GUIDANCE DEPARTMENT






TRIDENT COMMITTEE






GEOMETRY













The Columbia Press is a national organization which evaluates yearbooks. Our last year's book received a second place in the nation, just six points away from a first place honor.


Many hours and much hard work go into the finished publication. It requires complete co-operation by everyone to compile a yearbook of which the students of Brewer High School will be proud.







Although Brewer's football team lost several key players via the graduation route in 1959, the Witch squad came through with a better-than-average season, due to fine coaching and a great desire to win on the part of the players.

The Witches were hampered early in the season by injuries to backfield men, Wayne Walls and Ron Given.

On September 11, Gardiner arrived at Doyle Field for Brewer's opening game. Gardiner struck early and led 7-0 after one period of play. Brewer finally got their attack started, and Ron Given smashed for a TD. Half way through the third period, Given broke away for his second touchdown. The score was tied 13 to 13 with less than a minute to go. Brewer's Jim Garrity passed to Harry Bowden in a final effort, which won the game 19-13.

The second game of the season was all Brewer as they romped over Old Town 41-0. Brewer's offense was led by Ronnie Graves and Jim Garrity as they combined for twenty-three points. Other standouts were Bob Blanchard, Ron Given, and Jerry York. Frank Gemme and Dick Hadley were outstanding on defense.

The Stearns Minute Men met Brewer under the lights of Doyle Field on October 2.

The Witches looked like the team to beat, as Bob Blanchard and Jim Garrity led their team to a 25-0 victory.

On October 10, Brewer traveled to Sanford. Both clubs were undefeated, and the winner would be almost certain of a shot at the State crown. After a hard fought first half, Brewer trailed 7-0. The second half was all Sanford. The Witches just couldn't get rolling. The score ended Sanford 32, Brewer 0.

Some new youngsters found glory in the John Bapst encounter on October 16. Pete Pooler and Louie Violette led the Brewer scoring, while Jack Lane, Frank Gemme, and Dick Hadley led the line play. The final score was Brewer 25, John Bapst 0.

The game with Mexico was a repeat of the Bapst game. Violette and Pooler again led the scoring, as the Witch squad decisioned Mexico, 26-7.

Winslow invaded Brewer on October 30. The Witches still had a slim chance at the State Championship, but Winslow was really up for this one. The Brewer squad was downed by a score of 26-0.

The Witches traveled across the river on November 11 with hopes of salvaging the Inter-City Championship. The orange and black couldn't turn the trick. Although Louie Violette, Ronnie Rogerson, and Frank Gemme turned in good performances, the Rams owned this day. Ron Given scored the only Brewer TD. Bangor won 32-7.



Caribou, Dec. 19—Brewer rode to its fourth victory in five starts by easily defeating Caribou 71-51. The Mahaney-men again used an all-court press, causing the Vikings to throw away the ball on a countless number of plays. "Big Dan" got his usual high with 27 points. Vanidestine was in double figures with a "cool" 13 points (11 of them were foul shots). For the second consecutive game Little got 10 points. The hard-working Brewer bench finished out the last few minutes with Denny Day bagging his first bucket.

Bangor, Jan. 5—After a brief lull in the hectic season, "Dan the Man" proved that he hadn't lost any of his cool-headedness. With a mere five seconds remaining, Brewer, in a deadlock with the Rams 49-49, struck the deathblow with a 15-foot jump. Al Leathers, with his 12 points, had been a deciding factor in setting up the Witches' win. When there were only three minutes left to be played Al got two "quickies" to narrow the margin and enable Coombs to tie and finally win the game. Dan wound up with a magnificent showing of 30 points, and Dave Farley impressed the fans with some fine defensive plays.

Brewer, Jan. 8—Big Dan Coombs topped all scorers with his 32 points, as the Witches romped over Bar Harbor, 61-44. Brewer monopolized on Bar Harbor's mistakes during the first half. Little and Vanidestine showed some of their great rebounding strength.

Brewer, Jan. 12—Some slick passing from Al Leathers and Dave Farley, combined with Danny Coombs' 33 points, proved to be too much for the Golden Bucks from Bucksport. After a nip and tuck first quarter, Brewer settled down to its usual game and ended on top with a final score of 79-64.

Brewer, Jan. 16—at their first meeting during the season, the Witches dumped the Houlton Shiretowners 75-39. Coombs played a little more than three-quarters and dumped in his usual 32 points. Leathers put on a show of accurate foul shooting and totaled 17 points, while Vanidestine swished some long ones from the side and ended with 14 points.

Brewer, Jan. 22—Little played one of the best games of his career both offensively and defensively. His 16 points added greatly to the large margin in points over the Ellsworth Eagles. Coombs again ripped the nets for 32 points as Dave Farley played an excellent game and accurately shot in 10 points. Brewer won this one by the biggest margin of the season, 78-29.

Brewer, Jan. 26—Bangor's tourney hopes were ripped apart by a sharp Brewer team as the Witches defeated Bangor 68-54. Coombs hit for 29 points, while Leathers played one of his best games of the season, gunning for 20 points. Vanidestine helped the cause with 12 big ones.

Brewer, Jan. 29—Fort Fairfield put up a great fight, but Brewer's teamwork proved to be too much of an overwhelming margin. Brewer winning, 55-49. Coombs was closely guarded, and the sagging defense kept him from scoring higher than the respectable 13 points he sank.

Ellsworth, Feb. 2—The Ellsworth Eagles were literally run off their own home court by a tournament-bound Brewer team. The high man (naturally) was cool Danny Coombs with 44 points. The subs took over the play during most of the second half. There wasn't any doubts in the minds of the spectators from the start of the game that Brewer wouldn't win as the final score of 71-49 well shows.

Brewer, Feb. 5—The fast-breaking Witches swamped Caribou, running up a score of 87-56 before a small crowd at the Brewer High School Auditorium. Dazzling Danny's accurate shooting netted 32 points. The whole team displayed some magnificent hustling. Vanidestine, Little, and Leathers wound up with 16, 14, and 13 points respectively.

Brewer, Feb. 9—Brewer gained revenge by defeating John Bapst, the only team to have defeated them so far, 78-56. The fourth quarter saw the Crusaders go scoreless as Coombs kept hitting, bagging a total of 33 points. Leathers was the highlight of the game, even though Coombs was top scorer, showing some nifty defensive action and contributing 29 counts to the Witches cause.

Coombs was high scorer with 28 points, but his magnificent effort was not enough to quell the determined Indians.

Northeast Harbor, Dec. 4—Brewer initiated a spectacular basketball season by downing a determined Bar Harbor quintet 58-55. Danny "Cool" Coombs showed a taste of what was to come by "bombing" 25 big points. Both Dennis Vanidestine and Al Leathers hit double figures with 16 and 15 points respectively.

Brewer, Dec. 8—Husky Jim Garrity came off the bench in the third quarter to spark the Witches in a hard-fought 55-52 win over the Old Town Indians. Coombs had to play it cautious during the last twelve minutes, and big Jim took over to gun six for seven from the floor. Coombs was the high man of the game with 22 points.

Bangor, Dec. 15—Brewer was downed by an impressive John Bapst Club 61-59. The Witches got off to a bad start and trailed at half-time by 11 points. 









Then the Witches finished close seconds in two different 4-way meets held at Bucksport and ended the regular season by winning a 4-way meet at Blue Hill.
