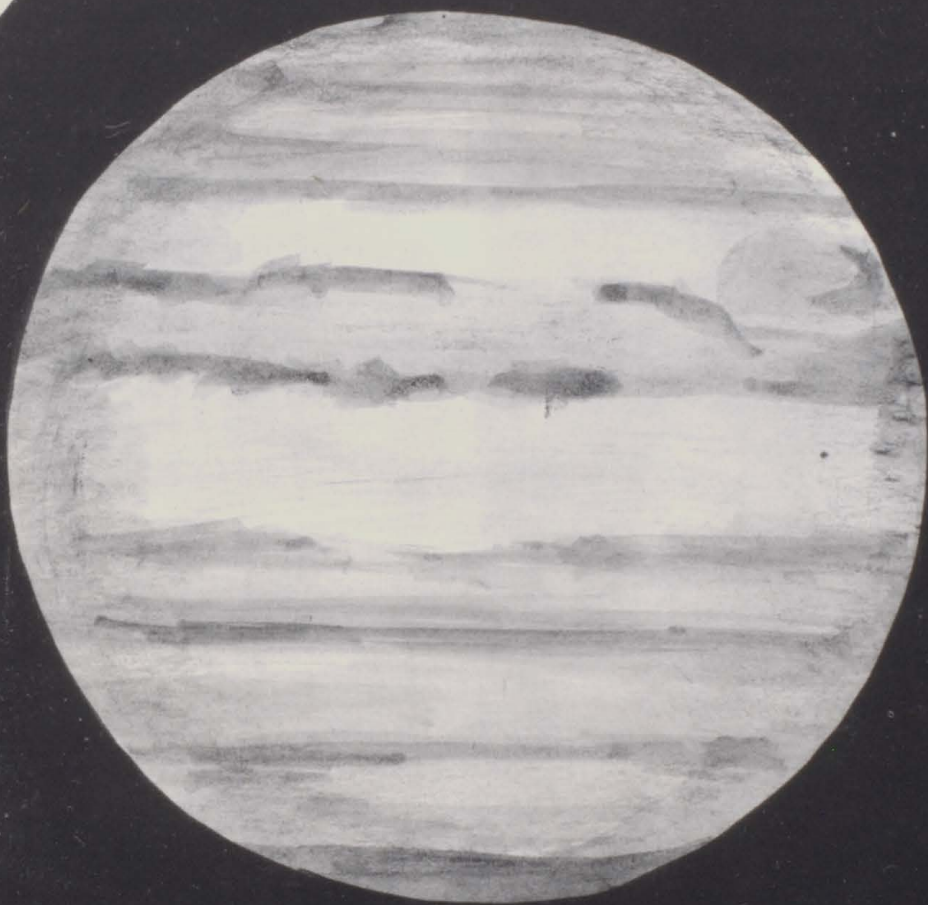

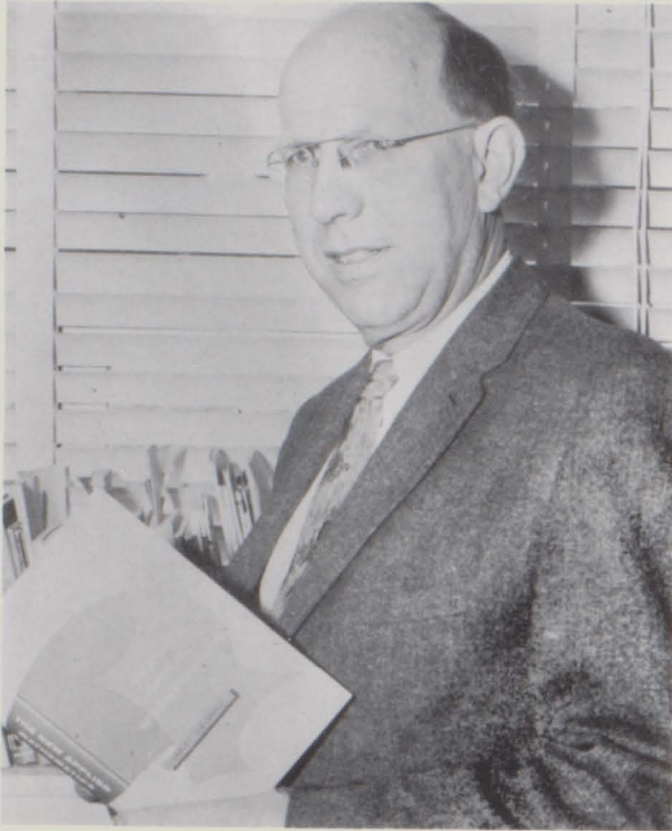
FOREWORD

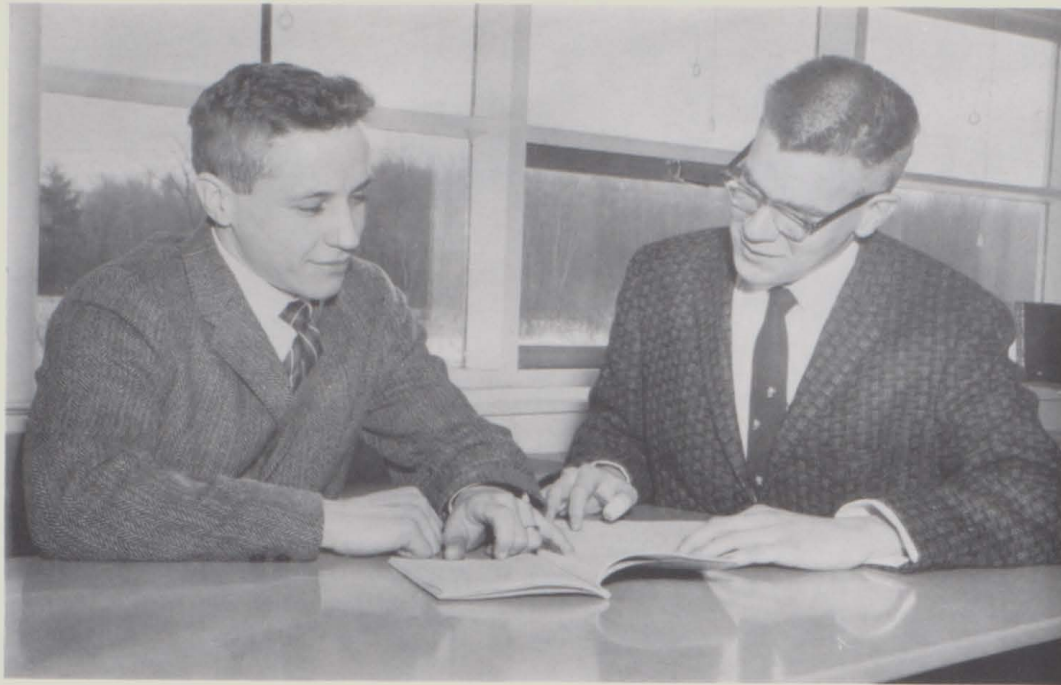

GEOGRAPHY

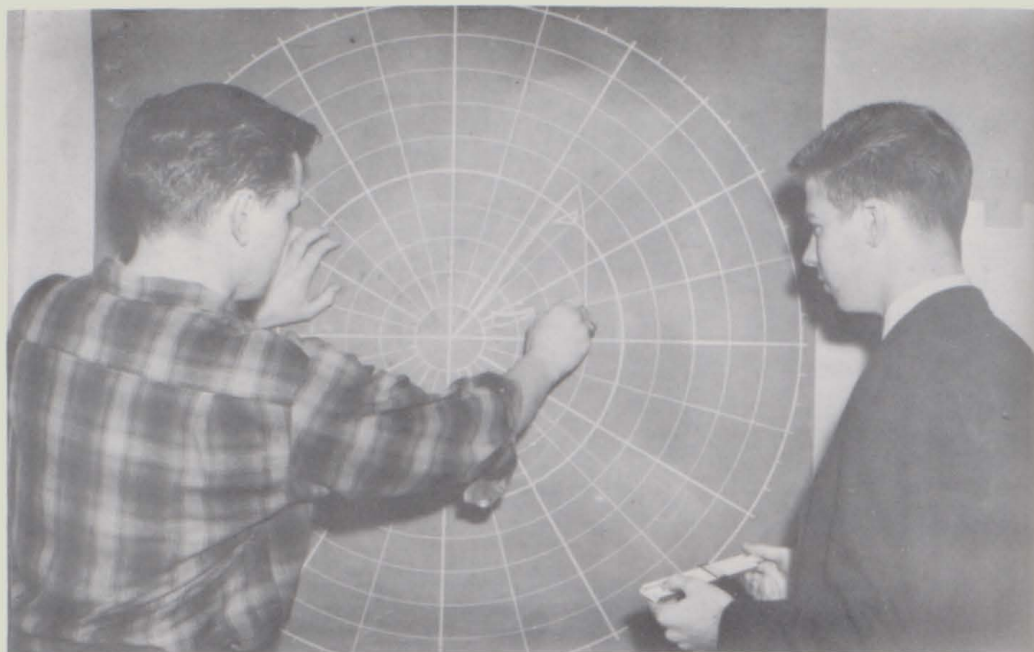

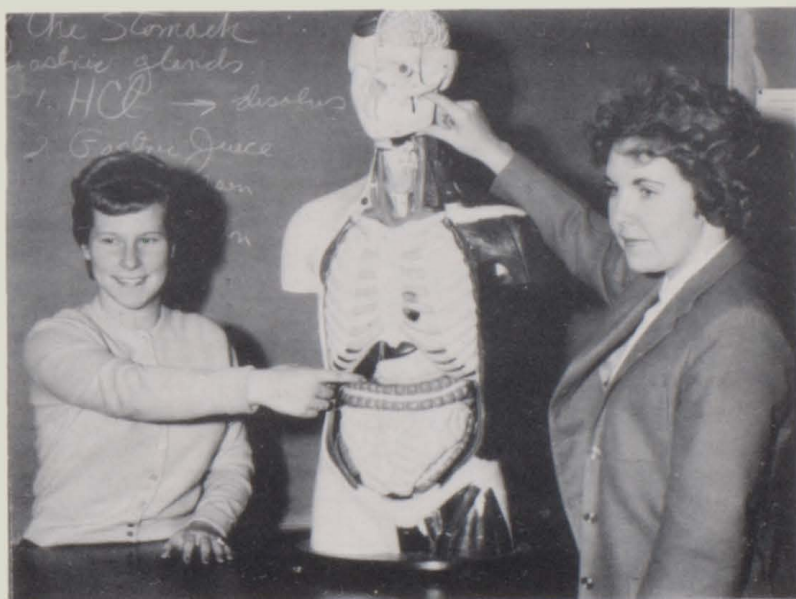

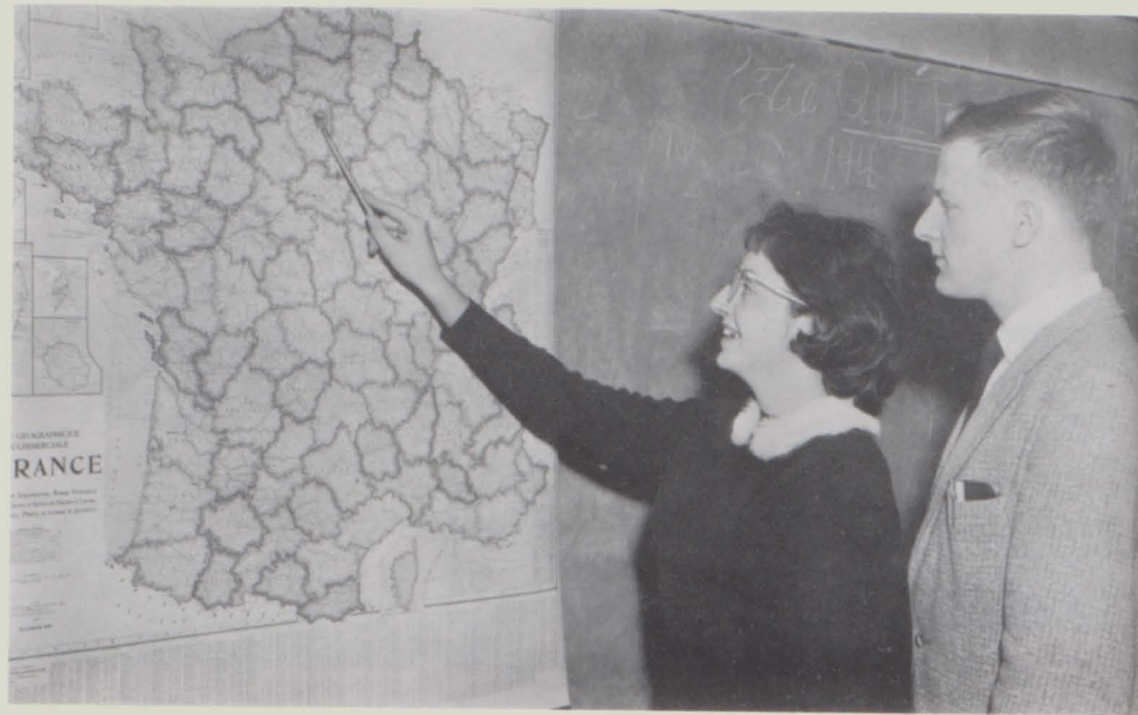

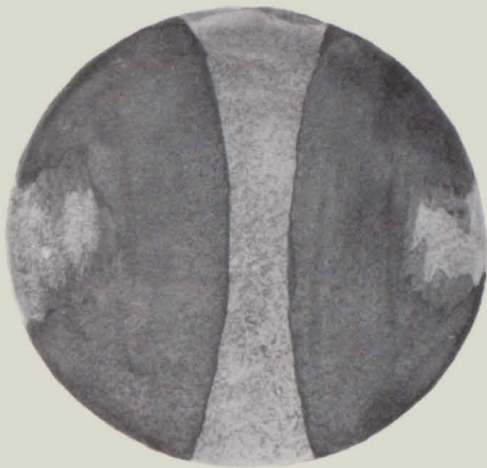

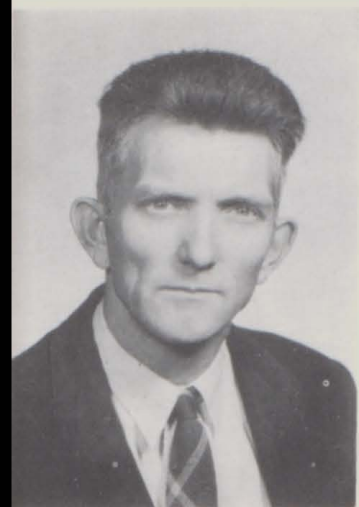

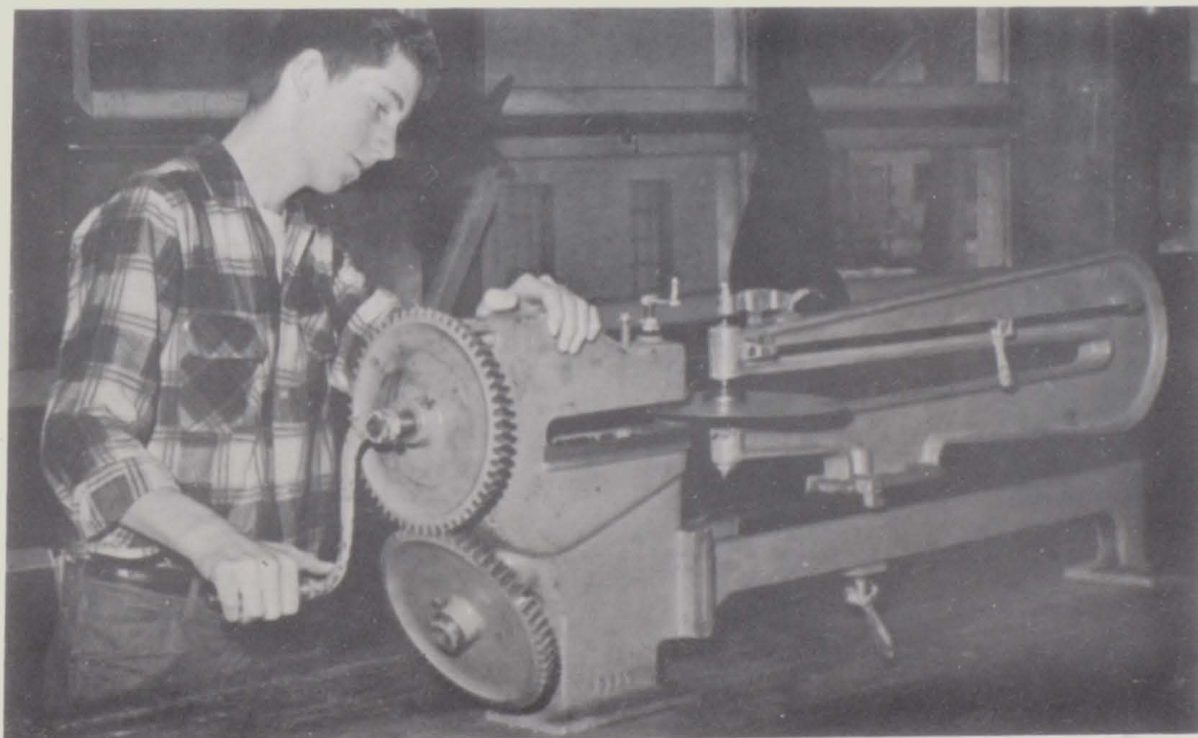

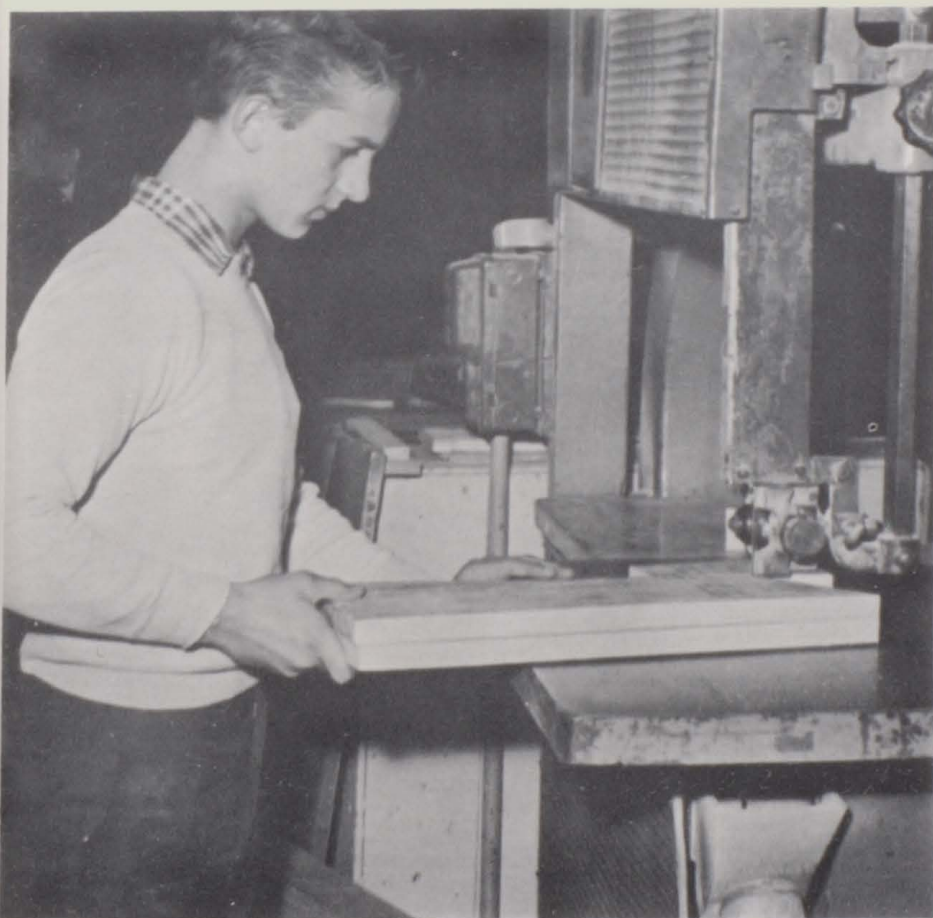

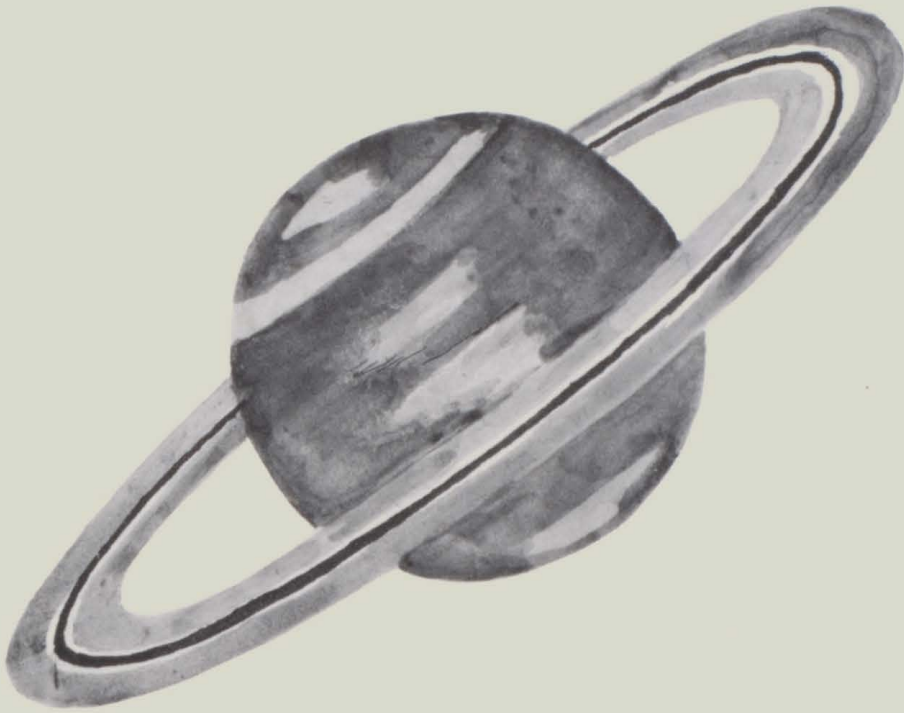

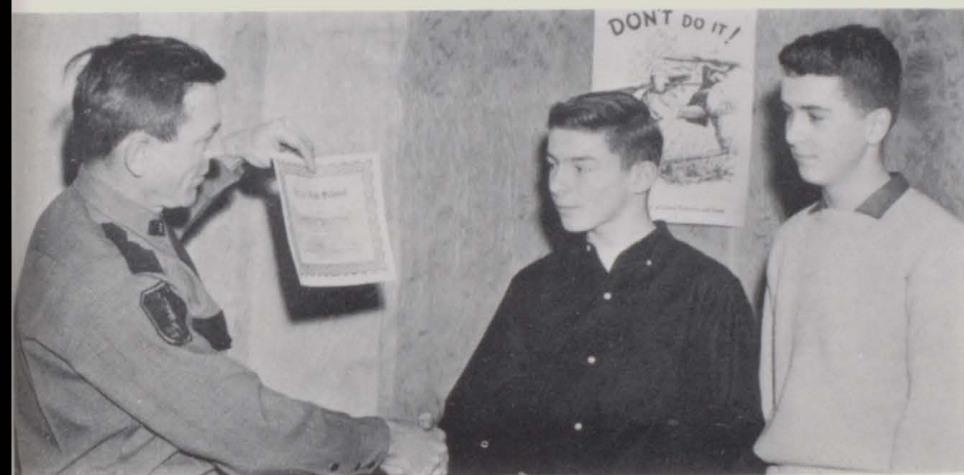

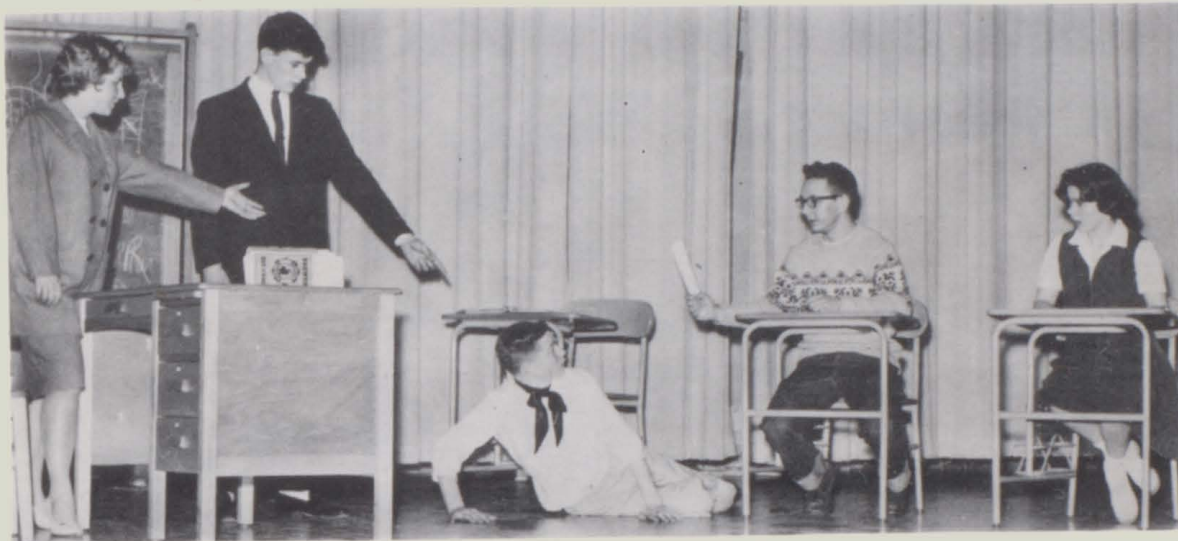

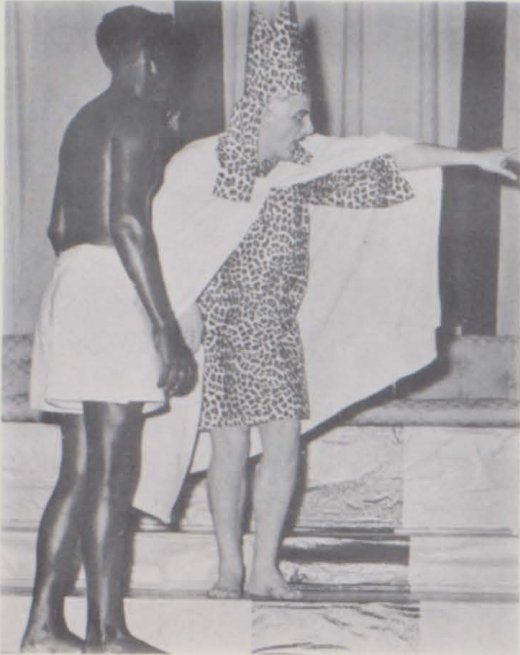

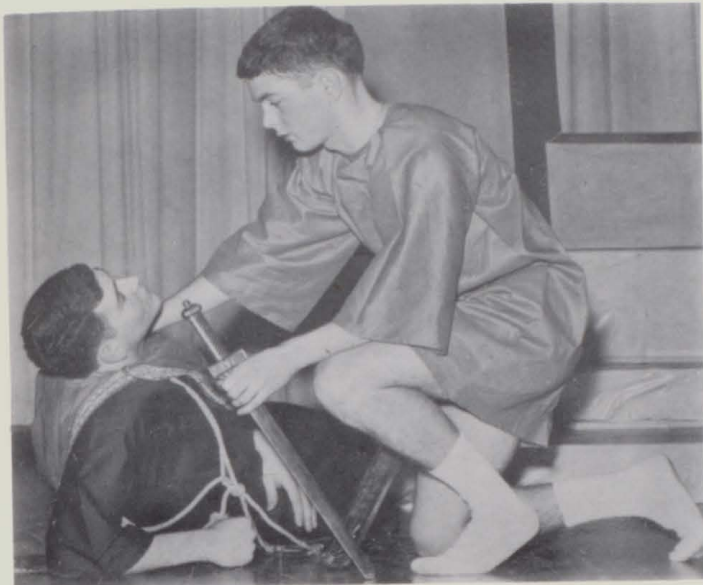

FOOTBALL

On September 10 Brewer opened its 1960 football season with a win at Gardiner. The Brewer team was led, as it was all season, by Louie Violette, Ronny Rogerson, defensive standout Stan Pyzynski, and co-captains Dick Hadley and Frank Gemme. Gardiner scored on a seventy-eight yard touchdown run on the third play from scrimmage. Brewer countered on a pass from Al Connolly to Louis Violette. Each team scored again in the first half, but Brewer missed its try for extra point and Gardiner led 14-13. The second half was a defensive struggle with Brewer pushing across a touchdown by Charlie Porter to win the game 20-14.

On September 23 Brewer played its first home game of the season against Old Town. It was Brewer all the way, led by the break-away speed of Louie Violette and a fine defensive effort by the Brewer Witches. Brewer scored in the opening minutes of play and came out on top 34-6.

Brewer continued its winning ways by invading Stearns lead by the fine running of Louie Violette and the defensive standout Stan Pyzynski. Brewer blanked the Minutemen 21-0.

A heavily favored Brewer team invaded Madison, only to be upset by the Bulldogs 20-0. Madison scored in the first quarter, after a long pass put the ball on the two-yard line. Late in the second quarter Brewer gambled on a fourth down pass which fell incomplete. Madison took over on their own 45 yard line and raced 55 yards on the next play. Madison took the kick off, starting the second half, and scored nine plays later. Jim Tolman, Lou Violette, and Charlie Porter teamed up to give Brewer their best drive, which took them to the 20-yard line before they were stopped.

Brewer, still smarting from its first defeat, came back strong by beating John Bapst 39-0. Louie Violette and Jim Tolman led Brewer with six touchdowns between

them. Mid-way in the third quarter Coach Larry Mahaney cleared the bench and the substitutes finished the game.

A heavily favored Winslow team invaded Brewer with high hopes of wrapping up the Class B championship. A fired-up Brewer team out-played the Winslow team but lost 14-13. Both Brewer and Winslow threatened in the first half but neither team scored. In the third quarter Louie Violette carried the ball over to break the deadlock. The conversion was good, and Brewer led 7-0. Winslow came right back to tie it up. Late in the third quarter Brewer scored again and led 13-7. But in the closing minutes Winslow scored and pushed across the extra point for a 14-13 victory.

Brewer, still in contention for second place in Class B, hosted a strong Sanford team. Brewer was in the game all the way, trailing 7-0 at half time. The score remained the same until late in the fourth quarter when Sanford pushed across the second touchdown, winning the game 14-0. The Brewer team was led by the hard running of Louie Violette and a fine effort by the defensive team.

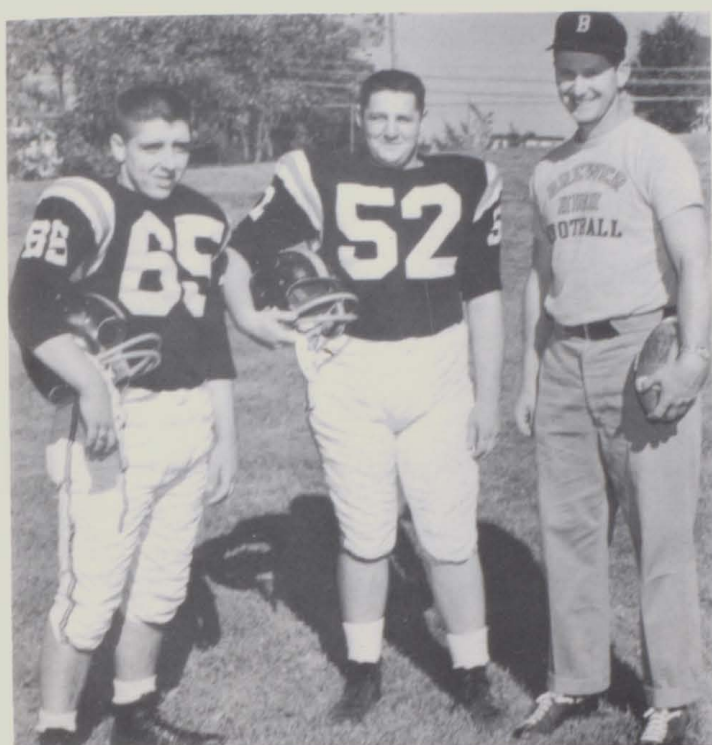
Brewer played host to a powerful Class D team from Bucksport. The Golden Bucks held Brewer to a slim 7-0 lead at the first half. In the second half Bucksport scored on a ninety-yard run, but the pass for the extra point was incomplete. Brewer held the slim lead to win 7-6.

In the traditional Armistice Day clash Brewer played host to Bangor. Bangor scored early on a fluke fumble. In the second quarter they scored again on a long pass. Bangor took a 13-0 lead into the locker room at half-time. Bangor broke away in the fourth quarter to score three touchdowns to break the game wide open to win 33-0. All seniors on the Brewer squad saw action in the final game.

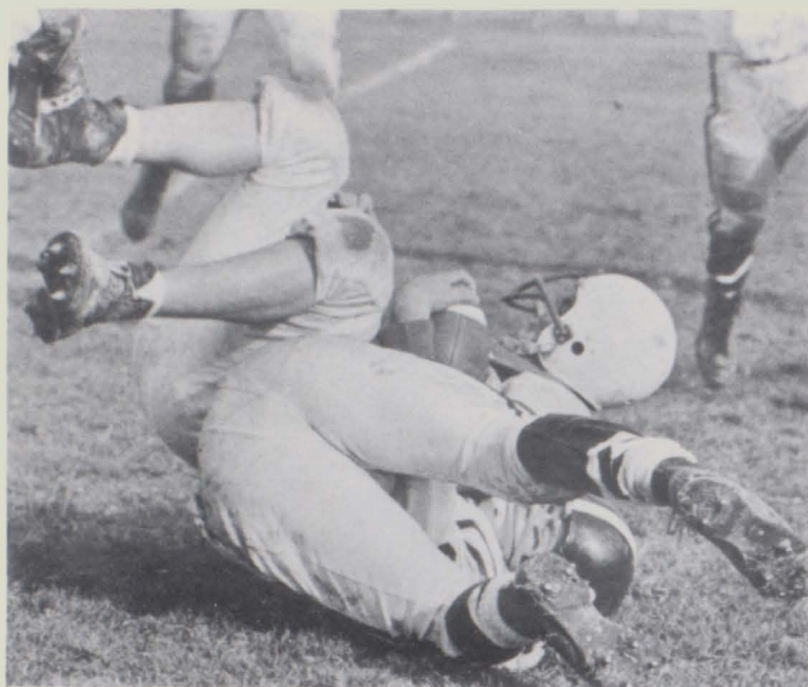

BASKETBALL

The defending Eastern Maine champs opened the 1960-61 season with only one returning letterman, Ron Rogerson, the manager. The starting line-up boasted only two seniors, but throughout the year the team maintained a "never-say-die" attitude.

The season began on a bleak note with a loss at Bar Harbor. On December 6, the Witches invaded Old Town and very nearly turned in the biggest upset of the season. Though the underdog, Brewer led by five points at half-time, but the Witches could not hold the Indians in the last quarter.

The first home game of the year saw Brewer obtain its first victory, a 60-50 win over John Bapst. The team was led by Eddie Arnold with 15 points, and Dennis Day and Jimmy White with 13 points each.

It was on the home court, Jan. 20, that Brewer turned in a major upset for its sec-

ond victory of the year. The Ellsworth Eagles came into the game strongly favored. But a strong offensive effort by Eddie Arnold and Dennis Day, coupled with the strong defensive job by Dave Harnum, was enough to turn the tables in Brewer's favor.

The team was led all season by the fine playmaking of Jimmy White and sophomore Al Connolly in the backcourt. Seniors Dave Harnum and Dennis Day provided rebounding depth and scoring thrust from the corners. Junior Eddie Arnold turned in a consistently good all-round performance. Joe Ferris performed well as a sixth man.

This season was a "building season" for Coach Larry Mahaney and his players. Next year looks very promising, with a team of talented and experienced juniors and seniors.

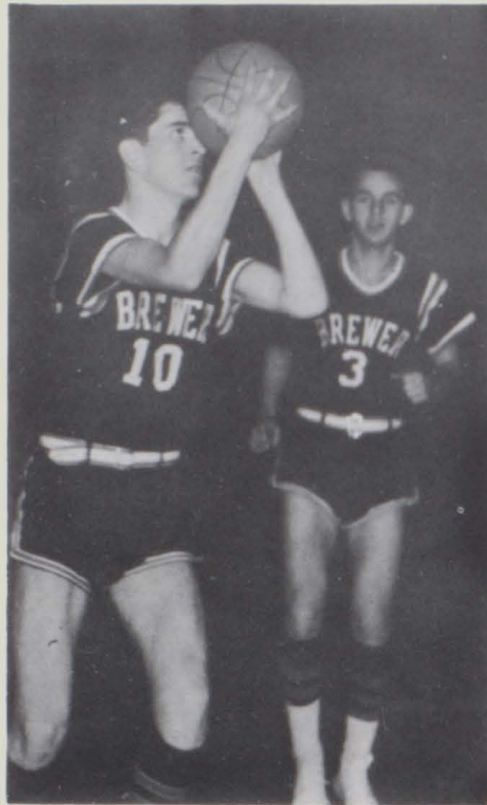

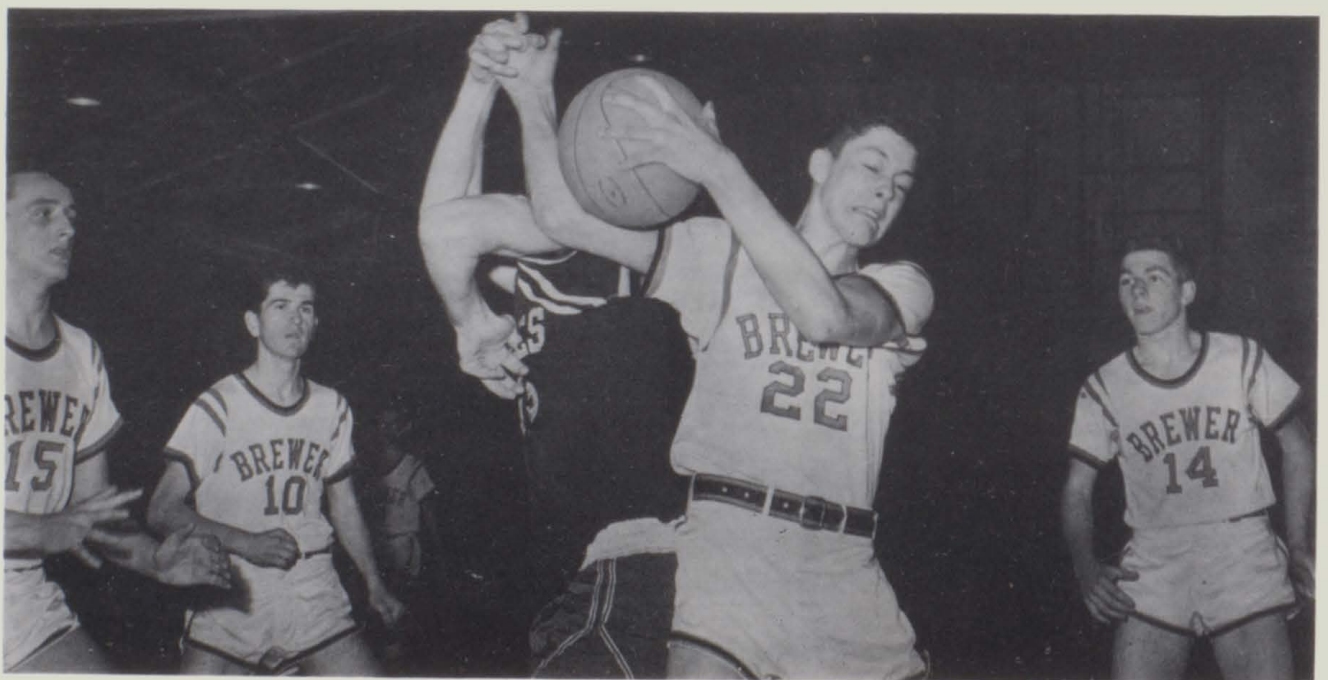

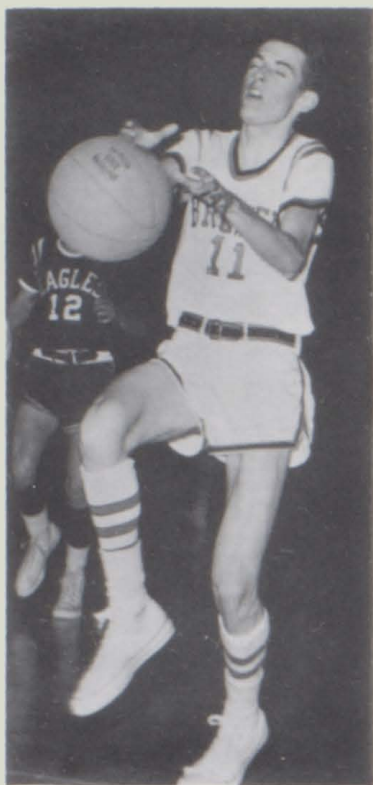

Brewer was led all the way by the fine running of Dave Farley and Harry Bowden, and Dennis Vanidestine's short put and high jumping. Brewer also got strong support from Dick Farley, a promising sophomore, who is expected to fill brother Dave's shoes very amply.

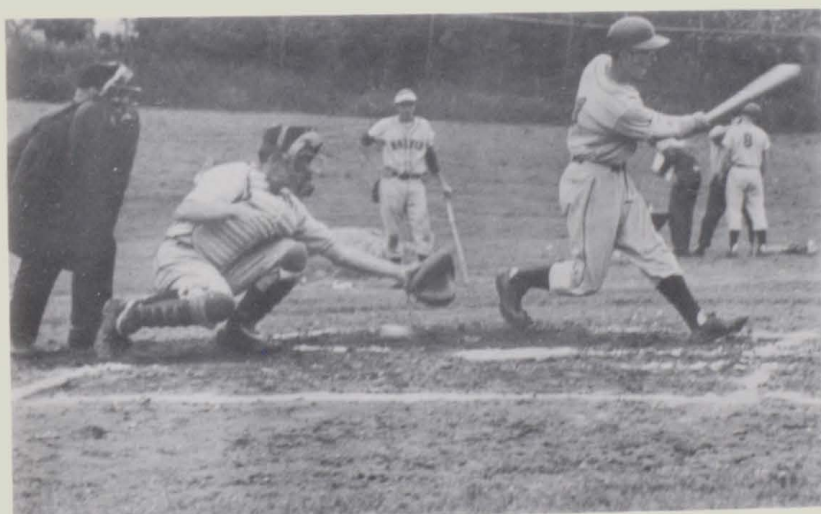

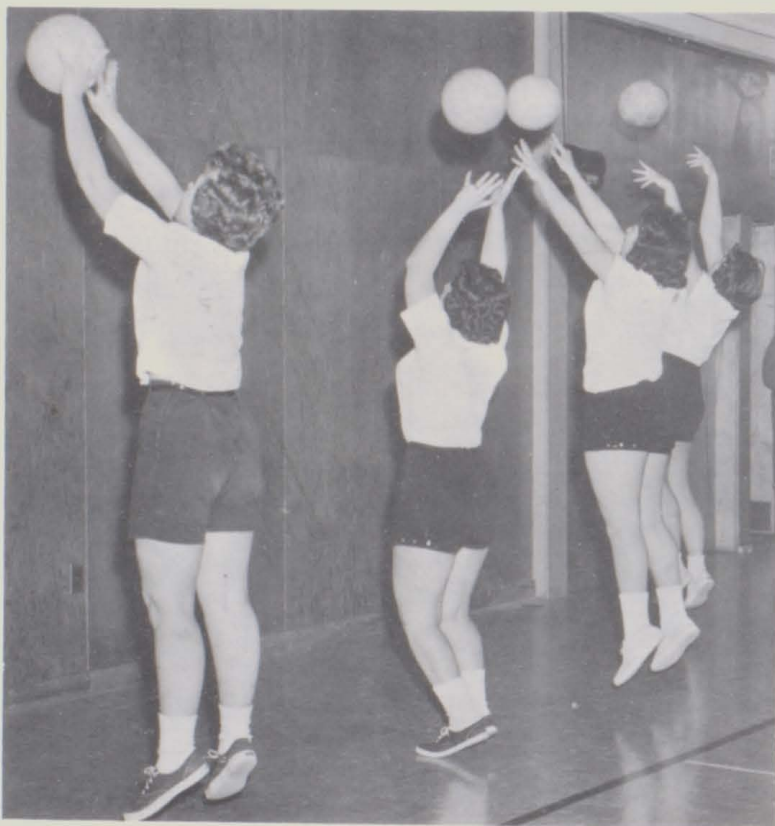

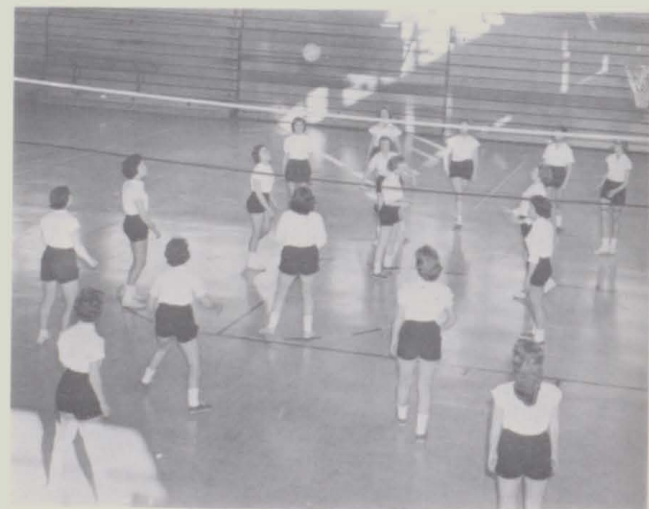


VOLLEYBALL

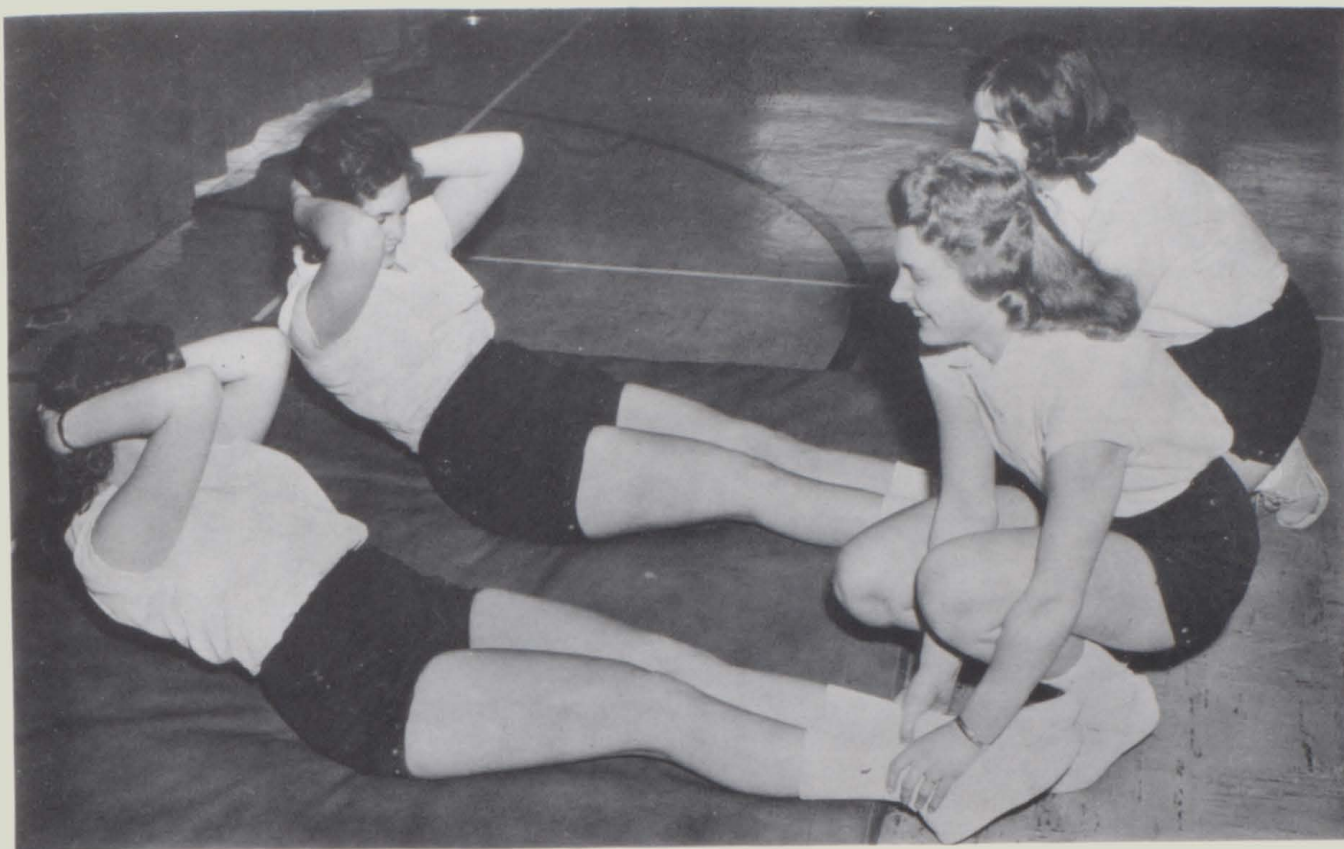

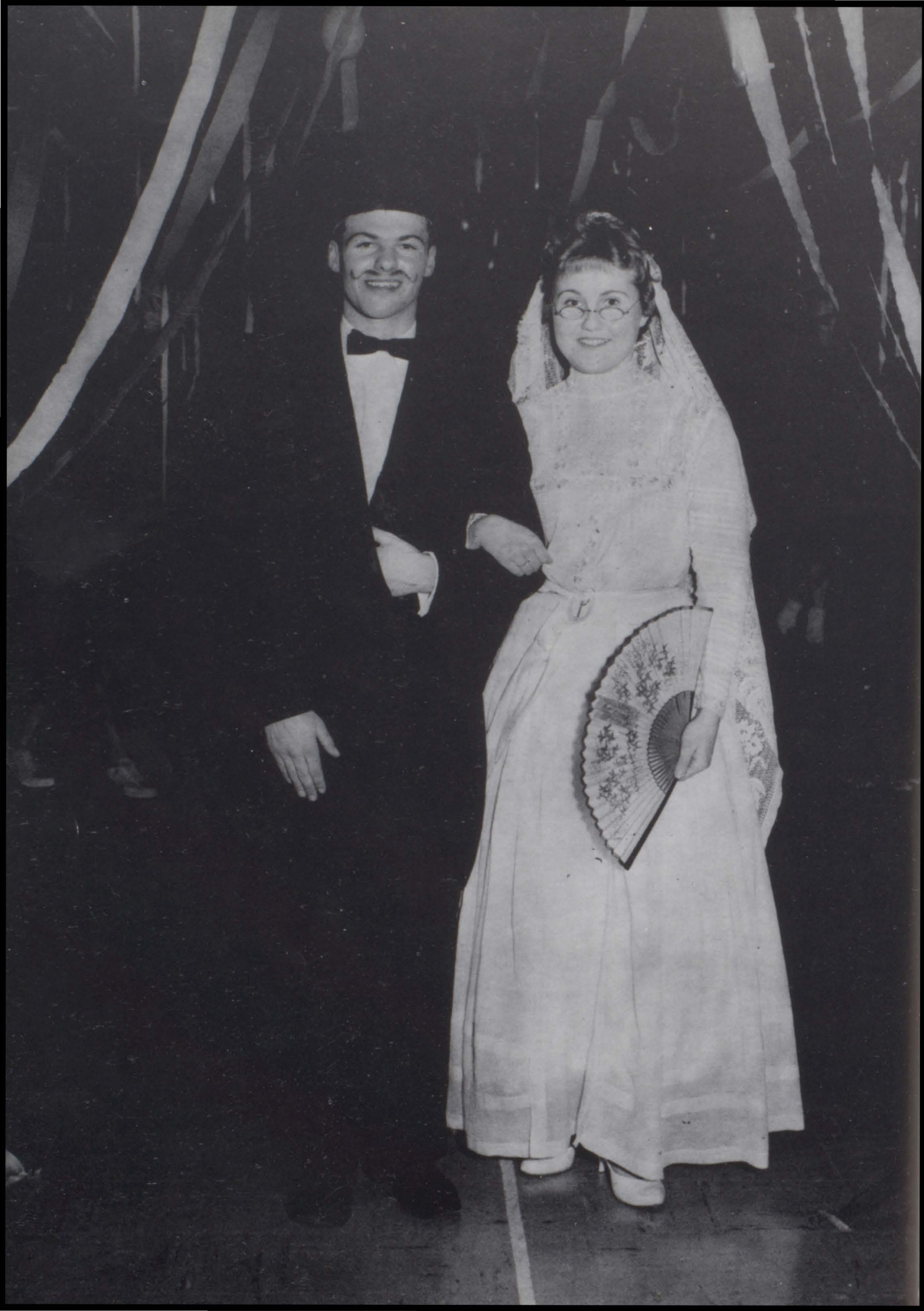

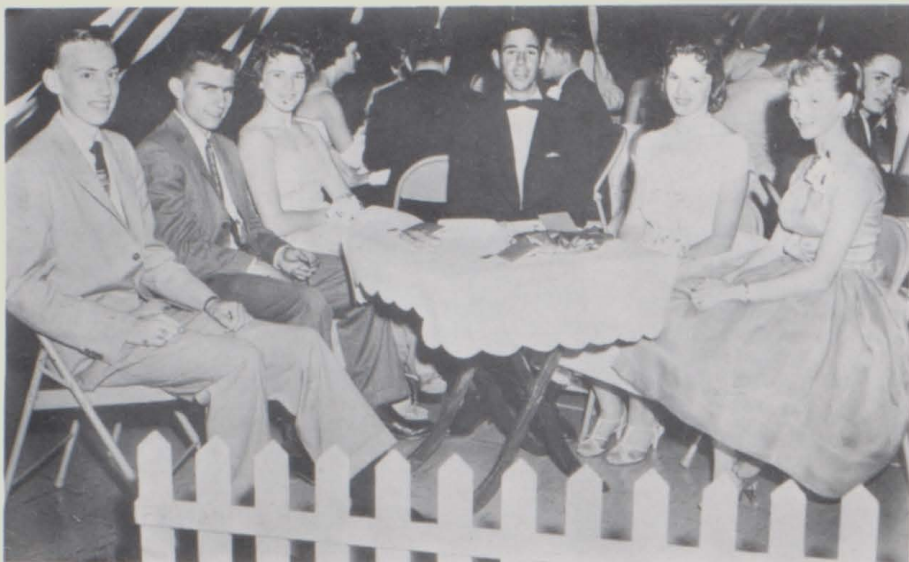
