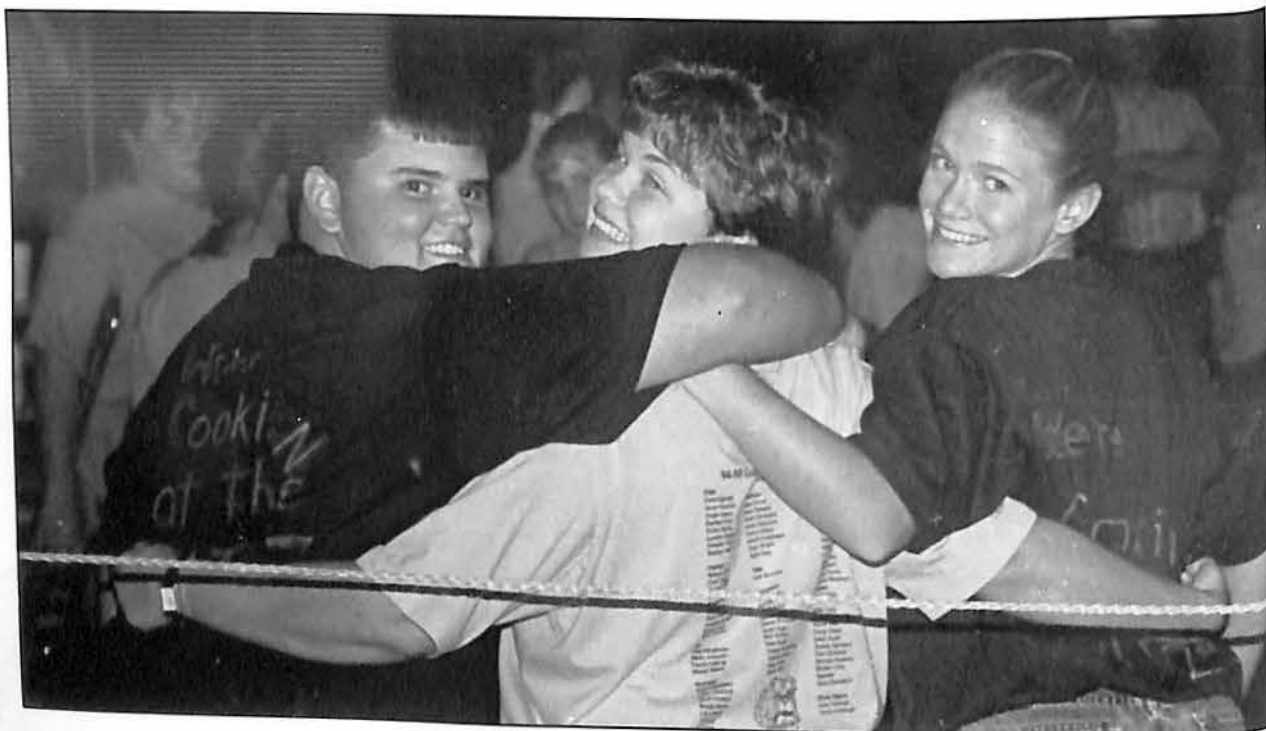
Many times these diversions from the mundane are considered amusing by most, like the call of the wild. Some kids emit strange noises, often quite

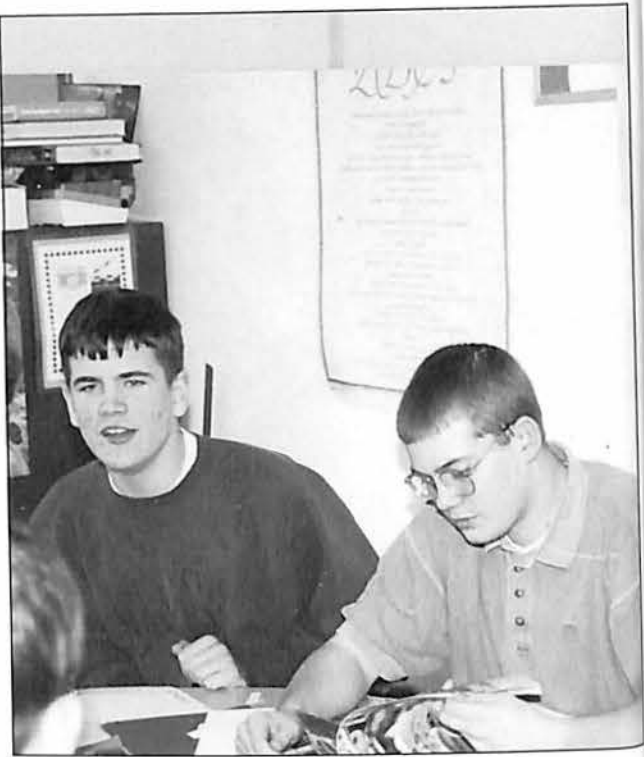

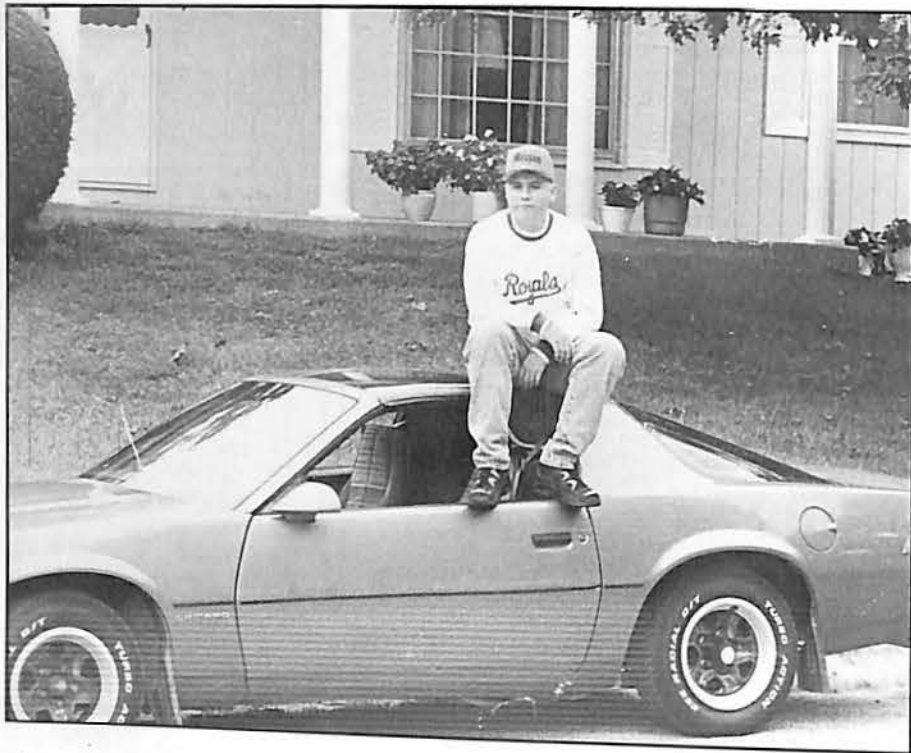

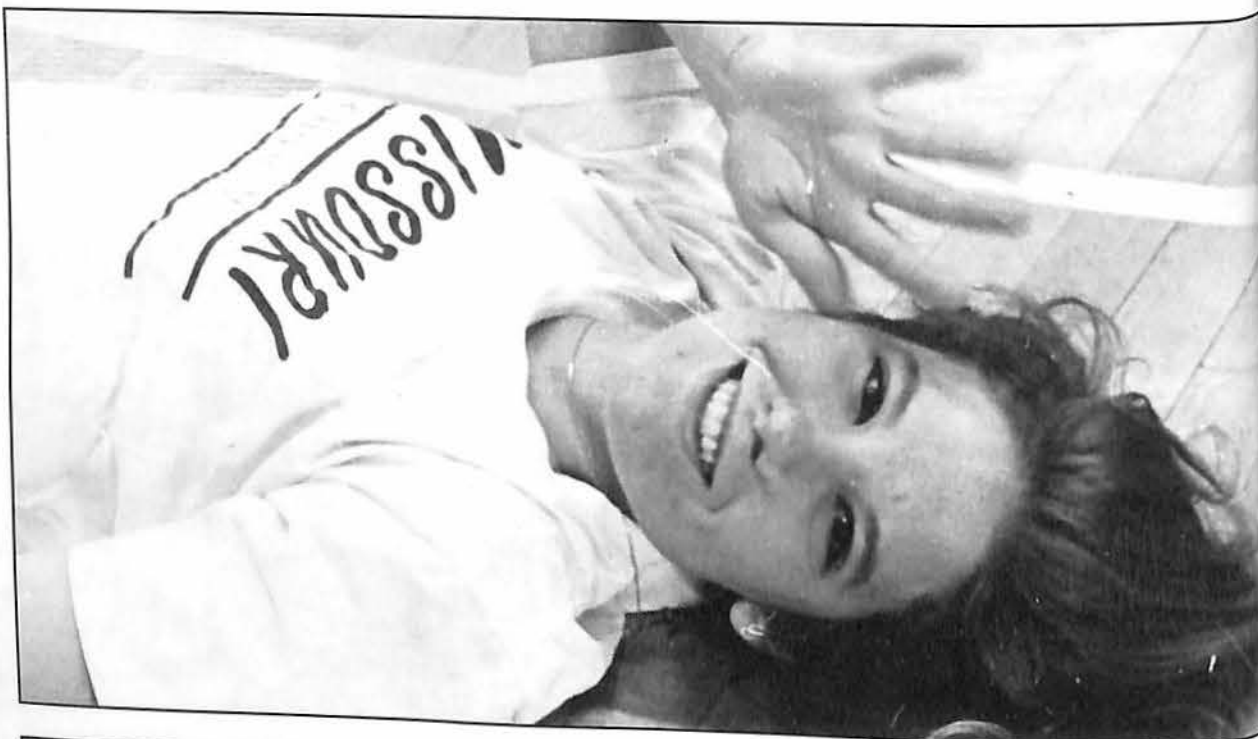


## Coping with Stress: I Did It My Way

ning, slamming and yelling on the court."

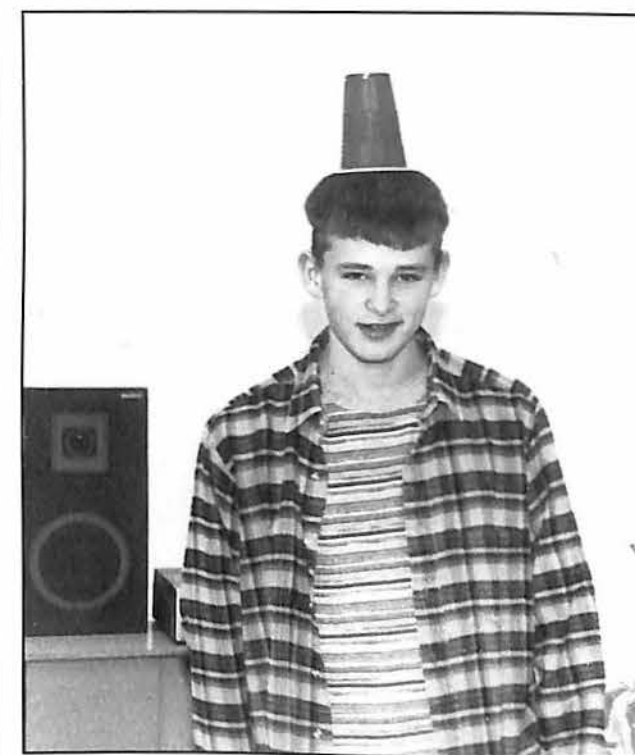
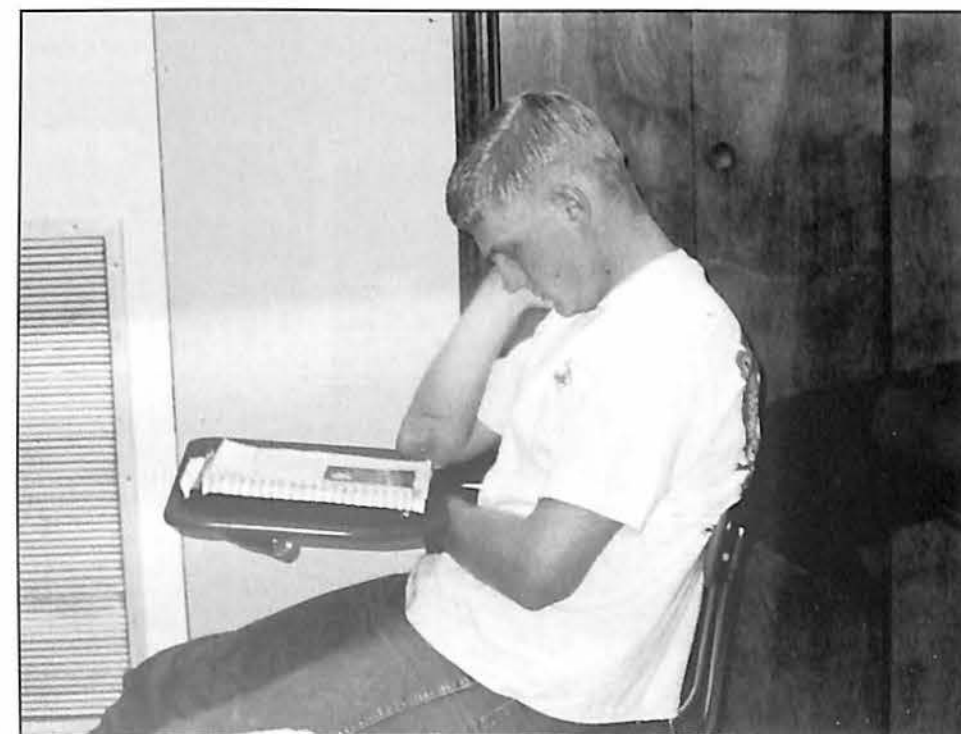

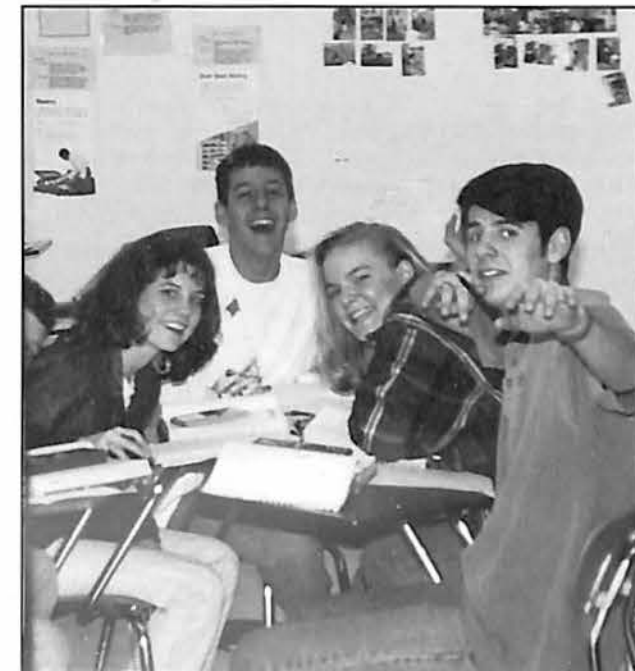

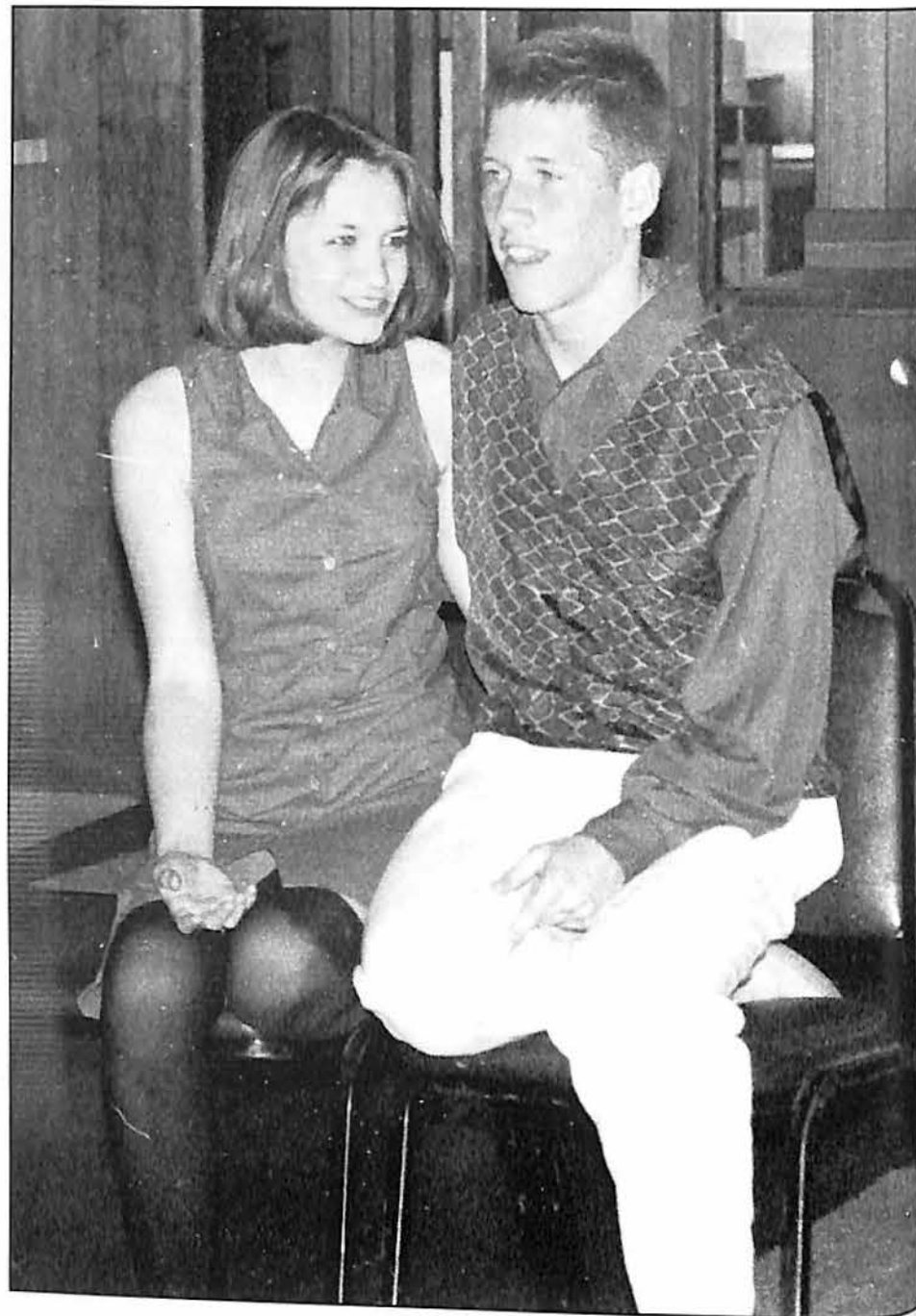

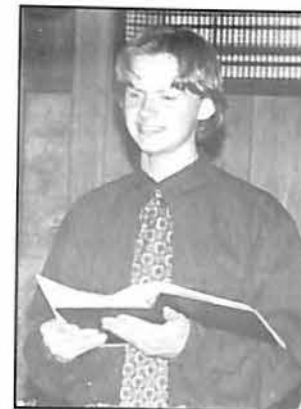
they gained self-confidence through competitions, plus many made new friends from other schools.

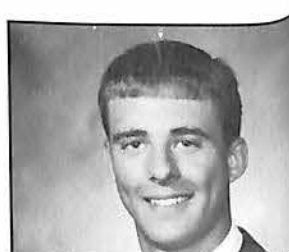

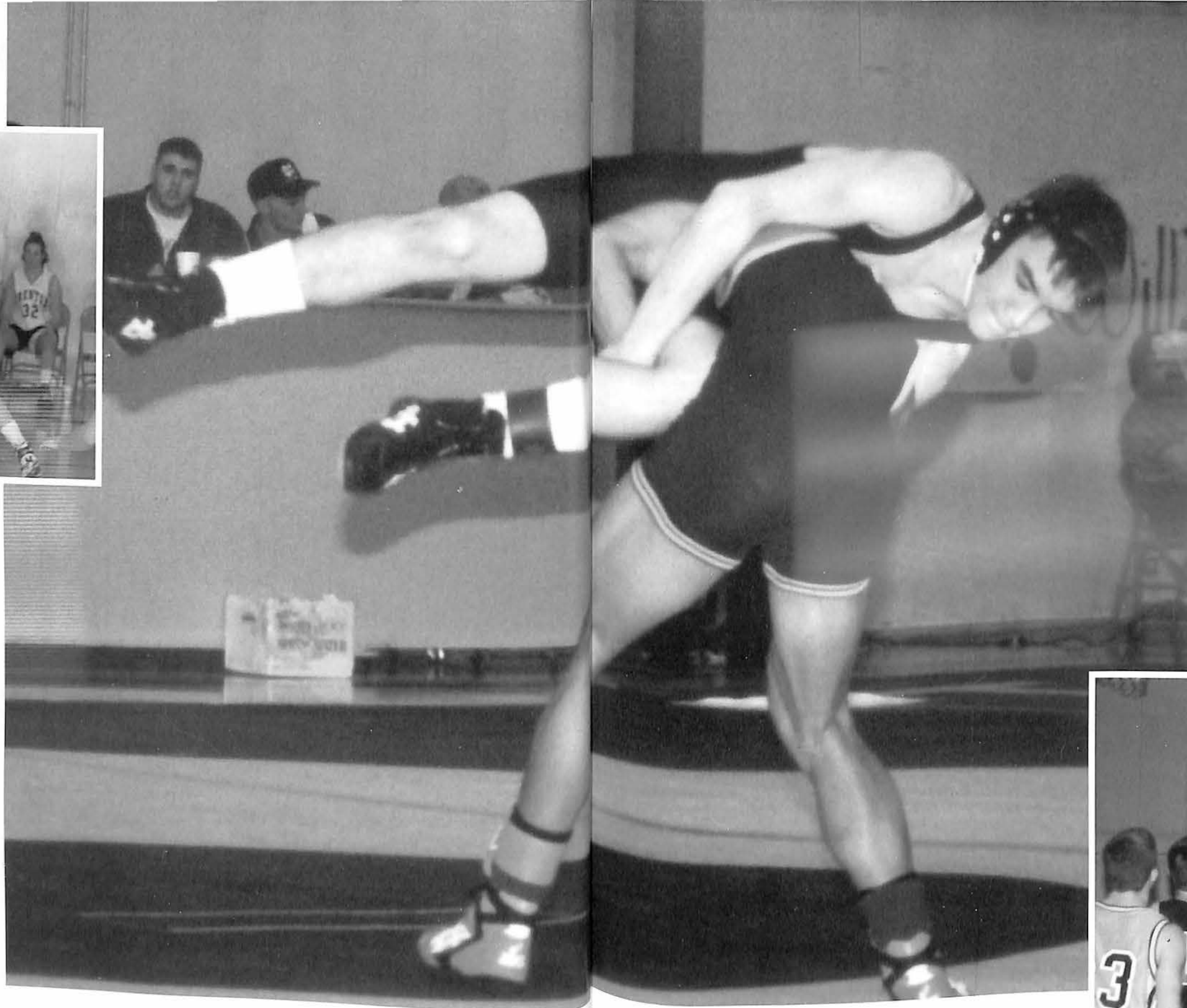

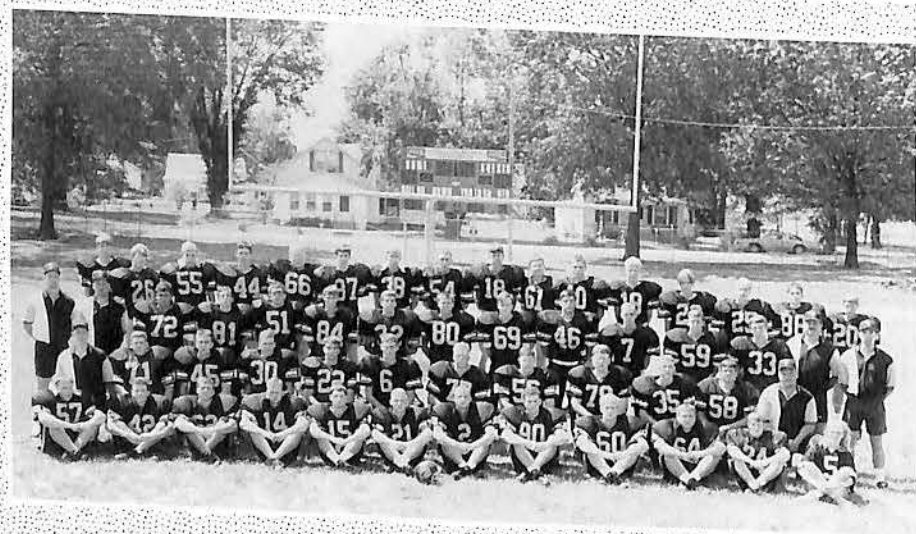

"I'll never forget playing doubles with Anne at State. I couldn't ask for a better way to end my tennis career," said senior Jayla Walker.

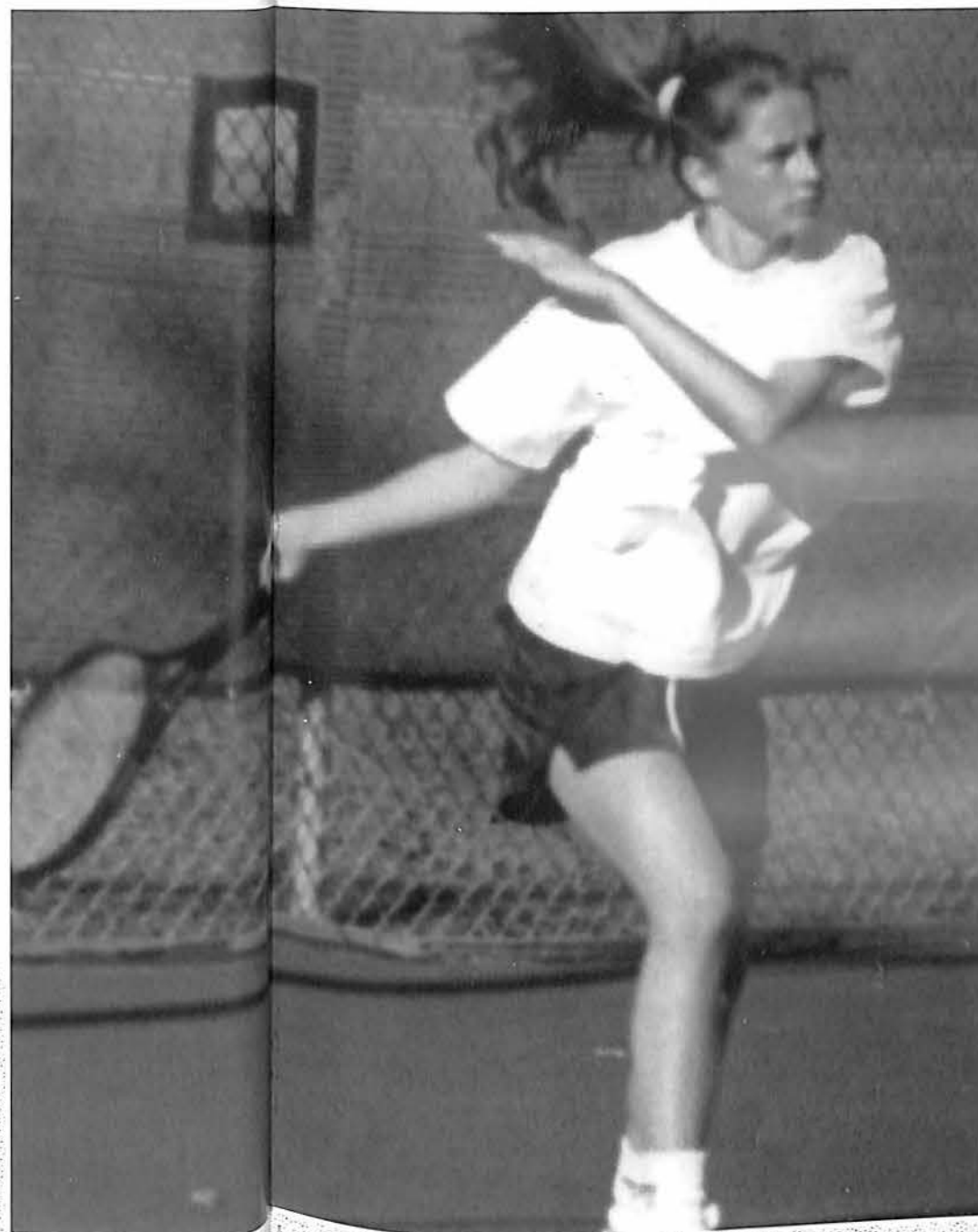

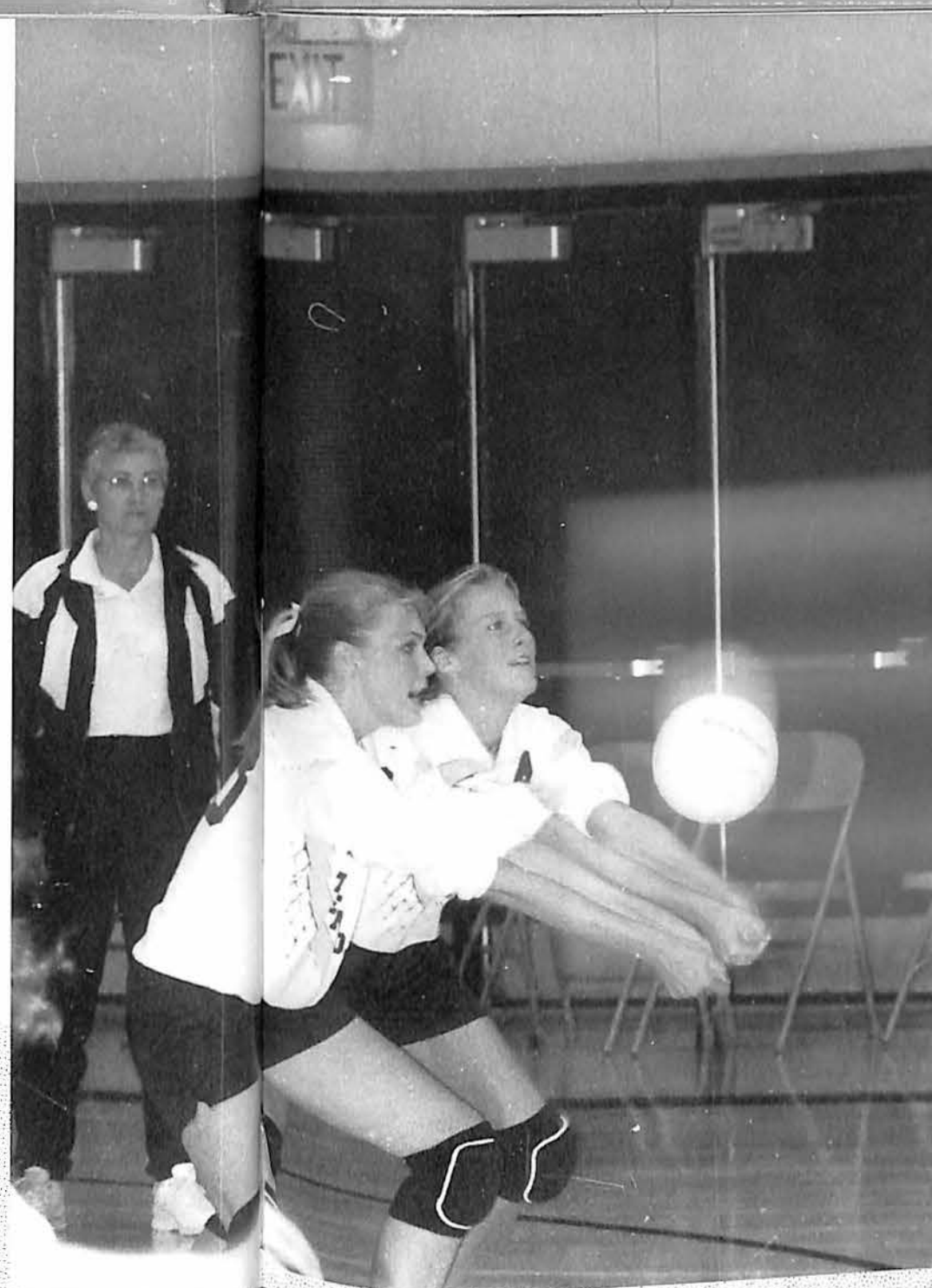

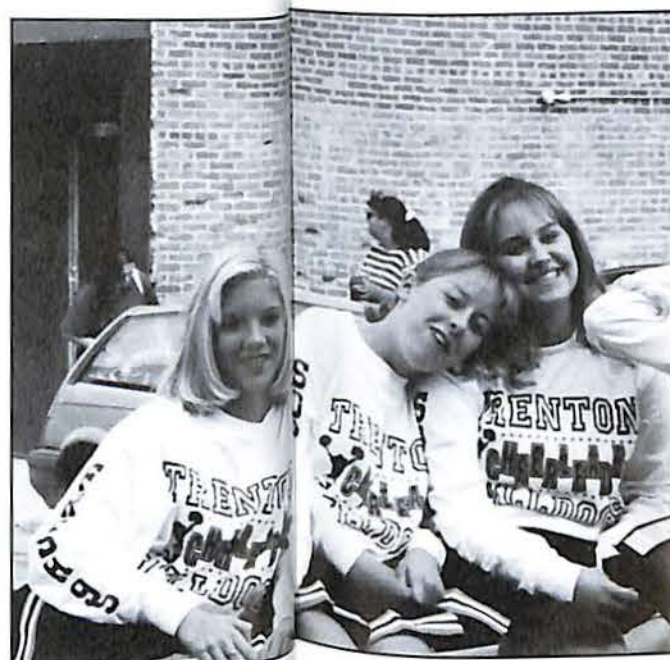

This year Trenton

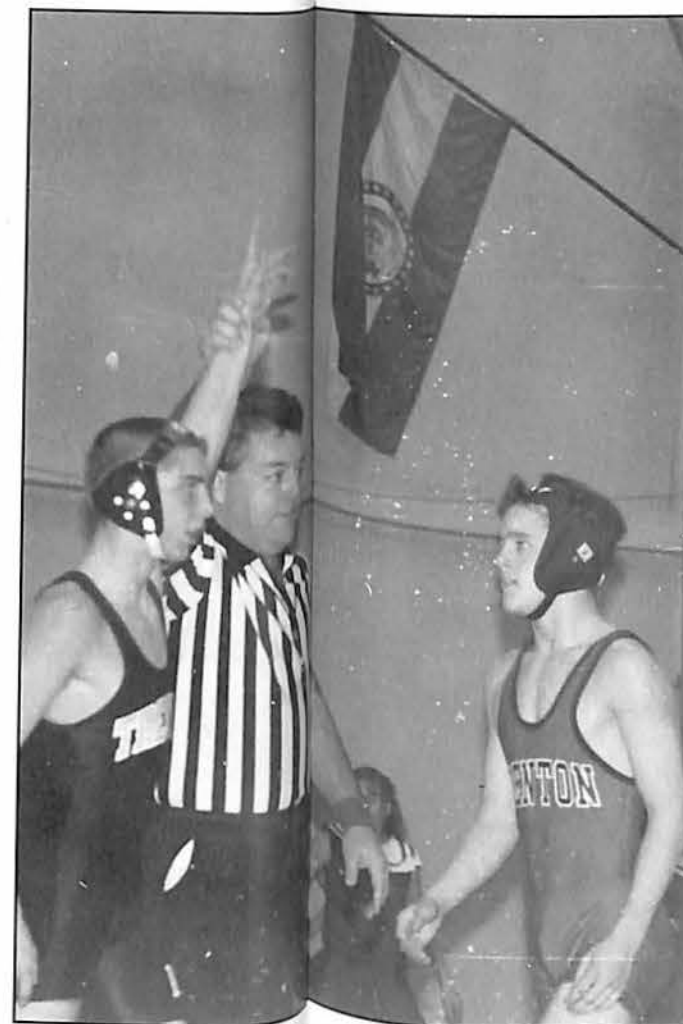

anything about us; then when we win, they wonder 'Where did he come from?'"

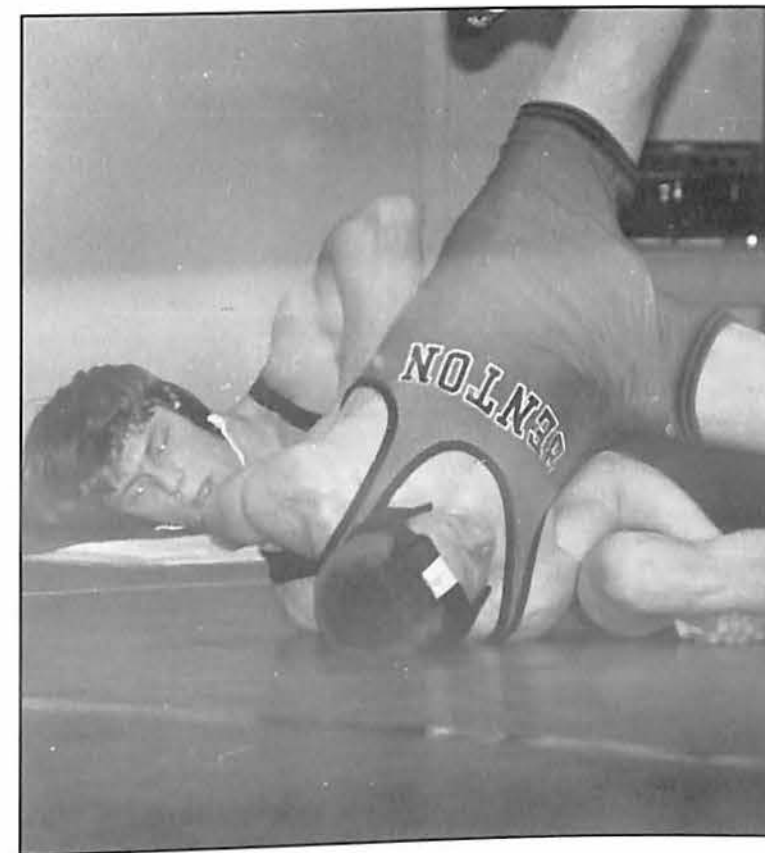

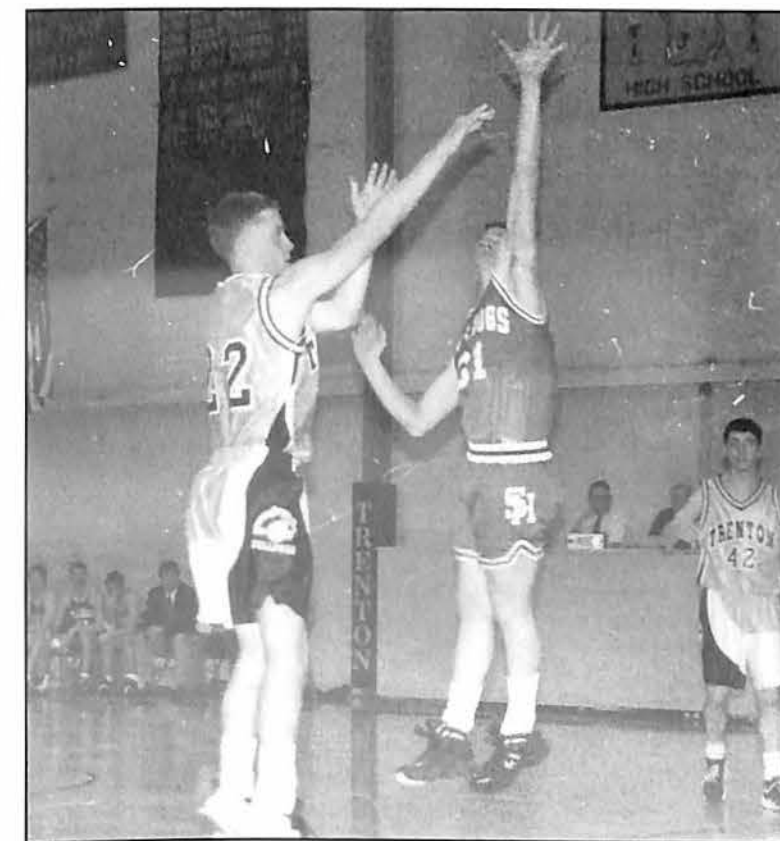

Senior Ryan Palmer appears to mesmerize the Bulldog bench with his awe-inspiring dribbling skills.

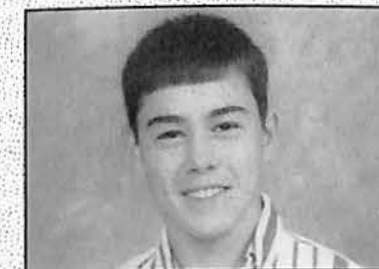

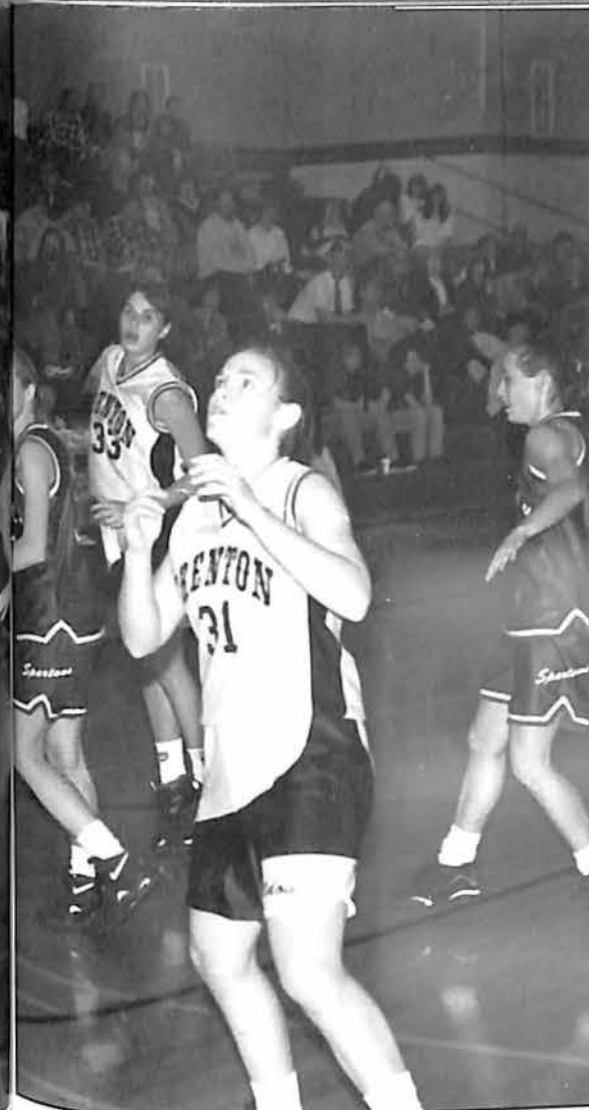
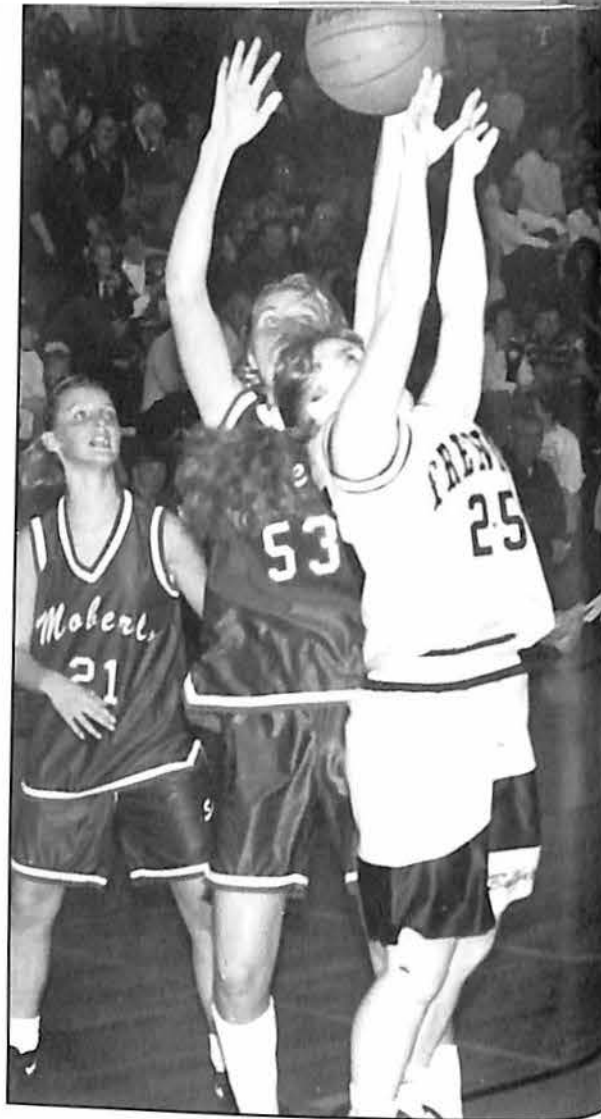
cent from the charity stripe, and Senior Katie Bishop led the team with a 44% field goal percentage. All of the upperclassmen were letter recipients.

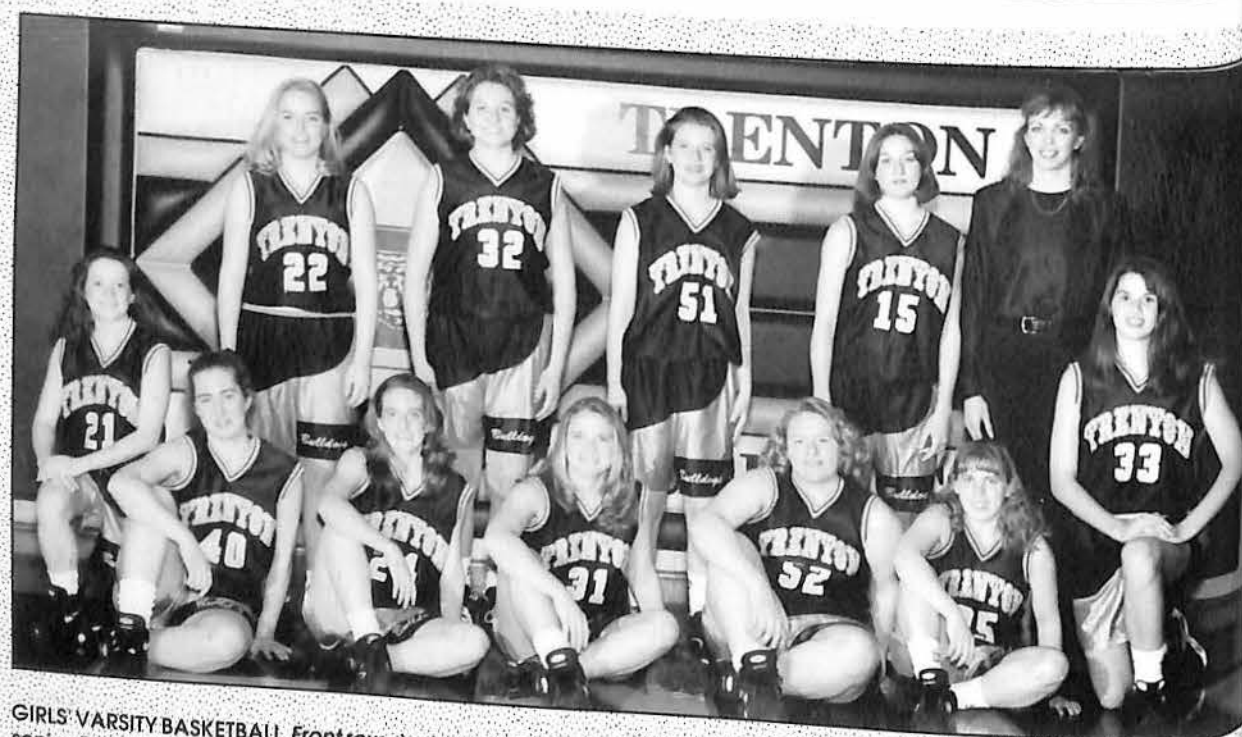

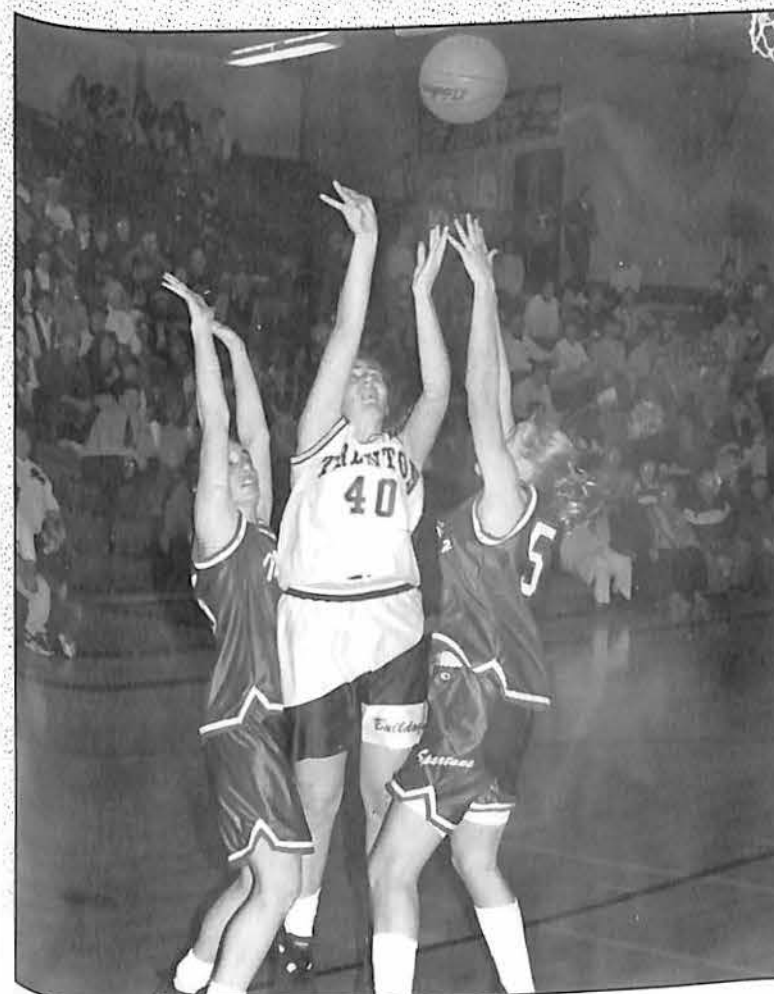

Coach Mike Bosley remarked, "There is nowhere to go but up. All this team needed was a little confidence. I believe they are gaining that, and they can use it in their years to come."

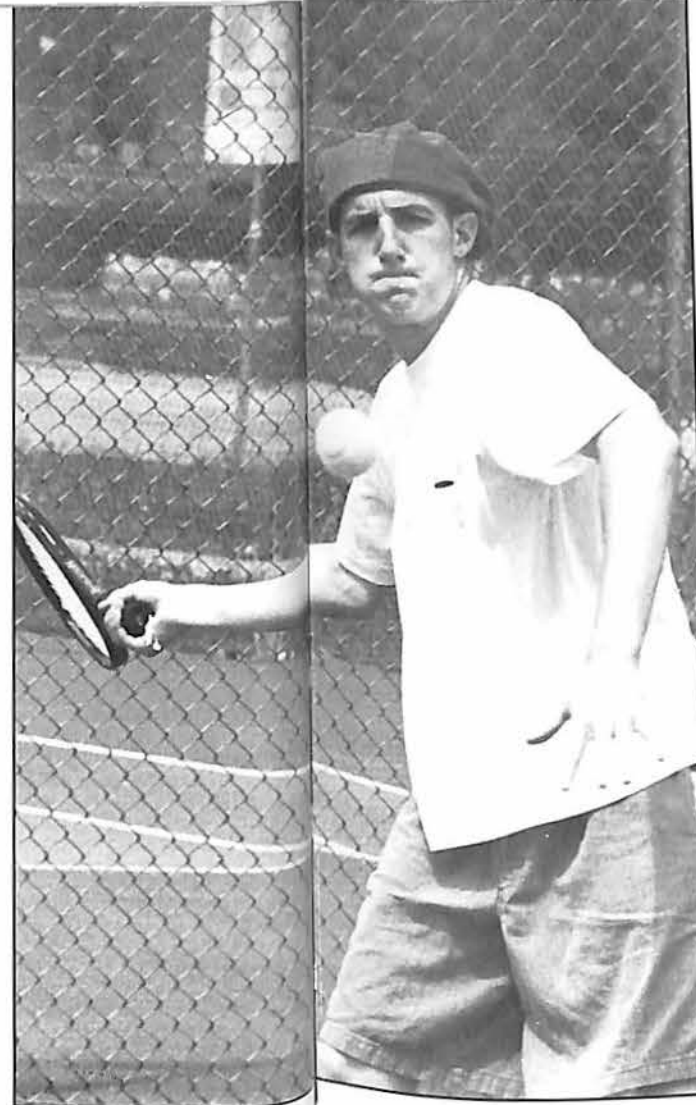

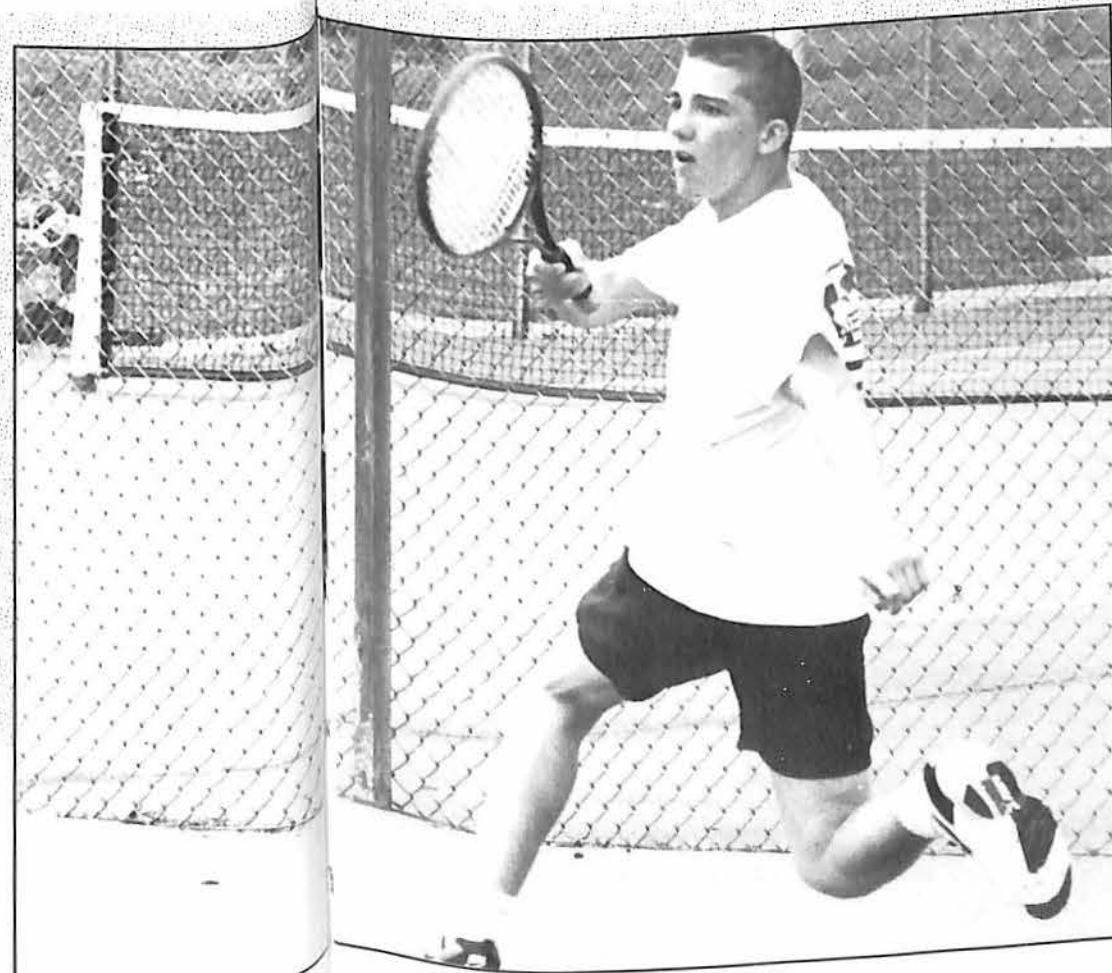

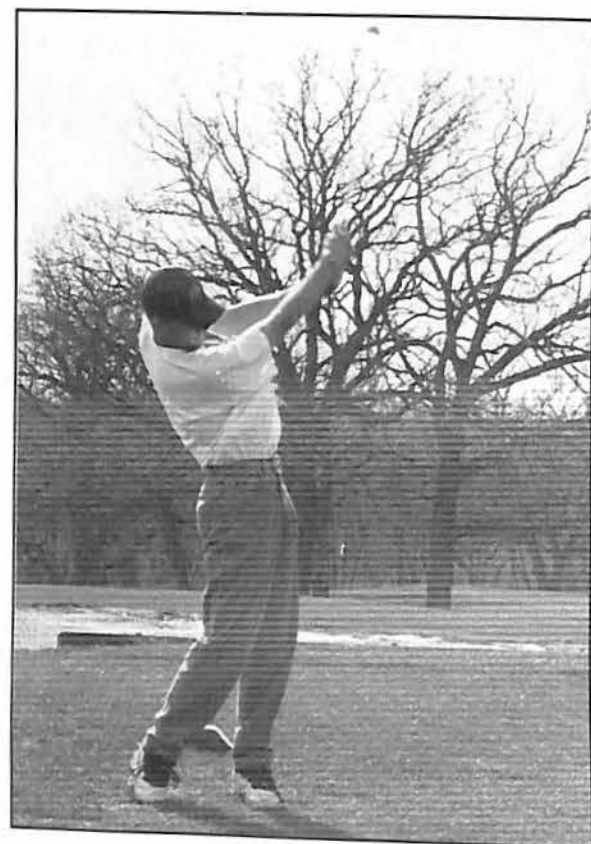

All the long runs and hard workouts paid off though as the individuals finished each race at their personal best. All of the participants seemed to have the eye of the tiger.

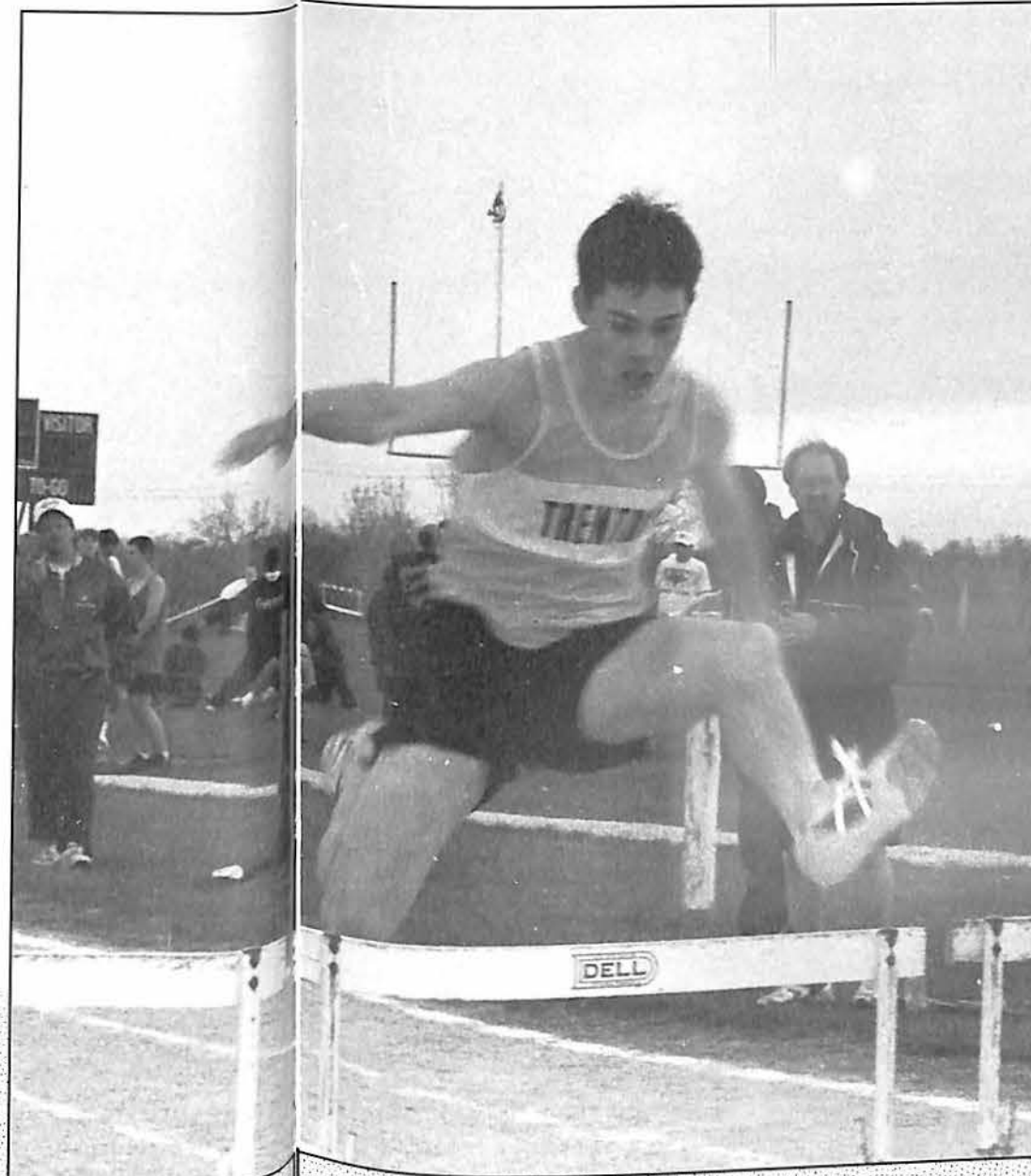

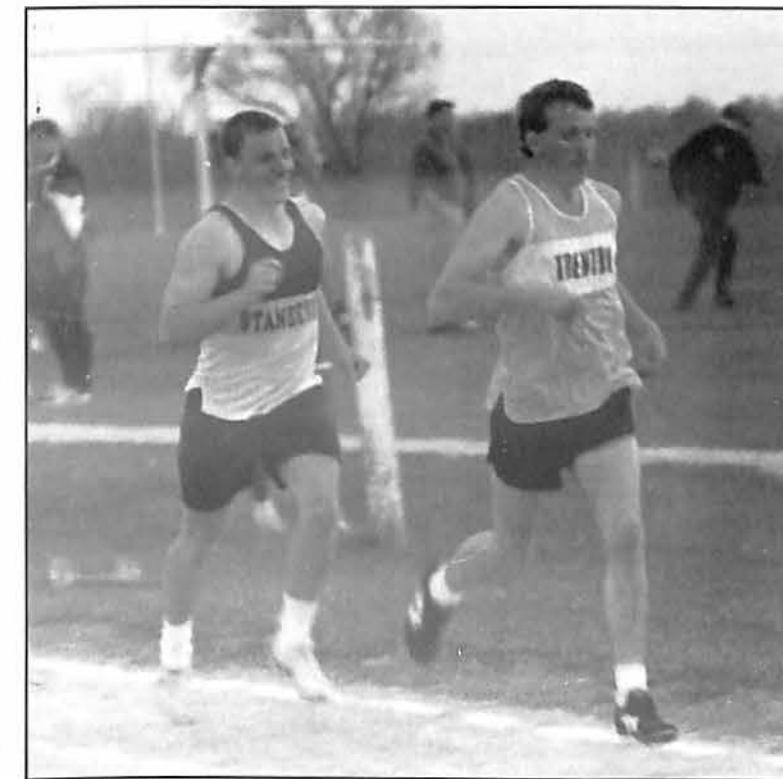

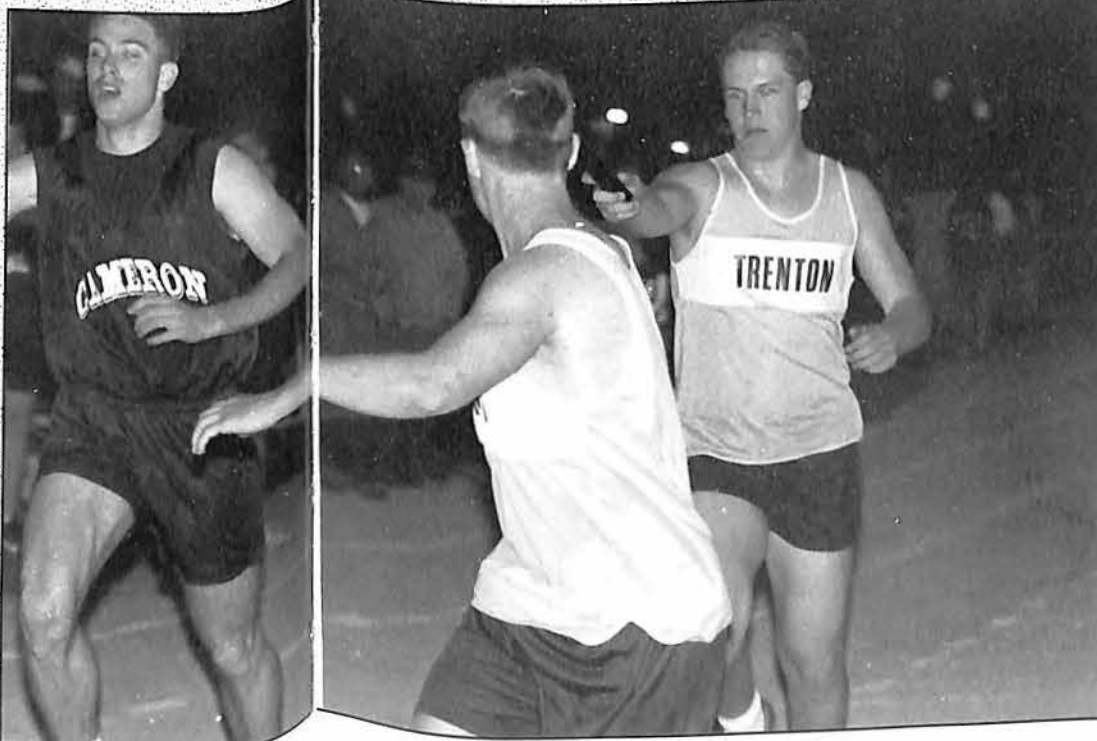

In boys' basketball, the guys finished with a losing record, but it was a chance for a couple of young men to step up and show what they could do on a basketball court. Corey Leeper led the

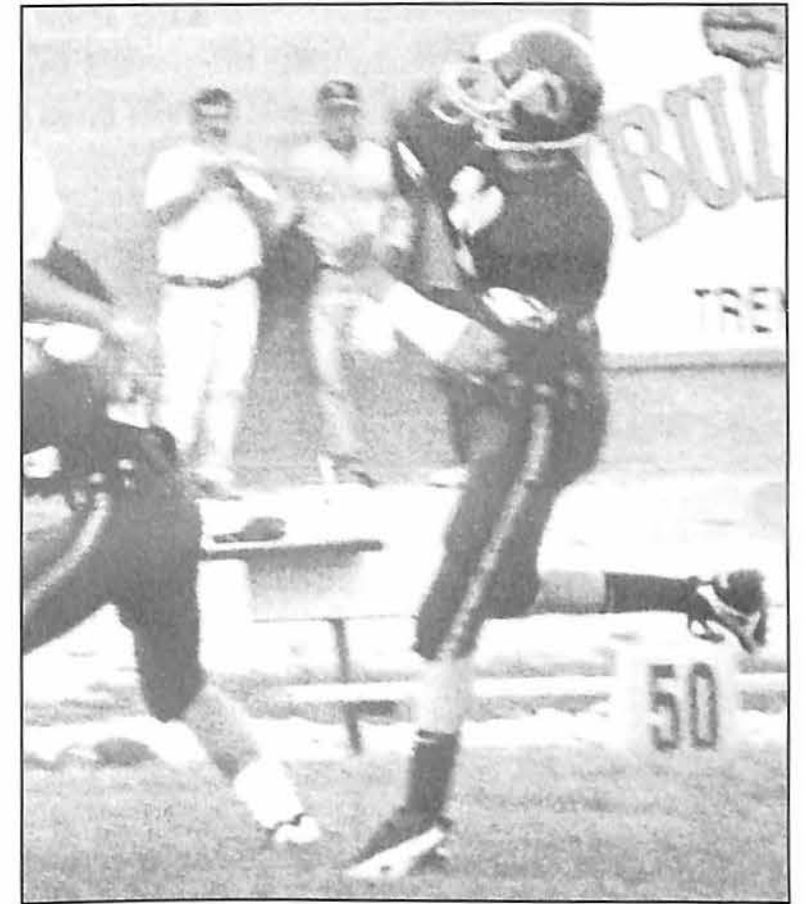
Dogs with a 9.5 scoring average, and fellow sophomore Philip Burgess was not far behind with a 8.7 average.

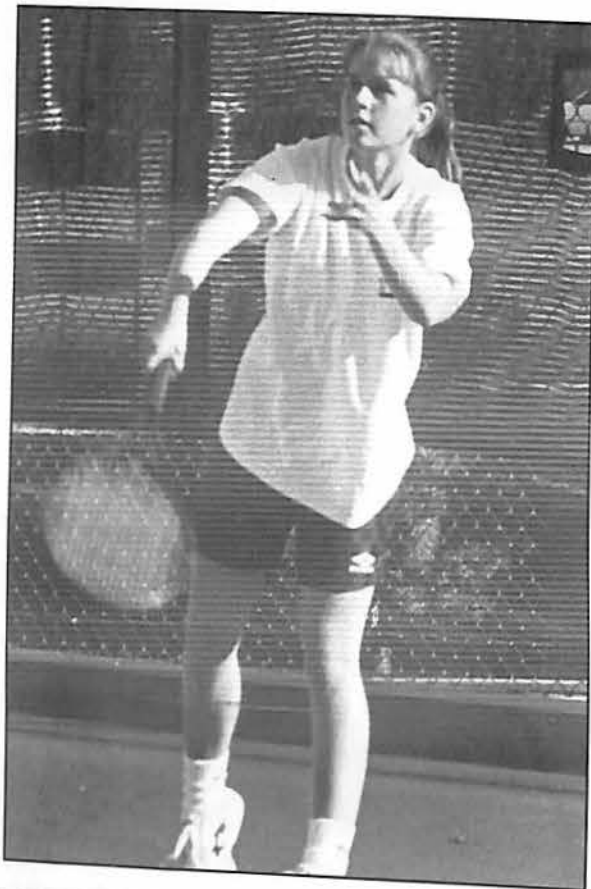

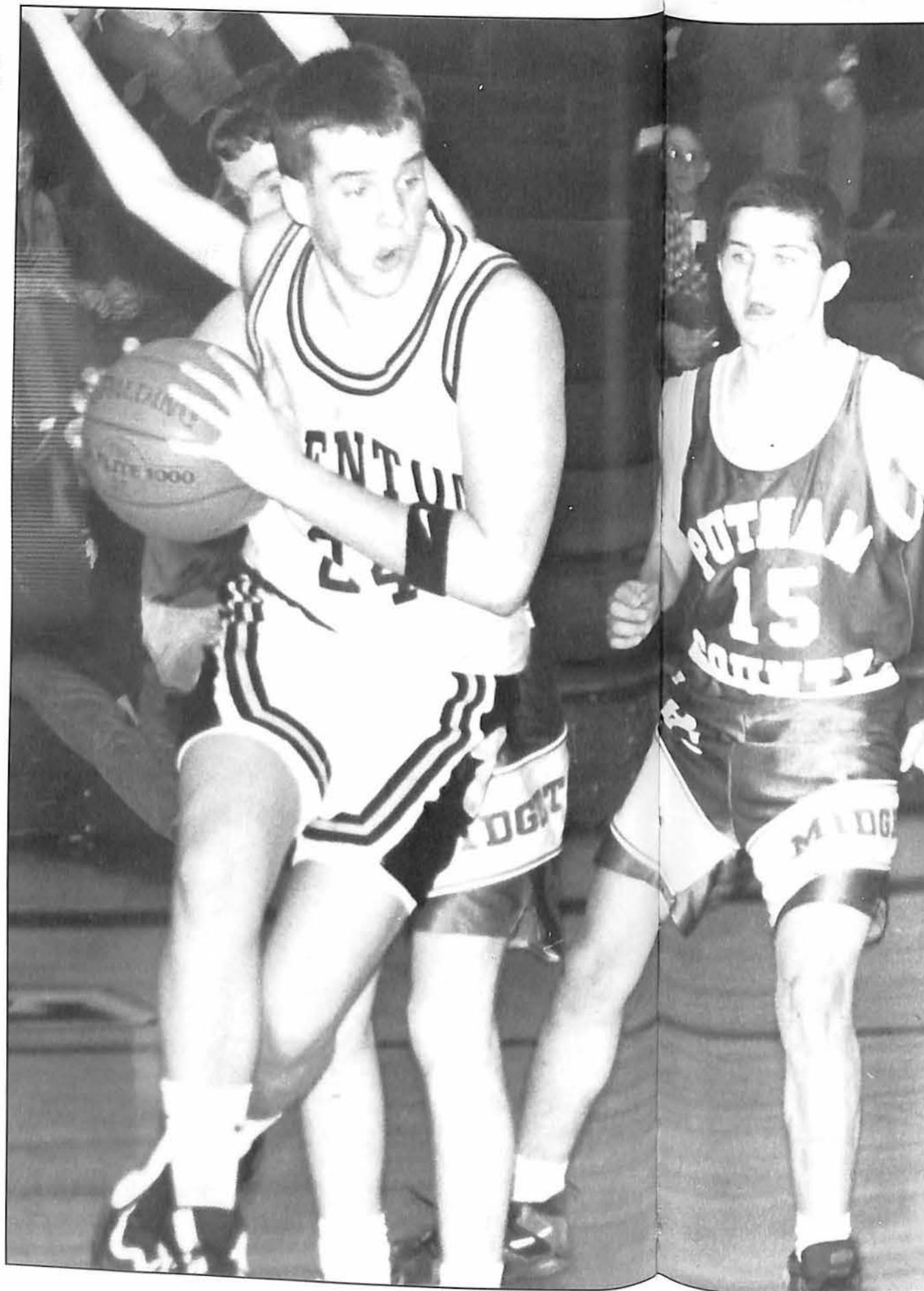

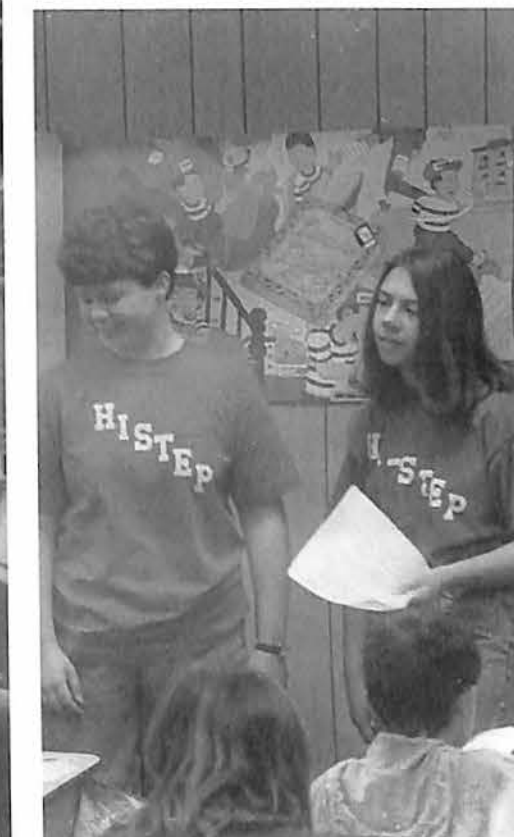

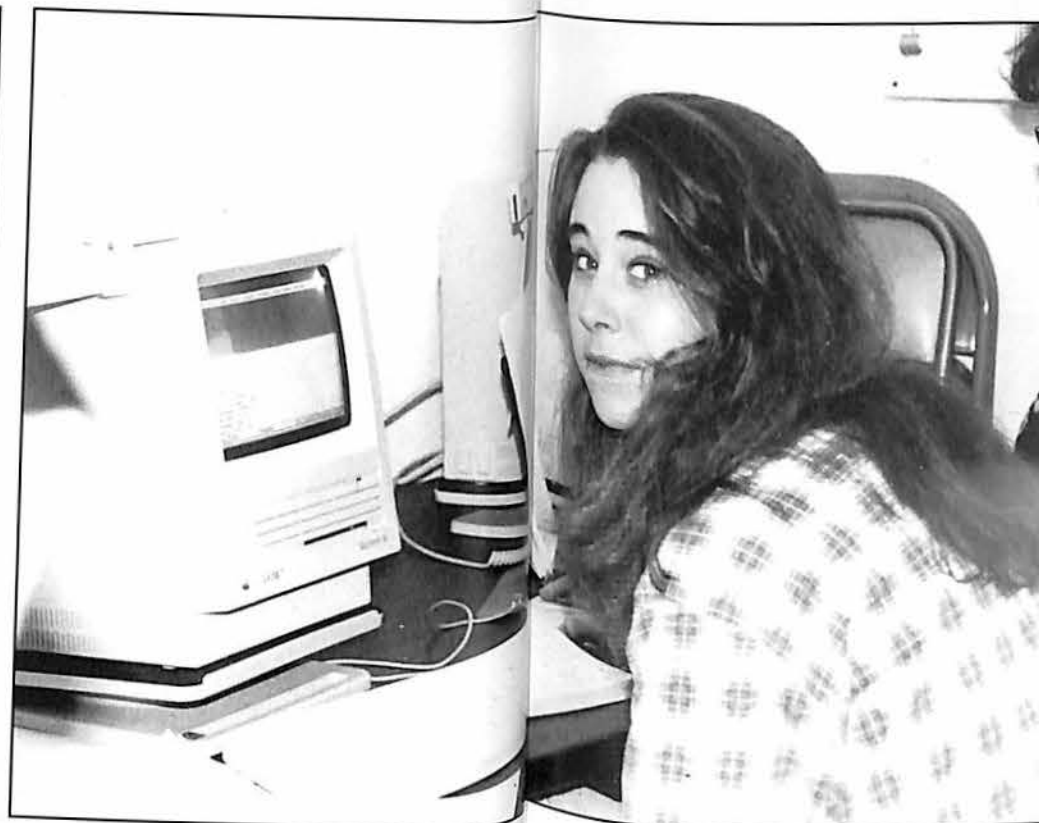

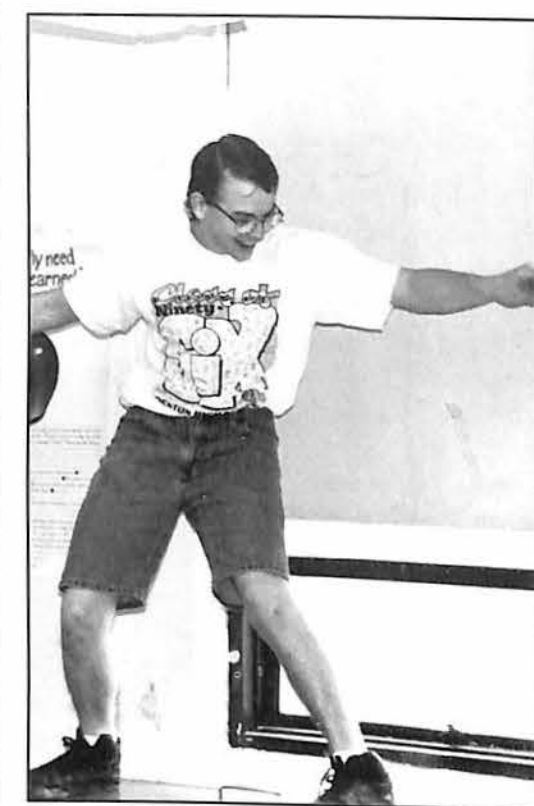
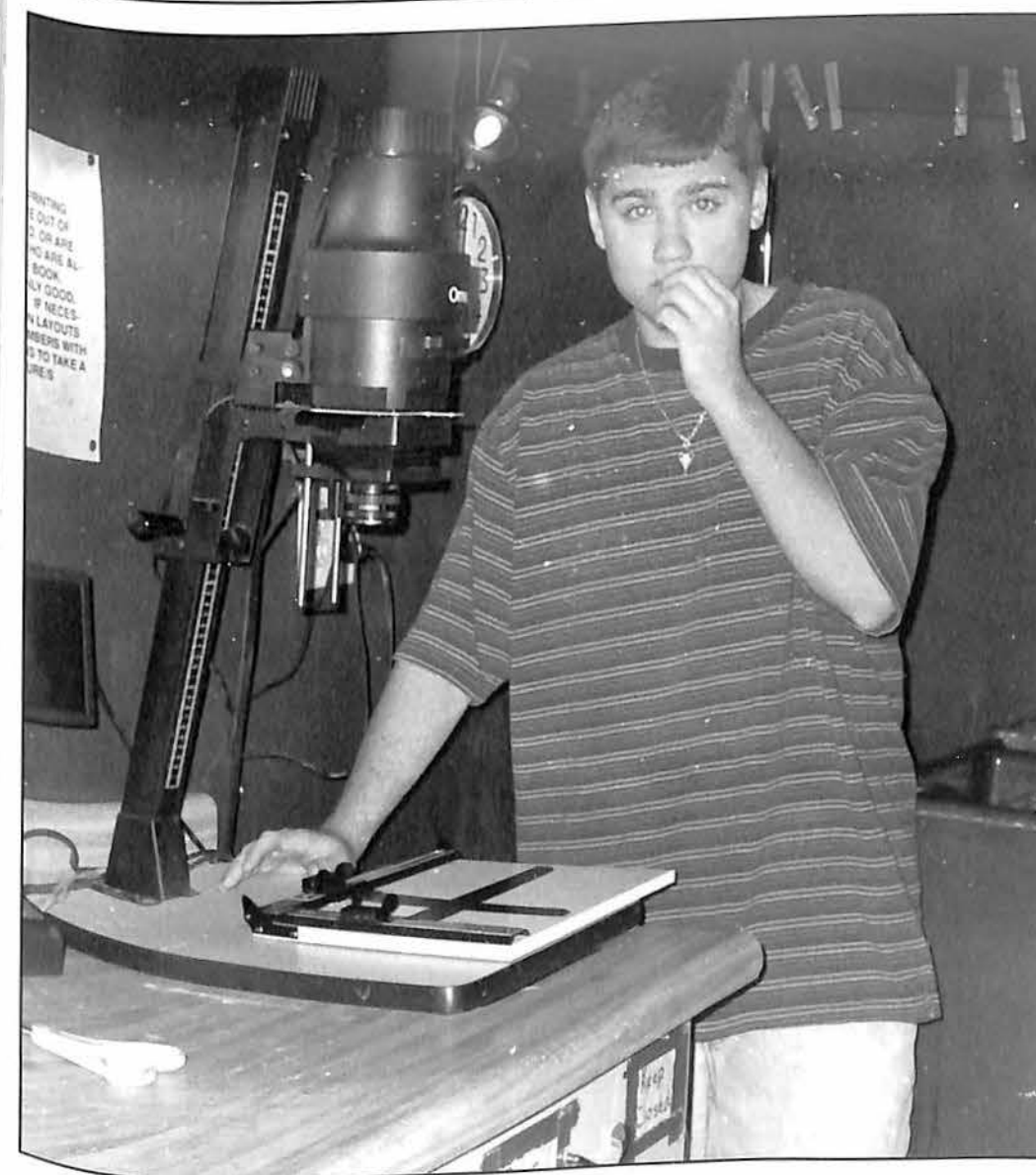

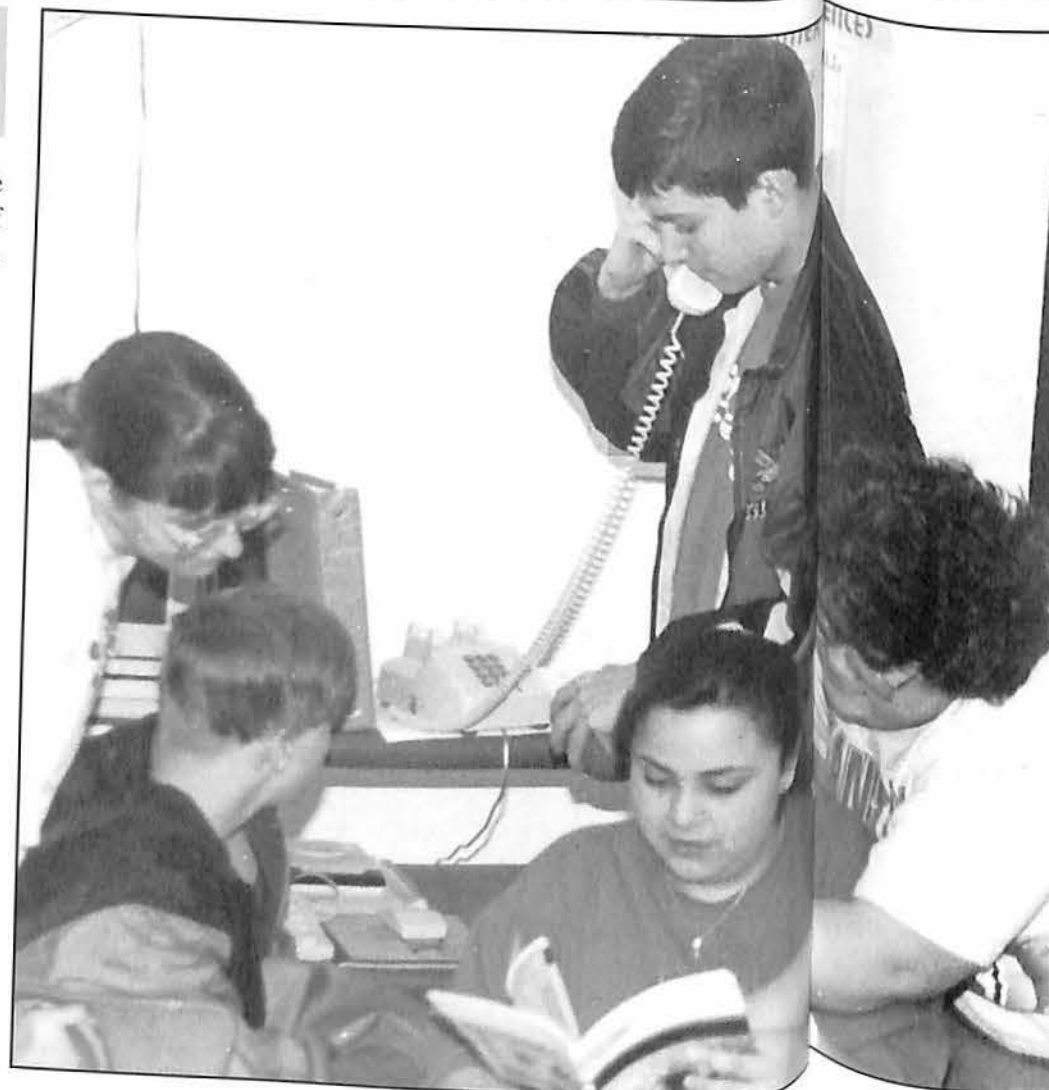

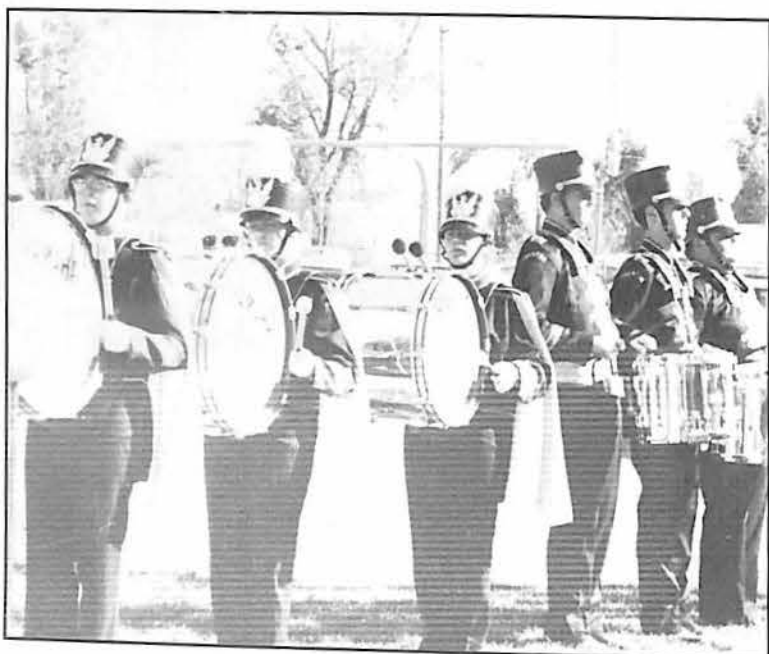

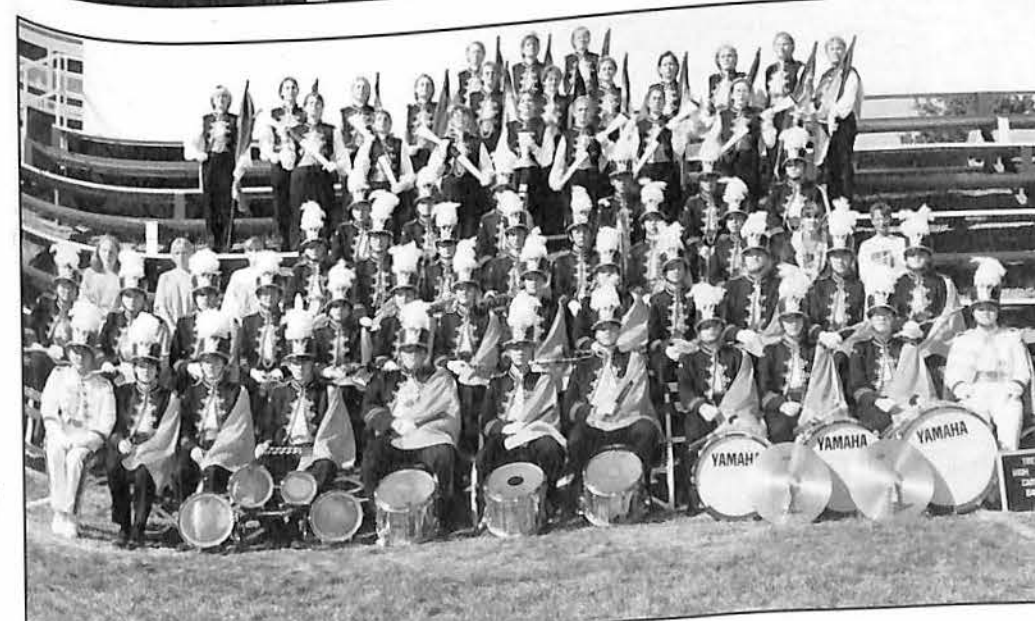
Through the cold months of night practices and the hot days of competitions, the band members will always remember the good times they had and the experiences they gained for their personal sacrifices.

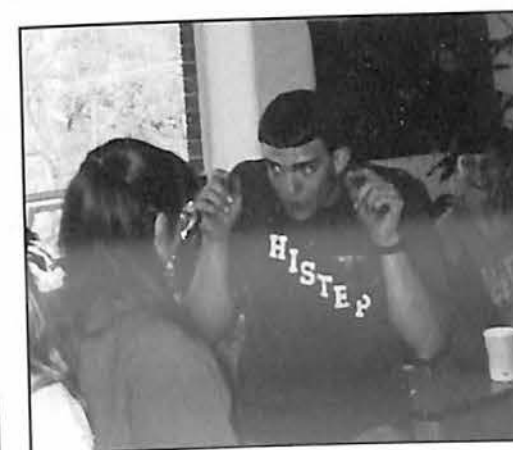

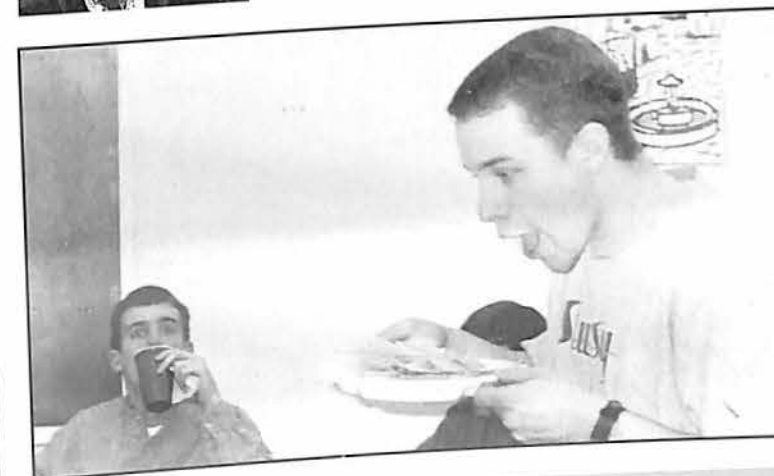

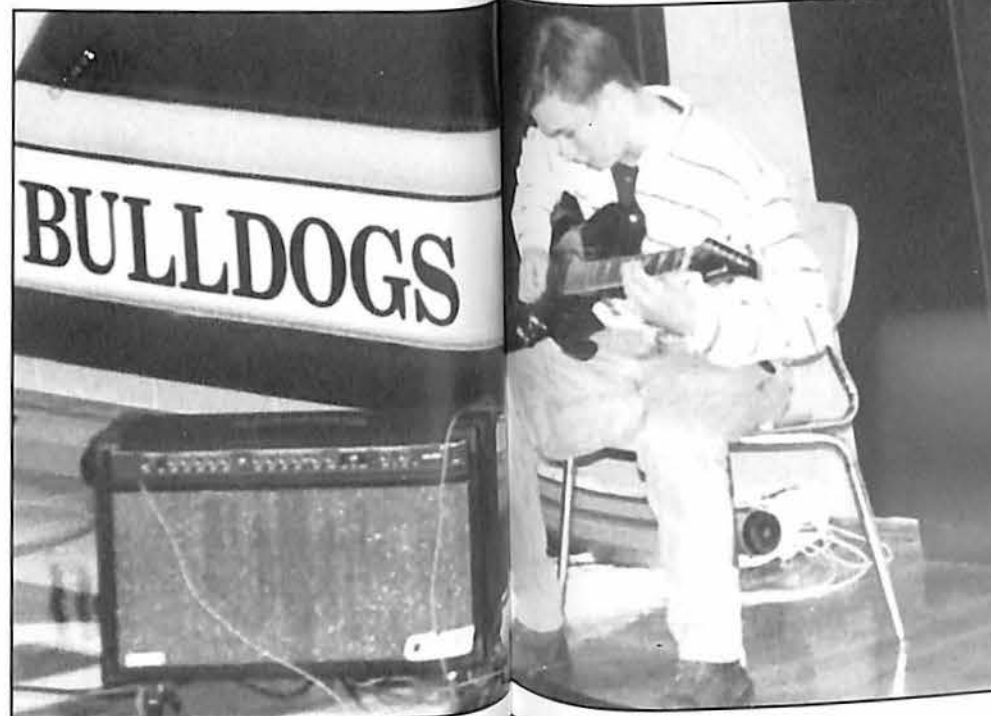

From organizing all homecoming activities to providing coffee and tea for the parent-teacher conferences, the Student Council kept busy throughout the year with a wide range of activities.

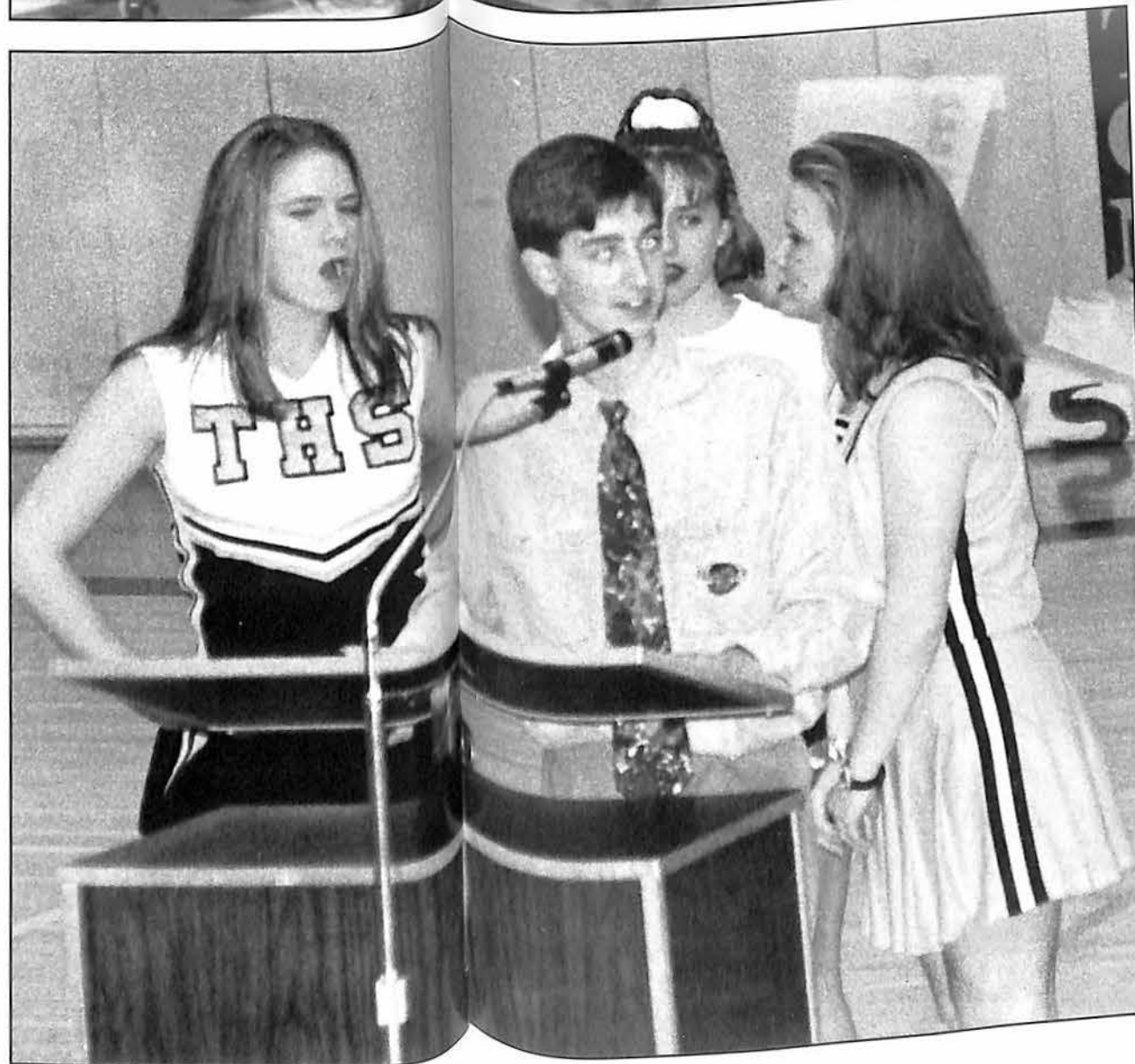

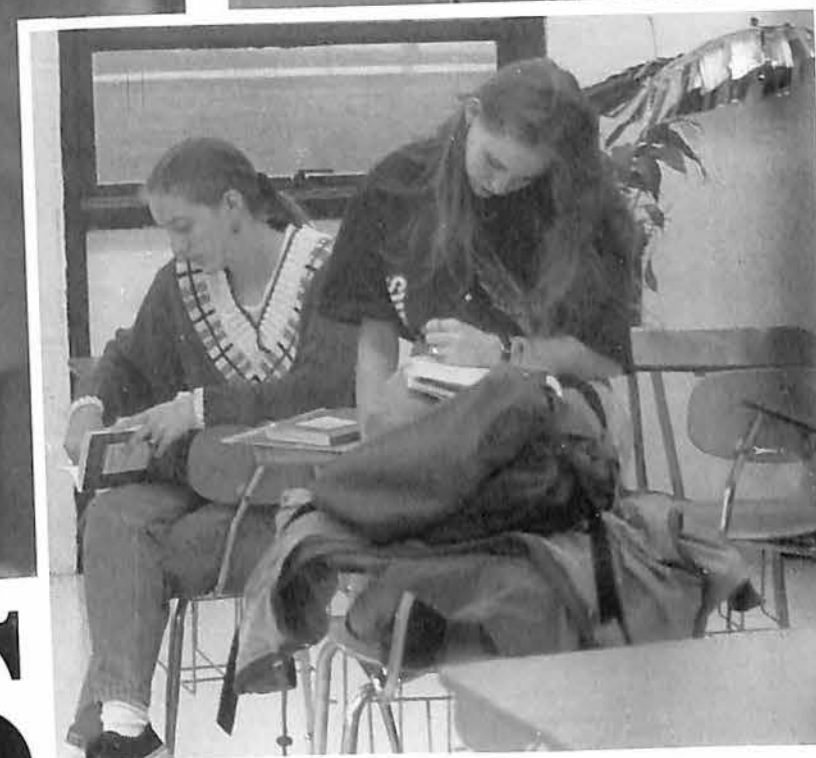

# Care Precaution & Guidance

Learning does not always have to be an unpleasant experience. In the classrooms, many teachers have methods of teaching other than just standing before the class and giving a lecture. Whether a student is in foods class cooking, or weight-training making him/herself fit, or in chemistry learning the importance and functions of the elements, or in structures learning how to build, there are many fun, yet, at the same time, dangerous things to do and learn. Under the careful guidance of the teachers, however, these projects are possible, if the students don't overstep the boundaries or forego safety precautions and guidelines.

Every instructor has his/her own set of rules which the students must follow while performing certain procedures and tasks. The last words given by the chemistry and physical science instructor, Ms. Fine, are "Don't go into the chemistry lab unless you have on your safety goggles and your apron. Do not pour the chemicals in the sink, and do not return the unused chemicals to the containers."

Coaches Regan Crow and Ric Cash advise their students to give one hundred percent in the gym and weight training room, but the best advice they feel they can give their students is to never work at a speed which they feel they cannot comfortably handle, and to never go into the weight room without a spotter.

Mrs. Hoffman instructs students in food preparation, child development, and sewing. Her main concern is that the students use common sense around the stoves and cooking areas. Some of the words of wisdom she gives are "Don't leave sharp objects in the dishwater and make sure the handles of the pans on the stove are always turned in."

"There is a lot of mechanical equipment in the agricultural department, and there should never be any horseplay. Safety goggles should be worn at all times, and when working in the shop, don't use any machine you have not been trained to use." These are the words of warning given by Mr. Ferguson, FFA sponsor and vocational-agriculture teacher.

Safety is a big issue and should always be acknowledged, not only for those engaged in a project, but for those in close proximity to the project. When doing these activities, the instructors ask that the students pay close attention and most importantly: "Don't try this unless..."

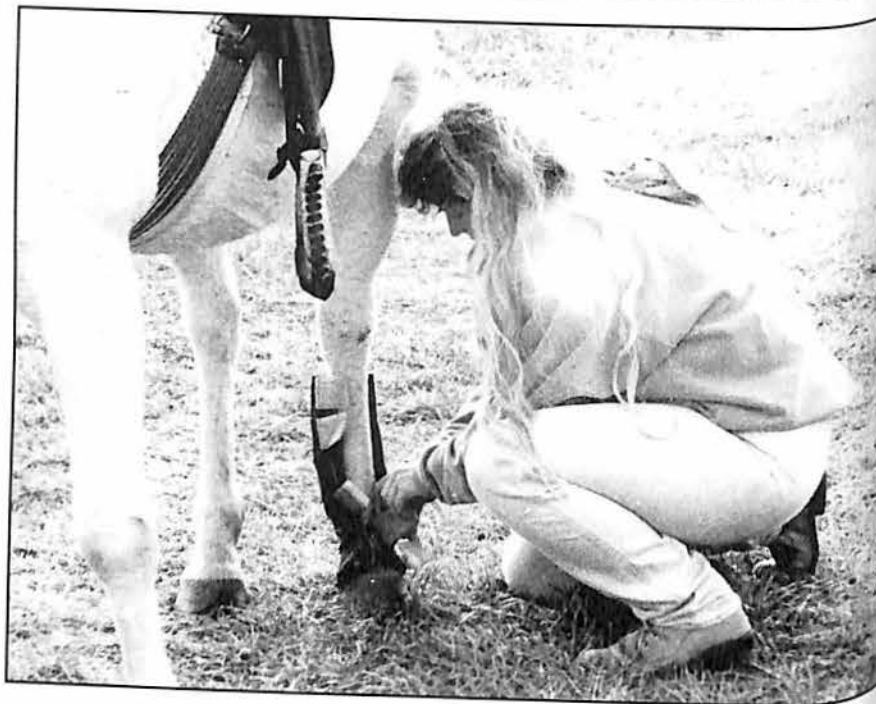
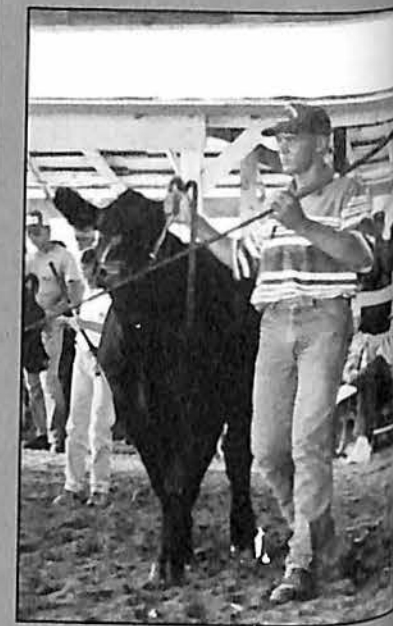

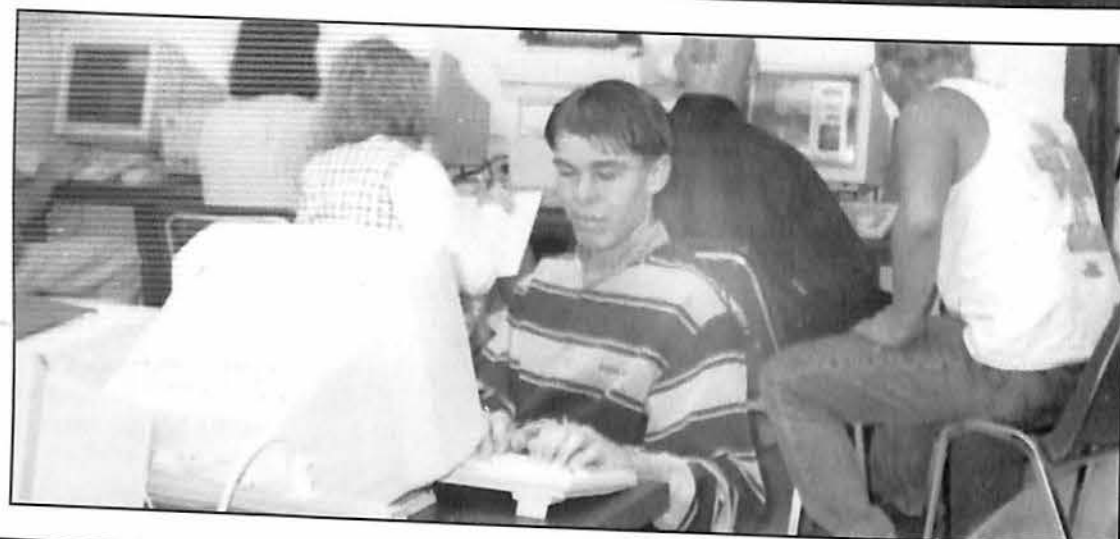

Students also had the opportunity this year to keep up with world and national news through a news broadcast watched daily, Channel One.

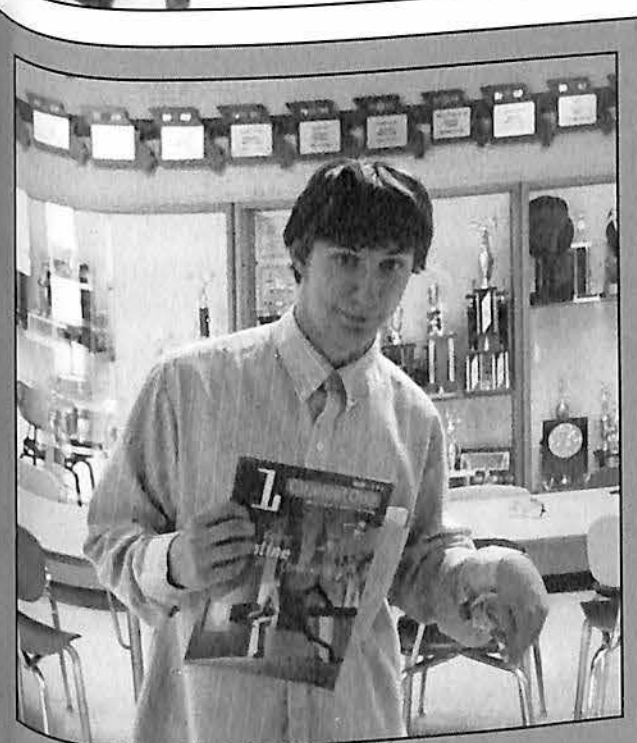
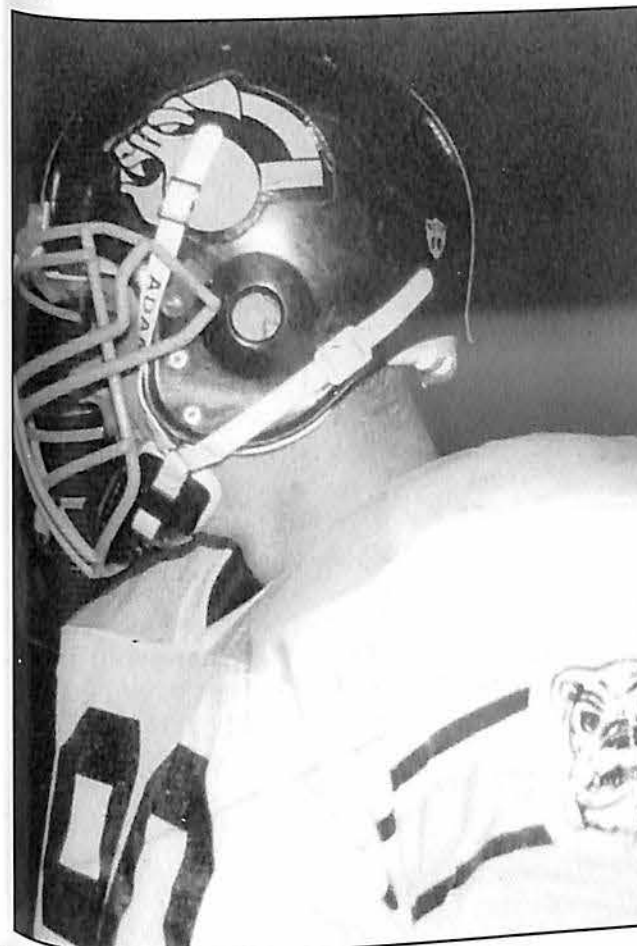

The goal of A+ is to combine technology and teaching methods to improve test scores, decrease dropout rate and to provide graduates with marketable academic and technical skills. Funds available through the A+ Missouri Schools Program will make such advancements possible. A large portion of funds for this year was spent on classroom computers. Over the next three years, there will be plenty of room for Trenton to improve and change.

There have been a few minor changes at THS as well. The nurses' office had moved, creating a new arrangement of offices and a teachers' lounge in the main office. Some classrooms were also equipped with desks and chairs. Teachers also gained a new duty of patrolling the parking lot in the mornings and evenings to maintain safety and order.

It was time for a change at Trenton High School and the students, faculty, and community all agree that it's all been for the better.

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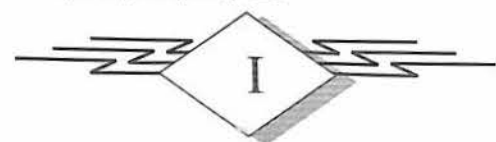
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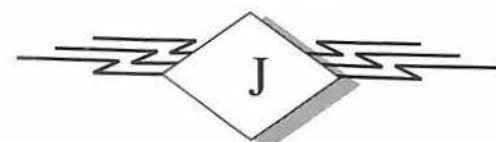
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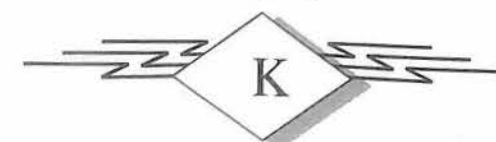
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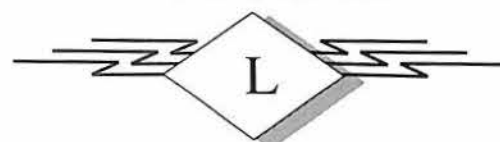
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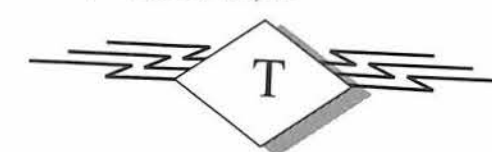
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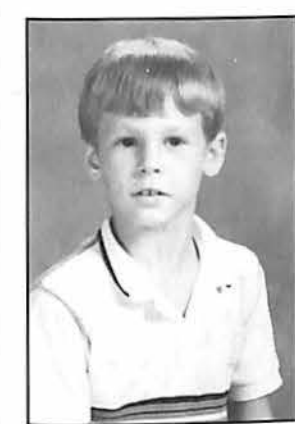
## Colophon
